Grand Revéil Acadien 2020

The 3rd Grand Revéil Acadien will be held throughout South Louisiana on 3-11 October 2020. Centered around Lafayette, Louisiana, there will be events from the east to the west side of southern Louisiana. We are already planning a Reunion for the Guédry and Petitpas families. For this event we will be teaming up with the Hébert and Breaux families for a joint reunion somewhere near Lafayette. We have had smaller joint Guédry-Hébert-Breaux Reunions for the past four years with great success. Remember all Acadians are related and almost all of us have some direct ancestor who was an Hébert and/or Breaux. If not, you will still enjoy meeting all these wonderful Acadians. Once we secure a venue for the Reunion, we will announce the date, place and other pertinent information. In addition, we are considering having a separate Guédry et Petitpas get -together on another day. This is very tentative right now.

Congrès Mondial Acadien 2024

The 2024 edition of the Congrès Mondial Acadien will be 10-18 August 2024 in the southern region of Nova Scotia around the municipalities of Clare and Argyle. The Geddry/Jeddry stronghold of St. Alphonse and Meteghan is in the Clare municipality. We already have a team of folks being to plan our Guédry et Petitpas Reunion in August 2024. It likely will be in the area of Meteghan and St. Alphonse where we had our 2004 Reunion. As plans become firmed up a bit, we will be making announcements on date, place, etc.

Honoring Our Guédry and Petitpas Ancestors

One of my unfulfilled goals in leading Les Guédry et Petitpas d'Asteur has been to recognize in a permanent way our ancestors that were instrumental in establishing our Guédry and Petitpas families that we are a part of today. My idea is to place a permanent marker (similar to the roadside plaques throughout the country) honoring specific ancestors. I would like to start by placing plaques in specific locations near the sites where we have held Reunions and where a Guédry or Petitpas ancestor had a major influence. Here are some suggested sites: (1) Lunenburg, Nova Scotia (where Claude Guédry and Marguerite Petitpas resided for many years and several brothers of Marguerite Petitpas lived nearby. There are a couple of plaques mentioning the Guédry family at Lunenburg, but nothing of a permanent nature.), (2) St. Alphonse, Nova Scotia (St. Alphonse/ Chéticamp was founded by Augustin Guédry and Marie Jeanson. Through the hard work of Albert Geddry and the local Guédry organization in Clare, we placed a beautiful bronze plaque next to the cemetery at St. Alphonse in August 2007), (3) Grand Isle, Maine (Romain Guédry dit Grivois and his wife Marie Comeau settled near Grand Isle in the 1820s and were a major part of the community. We held our 2014 Reunion at Van Buren, ME – just 5 miles from Grand Isle. It would be nice to have a plaque honoring Romain and Marie either near the local cemetery or along Grivois Road.), (4) Houma, Louisiana (a number of Guidry families settled in Terrebonne Parish near Houma, LA after the deportations and still comprise a major part of the population of that area. We would dedicate the marker to the founding Guédry families of the area. We held our 1999 Reunion in Houma, LA.), (5) Cut Off, Louisiana (similar to Houma, LA in that many Guédry families settled the Bayou Lafourche area including Cut Off after the deportations and comprise a large part of the population in this area today. We held a Reunion in 2011 at Cut Off during the 1st Grand Revéil Acadien.). A couple of other locations that we may consider in the future are Chezzetcook, Nova Scotia and Larry's River, *Nova Scotia* – both strongholds of the Petitpas family.

So what do we need to get the ball rolling – someone to chair a small group to select one location and begin the process of getting a plaque erected. I have some familiarity with the process in that I was one of the persons instrumental in having a plaque erected to the Acadians at Princess Anne, Maryland in 2013 and also worked with Albert Geddry on the plaque at St. Alphonse in 2007. We will need to raise some funds for the plaque and installation and get some approvals to install, but these are not difficult issues.

Folks periodically approach me and want to volunteer to help with our family association. Here is a great way to help that honors our ancestors. I am hoping that several folks will volunteer to chair and be on the Ancestral Plaque Group. Just email me at guidryrmartin@gmail.com to let me know your interest.

