THOMAS BLANTON 1646 Eng-1697 Va

Colonial Records of Henrico County, Virginia. Book I, p 153. 1680. In a deposition, THOMAS BLANTON stated that he was 34 that year. Evidently he was born around the year 1646 and is the first THOMAS BLANTON among the Colonists from Great Britain to America.

THOMAS BLANTON received fifty acres for each person brought into the Colony of Virginia. It is thought he had his own ship, as records prove he amassed a large acreage.

Virginia Colonial Records Vol 13, p 522 by Fleet. November 2, 1672 Charles City, County, Virginia. A Power of Attorney was given to THOMAS BLANTON of Martins Prandon in Virginia, by John SADLIER and Thos QUINEY "so that he might sell our plantation in the James River and also Merchants Hope in Virginia, in parts beyond the seas."

The land granted to THOMAS BLANTON is located about 15 miles south of Fredericksburg, Virginia and 12 miles west of Bowling Green, the County Seat of Caroline County. The Post Office and Village of Plantons, Virginia was named for the early Blanton family.

The will of THOMAS BLANTON, dated Seventh day of February 1697/8 recorded in Book 9, page 160 Tappahannock, Essex County, Virginia was proved in Essex County Court by the oathes of Jno DOUGHTY and Jno BUTCHER, on "ye 16th day of March Ano Dom 1697."

THOMAS BLANTON bequeaths his Soul to the Lord that gave it him, and his body to the earth from whenth it came. He speaks of "my loving wife Jene (Jane) Blanton. My daughter Jene Blanton, and my other daughter Elizabeth Blanton." He gives one Town Gray Mare being about two years ole, branded with his brand, to these two daughters. The said Mare to run and her increase for the benefit of these two daughters.

THOMAS BLANTON gives to his four sons:

THOMAS; and JOHN; and WILLIAM; and RICHARD BLANTON all of his land, it to be equally divided unto them and if either of them shall die <u>before</u> he <u>shall come of age</u>, then his part shall come to the others and so in case to them all. Son RICHARD BLANTON shall have the plantation in his part. The will provides that the wife shall have the plantation for her life.

The will of THOMAS BLANTON reveals that none of the four sons was of age in 1697. All four would have become of age by or before 1718.

Note: The above mentioned JOHN; WILLIAM: and RICHARD BLANTON are undoubtedly three of the four sons mentioned in the will of THCMAS BLANTON. No record is found of THCMAS, son of THCMAS BLANTON who died 1697.

The will of RICHARD BLANTON, Spotsylvania County, Virginia 1734 is quite long and extremely difficult to read; certain portions are obliterated entirely. The Will reveals:

Richard Blanton died 1734 Spotsylvania County, Virginia wife: Elizabeth Blanton

Three daughters: Priscilla; Elizabeth; and Mary Elanton. "each to be put to school two years at the charge of my estate."

Sons:
Richard Blanton to be put to school two years at the charge of estate."
Thomas Blanton be put to school four years at the charge of the estate.

Provision is made for division of estate "amongst my surviving children, to be divided as my children come to age or marry."

None of these children was of age in 1734 at time of Richard Blanton's

THOMAS H. BLANTON

The late Thomas H. Blanton served as superintendent of Carmel Baptist Sunday School from 1934-1949.

The following reflections were recorded the day he was buried in Bowling Green October 20, 1965:

A description of personal impressions as well as of the life and death of a beloved banker and statesman are set forth following the funeral today of former Senator Thomas H. Blanton of Virginia, a Baptist who served Carmel Church and the Hermon Baptist Association.

Bank president, Democratic Party leader, former State Senator, Tom Blanton of Bowling Green, Virginia, was laid to rest today in the midst of brown and yellow autumn chrysanthemums. Dignataries and friends gathered from all over Virginia, and one floral spray of late red rosebuds had a tell-tale streamer lettered with "Mr. Chairman," striking a pathetic chord sounded from the directors of one of his many enterprises.

Born in Caroline County, Virginia, he made his way through the schools to eventually receive his legal degree from the University of Virginia in 1921.

He served as commonwealth attroney of his own county, then was elected president of the Union Bank and Trust Company in Bowling Green in 1925.

His business interests extended to the Tidewater Telephone Company and several businesses in Richmond and over the state of Virginia.

Entering a political career as state senator, his greatest contributions were after he reached 50 years of age. He would have been 70 had he lived one more day. As Democratic Party chairman and state senator, as well as chairman of a Commission which built the new state office building, he reached a pinnacle when that building was named "The Blanton Building."

As one surveyed the tremendous crowd standing on the hillside in the autumn sunshine facing the cemetery's treesurrounded lake, people whom Tom Blanton's life had touched could be seen with controlled mourning etched on their face.

Homeowners, colored and white, who had their houses financed through his bank.

Small businessmen who owed their business careers to his help.

