On this Thirtieth day of July, 1824 personally appeared in open Court, before the Judges of the Inferior Court of Common Pleas, holden at Morris-Town, in and for the county of Morris, in the term of July, in the year aforesaid, (the said Court being a Court of Record, possessing a seal, proceeding according to the course of the common law, having a jurisdiction unlimited in point of amount, keeping record of its proceedings, and its judgments being removable by writ of error only) Cornelius Drake, aged sixty nine years, and resident in said county, who being first duly affirmed according to law, doth, on his affirmation make the following declaration, in order to obtain the provision made by the acts of Congress of the 1st March, 1818, and the 1st of May, 1820, that he the said Cornelius Drake enlisted for the term of one year on February 16, 1776 in the Company commanded by Peter Richardson in the 3 Jersey Regiment commanded by Colonel John Dayton on the continental establishment that at the expiration of the year he enlisted again in the same Company and continued to serve until the disbanding of the Army in 1783 that he was present at the affair of the short Hills in Essex County State of New Jersey in the year 1777 that he was engaged in the Battles of Brandywine, Germantown, and Monmouth and that he was present at the taking of Cornwallis at Yorktown and that he served in the Western Campaign in the year 1779 against the Indians under General Sullivan. That his name has been placed on the pension list and dropped therefrom on account of property —

affirm And in pursuance of the act of the 1st of May, 1820, I do solemnly declare that I was a Resident Citizen of the United States, on the 18th day of March, 1818, and that I have not, since that time, by gift, sale, or in any manner, disposed of my property, or any part thereof, with intent thereby so to diminish it as to bring myself within the provisions of an act of Congress, entitled "An act to provide for certain persons engaged in the land and naval service of the United States, in the Revolutionary War," passed on the 18th day of March, 1818; and that I have not, nor has any person in trust for me, any property or securities, contracts or debts, due to me; nor have I any income, other than what is contained in the schedule hereto annexed, and by me subscribed. That, since the ~~exhibition of my just schedule, the following chattels have been made in my property~~ — As follows viz —


nearly as he can ascertain - To Thomas Stought for rent

that pursuit had become entirely inadequate to his
maintenance -

serve on the Revolutionary War at that in the proceeding
declaration against the common enemy for the term of
Nine Months under one engagement in the Continental
Establishment. I also certify that the foregoing statement
and the Schedule thereto annexed are truly copied
from the records of the said Court; and I do further certify
that it is the opinion of the said Court that the total amount
in value of the property extorted in the aforesaid Schedule
is Thiridy Eight dollars and Eighty Seven cents.

Personally came before me Lewis Condict,
one of the judges of the Inferior Court of Common Pleas
in and for the said County of Morris, Cornelius Drake,
who being duly sworn according to law, deposes and
saith, that he served in the American Revolutionary War
under the Continental Establishment, against the common
enemy; - that he enlisted near Cook's Bridge, in the
County of Essex, and State aforesaid, on the fourteenth day
of February, in the year seventeen hundred and seventy-
six, in Captain Peter Dickerson's Company, in the Third
Regiment of the Jersey Line, commanded by Col. Elias
Dayton; - that he served in said Company and Regiment,
in the different stations of private, corporal, and sergeant,
for the full term of seven years, three months, and twen-
ty three days, without any intermission, when he was re-
gularly and honorably discharged, at Newburgh, in the
State of New York, on the sixth day of June, in the year
seventeen hundred and eighty-three; - that during the
same service, he was engaged in several battles, viz. at
the Short Hills, in Essex County, aforesaid, - at Station House
in the State of New York - at Brandywine, in Pennsylvania
(at Germantown, in Penn.) - at Monmouth, in New Jersey. - in the Western Campaign
under Gen. Sullivan, against the Indians - and at
the Battle of York Town, in Virginia, at the Capture of
Cornwallis's army: - that he sold his discharge about five
years after the war, to one William Taylor, who his De-
ponent believes, took it with him to the Gennepic Country,
and that it cannot now be obtained.

