

FORWORD

This genealogy of the Hill family had its inception in 1914. At the time the writer began gathering this material he knew very little about his own immediate relatives and nothing whatever of the more distantly related lines. There have been numerous interruptions. While the collecting of data has been slowly going forward years have rolled by and the generation of elders living at the time the work began has passed on. Had I realized at the beginning what their passing would mean, I would now have fewer regrets over data lost beyond recall.

The charts accompanying the genealogy will enable any member of the Hill family to trace his direct line of descent from Thomas¹ Hill. Relationship to any other member of the family is also shown.

In the text of the genealogy each generation is clearly indicated by an appropriate letter or number. The first, second and third generations are indicated by Roman numerals.

I Thomas¹ Hill
II Thomas² Hill
III Thomas³ Hill

The fourth generation comprises the five sons of Thomas³ Hill and they are distinguished as John^{A1}, William^{B1}, Thomas^{C1}, Allen^{D1}, and Daniel^{E1}.

The fifth generation is designated by capital letters only as A,B,C.

The sixth generation is numbered with Arabic numerals 1,2,3, etc.

The seventh generation is designated with the small letter a

The eighth generation is designated with the small letter b

Members of the Hill family may have copies of this genealogy without cost by writing the compiler, giving name and specific address. Only a limited number of copies are available.

The writer is especially desirous of information relative to lines of the family on which little or no data is given herein. In fact, it is our plan to supplement this genealogy yearly with such corrections as may be necessary, including in the supplement, births, marriages, and deaths for each year as supplied by members of the family at large. All such data should be forwarded me at the address given below.

I. Thomas¹ Hill, from whom the genealogy of the Hill family is traced, lived and died in England. He was probably born around 1680 and reached an advanced age. Nothing more is known of Thomas¹ Hill nor of his children save that he was the father of Thomas² Hill.

II Thomas² Hill, son of Thomas¹ Hill, thru whom the line descends, was born in England in 1716, and fought in the war between the French and English. He then emigrated to America, settling in New Jersey. In 1753, he was married to Sarah Hamlin, and in 1764, moved to Loudon County, Virginia. Thomas² Hill had a family of sixteen children, six daughters whose names have not come down to me, and ten sons as follows: Joseph, Reuben, Thomas³ (our direct ancestor) Amos, Jonathan, Allen, Daniel, John, William and Charles. I have not attempted to trace the descendants of those sons and daughters other than those of Thomas³ Hill, as their off-spring at the present time would probably reach a very large number. I assume there have been approximately two thousand descendants of Thomas¹ Hill. Readers of this genealogy will therefore understand why there are many Hills living at the present time in America who are not connected directly with this genealogy.

III Thomas³ Hill, was born of English parentage in New Jersey, March 17, 1763. While he was yet a small lad his parents moved to Virginia, locating at Martinsville, Henry County, in the south-central part of the state. At the age of nineteen Thomas Hill enlisted and served a three month's term in the war of the American Revolution. On October 26, 1786, he married Mary Stone, by whom he had five sons: John, William, Thomas⁴, Allen, and Daniel. About the year 1788 or 1789 Thomas³ Hill was converted, united with the Baptist Church and was licensed to preach. A few months later his wife united with the same church. After a few years residence in Virginia Thomas Hill moved to East Tennessee. Here he resided about four years. In the fall of 1798 he moved to Kentucky settling near Somerset, Pulaski County. He continued to preach the gospel, holding meetings in various places, serving the small and destitute churches of the community and eventually organizing a new church called White Oak, of which he became pastor. Here he was ordained February 2, 1800. He served White Oak Church as pastor for seventeen years besides preaching at other churches in the neighborhood. In March 1817 he moved to Indiana and settled on Coffee Creek, Jennings County, in the southern part of the state, on land he secured from the government. In 1822 he organized the Coffee Creek Baptist Church of which he was chosen pastor and continued in this relationship for sixteen and one half years, when at his own request he was released because of the infirmities of age. Thomas³ Hill died Monday, May 22, 1841, after a short but painful illness caused by a fall. His funeral service was preached the following day at three o'clock at the Coffee Creek Meeting House, by elder J.W. Swincher from 1st Chron. 19:15, "We are strangers before Thee and sojourners as were all our fathers; our days on the earth are as a shadow and there is none abiding". His body rests in the old Coffee Creek Baptist cemetery in almost the exact center of the burying ground located on what was then known as the Sylvester Deputy farm. His wife, Mary Stone Hill, died October 24, 1844 and is buried by her husband's side. Thomas Hill was a preacher of much more than average ability. At the time of

his conversion he was entirely uneducated; however, he soon learned to read his Bible and because of his splendid natural endowment and intelligence he was considered during the time of his ministerial labors one of the most able expounders of the Scriptures in that portion of Indiana. He was a convincing logical thinker of commanding personality and of robust size and strength. as one of his contemporaries says: "no one had a better faculty of illustrating his subject to make it interesting or of securing and holding, while speaking, the individual attention of his audience. Certainly no one more fully possessed the confidence and esteem of the entire community."