<u>DNA</u>

We have discussed DNA in some detail in "Generations" earlier so I will not go into detail. There are three types of genealogical DNA: (1) Autosomal DNA (at-DNA) that is passed down by a mother and a father to their children; a child receives roughly 50% of at-DNA from each parent. Autosomal DNA is excellent for tracking cousins and direct relatives in your genealogical tree, but it is only useful for about five generations back; (2) Y-DNA that is passed down from father to son almost unchanged for generations. Women do not have Y-DNA, but their father, brothers, paternal uncles, and paternal male cousins have the same Y-DNA that they would have received. Y-DNA follows the ancestral direct male line for at least 12 generations almost unchanged and (3) Mitochondrial DNA (mt-DNA) that is passé down from a mother to her male and female children; however, males cannot pass mt-DNA to their offspring. Mitochondriail DNA remains unchanged for thousands of years and follows the ancestral direct female line.

Evolving research on Y-DNA is beginning to identify unique branches of the ancestral tree that can point to individual children of the original ancestor. These branches are minor mutations that have occurred in individual lines. Remember almost all mutations are harmless, but they can offer information that may separate closely related lines. Currently we have several members of the Guédry family that have had their Y-DNA tested, but we need more to be able to use this new research. There is only one commercial research firm that currently does Y-DNA – FamilyTreeDNA.com. I have used them over the last 15 years for many of my relatives and find that they are quite reputable. One can test their Y-DNA at several levels: Y-37, Y-67, Y-111 and Big Y-700. The number refers to the number of "markers" tested. The larger the number, the more information gained.

I would encourage all of our direct descendant male Guédry family members (Guedry, Gaidry, Guidry, Gedry, Gedry, Jedry, Gidry, Labine, LaBine, LaBean and other variations) to test your Y-DNA at the Y-111 or Big Y-700 level. And, women, get one of your paternal male Guédry relatives to test their Y-DNA.

Around Thanksgiving and Christmas FamilyTreeDNA offers steep discounts on all of their tests. Just check their website for the deals. Also, join the Guidry Project Group at FamilyTreeDNA and get a discount.

LES GUÉDRY ET PETITPAS D'ASTEUR CIRCLE OF DISTINCTION 2019 INDUCTEES

In 2011 The Board of Directors of Les Guédry et Petitpas d'Asteur, Inc. created the Circle of Distinction to honor members of the Guédry and Petitpas families that meet specific critieria and are selected by the Board.

The Board of Directors of Les Guédry et Petitpas d'Asteur will periodically select up to six (6) persons a year to the Circle of Distinction. Recipients will receive a Circle of Distinction Certificate and a Gold Medal.

In selecting persons for the Les Guédry et Petitpas d'Asteur Circle of Distinction, the Board will use these criteria:

The person must be a direct descendant of either Claude Guédry and Marguerite Petitpas or Claude Petitpas and Catherine Bugaret.

Persons with any variation of the Guédry or Petitpas surname are eligible.

The person through their work, their avocation or their life must have brought distinction to the Guédry or Petitpas name.

The person may be living or deceased.

On 1 July 2019 the Board of Directors of Les Guédry et Petitpas d'Asteur appointed to the Circle of Distinction:

Nathalie Geddry - From Portuguese Cove, Nova Scotia Nathalie Geddry has had a distinguished career in the entertainment and broadcasting industries. She began singing semi-professionally in 2003 and in July of that year her fellow Nova Scotians selected her as the best contemporary Acadian singer in the province. Shortly afterwards, she was a finalist in a strong competition of Acadian musicians from throughout the Maritime provinces. Her inaugural CD "Liberté" received many accolades. Fluent in both Acadian French and English, Nathalie joined Radio-Canada in 2007. As her broadcasting career progressed, she has held many exciting positions at Radio-Canada including host and producer of the program "Ça se passe ici" and cultural reporter for "Le Réveil" among others. Reporting for Radio-Canada, Nathalie frequently brings to her listeners interesting and informative broadcasts about Acadian history and culture.


Christine Guidry Law

Christine Guidry Law - The daughter of John Lloyd Guidry Jr. and Shirlene Lejeune, Christine Guidry Law proudly promotes both her Acadian and her Mi'kmaq heritage. Counting many well-known Cajun accordionists in her Lejeune ancestry, Christine mastered the diatonic accordion as a youth and uses it to teach others about her Acadian culture and heritage. Renewing a Cajun tradition, Christine formed the Cajun family band "Chère Mom" with her son Taylor, daughter LeeAnn and husband Wallace. Using "Chère Mom" to teach others about Acadian history and culture, Christine and her family play at a variety of venues including festivals, concerts, reunions and school events – always mentioning the Acadians, their survival as a people and their culture. A member of the Acadian-Mi'kmaq Nation, Christine organizes Annual Gatherings of her Nation in south Louisiana and participates with her daughter LeeAnn in Acadian-Mi'kmaq events in Nova

Scotia. The Acadian-Mi'kmaq Nation bestowed on Christine the position of Aboriginal Spiritual Leader of the Acadian-Mi'kmaq of Louisiana. She frequently makes presentations to organizations throughout south Louisiana on the Acadians and the Acadian-Mi'kmaq people.

