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BY WAY OF INTRODUCTION

A Greeting
to
Williams Cousins --

Back in the agricultural boom days following the War between the States, three brothers and a sister of a pioneering Quaker family made their way westward to central Kansas from Lawrence county, Indiana. They were children of Pryor Williams and Anna Kern -- Isaac, Christopher C., James K.P. and Lucy Williams. The mother, twice a widow, came also, to spend the sundown of her life with them. For a goodly number of years, now, their descendants have held an annual reunion at Marion, Kansas.

In 1925, Frank E. Williams of Cedar Point, Kansas, and his cousin Rosetta Reynolds of Williams, Indiana, compiled a record of the descendants of the Kern and Williams families who entered Lawrence county in 1817 from Tennessee and Kentucky.... We began our own project in family history in 1932, on our way from Illinois to a home in California.

The basis of our work on the Williams and Kern lines was the manuscript compiled by Frank Williams and Zettie Reynolds. From that simple but voluminous record of parents and children of six generations the search led back in many directions in the effort to find the American beginnings. Anna Williams-Dwelle (mother of Alice Dixon), with her memories of Indiana and of pioneering in the Cottonwood Valley of Kansas, helped greatly in our quest.

With a Quaker heritage from the Williams tradition, we found a veritable gold mine of family history in the Friends Records of North Carolina, compiled and published by the late Wade W. Hinshaw. We present our findings in that, and in other fields, in this labor of love entitled "American Ancestry of Pryor Williams".

The Quaker movement in North Carolina began independently in 1672 a decade prior to the coming of Penn to the Delaware, with the itinerant preaching of William Edmundson and George Fox on Albemarle Sound. It was the second generation of Penn's colony that began the invasion of the Tar Heel State about 1735.

Pryor Williams's ancestors were intimately connected with both elements of Quaker beginnings in North Carolina. Robert Wilson, John Belman, Jacob Overman, and Samuel Pike were disciples to the preaching of Fox. William Williams and his children, descendants of Richard, the Penn colonist, followed the Quaker migration southward. The two elements united at Cane Creek in Orange (now Chatham) county, N.C.

Robert and Anne Wilson were original members of the Perquimans Meeting, established about 1680. They lived south of the Sound, opposite Perquimans. Their names appear as witnesses at a wedding as early as 1683. Scant records of this and Pasquotank Meeting, set up in 1698, indicate that they had at least three children, Jesse, Isaac and Sarah. Robert was dead by 1699, for when Thomas Story visited in Carolina that year, he left a record of an enthusiastic meeting at the home of the Widow Anne Wilson on the southern side of the Sound.

The fourth wedding recorded in Perquimans minutes, 8-19-1687, was that of Sarah Wilson and John Belman. Among the witnesses were Robert, Anne and Isaac Wilson. Records of Perquimans and Pasquotank supply data on several Belman and Wilson descendants, among whom was Sarah Belman, born 6-28-1688, who married Ephraim Overman in 1708.

Ephraim was the son of Jacob and Dorothea Overman who, with a family of seven children, arrived about 1694 in Carolina from Germany. They may have been Quakers already, converted in Europe by Fox's preaching. Certainly they were devout Friends in Carolina. Existing records have much to say of this family. On Feb. 25, 1694, Governor Thomas Harvey qualified Jacob Overman for a land grant of 400 acres.

Two daughters of Ephraim Overman and Sarah Belman married sons of Samuel and Jean Pike. These also belonged to the Perquimans-Pasquotank Quaker community. Abigail Overman, the oldest child, born 1709, married John Pike; Sarah married a younger brother, Samuel Pike, Jr.

When Josiah Hite of Pennsylvania opened up the Shenandoah Valley to settlement on his huge 120,000-acre grant, he started a flood of migration. John and Abigail Pike, married in 1731, soon found their way to Winchester, Va., where six of their nine children were born, including John, 1741, and Rachel, 1746. The Pikes removed to Orange county, N.C., and were members of the Cane Creek meeting, established in 1751. Three Pike children, John, Rachel and Nathan married children of William and Margaret Williams at Cane Creek.