This DepONENT further saith, that he now resides at
Rockaway, in the County of Morris aforesaid; - that he is now
sixty-three years of age in reduced circumstances, and needs
the assistance of his country for support; - that he has
never heretofore received any pension from the Government

of the United States, and prays to have his name placed
on the Pension List, under the act of Congress of the 18th
March, 1818. —

the act of Congress of the 18th March, A.D. 1818. —

On this 11th day of September, 1837 before me, the subscriber, a Justice of the Peace for the said County of Morris, personally appears Cornelius Drake, who on his oath deposes, that he is the same person who formerly belonged to the company commanded by Captain Dickenson & Ballou, in the Regiment commanded by Colonel

Dayton, 3^d Regt. in the service of the United States; that his name was placed on the pension roll of the State of New Jersey, from whence he has lately removed; that he now resides in the State of New York, County of Monroe, where his children live, & where he intends to remain, & wishes his pension to be discontinued payable in future. — The following are his reasons for removing from Morris County, New Jersey, to the County of Monroe, in the State of New York. His two only surviving daughters removed from New Jersey to Buffalo, N.Y., in the State of New York, about twelve years since, & having himself lost his wife & broken up house keeping, & become aged & infirm, he desires to be with his daughter in his old age, to enjoy the comfort of their society in his old age. He has also two sons living in the same town, viz. Buffalo, Monroe County, New York.

Morris County ss., Cornelius Drake a person applying
for a pension under the laws of the United States being
duly sworn in open Court (In the Inferior Court of
Common Pleas in and for said County of Morris) that
twenty ninth day of September in the year of our Lord
eighteen hundred and twenty four upon his oath de-
poses and saith, That the defendant in the year A.D.
eighteen hundred and seven bought a small house and
lot of land in Morris County for the sum of two hundred
dollars which sum was paid by this defendant, that
he continued to live on said place until the year
eighteen hundred and twenty two when he sold it
for the sum of two hundred and ten dollars, that
with this money in part he bought a small place
in the township of Roxbury in said County for which
he was to pay the sum of seven hundred and twenty
five dollars, having paid down as first purchase money
the said sum of two hundred and ten dollars received
as aforesaid, expecting to be able to pay the rest by
Cutting and Cutting Wood off the place thus bought
But the sickness and death of a part of his family
disabled him from making the residue of the
payments of the payment and compelled him to give
up the place to the Wendor and loose all his just

payment (two hundred and ten dollars) except ten dollars, that he was afterwards compelled to rent a small house and lot of land for the sum of fifty dollars but in consequence of the increasing infirmity of age and sickness he has not been able to make it adequate to his support, but is now in debt upwards of one hundred dollars. And being seventy years of age the ensuing 20th October 1824 hath no prospect of redeeming himself from these difficulties

That he has had no other property since the 18th day of March eighteen hundred and eighteen except two or three mares, which he sold for forty dollars and received as pay forty dollars worth of grain for the subsistence of himself and family. That the reason of this Defendant not having exhibited a schedule of his property prior to the passage of the act of Congress of the 1st of March 1823 was his hope and expectation of his being able to live without any other assistance than that derived from his own exertions he then considering himself as sufficiently strong in body to earn a living -

Cornelius Drake lost his wife twenty six years last march
and remained a widower till she dyed he died ten
years ago this December.

he drew his pension in New Jersey's Morris County
near Morristown and he was an orderly Sergeant in the war
but only applied for a common Soldier's pension.

He moved from there with us twenty four years ago
and then drew his pension here in Penfield in Franklin
village Franklin Clark Esquire interceded for him
in getting his pension for him but Franklin Clark is
dead now and where his warrant is I can't tell
if expert you can find his name there at Washington
for he was a faithful soldier during the war and went
through a great many hardships & was in several battles
he might of twice a sergents pension if had of applied for it.

If you will will send us what way to proceed to get it we
will attend to it and come and have it made right
out if his warrant ante hear at Penfield village you
can find it at Washington I expert

Penfield Monroe County at the village was where
he drew his pension last year & Joshua Mott

Webster is where we live now

Penfield was drawn about two years ago

and we fell in to Webster