IV John^{A1} Hill, oldest son of Thomas³ Hill, was born November 2, 1787, near Martinsville, Henry County, Virginia. He accompanied his parents to East Tennessee in 1794, and for four years resided there; then went with them to Kentucky in 1798, where they located near Somerset, Pulaski County. On July 17, 1806, he married Delila Cooper, daughter of Malachi Cooper, a Baptist minister in Pulaski County, Kentucky. In 1837 John Hill was ordained as a Baptist minister, and a few years after his marriage moved to Montgomery County, Alabama, where he remained several years engaging to a considerable extent in preaching. In the course of a few years he made a visit to his father's family in Jennings County, Indiana, purchased a farm there and brought his family up from Alabama soon after. He united with the Coffee Creek Baptist Church of which his father was pastor and frequently preached there and at other points. Not long after his ordination in August 1837, he moved to Clinton County, Indiana and located there permanently. He was a man of good preaching ability, unblemished Christian character and fine social qualities. His services were in great demand and well appreciated by both the church and community. John^{A1} Hill died April 6, 1852, at the age of 65 years. His wife died in 1847. Both are buried in Sugar Creek Cemetery near the old homestead, Clinton County, Indiana. After the death of his wife John^{A1} Hill married a second time. The maiden name of the second wife is not known to the writer but after John Hill's death she also contracted a second marriage to Thomas Rowland and resided at North Vernon, Indiana until her death. No children were born of John^{A1} Hill's second marriage.

V William^{B1} Hill, second son of Thomas³ Hill and Mary Stone Hill, was born December 24, 1789, in Henry County, Virginia. He was married February 17, 1811, in Pulaski County, Kentucky, to Nancy Green. He died December 18, 1817, whether there were any children born to William^{B1} Hill and Nancy Green Hill is not known, as there are no records of any kind available.

VI Thomas⁴ Hill, hereinafter designated as Thomas^{C1}, third son of Thomas³ Hill, was born in East Tennessee, September 12, 1797. In his infancy his parents moved to Pulaski County, Kentucky where Thomas Hill, Jr. lived until he was nineteen years of age, assisting his father in cultivating the farm. In 1816, together with his father and several friends he made an exploring trip to Indiana, going as far north as the Muscatatuck, where they made camp and remained until all had selected lands. Sullivan, Meek and others on the Muscatatuck and the two Hill's, father and son, on Coffee Creek. Returning to Kentucky, Thomas^{C1} Hill was married the following winter February 27, 1817, to Susan Buster, and at once settled on his land in Indiana. When the Coffee Creek Baptist Church was organized in May 1822, Thomas^{C1} Hill was one of the constituent members, was baptised by his father and retained membership in the same church thruout his life. In 1823 he was licensed to preach and in August 1825, was ordained and set apart for the ministry, and from that time on made the ministry of the Word his main business in life. At that early date anti-mission sentiment was rampant in southern Indiana, but from the first Thomas^{C1} Hill warmly espoused the cause of missions and was the first missionary in that part of the state, receiving his appointment from the American Baptist Home Mission Society as early as 1826 or 1827, and continuing in that capacity several years, traveling on horseback thru many of the counties of southern Indiana at a time when such traveling meant something. It was thru his influence probably more than that of any other that the missionary spirit prevailed thruout that section. In the early days of the Indiana Baptist General Association, Thomas^{C1} Hill was appointed General Agent for the state. When his father, Thomas³ Hill, in 1838 resigned the pastorate of the Coffee Creek Baptist Church, a call was immediately extended to Thomas^{C1} Hill, the son, to fill the vacancy. He accepted, resigning his position as state agent. He served his home church in a pastoral relation for nearly 30 years. He was Moderator of the Coffee Creek Association thirty-nine years and in that capacity was expected to attend all annual sessions of corresponding Associations, to be present at ordinations, at the establishment of new churches, at protracted meetings, and at Conventions of the various societies of the denomination. His time therefore, was fully occupied thruout a long and eventful life. On April 27, 1865, Susan Buster Hill, wife of Thomas^{C1} Hill, died and the loss of his wife and the infirmities of age led him to resign regular pastoral work. He continued to preach at intervals until his death on March 27, 1876, in the 79th year of his age. His first sermon was delivered at Coffee Creek Church in the early part of the year 1823, and his last at the same place in November 1875, making nearly 53 consecutive years that he had labored in the same community, always drawing a large congregation of attentive and interested listners. Quoting a contemporary: "Thus was lost to the community the presence of a remarkable man, but whose influence still lives. As a citizen and neighbor his character was irreproachable, as a Christian his daily walk and undoubted piety were recognized by all. He was large, dignified and noble in appearance, with a splendid command of language and an impressive manner. He was an easy, fluent speaker and a splendid singer. He was classed as the most popular orator of his day in this vicinity, never putting himself forward, but rather sunning notoriety. He was nevertheless forced to the

