the winters, although they are rainy and cold) and living close to the sea. We also enjoy the wide variety of friends and acquaintances from all over the world that we've met here.

When I think about our time in Canada... I miss our family (we have 3 children and two grandchildren in Toronto) and friends. We get back once every year or two but unfortunately our children don't get to Corfu very often. Our youngest daughter was married in Turin, Italy 3 years ago so we had a good visit then and our oldest son came to Corfu in January for our 50th wedding anniversary. Interestingly, we find that we also miss the variety of restaurants in Toronto and Bruno's Fine Foods (especially the butcher).

I enjoy being retired in Greece because I can... garden almost all year round, pursue more "Do It Yourself" projects than I ever thought possible and have a very active social life with English, Dutch and Greek friends. We've also managed a bit of travel to Morocco, Egypt, Holland and Italy. I am active in a Greek environmental group (the only foreign member) that is trying to protect the olive groves of Corfu.

As for the future... after having had an old stone house with an attached olive press (in the interior of the island) renovated, living in it part time from 1994 to 1999 and full time from 1999 to the present, we have decided to buy some land on the coast with a sea view and build our dream house.

My advice for other retirees travelling to Greece... don't come to Greece in July or August as it is too hot and there are too many tourists. If you really like the heat come in July but definitely not in August as the tourists from Greece and Italy overwhelm most destinations. The best time is May, June or September. Must do: Athens and Delphi for the antiquities; a cruise (for a week or less) of the Aegean Sea; a week on an island either in the Aegean (Santorini or Rhodes) or in the Ionian (Corfu or Cephalonia).
