Macon County, Ky } On this 1<sup>st</sup> day of October 1832, I do,  
sonably appear before the Justices of the county court of Macon County, in consist-

ting Samuel Brewer, aged twenty five years who being first duly sworn according to law doth on oath

make the following declaration in order to obtain the benefit of the act of Congress passed the 7<sup>th</sup> day of

June 1832 - viz I Samuel Brewer do hereby on my oath solemnly declare that I am 75 years

of age that I was born in the county of Sussex

and state of New Jersey and afterwards moved to

the state of Pennsylvania & County of Lycoming

where I live in fact, creek where I was called

into the service of my country as follows in the spring

of the year 1780, I was drafted in Capt. David Vance's

company of Col Robert Martin's Regiment to guard

the Western frontier of Pennsylvania for three months

and was stationed at Wallace's Fort and was enga-

ged as a spy and scout until my time expired,

and soon after I was discharged I again volunteered

for two months and marched to Corrsmarsh where

I was engaged as a guard and during the time we had

a fight with the Indians at Goldings place where

we killed five Indians and I faithfully served out

my time, and in the fall I again volunteered on

Capt. David Vance company and was stationed

at various places on the Allegheny river above Fort Pitt

where we built some block houses until my time expired

and I was discharged, I fought in a conflictive war three

months, - I cannot recollect the name of my second

Captain as I remember our officers changed, and

in the month of March 1781 I enlisted for six months in Capt Thomas Stokely's company in the 13<sup>th</sup> Pennsylvania Regt or Old Guard and we marched to Fort Crayford about forty miles above Pittsburgh where I was stationed until my term expired being employed as a guard at that fort and at the end of my time I was honorably discharged - I have no documentary evidence of my service having long since lost my discharge - after the war I lived in the state of Pennsylvania until the year 1784 - when I removed to the state of Kentucky, and I now live in Marion County of said state three miles South of Hanceburg, I do not know of any person alive except a brother in Hardin county of this state by whom I can prove my services, and Mr. Mark Higgin who bears my offices while in the six months since - I hereby relinquish all claim that I have to any pension or annuity except the present and I am not now a Pensioner of the United States or of any state Witness my hand this 1<sup>st</sup> day of October 1832 -

by the War Department that said Sam-  
uel Brown is an Old Soldier of the Revolu-  
tion and served as he is his written state-  
ment for a Pension has declared & the  
Court further certifies that it appears  
to them that said Head is a Clergyman  
resident in the County of Morgan that  
Peter Huff and Peter B. Huff who has also  
signed the same are residents of said  
County of Morgan and creditable Persons  
and that their statements are entitled  
to credit. I Thomas Alling Clerk of the  
County Court aforesaid do certify that the fore-  
going and wherein contains the original ad-  
dressings in the matter of the application  
of Philip Board for a Pension  
in testimony whereof I have

On the third day of September, 1838, personally appeared before the county court of Mercer and state aforesaid Rebecca Brown, now a widow, of the county of Lincoln and state aforesaid, in the seventy ninth year of her age, who, being duly sworn according to law, doth, on her oath, make the following declaration in order to obtain the benefit of the provision made by the act of Congress, passed July 7, 1838 intituled "An act regulating half pay and pension to certain widows." That she is the widow of Samuel Brown, late of the county of Mercer and state aforesaid. That she has no personal knowledge of the military services rendered by her said husband in the war of the revolution, as she did not marry him until some time after the termination of the same, but she merely believes he did render such services, and she knows that he was a pensioner of the government of the United States until his death, and that he received annually, in semi-annual payments, about the sum of forty six dollars. She believes forty six dollars and some cents. That said pension was paid her said husband in the City of Lexington Ky., and that she gave this pension certificate to a granite mason, who was employed after the death of her husband, to draw that portion of his pension which accrued from the time of his last draw till his death, so that said certificate was never returned to her. She further states that she now resides to the said Samuel Brown in the said county of Mercer on the 13th day of May 1838, the year seventeen hundred and eighty seven, by the Revd. David Price. That her said husband, the said Samuel Brown, died on the last day of January eighteen hundred and thirty five. That she was not married to him prior to his leaving the

ceremony, but the marriage took place previous to  
the first of January seventeen hundred and ninety  
four reg. at the time above stated. She does  
not wish to be understood that her said husband  
performed no military service after her marriage,  
for he died before two campaigns against the Indians  
subsquent to their marriage. She has not married since J. Brown  
death known and subscribed to, on the day and year  
above written, before the worshipful County court  
of Mercer, which is a court of record.

quainted with Samuel Brewer and the late husband of  
Rebecca Brewer who has subscribed, by making his mark,  
and sworn to, the foregoing declaration in this present  
he states that he recently acted as the agent of the ad-  
men, Samuel Brewer, in drawing his pension and bringing  
it over from Washington Territory. That the witness said  
Brewer was a pensioner of the government of the United  
States and drew annually about the sum of forty six  
dollars and 66 cents. That he died about the 31st day  
of January 1835 as near as this deponent can recollect.  
That the said Rebecca Brewer is his widow and  
has remained unmarried since his death. - Subscribed  
and sworn to this 3d day of September 1838.

Madam:

I have to advise you that from the papers in the Revolutionary War pension claim W. 8401 it appears that Samuel Brewer was born in 1757 in Sussex County, New Jersey.

While living on Jacobs Creek, Tyrone County, Pennsylvania he enlisted in the spring of 1780 and served three months as spy and scout in Captain David Vance's Company, Colonel Robert Vance's Pennsylvania Regiment.

Soon after, he enlisted and served two months as guard at Conemaugh, Pennsylvania and had a fight with Indians at "Goldings Place".

He enlisted in the fall of 1780 and served three months as a private in Captain David Vance's Company.

He enlisted in March 1781 and served six months as a private in Captain Thomas Stokely's Pennsylvania Regiment. He was also in two campaigns against the Indians subsequent to 1787.

He was allowed pension on his application executed

October 1, 1832 while living three miles south of  
Harrodsburg, Mercer County, Kentucky. He died in  
said county January 31, 1835.

Soldier married May 13, 1787 in Mercer County,  
Kentucky, Rebekah or Rebecca Smith who was allowed  
pension on her application executed September 3, 1838  
while a resident of Garrard County, Kentucky aged seven-  
ty-five years. In 1843 she was living in Anderson County,  
Kentucky.