Richard Williams, Welsh immigrant, arrived with Wm. Penn's Quaker colony. His son William (Pryor's gr-grandfather) was born at Philadelphia in 1719. He married and emigrated to Loudoun county, Va., where most of his children's births were recorded at Fairfax Meeting. The two oldest, however, were born at Philadelphia in 1741 and 1742. The latter, Isaac, married Rachel Pike at Cane Creek, Jan. 24, 1765. In 1772 he removed to Guilford county, and thence to Surry in the extreme west. Isaac Williams, Jr. was born in Surry in 1779. At the age of fourteen he removed with his father's family to French Broad Valley in Jefferson (now Cocke) county, Tennessee. There he married. And there Pryor Williams was born, the fourth child, about 1809/10.

JOHN BELMAN

John Belman and Sarah Wilson of Perquimans Meeting, North Carolina, were Great-great-great-grandparents of Pryor Williams. They were members of the first Quaker meeting in that State. One of the earliest records of that meeting still in existence is a minute of their marriage at the home of Jonathan Phelps:

"On the 19th of the 8th month, 1687, John Belman and Sarah Wilson were married at the house of Jona. Phelps.. Witnesses included Hannah Hill, Hannah Phelps, Johannah Jenkins, Elizabeth White, Robert Beasley, Isaac Wilson, Jona. Phelps, Ann Wilson, Robert Wilson, and William Bundy".

These records throw no further light on the identity of John Belman. But Sarah Wilson was the daughter of two of the witnesses, Robert and Ann Wilson; and was a sister of Isaac.

The family of John Belman and Sarah Wilson is further identified in the records of the Pasquotank Monthly Meeting:

Further records of this family are meagre. But even so, one of them is a record we are happy to find -- the marriage of Sarah to Ephraim Overman. Two others may appear somewhat scandalous!

This is all we have found on the Belman family and ancestry. By 1790 the name had apparently died out, for it does not appear in the North Carolina index of heads of families in the first US Census.

GARRETT GIBSON

This is a page of conjecture.. For we have never found a record which would prove conclusively the parentage of Amelia Gibson. "Long have we wandered in the shades of night" as far as the Gibson line is concerned. When in 1925 Frank Williams and Zettie Reynolds were interviewing descendants of Isaac Williams and Abram Kern for their Williams-Kern family record, they did not arouse a single sleeping memory of Amelia Gibson's forebears.

However we are now, by certain documented facts, induced to believe her to be the daughter of Garrett Gibson of Surry county, NC. Item 1: She named her firstborn son, 1804, Garrett Gibson. Item 2: Heads of Families, 1790, for North Carolina, identify county locations of 62 Gibson families. Of these, seven were in Surry county: Archelus, Garrot, James, two Johns, Valentine and William.

Garrot's record shows: Free white males 16 or over, 1; under 16, 2; free white females, 4; slaves, none. To recap: Father 1; mother, 1; sons under 16, 2; daughters, 3. Probably the three girls as well as the two boys were under 16. Otherwise they would very likely have found husbands and would be enumerated with other families.

To analyze further: If this is Amelia's family, and she was 16, she would have been born in 1774, five years before Isaac Williams, the man she married about 1802. Again, if she were ten years younger than Isaac, she would have been born in 1789 and still fit into the pattern of the 1790 census record. She would also have been about 14 years of age when married and about 40 when the youngest child arrived.

Now back to the facts: There is little mention of 1790 Gibsons in the Quaker records. Westfield minutes -- the meeting which covered Surry county, NC, Grayson county, Va., and Jefferson county, Tenn., -- show Garret Gibson receiving a certificate to the Lost Creek Meeting on Feb. 15, 1800. No mention is made of wife or children. We must believe therefore that Garret Gibson was a lone family convert to the Truths of Quakerism. Either he did not request a certificate for his children, or they were adults on their own.

Garrett Gibson was a substantial citizen, well thought of by the Society of Friends, as evidenced by two surviving records of the Lost Creek Meeting. The first shows his reception into membership on March 22, 1800, just five weeks after the certificate of removal was issued at Westfield. The other, dated May 22, 1802, shows him chosen Overseer for the Lost Creek Meeting. This is the last Garrett Gibson reference we have found. We believe that he was the father of Amelia and the grandfather of Pryor Williams.