front and regarded as one of the leading spirits of the age. Elder Thomas Hill was a man of peace; he never sought controversy; but when thrust upon him no man could more ably defend the principles or more clearly and forcefully defend the distinctive tenets of the denomination. His was the happy gift of saying just enough to clearly elucidate the position taken and to leave unsaid everything that would tend to divert the mind from that position. He was sound on all Baptist doctrines and when deemed advisable to present them used language that could not be misunderstood; yet the kindly Christian spirit manifest, and the pure gentlemanly deportment maintained, disarmed undue criticism, and those discourses were kindly received by the numerous members of the other denominations who listened to them." Thomas Rowland, a man of piety and intelligence, who from youth to old age was a worthy member and leader in the Methodist Episcopal Church once said "I have been intimately acquainted with Brother Hill for more than forty years and can truly say I never heard him make a remark in the pulpit or out of it, that I could wish he had not said." Thomas^{C1} Hill and wife are buried in the old Coffee Creek Cemetery in the family lot.

VII Allen^{D1} Hill, Sr. fourth son of Thomas³ and Mary Stone Hill, was born November 29, 1799, near Somerset, Pulaski County, Kentucky. Allen^{D1} Hill went with his father and family in its migration to Indiana in 1817, and settled in Jennings County, Indiana. On March 18, 1821, he was married to Betsey McCray, and engaged in farming in the southern part of the state, later being elected to the state legislature for at least one term. He had few educational advantages enjoying only such schooling as was common at that early time. He was a man of robust frame and great bodily vigor and strength. His death occurred March 19, 1871. His wife Betsey McCray Hill died May 11, 1880.

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VIII Daniel Milton^{E1} Hill, fifth and youngest son of Thomas³ Hill and Mary Stone Hill, was born in Pulaski County, Kentucky, December 31, 1805. Following the migration of the family to Indiana he settled in Jennings County, where he was married April 22, 1824 to Jane Dixon. Daniel Milton^{E1} Hill, like the other members of his family was of commanding appearance. He was fully six feet in height, weighed approximately two hundred and seventeen pounds, was of light complexion, with blue eyes, and throughout his entire life enjoyed sound health. He, of course, enjoyed only the educational advantages of the common schools, for no other was available in his day, yet because of his natural ability and later reading and study, became one of the really well educated men of his time. During his early life he was engaged in farming and later in the mercantile business, owning and operating a store at Paris, Indiana. In politics Daniel Milton Hill was a life long Democrat. Besides filling minor positions including that of Postmaster of his home town for twelve years, Daniel Milton Hill was for seven years Associate Judge of the Circuit Court. As an evidence of his independence of thought and action he was a member of the Methodist Episcopal Church, whereas, two of his brothers, as well as his father were Baptist Ministers. After having enjoyed more than the usual amount of honors, Daniel Hill died at the age of 77 years near Sharpsville, Tipton County, Indiana, and is buried at Paris, Jennings County, Indiana. The immediate cause of his death was paralysis.

A. William Hill, eldest son of Thomas^{C1} Hill, was born January 2, 1818 and died February 12, 1818.

B. Margaret Hill, second child and eldest daughter of Thomas^{C1} Hill, was born February 9, 1819, and died November 10, 1879. On August 3, 1837, Margaret Hill was married to her cousin Isaac P. Hill, the eldest son of John^{A1} Hill. Shortly after this marriage Margaret and Isaac Hill moved to Texas, where they continued to reside until Margaret Hill's death, November 10, 1879.