Colleagues from the bank who bore his casket of rich bronze, and one lamented, "I worked beside him for 40 years."

Members of Carmel Baptist Church were there. Mr. Blanton had served as Sunday School superintendent and first B.Y.P.U. president, and was now serving as a trustee of the church which he joined in 1905.

One saw political proteges who, with his firm backing, were now slated for leadership in the Virginia Legislature. Yet, it is reported that he himself never made a campaign speech, had any opposition in a political race, or spent a dollar to gain election!

The Virginia Legislature could be spotted here and there: Senator and Mrs. Garland Gray, former governor Lindsay Almond, and others.


Business acquaintances and associates were in the teeming crowd, and the dignified snowwhite hair of Governor Albertis S. Harrison made him distinguished in the group.

The minister intoned, "Let thy work appear unto thy servants, "led in the closing Lord's Prayer, and the crowd dispersed leaving his body to rest, his family to their sorrow, and this county, and state to their mourning.

We buried Tom Blanton today as autumn converged around his lakeside grave in his native Caroline County.


The Blanton Building is located in Capitol Soua Richmond, Virginia.

MEMORANDUM OF HARRISON BLANTON

Frankfort, Ky. August 28, 1875

"My Grandfather, Richard Blanton, Sr., was born in Virginia. His ancestors were from England. My Grandmother was a SNEED. Their children were:

All of the children except Mrs. Vaughan and my uncle Charles Blanton moved to Kentucky and raised large families.

My Grandmother was aunt of James Lewis and William SNEED who died in this county, and Thomas REDD of this county, and Samuel REDD of Lexington, Ky. The sons of my grandfather, the three Sneeds and the two Redds were remarkable for their similarity of mind, habits and dispositions. They were unsurpassed as men of integrity and uprightness. There were no great men or office holders among them. All discharged their duties as good citizens.

"The second class has gone very much like the ancestors. No great men and few wanted public office. Dr. James Blanton settled in Owen County, Ky., he was the son of my Uncle John Blanton, and was for many years a leading politician of this county. For several sessions he was a member of the Legislature. ... He was then a true Owen County Democrat....

"Among the incidents of the life of my Grandfather Blanton, and which he related to his family was his agency in apprehending and committing to jail, the Rev. Joseph Craig, for preaching sometime before the Revolution. He was made Sheriff of his County. (Caroline County, Va.) It was his duty to execute the laws. About the same time a revival of religion took place principally among Baptists. They were then living under the old laws of England which prohibited public preaching of any other doctrine than that of the Church of England, or what is now the Episcopal Church. Joseph Craig being one of the most zealous and considered one of the most dangerous among the Baptists, was arrested by my grandfather under the proper authorities of law and committed to the Fredericksburg jail. Craig could not, however, be stopped from preaching. Large crowds collected around the jail to hear him through the grating until it was found necessary to release him as he was doing more mischief in, than out of jail. Our grandfather told us that this was his first official act as Sheriff. He died at a great age between 90 and 100 years, - near the Grassy Spring Meeting House between Frankfort and Versailles. Rev. Joseph Craig came to Kentucky, settled in Woodford County, or Fayette County, and was among the leading Baptist preachers of his day in establishing churches and organizing societies. He was the Grandfather of our Newton Craig of Scott County, Kentucky.

"My father (Richard Blanton) was a soldier in the Revolution. He went as a substitute for his brother John. He was very young at the time, not old enough to be drafted. Was at Gates' defeat and I have heard him tell what a great race he made at that time -ran 60 miles to his home without stopping.

"My mother was the daughter of John Combs, brother of Seth Combs of Stafford County, Virginia. They had six sons and two daughters who lived to old age. Of the grandchildren General Leslie Combs now of Lexington, has been the only prominent politician and office-holder. Another of the grandsons who was prominent in Society was Dr Ennis Combs, late of Montgomery County. He had a good reputation as a physician and probably did more good than any one of the connection. My grandmother Combs was a daughter of one of the Bulletts of Dumfries County, Va. She was also an aunt of Alex. Scott Bullett of Jefferson County, Ky. who was formerly Lieutenant Governor and Speaker of the Senate and also connected with the large family of Bulletts of Louisville, Ky. She was in her 50th year when my mother was born and lost her husband when my mother was about fifteen years old. She continued for many years afterward to manage her farm, -- always making more than supported her, which she divided liberally with her children. There was nothing more remarkable in the life of my Grandmother than the large/she left at her death.

"My father and mother were married in 1790 and lived in Virginia until Spring of 1799, when they moved to Kentucky and settled in Fayette County, where the family was raised. They had 8 children, myself the oldest and only boy, five of whom were born in Virginia, and 3 in Kentucky. Two born in Virginia died when infants. The others lived to be married. My father died July 1809. I was born 13 August 1791, and my sister Nancy Clay was born .

