On this Second day of July 1865 before the subscriber a Justice of the Peace in and for said County personally appeared Frederick Manning a resident of the town of Lewis in said County aged 54 years and made oath according to law that he is directly interested in a claim against the United States for certain arrears or increase of pension, supposed to be due to Thomas Manning of N.Y. who was a U.S. Pen - served out June 7. 1832

and he hereby appoints J. DOUGLAS WOODWARD, Counsellor at Law, of Plattsburg, N. Y., his Attorney to prosecute said claim, and examine all papers and documents in relation thereto, on file in any of the Departments at Washington City or elsewhere, and to receive from the officer authorised to issue the same, a certificate for any arrears or increase of pension to which Deponent may be entitled, and to do all other acts and things in and about obtaining such arrears or increase of pension as Deponent might or could do, were he personally present at the doing thereof; and he hereby revokes all former powers if any inconsistent with the above, and authorizes his said Attorney to appoint Attorneys, one or more, under him, for any or all the purposes aforesaid, hereby ratifying and confirming whatsoever Deponent's said Attorney or those appointed under him shall lawfully do or cause to be done in the premises. In witness whereof the said Deponent has hereunto set his hand and seal the day and year first above written.

On the Twenty Seventh day of September
in the year of Our Lord 1832. Personally appeared before
the Court of Common Pleas of the County of Essex
Thomas Manning a Resident of Marlborough in the
County of Essex and State of New York aged seventy
four years, who being first duly sworn according to Law
doth on his said Oath make the following Declaration,
in order to obtain the benefit of the Provisions made by the
Act of Congress, passed June 7th 1832.

That he entered in
the Army of the United States in the year 1777. Captain Gilbert
Loudy Stone and served in Colonel Haysers Regiment
of the Continental Line under the following Military Officers
Col. Haysers, Captain Gilbert Livingston, Lieut. Arthur
Higinbotham, William M. Haysers & John T. Fogart & that he can
not recollect any other of his field or Company Officers
knowing that he left the service in the month of January in the year
1778. at Cooper in the State of New York, that he resided in Dutchess
County in the State of New York when he entered the service and
and that at the time he entered he drew a Bounty of \$75.
That during the term of his service he was in a Steamship under
the Protection of the British at St. Michaels where his Regiment was
stationed keeping Garrison, at the time the British came up the North
or Hudson River & burnt Cooper - they wanted from St Michaels
to Cooper but did not arrive there until the British had
re-embarked on Board their Shipping at St Michaels
the reason that they then returned to St Michaels at their Quarters
& remained there until their term was out when they were wanted
to Cooper and discharged by Col. Haysers, did not receive
a written discharge, the Regiment then Paraded & dispersed
by the said Col. Haysers that he enlisted for Nine Months
Service and served his term out.

And he further claims and says that in the early part of the Spring
of the Year 1778. he entered the service of the United States as a Substitute
for his Brother Joseph Manning who was drafted for the same

Young, was from Poughkeepsie. While he resided, to work on
the Works on the West side that he did go and worked on
the Fort. Under the Charge of the Engineer (whose name
he does not recollect) for eight days being at the
Expectation of said term. He never again staying any longer
by the said Engineer.

And that on his return to Poughkeepsie
he again took the place of another person who was drafted
for five days to work on the Fort at West Hill and that he
did not and would not give any name of the person who
took Command of that Artillery. Nor the persons names for
whom he was a substitute.

That he never relinquished every claim
whatsoever to a Pension or Annuity. Except the present, and
he declares that his name is not on the Pension Roll of the
Agency of any State. That he made application for
the Pension under the Act of March 18 1818. and made
proof of his service by the Affidavit of Nathaniel
C. Johnson.

The Court propounded the following interrogatories to the
 Applicant as prescribed by the War Department. To-wit:
 1st When and in what year were you born?

- 2nd Have you any record of your Age, and if so, what is it?
- 3rd When were you being when called into the service when was it? You could claim the Revolutionary war, and ask where you now live?
- 4th How were you called into the service, were you drafted, did you volunteer or were you a substitute and if a substitute, for whom?
- 5th State the names of some of the regular Officers who were with the Troops when you served such Continental & Militia Regiments as you can recollect & the general Circumstances of your Service.
- 6th Did you ever receive a Discharge from the service, and if so, by whom was it given & what has become of it?
- For the foregoing interrogations the above Applicant made the following Answers to wit:

To the 1st He was born in Westchester about eight miles south of White Plains in the State of New York the fourteenth of September in the year 1758 as he believes.

" " 2nd He has no record of his Age, it was recorded in his fathers Bible which is destroyed.

" " 3rd He resided in Poughkeepsie when he entered the Service in Dutchess County New York. lived there during the war and about twenty years after the close of the war, when he removed to Colleton in the Province of Lower Canada, the first town on the line. lived there about eight years removed from thence to Willborough Essex County New York when he has resided since and never resides.

" " 4th Answers in the Declaration.

" " 5th He cannot recollect any other Regiments or Continental Officers that were with the Troops when he served. he has stated some Gen^l Circumstances as he can recollect.

" " 6th He never received a written Discharge.