Greg Gerard Guidry - Born in 1960 in Jefferson, LA, Greg Guidry earned in 1985 his Juris Doctor from Louisiana State University's Paul M. Hebert Law Center. In 2010 he received a Master of Judicial Studies from the National Judicial College at the University of Nevada. During his legal career Greg Guidry has worked in commercial litigation law and as an Assistant United States Attorney for the Eastern District of Louisiana where he focused on public corruption and commercial fraud. Greg Guidry served from 2000-2006 as a district court judge for the 24th Judicial District for Jefferson Parish and from 2006-2008 as circuit court judge with the Louisiana 5th Circuit Court of Appeal. In November 2018 Judge Guidry was elected to the Louisiana Supreme Court as an Associate Justice. He began his term in January 2009 and continued to serve the people of Louisiana as an Associate Justice until 2019. During his legal career Judge Guidry has assisted the U. S. Virgin Islands, the Republic of South Africa and Malawi as an instructor and advisor in legal affairs. In 2019 the President nominated and the U. S. Senate confirmed Justice Greg Guidry to a seat on the United States District Court for the Eastern District of Louisiana. Throughout his college and legal career Judge Guidry has received many honors and awards and has served on numerous civic and professional organizations. For relaxation Judge Guidry rides and shows Western performance horses which he has on his St. Tammany Parish, LA farm.

Eleanor Labine - The daughter Roland A. Labine, Jr. and Claire Wood, Eleanor Labine is an American screenwriter. A graduate of Yale University, Eleanor joined her mother in the 1980s in writing a number of highly-rated television screenplays. She was the co-head writer for "Ryan's Hope" in the late 1980s and has written for "One Life to Live", "General Hospital", "Port Charles", "Another World", and "Guiding Light". In 1995 she garnered a Daytime Emmy Award in Best Writing for "General Hospital" and in 2005 she won the Writers Guild of America Award for her writing of "Guiding Light". Additionally, Eleanor was nominated in 2002 and 2003 for the Writers Guild of America Award and in 2003 and 2005 for the Daytime Emmy Award in Best Writing for her screenplays of "Guiding Light" in those respective years. Expanding the scope of her work, in 2016 Eleanor wrote the play "Black Powder", a true story of an 1750s free African American family during the French and Indian War. "Black Powder" was selected as a finalist for the 2016 GI Film Festival in Washington, D.C. – a film festival dedicated to promoting positive portrayals of United States veterans. Honoring her Acadian heritage, Eleanor presents a dramatized multimedia program in period costume of Henry Wadsworth Longfellow's epic poem "Evangeline" to audiences throughout the northeastern United States.

<u>Guy Labine</u> – The son of Robert Labine and Hortense Joliat, Guy Labine gained a strong work ethic and sense of direction from his parents. After graduating in 1984 from Laurentian University in Sudbury, Ontario, Guy began working as a supervisor at the Employment and Immigration Student Employment Centre. Here began his inspiration for public service. Soon, he moved to Statistics Canada where he worked on the 1986 census of the Algoma Region. In 1988 at age 27 Guy Labine became one of the youngest persons elected as Municipal Councillor of the Town of Rayside Balfour. He served until 1993 when he formed the town's first economic development office. Continuing his public service, in 1997 Guy became manager of the Sudbury Regional Development Corporation. In 2001 Guy joined Science North as Director of Business Development. Science North, located on Lake Ramsey in Sudbury, is an outstanding science education centre offering interactive venues from lakes, rivers and forests to

space and astronomy, technology and engineering, the human body and DNA as well as computers and communications. Because of his experience and demonstrated leadership, Guy has risen in the ranks at Science North and in 2011 he was appointed Chief Executive Officer. It is northern Ontario's most popular tourist attraction and the second-largest of the more than forty science centres in Canada. 