Abstracts of a letter written to Dr. Lindsey Hughes Blanton, Richmond, Ky. by Llewellyn Harvey Blanton (born 12 Oct 1853) of Indianapolis, Indiana.

March 3, 1900

Herein you will find a copy of my Grandfather's Memorandum. I have regretted many times since his death that I did not request him to go more fully into details in regard to our family, but as I have really been away from Kentucky since 1872 when I went to College, I saw very little of my grandfather after that time and put this request off too long.

You will notice that my Grandfather's father was a soldier in the Revolutionary War, etc. My father was Alexander M. Blanton. My Grandfather was Harrison Blanton, his father was Richard. I do not know the name of the first Richard's father as I have never traced the genealogy though intending to do so at some time. I remember you stated at one time that there had been published in Virginia a small volume giving some details in regard to Blantons. Would it be possible for me to obtain this book? My mother resides with me in Indianapolis.

HISTORY OF WOODFORD COUNTY, KENTUCKY by Wm E Railey, Pub 1928. Page 127.

"RICHARD ELANTON who died at the home of his son-in-law, the Rev Isaac CRUTCHER, near Grassy Springs Church, lived to be almost 100 years old, came from Virginia. Before the Revolution RICHARD BLANTON was Sheriff of the County in which he lived. At that time it was unlawful for preachers or teachers to speak in public, other than the doctrine of the Church of England. Rev Joseph Craig was a Baptist, and it was Richard Blanton's duty of office to arrest the Rev Joseph Craig and incarcerate him, in the Fredericksburg jail.

"Both Rev Joseph Craig and Richard Blanton, later in life lived in Woodford County, Ky., and were friends. Rev Craig died in 1819 at age 77. Richard Planton died at about the same time."

Rev JOSEPH CRAIG, son of Toliver Craig who died in 1796, came to Kentucky with his father before 1782. This family was in Eryan's Station during the perils when that garrison was surrounded by Indians in 1782. Rev Craig was a noted minister and records show that a large proportion of his Virginia congregation came to Kentucky with him. They held religious services along the route, as borne out by the book "The Traveling Church."

Abstracts from KENTUCKY HISTORICAL REGISTER

"The farm of the Rev Isaac CRUTCHER was near Millville, in Woodford County, Kentucky, an inheritance from his father Henry CRUTCHER, of Virginia, who received it as a land grant for services in the Revolutionary War...Rev Crutcher was a prominent Eaptist minister and was twice married. First to Elizabeth, daughter of RICHARD BLANTON, and second to Nancy, Daughter of Jesse and Viola (Dale) GRADDY. Jesse Graddy was born 1767 in North Carolina

"There were two sons by Rev Isaac Crutcher and his wife Elizabeth Blanton:

Lewis Crutcher married Narcissus DEARING. They had no children

Richard Crutcher married Elizabeth McKNIGHT. Florence, wife of George Taylor COTTON was a granddaughter of Rev Isaac CRUTCHER.

"When the County of Franklin was formed, 1794, the dividing line ran through the center of the Crutcher farm, but left the residence of Rev Isaac Crutcher in Woodford County. Jesse Graddy CRUTCHER, born 1815, inherited the portion of the estate that lay in Woodford County.

Richard Crutcher (son of Elizabeth Blanton) built on that part which was in Franklin County. Richard Crutcher was first married to Permelia Berry; second to Elizabeth McKNIGHT.

"The Rev Isaac Crutcher was first Pastor of Grassy Springs Church. The first building, built in early 1800's, was of logs. Rev Isaac Crutcher is buried in the churchyard of the church he helped to organize. Later it was in possession of Alexander Campbell followers the "Disciples of Christ" or "Christians".

- NSDAR #12322. "Miss Carter married Mr SNEED and had a daughter Joanna who married BICELED BLANTON, and had among others, a son Carter (b 1765) who in 1787 married Susannah SNEED of Caroline County, Va. They also had a daughter."
- NSDAR #12002 "Blanton. According to a letter written by HARRISON, ELAN-TON, the Rev Soldier who served as a substitute for his brother John, was Richard Blanton (b 1760) whose wife was Sarah COMPS.

The parents of this Richard were RICHARD SLANTON and his wife Joanna SNEED. The elder Richard was a brother of THOMAS BLANTON whose father was Richard who died in 1734, Spotsylvania Co. Va.

RICHARD BLANTON (1760/66 Va-Jul 1809 Ky)

RICHARD BLANTON son of Richard (1720 Va-1819 Ky) and grandson of Richard Blanton whose will is recorded 1734 Spotsylvania Co. Va.; predeceased his father who lived to be almost 100 years old. The identity of father and son has been confused, probably because the younger Richard Blanton died prior to the 50th year of his age.

Richard Blanton who died 1809 Kentucky, served as a substitute for his older brother JOHN Blanton, in the Revolutionary War, when the family was living near Bowling Green, Caroline County, Virginia.
