OLD BAILEY INTELLIGENCE.

According to a statute passed in the reign of James the first, the punishment was burning in the hand, and twelvemonths imprisonment; but a late act of parliament left it to the discretion of the court to change the branding into a fine; the deputy recorder therefore through humanity fentenced the prisoner to one years imprisonment, and fined him one Stilling.