No further definite information is available on the individual members of the family of Margaret and Isaac Hill. The children were all born in Texas and as the name Hill is a very common one thruout Georgia, Alabama and Texas, it is quite likely that there are numerous descendants of this line that could be traced without particular difficulty.

C. James Woods Hill, third child of Thomas^{C1} Hill and Susan Buster, was born near Paris, Jennings County, Indiana, November 26, 1820. His early education was of course, conditioned by the limited opportunities for schooling available at that time, and yet he made such good use of those opportunities, that at an early age, we find him engaged as a successful teacher. This love for knowledge and an appreciation of the best things in literature became a passion with him, and as a result, James Woods Hill was an exceptionally well read and cultured man, far in advance of his contemporaries. After several years experience as a teacher in the public schools James Woods Hill left the teaching profession to engage in the mercantile business, first in the southern part of Jennings County and later, about 1861, in Vernon, Indiana, where he owned and operated the largest store in the county. Meeting with unusual success in business James Woods Hill was able to retire after some years, disposing of his interests in the store to his son. It was impossible for him to remain inactive, however, and as a result, he with others, organized the First National Bank of Vernon, Indiana. He was chosen Cashier of the bank, which position he filled for some years, and later, such was the confidence of his fellow-citizens in his intelligence, integrity and foresight, that he was made President of the bank. This position he held until he finally retired from active business. However, he remained a Director of the bank until the end of his life. James Woods Hill was a cultured Christian gentleman, tall of figure, impressive in bearing, and always particularly well groomed. The writer still remembers the dignity of his bearing and the grace and fluency of his speech. He was able to talk convincingly and intelligently on practically any subject that was likely to come up in conversation. He had a keen sense of humor, yet with it all there was an air of reserve about him that may have led those who did not know him well, to judge him somewhat austere. No one ever knew the number of his kindly deeds. As he himself said, "He enjoyed the making of money, but his pleasure from it was obtained by using it for the benefit of others". He was an active member of the Baptist Church in his home town, in the county and the state for twenty-five years. The greater part of his life was spent in Vernon, Indiana. He was a man of peace, never argumentative, but making his influence felt at all times, for the uplifting and benefit of the town and community in which he lived. He was married August 10, 1841, to Sarah J. Brandon, by whom he had a large family of children, most of whom, however, died in infancy. His wife Sarah Brandon, died in 1890, and on August 31, 1893, James Woods Hill married Florence Dowd, of Vernon, Indiana, with whom he lived until his death, December 12, 1905, having reached the mature age of eighty-five years.

(According to the information given herein James Woods Hill was born November 26, 1820, and on August 31, 1893, he married his second wife, Florence Dowd. On December 7, 1897, his last child, James, Jr. was born. At this time James Woods Hill would have been 77 years of age. The age of his wife, Florence Dowd is not given. I believe this is true as all of the dates of events that took place, coincide with the birth of James Jr. James Woods Hill was considered a wealthy man in his day, and probably able to attract a much younger wife.) 3. Wayland Hill, second son of James Woods Hill, to reach maturity, was born November 23, 1847, at Hilltown, Indiana, and died March 15, 1913. During his lifetime, he was a very successful merchant, engaging in business first at Vernon, Indiana, and several years in Morgantown, Indiana. On January 23, 1873, he was married to Louise Jennie Perry, daughter of John Perry of Vernon, Indiana.

After finishing with honor the high school course of Indianapolis, Indiana, James Hill, Jr., entered Greenbrier Military College, Virginia, and holds a diploma from that institution. After graduation, he was first associated with the Indianapolis, Indiana Heat and Light Company and later entered the employ of the B. & O. R.R. in Virginia. He is a genial, affable man full of humor, and socially a fine mixer.