Cocke county, Tenn., was created out of eastern Jefferson county in 1797. It included most of the earlier settlements on both sides of the French Broad River. The first Quaker settlers came to this area in 1784. Two Williams families (Isaac and William) came in 1792. The Lost Creek Meeting was set up in 1797. Between 1802 and 1820 many Lost Creek Friends removed to Indiana. Springfield Meeting was established in Wayne County. But Isaac Williams and his sister Rachel Adamson, with their families, took letters to the Lick Creek Meeting further south, and settled in 1817 on the White River in what is now Lawrence County, near the site of Bedford.

We claim Abraham Kern, his wife Catherine, and his mother Elizabeth as ancestors of Anna Kern, the wife of Pryor Williams, Lawrence County Pioneer of 1817. Pennsylvania Archives show this Abraham Kern taking the Oath of Allegiance on Sept. 21, 1731. He came on the ship Brittania, Michael Franklin, Master. Ages of the three Rotterdam immigrants were given as Elizabeth, 55, Catherine, 22, and Abraham, 23. Although we believe this Abraham to be the immigrant ancestor of our Kern Clan, to date we have found no documents to prove this.

With wife Catherine, 22, and mother Elizabeth, 55, arrived at Philadelphia from Rotterdam on Ship Brittania, 1731.

Of Berks and Bucks counties, Pa. Names of the following children were given by Mr. W. W. Smith of Moscow, Idaho, in 1942. Order and date of birth of first six is unknown. Abram Kern II was a Dunkard Preacher. Sometime prior to 1800 he removed to Nicholas County, Ky. (possibly via North Carolina).

ABRAHAM KERN III

Born, Bucks co., Pa., 1786; d. 1858, Lawrence co., Indiana.

NOTE: In the 1850 Census he gave North Carolina as his place of birth. He was 64 years of age. If statement was correct, it indicates a temporary residence of his family in North Carolina prior to removal to Nicholas co., Ky.

Abraham Kern III, like his father, Abram II, was a Dunkard Preacher. One of his pastorates was the Old Union Church, Lawrence County. In 1807 he married Susan Wilson, b. 1786 in Pennsylvania. Six children were born in Nicholas co., Ky. In 1817 Preacher Kern decided to remove to the White River country of southern Indiana. Enroute he fell in with the families of Isaac Williams and Rachel Williams-Adamson moving up from Cocke co., Tenn. They decided to settle as neighbors in the new land.

JACOB OVERMAN

Whether or not the immigrant Jacob Overman, Sr., with his wife Dorothea and seven children, were Quakers before arrival in North Carolina, we do not know. But we do know that they came from Germany in or prior to the year 1694; and that they constituted an influential Quaker family in eastern meetings. Hundreds of Overman entries are found in the records of various North Carolina meetings.

The Colonial Records of North Carolina for the year 1694 show Governor Thomas Harvey qualifying Jacob Overman for a grant of 400 acres due him as an immigrant settler. The date -- February 25, 1694.

(*) NOTE: These two Overman-Trueblood marriages are recorded as Ephraim and Isaac, "sons of Ephraim". However, since Ephraim, Sr. died in 1732, it appears likely that the Ephraim and Isaac named may be sons of Ephraim Jr., and grandsons of Ephraim, Sr.

The Elder Ephraim was a devout, peace-loving Quaker. But on at least one occasion he assisted an officer and defended himself manfully with a weapon. What the incident was the record does not clarify, but someone reported his lapse of morals to the Pasquotank meeting, and Brother Ephraim was tried before his peers. So, on the 15th day of the 9th month in the year 1711 -- the year his first son Joseph was born -- he stood before the Meeting and condemned his unchristian and warlike misbehavior!

Samuel Pike, Sr., and his wife Jean (or Jane) were among the early members of the Pasquotank Meeting. Records state that Samuel died in 1718, 8th day, 3rd month, but do not indicate his age. His widow Jean married Arnould White, Jr., at Little River, 4-9-1720. Many North Carolina Pikes are descended from this pioneer Quaker family. But records do not always clearly indicate the line of descent.

Various record entries have survived relating to the Quaker families of John and Samuel who intermarried with the Overmans. Samuel removed to Opequin, Va., but returned later to Pasquotank. John took Abigail to the Shenandoah Valley in 1736, where six of his children were born. He later removed to Orange county, NC where his family helped pioneer the Cane Creek Meeting, and where he died and was buried. His monument can be seen at the Cane Creek cemetery.

