Noticed from David Clark Nov 2. 1818 to Adminr Jonathan Lewis  
Chicago N.Y.

State of New York. Broome County. On this 4<sup>th</sup> day of May  
in the year 1818 before me the Subordinate one of the Justices  
of the Court of Common Pleas in and for the County of Broome  
personally appears David Clark resident in the town of Gale  
County of Broome aforesaid, aged Sixty two years, who being  
by me first duly sworn according to Law doth in his oath  
make the following declaration in order to alter the  
provision made by the late act of Congress, entitled an act  
to provide for certain persons engaged in the Land and  
naval service of the United States in the revolutionary war  
that the said David Clark enlisted in the month of May  
AD. 1776: at the first of his declaration about the tenth day  
of the month of May at Genesee County of New York State of New-  
York in the Company commanded by Capt. Lillibens  
Hall, under the Command of Col. Leonard <sup>of the Department line</sup>, that he  
continued to serve in said corps, or in the service of the  
United States until the month of February about the fifteenth  
AD. 1777. when he was discharged from service in the town  
of Morristown State of New Jersey, that he was in the  
battles at Frog Point, Genesee and Pinestown, that  
he is in reduced circumstances and stands in need  
of the assistance of his Country for support, and that he hath  
no other evidence now in his power of his said services.

 On the 15<sup>th</sup> day of September 1820 personally appeared in open Court being the Court of Common Pleas and general Sessions of the Peace in and for said County of Broome a certain David Clark of record of record proceeding according to the Course of the Common Law with a Jurisdiction unlimited in the Point of amount respecting a record of their Proceedings and having also the Power of free and full imprisonment David Clark aged 64 years resident in the Town of Delhi in said County of Broome who being first duly sworn according to Law doth on his oath declare that he served in the revolutionary war as follows to wit. from the month of May 1776 until February 1777 in the Campaign Commanded by Captain Lathrop Ball in the Regiment first Commanded by Colonel ———— Larned and afterwards by Colonel ———— Shepherd in the Campaigns here and that the date of his original Declaration was the 4<sup>th</sup> day of May 1818 and that the number of his Pension Certificate is 13.106 and that he was in the battle at Frog Point near the City of New York and in the battle at Trenton New Jersey and in the battle of Princeton New Jersey and do solemnly swear that he was a resident Citizen of the United States on the 18<sup>th</sup> day of March 1818 and that he has not since that time by gift sale or in any manner aliened any property or any part thereof with intent thereby so to accumulate it as to bring myself within the provisions of an act of Congress entitled "an act to provide for certain persons engaged in the Land & naval service of the United States in the revolutionary war passed on the 18<sup>th</sup> of March 1818. and I have not nor has any person in trust for me any property or Securities contracts or debts due to me nor have I any in come other than what is contained in the schedule hereto annexed and by me subscribed Schedule of the Property of the above named David Clark on Oct. two Cows one heifer one steer 2 Calves 10 sheep two small Hogs two pigs two large Iron Kettles one pot one small Kettle one Tea Kettle twelve quart Iron Kettles two Tables one Pine Chest two earthen milk Pans two tin do. one Iron Spider six tin cups saucers one powder flatter one tin Basin 24 earthen plates one tin fruit two pint Churns 2 pails one wooden Bowl one pair Tongs six knives & forks 3 Shoons & powder Tea Shoons two glass bottles one decanter two half pint Glasses 4 gill glasses one Tin Canister one frame Shel yards one small Tin drum one 8 Common Chairs two spinning wheels one reel one old lantern green wash tub one sugar tub two meat barrels 36 Top tubs one powder flatter all value money Three Dollars & Twenty Cents

 And the said David Clark upon his oath affirms a doth further declare that he is by occupation a Farmer and is unable to find employment for 5 years past on account of the Palsy and still continues so and that the number of his family is 3 himself wife named Budget aged 60 years troubled with the Rheumatism & unable to do but little and one son named George aged 17 years generally in good health and able to work

On this 8<sup>th</sup> day of December 1858  
personally appeared before me George Wheeler, one of the  
Judges of the Court of Common Pleas, in and for the said  
County of Broom, Bridget Clark, a resident of Lisle in  
the said County of Broom aged 78 years, who, being  
first duly sworn according to law, doth, on her oath make  
the following declaration, in order to obtain the benefit  
of the provision made by the act of Congress passed  
July 7<sup>th</sup> 1838, entitled: "An act granting half pay and  
pensions to certain widows".

That she is the widow of David  
Clark who was a Private in the Army of the Revolution  
and according to her best knowledge and belief, her late  
husband served in Captain Libbeus Ball's Company of Infantry  
in Col. Shepherd's Regiment, as he has frequently informed  
her as to the names of the officers under whom he  
served, that she knows of no documentary evidence, that  
David Clark her late husband was a Pensioner of the Army  
of the Revolutionary War, under the act of Congress of  
the 18<sup>th</sup> <sup>March</sup> 1818 at the rate of eight dollars per month.

She further declares that she was married to the said  
David Clark on the 9<sup>th</sup> of November 1780 that her husband  
the aforesaid David Clark died on the 23<sup>rd</sup> day of November  
1834. That she was married to the said David Clark on the  
day and year above stated in the town New Concord in  
the County of Columbia and State of New York, by the  
Rev. Mr. Clark of North Chatham of the same County  
and that the records of the marriage and death are  
in the family Bible, and that she has not since been  
afterwards married. That for further evidence she would  
respectfully refer to the records of proof of the service



of her late husband which accompanied his former  
declaration that is in the War Department & that the  
marriage took place previous to the 1<sup>st</sup> of January  
1794, viz, at the time above stated. Bridget <sup>an</sup> Clark