D. Mary Hill, fourth child of Thomas^{C1} Hill, was born September 14, 1822, and died November 27, 1873. On October 2, 1839, Mary Hill was married to her cousin, John Hill. The year previously Mary's elder sister, Margaret, had married Isaac Hill, brother of Mary's husband, John. John^{A1} Hill, the father of Isaac and John, had at one time lived in Alabama and later moved his family to Indiana, purchasing a farm in Clinton County; this brought the two pairs of cousins together just as they were reaching young manhood and young womanhood and a very interesting romance evidently developed, resulting in the marriages mentioned above, and because of their previous residence in the South, it resulted in the migration of both young couples to Texas, where they continued to live permanently. 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E. Minerva Hill, the fifth child of Thomas^{C1} Hill and Susan Buster Hill, was born November 25, 1824, at the home place in Southern Indiana, and was married to James Cox, January 27, 1842. Practically her entire life was lived in and near Vernon, Indiana, and here she died July 13, 1893, at the age of 68 years. The women members of the Hill family of this generation resembled quite closely the men in general build and physical appearance. All of them were strong, rather large women and without exception, each of them inherited the mental alertness and strength of character evidenced by the father, Thomas^{C1}, as well as by the grand-father Thomas³. Busy with the raising of large families, and the many domestic duties typical of that time, none of those women had opportunity to distinguish themselves, other than as good housekeepers and splendid Christian mothers. It must not be forgotten, however, they were quite as strong physically and mentally as the male members of their family and given opportunity could have distinguished themselves quite as much. After the death of her first husband, James Cox, Minerva Hill Cox, was married to William Cunliffe, with whom she lived until her death in 1893. No children were born of this second union.

F. Elizabeth Jane Hill, sixth child of Thomas^{C1} Hill and Susan Buster, was born December 24, 1826, and died November 13, 1922, aged ninety-five years, ten months, and nineteen days, having lived longer than any known member of the Hill family. On August 22, 1844, she was married to James Woods Deputy, who died in 1868. No children were born of this marriage. On October 26, 1875, she was married to John Wiggam, who died August 9, 1881. At the death of John Wiggam, Elizabeth Jane Wiggam was left to rear his family of nine children by a former wife. More to the point, those children were not strong

and healthy like the average family; one of them, in fact, was an invalid for years, and only two of them, John and Edward, are living to-day. Such a task as was set before Elizabeth Wiggam would have appalled most women, yet she continued to direct the Wiggam farm near Deputy, kept the children together and later moved to Vernon, Indiana, where she continued to reside until her death, making this move in order that the various younger children of the family might have better high school opportunities. As the children grew older, they were sent away to various colleges and institutions of higher learning. One of these boys, Albert Edward Wiggam, is internationally known to-day for his lecture work on the Chautauqua platform, and for his original research along Biological lines. Albert Edward Wiggam is the author of at least two well known books along scientific lines---"The New Decalogue of Science" and "The Fruit of the Family Tree". The first of these has won for him international fame. I mention this fact in order to make more clear the result of Elizabeth Jane Wiggam's care, watchfulness and sympathetic understanding in the raising of that large group of children confided to her care. She was a woman of fine Christian character and with a heart so overflowing with good-will that her deeds of helpfulness to others cannot be numbered. She once made the statement that the funeral services of fourteen different persons had been conducted from her home, which only means that she had reached out and taken under her care in their time of need, those sick and ailing people, who, but for her kindness might have lacked such gentle ministrations in their last hour. In the short space of this sketch, it is impossible to do justice to Elizabeth Jane Wiggam's life. Suffice to say that she literally went about doing good and if ever a woman deserved a tablet in the Hall of Fame, this wonderful woman does. All who know her hold her in reverence and the writer wants especially to impress on every member of the Hill family, the nobility of this woman's character and the remarkable manner in which she devoted her entire life to the interests of others. She leaves not a single descendant of her own blood, yet her name will not be forgotten. Her good deeds surely shall live after her.