JOHN PIKE

Son of Samuel, Sr.; born, Pasquotank, NC 4-14-1702; died at Cane Creek, 1-15-1774, and is buried adjacent to the Meeting House.

Married Abigail, daughter of Ephraim Overman, (leave to marry) 9-4-1731. She was born at Pasquotank, 3-19-1709; died at Deep River, Guilford county, NC, 2-23-1781.

The records of Cane Creek Monthly Meeting show three intermarriages between children of John Pike and William Williams: John to Priscilla Williams, Rachel to Isaac Williams, and Nathan to Elizabeth Williams. Family records of all three of these marriages are given in considerable detail, and will be reproduced in Williams Family history when this record is amplified at some future time.

John and Priscilla and many of their descendants remained at Cane Creek. Isaac and Rachel removed, via Guilford and Surry counties, to Cocke county, Tenn. Nathan and Elizabeth, with their family and his mother Abigail Overman-Pike, removed to Deep River Meeting in western Guilford county, where Abigail died in 1781.

ROBERT WILSON

Robert and Anne Wilson, Great-gr-gr-gr Grandparents of Pryor Williams, were among the earliest North Carolina converts to the itinerant preaching of William Edmundson and Founder George Fox about Albemarle Sound in eastern North Carolina. Their evangelistic endeavors led to the setting up of the first North Carolina Quaker Meeting at Perquimans in 1680.

Robert and Anne Wilson attended meetings at various homes in Perquimans county, and signed as witnesses at several weddings. Robert died before 1700. Thomas Story visited the Widow Wilson's home on the south side of the Sound in 1699, and reported a fine meeting there.

Although records of these early meetings are few indeed, they indicate that Robert and Anne were the parents of at least three children: Sarah, Isaac and Jesse. Of Jesse and Sarah we have but little information. But there is more data on Isaac's family.

RICHARD WILLIAMS

Family tradition has it that he was a Welsh Quaker, and that he came with William Penn. This we have been unable to verify by record. But Cane Creek records in North Carolina state that his wife's name was Margaret, and that they had at least one son, William, born in Philadelphia county, Pa., in 1719. William also had a wife Margaret, and had a daughter Priscilla and a son Isaac born at Philadelphia. This Isaac was the grandfather of Pryor Williams.

Following the Quaker migration to the Shenandoah Valley, William took his family to Loudoun county, Va., where they were members of Fairfax Meeting. Eight children were born there. In December 1762 this family was received at Cane Creek, Orange county, NC, where the last of William and Margaret's eleven children was born.

Records of the Society of Friends in North Carolina and Tennessee have done well by this family. Of the eleven children, there are eleven birth records. Three children, ages 8, 17, and 20, died in 1766 within a six-week period, of some unrecorded frontier ailment.

There are eight marriage records, seven of which are replete with names and dates of birth of 81 great-grandchildren of Quaker Immigrant Richard -- including Isaac (Jr.) and Rachel (Adamsen) who went from Tennessee to Indiana in 1817.

The records also show that this Williams family led the stampede of Quaker Migration from East Tennessee to Indiana. In the spring of 1814, William (#11) and his son Richard, took their families with letters to White Water Meeting, from Newberry in Blount county, and were thus among the first settlers of Wayne county, Indiana.

III. ISAAC WILLIAMS, SR

Son of William and Margaret Williams; born, Philadelphia co., Pa. 11-7-1742; died Cocke co., Tenn.; married Rachel, dau. of John and Abigail (Overman) Pike at Cane Creek Meeting, Orange county, NC., 1-24-1765. She was born at Winchester, Va., 10-10-1746, and died 5-8-1789 in Surry co., NC.

Isaac m. 2nd, at Lost Creek Meeting, 12-26-1792, Hannah, dau. of Thomas and Sarah (Antram) Beals. She was born in Guilford county, NC 12-13-1759; took a certificate to the Lick Creek Meeting in Indiana in 1828, and probably spent her last days in Lawrence county.

