Somerset County. On the fifth day of December, in the year  
of our Lord eighteen hundred & thirty one  
personally appeared in open Court of Common Pleas in  
for said County Jacob Beckhart resident in said County  
of Somerset, aged seventy three years, who being first duly  
Sworn, according to law, doth on his oath make the following  
declaration: in order to obtain the provision, made by the acts  
of Congress of the 18<sup>th</sup> March 1818 and 1<sup>st</sup> May 1820, viz.  
"I entered the Public Service of my Country by enlisting in  
the Town of Reading, Berks County, & State of Pennsylvania  
in the month of June, seventeen hundred & seventy six, in  
the Company commanded by Captain Jacob Brown for  
service, under Major Beale, in the regiment of 60th Dragoon  
in that part of the army of the Revolution under the  
command of General Sterling - that I served in the army  
from the period of my enlistment until the 27<sup>th</sup> day of  
August 1776 at which time I was taken prisoner by the  
enemy, on Flat-Bush bottom, at the battle of Long  
Island - That I remained in captivity five months  
& two weeks, when I was released on parole - That I was  
exchanged about one year after my release, after which  
exchange, I entered the continental army under Capt  
Ream & Major Banister and continued in the service  
two months - and that subsequently I served a short  
campaign in New Jersey under Major Alder - That  
I was a non-commissioned Officer (viz. Corporal) during  
part of the time I served in the army of the Revolution  
and in pursuance of the act of Congress of 1<sup>st</sup> May 1820  
I do solemnly swear "that I was a resident citizen of the  
United States on the 18<sup>th</sup> day of March 1818, and that I  
have not since that time by gift, sale, or in any  
manner whatever, disposed of any property or any part  
thereof, with intent thereby so to diminish it, as to bring my  
self within the provision of an act of Congress entitled an  
act to provide for certain persons engaged in the land  
& naval service of the United States in the revolutionary  
war, passed on the 18<sup>th</sup> day of March 1818, and that  
I have not, nor has any person in trust for me any  
property, or securities, contracts, or debts due to me, no have

act of Congress of the 7<sup>th</sup> of June 1832.

State of Pennsylvania

County of Somerset A.D.

On the fourth day of September A.D.  
eighteen hundred and thirty two personally  
appeared before the judges of the court of  
Common Pleas of the said county and  
commonwealth Jacob Burkhardt a resident  
of the township of Allegheny in the county  
and commonwealth aforesaid aged seventy  
four years, who after being first duly sworn  
according to law, doth, on his oath, make  
the following declaration, in order to obtain  
the benefit of the provision made by the  
act of Congress passed June 7<sup>th</sup>. 1832. That  
he was born in the town of Reading in  
the county of Berks and State of Pennsylvania  
on the 8<sup>th</sup> day of May A.D. 1758. where he  
resided until enlisted in the army of the  
United States on the — day of June  
seventeen hundred & seventy six in the  
company commanded by Captain Jacob  
Kreul (or Croul) under Major Bird, in the  
regiment of Colonel — in that part of  
the army of the revolution under the  
command of General Sterling - That he  
marched through Trenton, Princeton,  
Brentwood, Somers, Paulus Hook, to  
New York and from thence to Long Island  
where on the 27<sup>th</sup> day of August 1776 he  
was taken prisoner by the enemy on  
Flatbush bottom, at the battle of Long  
Island - That he remained in captivity five  
months & two weeks from the said 27<sup>th</sup> day of  
August 1776 when he was released on parole -  
That he was not exchanged for about one year

Dear Madam:

Reference is made to your letter in which you designate the following named Revolutionary War soldiers as those whose records you desire, Jacob Burkhart, George Burkhart, Sebastian Burkhart, John Harger, and John Adams and his son, Robert, of or near Alexandria, Virginia.

A search of the Revolutionary War records fails to show claims for pension on file based upon service of John or Robert Adams as described by you, or of any John Harger or Sebastian Burkhart; similar spellings of the surnames have been used in the search. As previously stated, the record of George Burghart (Burkhart), R. 1402, which was furnished you is that of the only soldier with that name found on the Revolutionary War records of this office. The record of Jacob Burkhart is given herein as found in the papers on file in his claim for pension, S. 22150, based upon his service in the Revolutionary War.

Jacob Burkhart was born May 8, 1758, in Reading Berks County, Pennsylvania; the names of his parents are not shown.

While a resident of Reading, Pennsylvania, he enlisted sometime in June 1776, served as corporal in Captain Crowle's company, Colonel Lutz' Pennsylvania regiment, was in the battle of Long Island, was taken prisoner on August 27, 1776, was held five months and two weeks, and was then released on parole and, in about a year, was exchanged. He enlisted sometime in May 1778, and served two months as private in Captain Ihess's company, under Major Carrigher in the Pennsylvania troops; he enlisted in the fall of 1778, and served three weeks as private in Captain Scober's company under Major Udree.

The soldier resided in Reading, Pennsylvania, until 1795, then

moved to Allegheny Township, Somerset County, Pennsylvania.

He was allowed pension on his application executed September 4, 1832, at which time he resided in Allegheny Township, Somerset County, Pennsylvania; he had resided there ever since he moved from Reading, Pennsylvania.

In 1831, the soldier referred to his wife as the mother of twenty-seven children since their marriage, but he did not give her name, nor are the names of any children shown.

In 1831, John Burkhart, soldier's brother, was a resident of Somerset County, Pennsylvania; he was born August 11, 1756.
