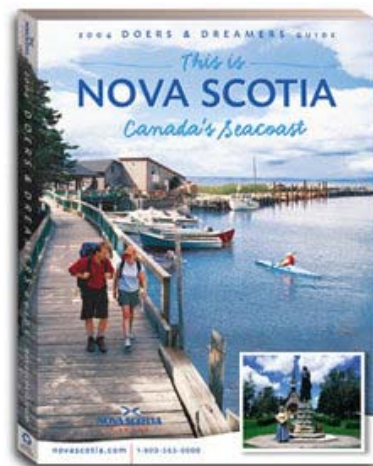

The LaBeans of Michigan

Another Branch of the Guédry Family

Earlier (see “Les Guidry d’Asteur Generations”, v. 1 #4) we discussed the origins of the Labine surname within the Guédry family. Briefly, about 1756 the English exiled Jean Baptiste Augustin Guédry dit Labine from the Pisiguit region of Acadia to Wilmington, Massachusetts.

Jean Baptiste Augustin Guédry dit Labine, son of Pierre Guédry dit Labine and Marguerite Brasseau, married Marie Marguerite Picot, daughter of Michel Picot and Anne Blain, shortly before being exiled. Together they raised a large family in Massachusetts while suffering terribly from lack of food and shelter.

After ten years of exile in Massachusetts, Jean Baptiste Augustin Guédry dit Labine successfully petitioned the Massachusetts Governor and the Council of Boston to transfer his family from Massachusetts and in 1766 he and his family moved to St. Jacques de L’Achigan, Québec, Canada.

While in Massachusetts, Jean Baptiste used various names including Jean Labrador, John Labarador and Jean Guédry dit Grivois. After arriving in the Québec region, the family of Jean Baptiste Guédry dit Labine changed their name yet again - to Guildry dit Labine and then to Labine, by which most of the descendants of Jean Baptiste are known today.

Jean Charles Guildry dit Labine, a son of Jean Baptiste Augustin Guédry dit Labine, married Marie Angélique Doucet, daughter of Pierre Doucet and Marie Arsenault. They remained in the Québec area and raised a large family of six sons and eleven daughters.

Jean Baptiste Guildry dit Labine, their ninth child, born on 16 April 1791 at St. Jacques de Montcalm, Québec, Canada, married Angélique Rivêt, daughter of Pierre Rivêt and Marie Agathe Chaput, and, after Angélique’s death in 1840, he wed Marie Josephte Marsan. Jean Charles and Angélique had 2 sons and 4 daughters; however, only two of their children - Marcelline Guildry dit Labine and Jean Baptiste Guildry dit Labine - survived beyond 21 years of age. Jean Charles and Marie Josephte had one son, Jérôme.

Jean Baptiste Guildry dit Labine, born 31 July 1825 at St. Jacques de Montcalm, Québec, Canada, eventually moved from the Québec area - journeying south to Michigan. In the Census of Monroe County, Michigan of 1840 we find Jean Baptiste Guildry dit Labine.

On 7 November 1848 Jean Baptiste married Edwidge Senever dit Lemarbre, daughter of Pierre Senever dit Lemarbre and Marie Angélique Beaudry, at St. Antoine on the River Basin Catholic Church (today St. Mary’s Catholic Church) in Monroe, Monroe County, Michigan. Edwidge, like Jean Baptiste, emigrated to Michigan from St. Jacques de Montcalm, Québec, Canada.

Jean Baptiste and Edwidge remained in Monroe County, Michigan and began their family together with their first child Sophronie born on 12 October 1849 in Newport, Monroe County, Michigan. Over the next 27 years they had sixteen additional children - six of whom died as young children.

In the early 1880’s Jean Baptiste and Edwidge Labine gathered their children and belongings and moved to Pinconning Township, Bay County, Michigan. Jean Baptiste purchased 60 acres of land in Section 16 of Pinconning Township. Later, as his children matured, they purchased property in the same area. From the tax rolls of Bay County we know that Jean Baptiste Labine died about 1888 in Pinconning Township and is buried in the Pinconning Township Cemetery.

Edwidge Senever survived her husband and remained with her children in Pinconning Township where she died on 17 February 1918 at the age of 87 years. She is buried in St. Michael Cemetery in Pinconning Township. At the time of her death she had 102 grandchildren, 88 great grandchildren and 4 great great grandchildren - certainly a combination of living to a ripe old age and bearing a very prolific family.