Isaac Williams was a great pioneer. Born in Philadelphia, as a child he travelled down the Valley of Virginia to Loudoun county, where he grew to young manhood. As a young man he removed again with his family to Orange county, NC. Married to Rachel Pike, he removed again to Guilford county in 1772, and in 1775 to Surry county in the "far west". After Rachel's death in 1789 he moved on to the frontier Quaker settlement on the French Broad. He was an original member of Westfield meeting in Surry, established 1786; and of Lost Creek in Jefferson co., Tenn., set up in 1797; also Deep Creek Meeting, 1778.

A staunch Friend, Isaac raised sixteen sons and daughters in the way of Truth. But most of them left the fold, or were disowned for conduct or marriage contrary to discipline. Three of his daughters by Hannah Beals disgraced ^{him} by running away to the Methodists! Nothing has been learned of his descendants other than the families of Isaac (Jr.) and Rachel (Adamson) who removed to Indiana in 1817.

Rachel Pike died the same date her twins were born, 5-8-1789. She was a noble Quaker woman, braving hardships and dangers of a raw savage frontier for a quarter century, and bearing eleven stalwart sons and daughters, all of whom reached adulthood. At the time of their mother's death, Rachel was a lass of thirteen, Isaac was ten.

LOST CREEK TO WHITE RIVER

John Mills started the Quaker settlement in Jefferson county, Tenn in 1784. It was an explosive society. Many members were lost due to marriage "out", or to conduct, military or otherwise, not approved by the church. Numerous Quakers -- including the Williams families-- settled on Indian land south of the French Broad, causing numerous Indian depredations in the area.

By the Treaty of Holston, July 2, 1791, the Cherokees gave up their coveted agricultural strip south of the Broad. A special census enumerated nearly 4000 settlers in the strip: 681 free white males 21 or over; 1082 under 21; 1627 free white females; 63 other free people; 163 slaves. They were not all Quakers, but the low incidence of slavery indicates strong Quaker sentiment.

The Manumission Society of Tennessee was founded at Lost Creek in 1815 by Charles Osborn who, a decade later, laid out the town of Economy, Indiana. Elihu Embree, a Lost Creek slave-owner (and cousin to many Williamses, published the first abolition newspaper, the Manumission Intelligencer, to be followed shortly by his Emancipator. Cocke County and the Lost Creek Meeting were both set up in 1797.

One of the earliest Lost Creek minutes shows Rachel Williams condemning her marriage (contrary to discipline) to Byrd Adamson. Nine children were born to Rachel here at Lost Creek; and six to Isaac and Amelia Williams. They wanted to establish homes on free soil north of the Ohio. So, in the late fall of 1817 they set out for Indiana -- with three wagons, six Williams children, eight Adamson children, and letters for the Lick Creek Meeting. Garrett, the oldest Williams boy, got the last drink from the old spring.

From French Broad they rolled over the trails to the Ohio. Somewhere in Kentucky they fell in with Abraham and Sarah Kern and six children. The families found immediate affinity! They settled as neighbors on the White River. The children grew up together and intermarried. And their descendants are legion!

OBITUARY OF MRS. ANNA DWELLE

Anna E. Williams was born in Bedford, Indiana, May 26, 1869, daughter of Christopher C. and Elizabeth Ann Williams. The family came to Chase County in 1883, located two miles east of Cedar Point and became a part of the pioneer life of the community. In young womanhood she united with the Christian church. She taught two terms of school and for more than fifty years she was a member of the Ladies Guild of Cedar Point.

On February 27, 1890, she was married to Ferguson E. Dwelle and went to live two miles south of Cedar Point on his farm which remained the family home for more than 35 years. Four children were born to this union, all of whom survive: Mrs. Alice Dixon of Washington, D. C.; Mrs. Ruth Grimwood of Cedar Point, Donald J. Dwelle of Cedar Point and Wm. P. Dwelle of Marion.

Mr. Dwelle passed away in 1922; Mrs. Dwelle passed away at the Marion Hospital February 26, 1945 at the age of 75 years, 9 months. Funeral services were held in the Florence Christian church March first, with the minister, Rev. E. F. Parnell, in charge. Music was furnished by a mixed quartet; Mrs. Fred Koch, Mrs. M. F. Morgan, Mr. Lyle Utz, Mr. Bernard Strongberg, Miss Maxine Ward, pianist.