IN MEMORIAM BERNARD L. "BERNIE" GEDDRY 4 NOV 1935 – 22 AUG 2019

On August 22, 2019 the Guédry and Petitpas families lost a strong supporter, a wonderful researcher, an excellent genealogist, a superb author and a great friend when Bernard L. "Bernie" Geddry of Peoria, Arizona passed away at age 83. Although a proud man of his many accomplishments, Bernie was not one to expound on all he had done – except about his family of which he was exceedingly proud. A graduate of Boston College with a PhD in Physics, Bernie quickly tired of physics after briefly working in the field and switched to the more exciting field of electronics. Here he worked for Sanders Associates/Lockheed Martin throughout his career on my projects vital to the interests of the United States. He became an expert in the emerging field of radar and became a national leader in research in this field. With his outstanding knowledge and unique capabilities recognized by corporate management, Bernie rose through the levels to Chief Engineer before his 1994 retirement. During his distinguished career he garnered many honors and awards including the coveted "Excellence in Technical Achievement Award".

Interestingly, even as a young child, Bernie had a strong interest in astronomy. As a young teenager, he built his own telescope and the heavens became his passion. Today, if you visit Bernie's home in Peoria, you'll notice his observatory in the backyard – one of America's few homes so adorned.

Unknown to most, Bernie was the oldest person in the world to receive a kidney transplant – which he received at age 80. It was still functioning fine at his death.


In the Spring of 2013 Bernie and his lovely wife Barbara went on a research trip to the Franche-Comté region of France on the east central border with Switzerland. In the town of Arpenans he conducted extensive research with the region's chief archivist on the origin of the Guédry name (which still exists in the area). Bernie also visited Mont Gedry near Arpenans. His research revealed many exciting clues to the origin of the Guédry name dating back to the Middle Ages. On August 17, 2019 Bernie presented the results of his research to over 90 attendees at the Les Guédry et Petitpas Reunion in Summerside, Prince Edward Island. His discussion and findings offer new avenues of research on our family. His presentation was extremely well-received and received lots of comments and questions.


IN MEMORIAM BERNARD L. "BERNIE" GEDDRY 4 NOV 1935 – 22 AUG 2019


Shortly after the Reunion, Bernie and Barbara returned to their home in Peoria, AZ. The next night they went to a local restaurant for supper and there Bernie collapsed and passed away immediately. Although we are all saddened at his death, Bernie died amidst some of the happiest days of his life. He had long-awaited presenting his research to the Guédry and Petitpas families for which he received many accolades; he had visited with his many friends from thoughout North America at the Reunion; he again set foot on the homeland of his ancestors and he was seated next to his beloved wife and best friend of 33 years. I know he died with a smile on his face – a smile that one always saw on his face as Bernie was one of the most positive persons that I have ever met. Even in the depths of his dialysis and the early days after receiving his new kidney, Bernie always had a wonderful smile and great enthusiasm in his voice when we talked. He was always looking to the future.

Bernie had many passions during his life – one of which was writing. In the past two years he authored three books – a genealogical volume and two novels based on real events of his life. *All three are available on Amazon.com and are highly recommended.* The two novels, which are spy mysteries, will grip you from the opening paragraph and will be difficult to put down. They are both based on real events in which Bernie played a significant role. The books are:

- 1) The Story of An Acadian Family The Geddrys, Guidrys, Gedrys, Gedres, Guedrys, Gueldreys, Jeddrys and Labines, etc. (Published in 2019; An updated and revised version of his earlier work of 2004). It comes in two versions one with color photos (slightly higher price) and one with black and white photos (reduced price). Fortunately, Bernie's presentation from the Reunion is included in this revised work a true gift that he left all of us.
- 2) <u>Nuclear Deception</u> by Bernard dit Grivois (Bernie's pen name) (Published in 2018) This book concerns a sophisticated radar system developed by the United States during the Cold War and the near pre-emptive nuclear strike by the Soviet Union to destroy the U. S. before the radar system could be deployed.
- 3) <u>Under the Ice</u> by Bernard dit Grivois (Published in 2019) This book concerns a unique submarine detection system developed by the U. S. against Soviet submarines and the KGB's attempt to sabotage the system.

BORN A PETITPAS, RAISED A VETTER... AGAIN A PETITPAS

Marie Lillian Petitpas was born on 10 March 1922 at Richibouctou Village, New Brunswick to Dominque Petitpas and Précille Baleineau. Shortly after her birth, her parents gave her up for adoption to the Vetter family. She eventually moved with her new family to Fitchburg, Massachusetts where the Vetters raised her. Reaching adulthood, Lillian married, but had no children and at age seventy was widowed.

Alone in the United States, Lillian wondered about her origin. Fortunately, she had a copy of her baptismal certificate. Urged by others in her quest to find her Petitpas family, Lillian attended the Congrès Mondial Acadien in 1994 at Moncton and struck gold. After much searching during the Congrès, she found her sister. Then she learned she had another sister and a brother and a slew of nieces, nephews and cousins. What a grand reunion it became for Lillian and her Petitpas family.