François John Labine, called Frank and the fourth child of Jean Baptiste Labine and Edwidge Senever, was born on 30 September 1853 at Newport, Michigan and moved with his family in the early 1880’s to Pinconning Township, Michigan. Frank Labine was a farmer. He purchased a threshing

machine and threshed grain for the farmers of Pinconning Township.

Frank Labine first married Therese Catherine Campeau, daughter of James Campeau and Catherine St. Martin, on 1 October 1872 in Newport, Michigan. After her death in April 1881 in Pinconning Township, he married Melenisse “Minnie” Cardinal, daughter of Médard Cardinal and Mathilda Richer, on 1 July 1889 in West Bay City, Bay County, Michigan. Frank and Therese had five children - four boys and one girl. Frank and Minnie had eleven children - five boys and six girls.

David Labine, the tenth child of Jean Baptiste Labine and Edwidge Senever, was born on 15 July 1860 in Newport, Michigan and married Josephine Campeau, daughter of John Campeau and Angeline Lamerand, on 3 September 1889 in West Bay City, Michigan. They had nine children - five boys and four girls.

Joseph Labine, the eleventh child of Jean Baptiste Labine and Edwidge Senever, was born on 13 January 1864 in Newport, Michigan and married Mary Lea Julian on 15 September 1885 in West Bay City, Michigan. The couple had eight children - one boy who died in infancy and the rest girls. Joseph LaBean died on 8 July 1932 in Detroit, Wayne County, Michigan from injuries received when on 19 June 1932 he was struck by a hit-and-run driver at Collingwood and Broad Street while on his way home from a visit with relatives. He suffered a skull fracture and internal injuries which shortly resulted in his death.

[Note: Ms. Myrtle H. (LaBean) Pletos of Sterling Heights, Michigan has extensively researched the LaBean family of Michigan and is the authority for this area of Guédry family research. Her work served as the basis for the above.]

Pierre Labine, the twelfth child of Jean Baptiste Labine and Edwidge Senever, was born on 18 March 1866 in Newport, Michigan and married Therese Victoria LaBeau, daughter of Richard LaBeau and Victoria Wilmont, on 27 April 1886 in West Bay City, Michigan. They had twelve children - five boys and seven girls.

Daniel Labine, the youngest child of Jean Baptiste Labine and Edwidge Senever, was born on 16 August 1876 in Newport, Michigan and married Elizabeth Bedore, daughter of Frederick Bedore and Suzanne Saunders, on 8 November 1898 in Pinconning, Michigan. Daniel and Elizabeth had ten children - six boys and four girls.

It was during this generation, sometime after 1881, that the Labine surname of the family underwent another evolution to LaBean. Almost certainly this resulted from the English-speaking population of Bay County, Michigan phonetically writing Labine as LaBean. Could a government clerk have miswrote the Labine name as LaBean on official documents and the family decided it was easier to adopt the new spelling rather than “fight the tide of change”? Regardless, the change took hold and today the Labine (i.e., Guédry) family of Michigan continues to spell their surname as LaBean.

The Guédry surname of our progenitor, Claude Guédry dit Grivois, has undergone many changes over the last 350 years - including Guidry, Guildry, Geddry, Gedry, Jeddry, Jedry, Gidry, Gaidry, Labine, LaBine and LaBean - yet we remain one family bound by our common ancestry and heritage.

Family Talent

Jules "Nonc Jules" Guidry - Cajun Band Leader and Musician

Jules Guidry says proudly that he is a Cajun from the small town of Carencro, ten miles north of Lafayette. He is leader of a band called "Nonc Jules and Lachez-Les." He plays the triangle (Tee Fer), harmonica, occasionally the accordion, and he sings.



Born in 1944, Mr. Guidry is an accountant for CODOFIL, the Council for the Development of French in Louisiana. He has long been active in working to preserve Acadiana's French language and culture. For thirteen years, he has been the host of a weekly Cajun music radio show called "Le Bal de Dimanche Apres Midi" (The Sunday Afternoon Dance) on KRVS Public Radio in Lafayette. His band's most widely known song is "La Valse de Dimanche Apres Midi" (the Sunday Afternoon Waltz,) which he recorded on a 45 with the "Lachez- Les Two Step." Both songs were written by Nonc (Uncle) Jules, and describe the Cajun heritage he feels so proud of. "La Valse de Dimanche Apres Midi" also appears on Volume Two of an album recorded by the Cajun French Music Association of Eunice, featuring various Cajun artists. Another song, "La Valse a Tolan," is included on the album titled "Direct de Vermilionville," which is available for purchase at Vermilionville Historic Bayou Attraction in Lafayette.