Burial was in the family plot in Cedar Point cemetery, near the Dwelle family home on Cedar Creek. Pall bearers were Whit Byram, S. P. Fisher, F. L. Grimwood, W. R. Ice, Harry Hefley and E. C. Lambert.

Additional survivors are a stepson, Edward C. Dwelle, Old Joe, Arkansas; six grandchildren; one sister, Mrs. Z. A. Emerson, Denver and two brothers, Henry E. and Frank E. Williams, Cedar Point.

THE WILLIAMS CLAN IN KANSAS

All of the Pryor Williams family, except Aunt Jane Reynolds, went west after the Civil War -- and most of them got as far west as central Kansas. James K. Polk took Antoinette and three children to Marion county in 1871 -- and there doubled his progeny. He was followed by Elijah and Lucy Crawford, who stopped off at Cottonwood in Chase county; by Uncle Isaac, the old bachelor; and by Grandmother Anna, twice bewidowed. Last to go was Christopher Columbus. In 1882 he took his family to the Cottonwood Valley in Chase county. It was for his wife's health, who had not long to live. She recovered and lived another 35 years. He died within three!

POSTSCRIPT AND FORECAST

If you have been wondering what the catalogue serials represent at the bottoms of preceding pages, be advised they are for your convenience should you ever wish to have additional copies of any of this material. The stencils have been preserved and catalogued, and will be available for processing additional copies of this first brochure of "Family Historians". Future publication will continue these serials and add other family names that come within the scope of our publication.

We have been following this family hobby for almost three decades, starting our collections in 1931 with a "frontal attack" on Dixons and Kinkades. "Our Book: Dixon-Nicholas, Kinkade-Spillman" was our first genealogical work, published in an edition of 100 copies in 1932. Several other works, less comprehensive, have been completed in typescript on the families of Adamson, Culbertson, Dixon, Dwelle, Francisco, Kern, MacBride, Sears, Spillman and Williams. Copies of most of these have been placed in the Library of Congress and the Institute of American Genealogy.

Through the years we have assembled a large amount of genealogical material on our own and other families in which we have been interested. Due, however, to the pressures of the war years, and to our sponsorship of the recent Overland Mail Centennials, we have been unable to devote as much time as we should have wished, to correspondence, or to publication, in the field of family history.

As we approach our Biblical allotment of earth-time, we have decided not to postpone this all important matter any longer. So, beginning with this Pryor Williams brochure, we hope to issue similar items two or three times a year -- just as often as we can prepare the material for making the required mimeograph stencils.

THE PRYOR WILLIAMS FAMILY IN KANSAS

1870 - 1960

The second part of this gene⁴alogy has been prepared by the Williams relatives whose grandparents migrated to Kansas. It is intended as a tribute to these older folk who passed on this sense of loyalty, pride and integrity.

There were celebrated men in this family. Dr. Elkanah Williams of Cincinnati, Ohio, provided the impetus for Dr. Abraham Williams' study and higher standards of practice in St. Louis. He also arranged higher educational facilities at Cincinnati for James K. P. Williams.

James Knox Polk Williams added two years to his actual age that he might enlist in the local Company B, 18th Indiana Infantry from Bedford Indiana, going into the Civil War on August 16, 1861. He participated in Shiloh, Donaldson, capture of Vicksburg, Pea Ridge and many others during which time neither he nor any of his mess of four had received a wound.

On July 20th, 1864, at Peach Tree Creek, Ga., Hood fell upon their division while under Sherman on his March to the Sea, and out of that bitter struggle, when they went into camp, only one was left of the four companions, and Mr. Williams in relating the incident said it was the saddest day of his army life when he had to write home to the relatives of his companions, that they had fallen that day.

Mr. Williams was wounded by the fragments of a shell, but continued in the war his full time and honorably discharged August 18th, 1864, having served three years and two days. He returned to Bedford, Indiana, at the close of the war and engaged in the mercantile business with his wife's father, John Reed.

Isaac Williams, a bachelor, had been through the fertile country of Chase and Marion Counties by ox team on his way to California during the Gold Rush. When he returned to Indiana, he recounted the possibilities of farm and cattle operations in this new country. In 1871, James K. Williams and Isaac Williams, came to Marion County and located near Florence. His family came in April of 1872.

