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State of New York, 2<sup>d</sup>

Poculum County, 1830. On this twenty-first day of November,  
1830, personally appeared in Open Court, before the judges of the  
Court of Common Pleas, in and for said County, Rebecca Brower,  
a resident of the town of Clarkstown, in said County, aged seventy  
seven years, who, being first duly sworn, according to law, doth,  
on her oath, make the following declaration, in order to obtain  
the benefit of the provision made by the act of Congress passed,  
July 7, 1830, entitled "An Act granting half pay and pensions to  
certain widows:" That she is the widow of Abraham Brower,  
who was a Private and served during the Revolutionary war  
as follows: That in the Month of March, in the year 1776, her  
said husband enlisted for Three Months, at Clarkstown, in a  
company whereof Gilbert Cooper was Capt in Col<sup>t</sup> Drakes Regi-  
ment, and after being so enlisted went to New York, and was  
stationed at a place called Burners hill, making fortifications, where  
he remained for some time, was then taken back to Clarkstown, where  
he remained subject to the command of his Officers, until the term of  
enlistment was expired. — That in the Month of July, in the year 1776  
and about the tenth of the Month, the British having sailed up the Hud-  
son River and anchored in the Sappan and Haverstraw bays, her late hus-  
band, the said Abraham Brower, then belonging in Capt Hendrick —  
Teniers company, in Col<sup>t</sup> Drakes Regiment, was ordered out to  
guard along the said River to prevent their landing, at Nyack, and  
continued to guard for one Month, or more, until they for a few days —  
sailed down the River, when he was dismissed to be ready at a moments  
warning, and after about eight or ten days the British again returned  
and the said Abraham Teniers was called out, and guarded along the  
said River at Nyack, and continued out on duty for not less than three weeks,  
when he was again dismissed. — And the said Abraham Brower and  
Boel Teniers, having jointly agreed that they two should serve as one  
man, for five months, in a company whereof Jacob Deonda was Capt  
in Col<sup>t</sup> Drakes Regiment, and the said Boel Teniers agreeing to serve  
the first half of the said term commencing on the first of August, the said  
Abraham Brower, on the Middle of October, 1776, went and joined said com-  
pany near Haverstraw, and served until the first of January, 1777, in

The place of the said Det. Service, serving two months and a half. —  
That in the Spring of the year 1777. the Men composing last Services com-  
pany, being put in to claps, so that the one fourth part of said company  
should attend as a guard at such place as was most necessary, and to  
serve one week at a time, and each to take his turn, in which man-  
ner the said Abraham Brower did serve, commencing as early as the  
first of April in said year of 1777. and serving one week, and then serv-  
ing one week in each and every four weeks thereafter, until the Month  
of December in said year, and making two months in weekly turns,  
a guarding at some one of the following named places. At the long clove,  
at Clarkston, at some stations along the River at Hight, at Tappan  
town, at Closter, Schreiberberg or the Liberty pole —

That in the year 1778. the said Abraham Brower served from the  
first of April until the Month of December in towns and duty  
as aforesaid. Making two months, in weekly turns.

That in the year 1779. the said Abraham Brower served in duty  
and stations as aforesaid from the first of April until December  
making two months in weekly turns.

That in the year 1780. the said Abraham Brower served in town  
and duty as aforesaid from the first of April until December  
making two months in weekly turns.

That in the year 1781. the said Abraham Brower served in  
towns and duty as aforesaid from the first of May until the  
first of November, making one month and a half in weekly  
turns. — That exclusive of the services above set forth the said  
Abraham did much duty on alarms, which she at this late  
period is unable to set forth with any degree of certainty —

That the services ~~were~~ by her above set forth as rendered by  
her late husband has been done from her present memory  
of his services as was by him related to her, and information  
from some of his fellow soldiers — And that the aforesaid testimo-  
ny is all that she at this late period is able to procure to prove the services  
rendered by her late husband during the said war.

She further declares that she was married to the said Abraham

She further declares that she was married to the said Abraham Brower, by the Rev<sup>d</sup> Samuel Verheyen, on the first ~ ~ day of November, in the year seventeen hundred and eighty two: That her husband the aforesaid Abraham Brower, died on the eighth day of August, - in the year eighteen hundred and six, ~ ~ That she was not married to him prior to his leaving the service, but the marriage took place previous to the first of January, seventeen hundred and ninety four, viz; at the time above stated.

County of Rockland) On this fourteenth day of May 1849, personally appeared before me John T Blanch, a justice of the peace in and for said county, duly authorized by law to administer oaths. Abraham Brower, a resident of the town of Clarkston, aged fifty four years, who, being first duly sworn according to law, doth, under the rule established by the Honorable Secois Capt. late Secretary of War, make the following declaration that he for the sole benefit of his mother Rebecca Brower, the widow of his father Abraham Brower deceased, may obtain the benefits of the provision made by the Act of Congress, passed on the 2<sup>d</sup> of February 1843, granting pensions to widows of persons who served during the revolutionary war. That he is the sole son of the said Rebecca Brower that resides in the state of New York and the person with whom the said Rebecca Brower has resided on the premises by him owned, and in an adjoining house for many years past, and who has provided for her support. That the said Rebecca is now and has been for more than a year past, what is called mental infirmity her faculties so destroyed that she does not know her own children. That she still remains the widow of Abraham Brower, who served during the Revolutionary war under Capt. Thompson Tenure, in Capt. A Hawks Hays's Regiment and that she received a pension at the rate of Twenty seven dollars per annum, under the act of 17<sup>th</sup> June 1844.

County of Rockland) On this fourteenth day of May 1849, personally appeared before me John T Blanch, a justice of the peace in and for said county, duly authorized by law to administer oaths. Abraham & Demarest aged 53 - years, and Catharine Myers, aged 39 years, both residents of the town of Clarkston in said county, who being first duly sworn according to law, doth depose and say that they have been intimately acquainted with Rebecca Brower for more than twenty years and know her to be the identical person who was allowed a pension at the rate of twenty seven dollars per annum, as the widow of Abraham Brower that she is now entirely bereft of personal knowledge so much so as not to know her own children, and that Abraham Brower the above declarant is her son and one who provides for her support, and that the said Rebecca has been so afflicted for more than a year past and there appears to be no hope that she will ever be restored.