Immediately, she returned to Fitchburg, sold her home and moved permanently to New Brunswick to reunite with her biological family. At age 97 she now lives in a seniors home in Moncton with her sister just down the hall.


Lillian Vetter's life can be split into two chapters: the first 72 years of her life, and the past 25 years.

Vetter was born in New Brunswick in 1922 and given up by her biological parents as a child. She was raised in Fitchburg, Mass., by her adoptive family.

She married but never had children. Widowed at 70 and without any family south of the border, she set out to find out more about her Acadian origins.

On a trip to Louisiana with a friend, she met many francophones and asked around about her birth name — Petitpas.

Someone told her she should go to New Brunswick. The year was 1994. It was the first World Acadian Congress.

"I said 'huh?" Vetter recalled, laughing.

Vetter had never heard of the event.

This was before the age of the internet. She called the Better Business Bureau in Fredericton, and next thing she knew, she was on a train to New Brunswick, armed with her birth certificate.

Vetter visited cemeteries, churches and nursing homes in search of clues.

She went to Barachois, Shediac and Richibucto Village. People told her many anecdotes but nothing concrete.

Then one day, a woman left a note at her hotel.

Lillian Vetter met her biological siblings in 1994 for the first time at the age of 71. It was an emotional reunion. 1:22

"I was overwhelmed," Vetter remembered.

The note was from her sister.

Unbeknownst to her, she had two sisters and a brother.

They all met for the first time the next day.

Suddenly, a large family

"It was hard for me to believe," said Vetter. "In some ways sometimes I think maybe I'm still in a dream."

She went back to the U.S., sold her house, packed her bags, and at 72 years of age, moved back to the country where she was born.

Overnight, she had what was a very large family.

Not only siblings, but nephews and nieces, one of them, Canada's minister of health, Ginette Petitpas Taylor.

"What it's done to my life," she said. "It's made it whole again. It's fulfilled more expectations than I would have ever had if I had stayed in the States."

Since 1994, the World Acadian Congress has been held every five years.

Part of the mission is to reunite families.

Best years of her life

For Vetter, that reunion has been a daily thing. Now 97, she lives in a seniors home in Moncton, just down the hall from her sister.

She's grateful for getting back her "famille."

"The last 25 years have been the happiest of my life,'" she said.

"And I think they deserve a big 'merci beaucoup.'"

BON APPETIT

1 medium-sized turnip
5 potatoes
1 tbsp (15 ml) salted herbs
2 onions, chopped
1/4 lb (125 g) salt pork (or butter), diced
Salt and pepper to taste

Place the turnip and the potatoes in a large pot with just enough water to cover the vegetables. Bring the water to a boil and add the salt, pepper, salted herbs and 1 chopped onion. Simmer for 20 minutes.

In a skillet, simmer the pork for 2 minutes with a small amount of water to remove some of the salt. Pour off the water and sauté the pork in its own fat. When the pork is crisp and brown put it

aside and sauté the remaining onion in the fat that remains. When the potatoes and turnip are tender, mash the vegetables together and blend with the pork pieces, onions and fat. Season to taste and serve immediately while the pork is still crisp.



Crust 2 1/2 C (625 ml) flour
4 tsp (20 ml) baking powder
1/2 tsp (3 ml) salt
2 tbsp. (30 ml) sugar
1/4 C (60 ml) fat - butter or lard
3/4 C (175 ml) milk

Filling -4 apples 1/2 C (125 ml) seedless raisins 1/2 C (125 ml) cranberries

Syrup -1 C (250 ml) brown sugar 3/4 C (175 ml) water

POUTINES WITH A HOLE An Acadian favorite from New Brunswick, Canada

Sift together the flour, baking powder, salt and sugar. Blend in the lard to form a course mixture. Add the milk and mix the dough well. Divide the dough into twelve pieces. Roll each piece until it is 5-6 inches (12-15 cm) in diameter.

Peel the apples and cut them into small pieces. Place the apple pieces, raisins and cranberries in the center of each circle of dough. Moisten the edge of the dough with milk or water, and roll the dough around the ingredients so as to form a ball.


Carefully close the opening and place the poutine upside down on a pan. Make a hole about ½ inch (15 mm) in diameter on the top of each poutine. Bake at 375°F (190°C) for 30 minutes.

Prepare the syrup by mixing the sugar and water. Boil for 5 minutes.

When the poutines are ready, remove them from the oven and pour the syrup into the hole on the top of each poutine. Serve cold or hot. Makes 12 poutines.