Isaac and J. K. Williams were closely associated in this enterprise until Isaac's death in 1886. James K. Williams' ability was widely known. He was County Commissioner for eighteen years. When the new and present court house of Marion County was built, it was trimmed with stone from his beloved town of Bedford, Indiana.

He felt his duty and responsibility to each child and the grandchildren as they appeared in the family. His all-wise discipline was kindly and has served as a source of great pride to these grandchildren. The memories that he and his beloved wife have provided their respective grandchildren is a heritage that will endure so long as they shall live. May the generations which follow, realize the value of such a heritage.

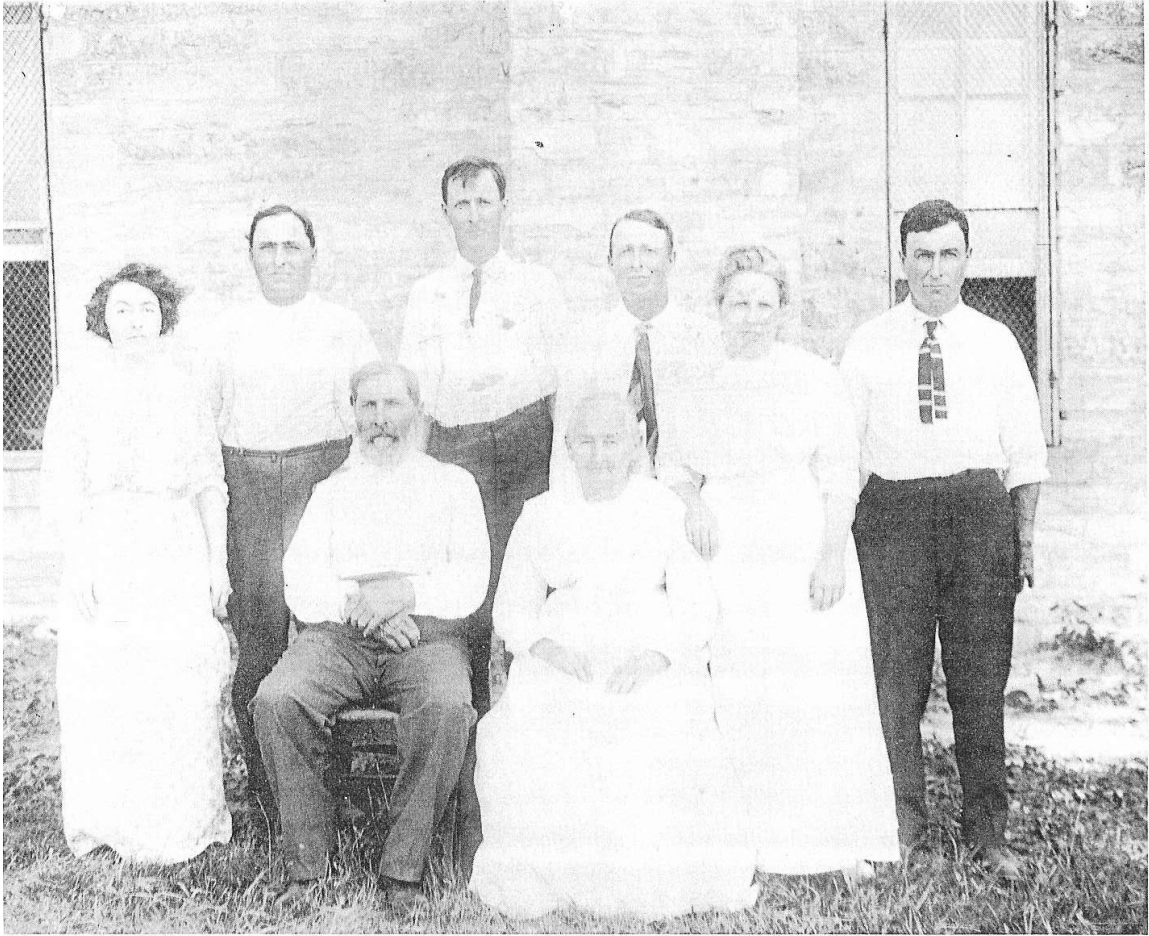
