




Now living Bartlett Belcher aged Sixty four years

who by first aly. swore afforad to Law, doth on  
his oath make the following Declaration in order

to obtain the benefit of the Province of Maine by the  
act of Congress passed Jun 1<sup>st</sup> 1832 that in

the Spring of 1780, in Putnam County in the State

of Virginia he volunteered under Capt<sup>r</sup> Collins

Shuttle for three months, to go to a place

called the Hallas in S<sup>t</sup> State on the head

of the Gaulekin River that he remained in said

country about one month at which time he

was promoted to take the place of his deceased

father, who had been drafted for three months

and left the army without permission and

the consequence of which he was turned

out of his company and sent to some other

place six months and that he said

declarant served a six month tour as

a Substitute for his father under

Capt<sup>n</sup> George Wallen Lieutenant Turkey Chase  
and he was marched from Henry County in Virginia  
to Hillsborough North Carolina, where he  
joined the main army under General Stevens Coloneel  
Cecilian Fortmire & Maj<sup>r</sup> Purvis whom the  
army remained ~~under~~<sup>over</sup> days and from thence he was  
marched to Camden South Carolina, where there  
was a Battle fought in which General Gadsden  
~~and he turned his back on the right wing of his officers~~  
~~the American Commandant in chief and General~~  
Cromwell was the English Commander in which  
Boller the American army was <sup>defeated</sup> states that  
he did not get with his company again until  
he arrived at Belford Court House where he also  
found his Capt<sup>n</sup> and Lieutenant whom he was taken  
back and ordered to the hospital, and he long unwilling  
to go to the hospital got permission to go home  
which was not permitted, he states that the  
company was again ordered to march to Hillsboro  
and he attended at Henry Court House to ~~see~~  
March and on account of his ill health he  
was furloughed to go home by Col<sup>r</sup> John <sup>Col<sup>r</sup> John</sup> for  
Colonel of Henry County Va and previous

To the expectation of his friends, and also  
before he recovered his health, for six months  
he states that he never attended to get  
his discharge as his officers had at a certain  
time been in the winter on duty  
He states that same time in the winter on duty  
fall away he volunteered to go against Cornwallis  
to intercept his march through Virginia, under  
Colonel Lewis Lyon Captain LeMire Colonel  
Lieutenant Colleens Carter, and was marched  
on Fairmont Shelders Ferry on Dan River  
in the early part of November 1781 he was captured  
in Henry County by the state of Virginia  
to go down in Virginia against the  
English under the command of General Cornwallis  
Wallace under Capt John Smith. LeMire and  
Emerson and were marched to Penne Elmore  
Cant hook where the army was under  
General Robert Lawson. Colonel Potts  
and Major Potts and he was marched  
on to Carters Ferry on Dan River where

they were stationed for some time and the  
British on the opposite side of the River  
and, prevented the Americans from crossing  
from thence he was marched on to James Town  
Williamsburgh. He states that ~~he~~ he was  
marched about in that neighbourhood some  
time, he was then marched back after the  
British had left that neighbourhood by  
Water to a place in Virginia called  
the Middle hills where he remained until  
discharged after having served a term of  
two months. He states that his discharge

They were stationed for some time and the

He further states that he has no documents to  
negotiate them up Master of the Chapel Royal or his  
successor of the same name neither does he know  
of any person whose testimony he can swear  
who can testify to his service.

The Supplemental Statement of Bartlet Belches Made in Order to Obtain a pension  
under the Act of Congress passed the  
June 1832

This declarant states that he was  
born in Chesterfield County Virginia  
on the 8th of June 1764 which  
statement he makes from recollection  
of the record in the family Bible  
of his father but he has not the  
Bible and knows the same was  
burnt near forty years ago in  
his fathers house and he has lived  
in Virginia or North Carolina  
Kentucky and Tennessee where  
he now resides ever since the  
revolutionary War.

This applicant states that he served  
first Month as a Volunteer in  
the Militia of Virginia. He then  
served six months as a substitute  
for his father in the Militia of  
said State both times signing as  
a private. The third time he served  
as a private and was dan-  
gerous one month. He then  
the 4th time was drafted and  
served two months against Dr.  
Cornwallis whilst he was in  
Virginia in 1781 which makes

then March the Service that he stated  
it in his former or ~~standard~~ time  
over nine months that he might  
be within rather than over the  
true length of time but on reflec-  
tion he is satisfied he served in  
all as a private in the manner  
he has stated ten months in the  
revolutionary war.

He has already stated the names of  
the officers and circumstances of  
the service as well as he now  
can state it.

before whom the above affidavit was made up now  
was at the time the same bears date an active

State of Virginia, Hanover County. 55.

On the 15 day of September 1849 personally appeared Alice Belcher a widow of Hanover County, in the State of Virginia aged eighty one years, before William Miller Esq; a Justice of the Peace in Hanover County, who, being first duly sworn to according to law didth in her oath make the following declaration in order to obtain the benefit of the provision made by the act of Congress passed on the 29th July 1848 extending the provisions of the pension laws to widows who served during the Revolutionary War to the Year 1800.

That she is the widow of Bartley Belcher who was on the Pension roll of the East Hanover Agency at New Market Hanover at the rate of sixteen thirty three & thirty three dollars per annum the exact amount left now collected, who was a private in Capt. Miller's company of Infantry in the 3<sup>d</sup> Virginia Regiment.

She further declared that she was married to the said Bartley Belcher on the 30 day of June in the year nineteen hundred & Ninety Nine (1799) in Patrick County State of Virginia; that she was not married to him previous prior to his leaving the service, but the marriage took place previous to the first of January 1800 at the time above stated. That her said Husband died on the eighth day of April 1848 at his house in Hanover County, affixed to that there is no sum of money known to Belcher on the day and year above written before Me. S. Wm. Miller Esq; Alice X Belcher.

I do certify that the said applicant for a Pension cannot from bodily infirmity attend the Court. Given under my hand this 16th day of October 1849 J.P. C.