E. Emily Hill, seventh child of Thomas^{C1} Hill and Susan Buster Hill, was born December 16, 1828, and died April 16, 1906, aged 77 years. H. Allen Hill, eighth child of Thomas^{C1} Hill and Susan Buster Hill, was born January 10, 1831, at the paternal homestead on Coffee Creek, Jennings County, Indiana, on February 14, 1850, he was married, at the age of nineteen years, to Salena Hudson, by whom he had one child, a daughter, Emaretta Olive Hill. A year later his wife was taken away by death. On February 24, 1856, he was married to Maria Elizabeth Malcolm, second daughter of Samuel Malcolm and Nancy Forceton Malcolm. This marriage was in the nature of a double wedding as at the same ceremony Maria Malcolm's younger sister, Eliza was married to Nehemiah Walton. Those marriages occurred in the west room of the Malcolm homestead at Paris Crossing, Indiana. On the breaking out of the Civil War, Allen Hill was the moving spirit in raising Company H. 27th Indiana Infantry. He was made Captain of his company and spent thirteen months in service when he was invalided home. He served under General Banks in the Shenandoah Valley and took part in the battles of Harper's Ferry and Winchester, beside other minor engagements in that section. Allen Hill was essentially a self-educated man, having worked on the farm during his minority while his father was away preaching. He attended Hanover College, at Hanover, Indiana a short time; possibly in the interval between his first and second marriage. In the spring of 1863, he moved to Illinois, and settled on a farm near Parker's Prairie. Later moves were made to Westfield and Saulsbury, and eventually to Charleston, Illinois. During the trying years succeeding the war, financial conditions were very unsettled and he combined farming in the summer with teaching in the winter. He was elected County Superintendent of Coles County, Illinois, in which capacity he served two terms. While living in Saulsbury, Allen Hill was converted and in April, 1869, was licensed to preach by the Little Flock Baptist Church. On January 22, 1870, he was formally ordained to the Ministry. For a period of eight years, he supplied numerous churches in Illinois finally taking charge of the Baptist Church at Charleston. In the spring of 1878, thru the solicitation of friends, he was induced to return to the old homestead in Indiana, where he became Pastor of the Coffee Creek Baptist Church, which his father and grand-father had served continually in the same relation since its founding in 1822. After several years as Pastor of the home church, he became General Agent of the Indiana Baptist State Convention, in which capacity he travelled over the state organizing new churches, stirring into renewed activity, weak and dormant ones, and making his influence felt for good thruout the entire state. Perhaps no man in the denomination at that period was more favorably known. He was a profound and logical thinker; a powerful platform speaker and a man of striking and impressive personality. Allen Hill was a man of large frame, of great strength and vitality, and while not portly, weighed in the neighborhood of two hundred and twenty pounds. His gray eyes looked out on the world in a spirit of unqualified kindness. He was a man of great breadth of vision, with perfect poise and dignity of bearing. He was a natural leader; and he possessed an abiding sense of humor. All men who knew him were his friends. His family life was happy and his home a place of restfulness and peace. He was a tower of strength in trouble but combined with his manly virility, a woman's gentleness and sympathetic understanding. He accumulated no wealth, such men rarely do, but the world is better by far from his having lived and labored in it. "As one may trace the course of a stream thru an arid plain by the line of vivid green along its banks, so may the evidence of his having lived be seen in the betterment of the lives of those who spoke with him along the way." His first political affiliation was with the Republican

party--he voted for Abraham Lincoln. Later, he followed the Greenback party, and still later was prominent as a forceful speaker for the Prohibition party. Allen Hill was made a Mason by the Westfield Illinois, Lodge. Later, he helped organize the Masonic Lodge at Saulsbury, Illinois, of which he became Worshipful Master. In later years, he accepted Pastorates at Galveston, Indiana, and Kokomo, Indiana. His last Pastoral charge was at Spencer, Indiana, where he died on August 4, 1898, after a short illness due to oramic poisoning. He was buried by his wife's side in the cemetery at Galveston, Indiana.

C. Ellison C. Hill, youngest son of Daniel Milton Hill, was born October 27, 1830, and was married December 16, 1856, to Melissa Jane Sharp. In appearance, he presented the usual Hill characteristics, varying from the type only in the possession of black eyes rather than blue or gray. He was a man of strong will, and it may be safely said that he possessed a temper, which he kept well under control. Ellison C. Hill served in the Civil War for a period of two years as Captain of Company K. 47th Indiana Volunteers. His honorable discharge from the army was dated December 27, 1863. In 1865, he moved to Indianapolis, Indiana, and engaged in the retail boot and shoe business until 1877, when on account of the unsettled financial conditions following the war, he failed in business. Let it be said to his credit, however, that he disposed of practically everything he owned in the world to pay his indebtedness. He then moved to Plymouth, Indiana, opened a store there and remained one year, when he moved back to Indianapolis. In 1879, he moved to Mitchell, South Dakota, and filed on a three quarter section of government land. In order to finance himself, he engaged in railroad work, continuing in it for fifteen years, up to about 1894, covering

most of the western states and Canada. In 1886, his family moved to St. Paul, Minn. In 1894, Ellison C. Hill entered the Milwaukee Soldiers Home, where he lived on his pension from the government until he died from pneumonia in October 1907. He is buried in Sharpville, Tipton County, Indiana, beside his wife. Ellison C. Hill had at all times, the bearing and air of a gentleman. He was not a member of any church but was a great student of the Bible. In politics, he was affiliated with the Democratic party, although he was not what you might call a party man, for in 1876, he aligned himself with the Populists and in 1896, voted for Palmer and Hockner. He was an indulgent father and especially proud of his children.