His band performs primarily for family oriented occasions like parties, weddings, festivals, and plays at Vermilionville in Lafayette four or five times a year. Mr. Guidry frequently acts as master of ceremonies for Cajun music events like Vermilionville's Old Timers Music Festival and Newcomers Festival and also at Belizaire's Restaurant.

In 1987, Jules Guidry was nominated by the Times of Acadiana Music Award panel as Best Male Vocalist-Cajun Music and as Best Triangle Player. He is an active member of the Baton Rouge chapter of the Cajun French Music Association, and plays music often in the Baton Rouge area. Over the years, he has organized a number of Cajun music jam sessions in the Lafayette area. His primary goal in this, he says, has been the promotion of young and new musicians. He feels that these efforts have been successful, and estimates that perhaps a dozen popular young musicians started out playing at local jam sessions.

With his band, he has performed at restaurants, clubs, festivals, and private parties throughout Acadiana, Texas, New Orleans, and Alexandria areas since 1985. These include the Bayou Festival in St. Martinville, the Natchitoches/NSU Folk Festival, Triangle Club in Scott (as the host band for a jam session), PaPa's Downtown Restaurant in Lafayette, Acadian Village's Bal d'Hanger (Old Time Barn Dance), the Louisiana Swamp Festival, and the Cloutierville Heritage Festival. He has been interviewed about Cajun culture several times by French journalists and radio broadcasters.

SIDNEY GUIDRY Guitarist, Vocalist, Songwriter [1 Jun 1922 - 28 Jul 1993]



Born on 1 June 1922 in Grand Bois, a small community of St. Martin Parish, LA, Sidney Guidry was the son of Joseph Guidry and Eva Guidry. He first married Lean Angell in 1945 with whom he had three sons. On 11 November 1983 he married a second time to Yvonne Robin. Sidney started playing music at eight years of age and became a self-taught rhythm guitarist, vocalist and songwriter. By the age of 13 he was a professional musician. During the 1930's he worked with the Alley Boys in Abbeville, LA and later played with Doc Guidry and the Sons of the Acadians. His Cajun and Western Swing recordings made with the Alley Boys were distributed by Vocalion Records. Popular Cajun hits on the record included *Abbeville Breakdown*, *Jolie Petite Fille* and *Moi et Ma Belle*. He also recorded records on the Decca Label in Houston, TX.

Always pushing the envelope, Sidney developed a rudimentary sound system in 1939 powered by an automobile battery. Also in 1939 Sidney Guidry had a weekly radio show on KVOL in Lafayette, LA. After serving in the Marine Corps during World War II, Sidney returned to full-time performing a couple of years after the war. On

28 July 1993 Sidney Guidry passed away at Lafayette General Hospital in Lafayette, LA and is buried at St. Joseph Catholic Cemetery in Cecilia, LA.

WES GUIDRY Rock Disk Jockey

Wes Guidry ran his very popular Rockin' Oldies Show on LA99 (KHLA 99.5 FM) radio station in Lake Charles, LA. The show aired on Sunday evenings from 6:00 -10:00 pm. His entertaining blend of classic rock hits of the 1960's and 1970's along with audience call-in for requests and contests made Wes' show a hit in the southwest Louisiana and southeast Texas markets. Wes Guidry signed off the air in Lake Charles, LA, after 14 years of spinning golden oldies.

THE SEVEN ACADIAN EXPEDITIONS of 1785

Researching the exile of various Acadian groups to France and their subsequent resettlement in Louisiana as part of the “Seven Acadian Expeditions of 1785” can be confusing unless one understands the various lists for the Expeditions and their purposes.

At least three different sets of lists exist of the Acadians who either planned to go to Louisiana from France or who did make the journey in 1785. The earliest document of September, 1784 is a list of Acadian Families desiring to depart France for Louisiana. The seven embarkation lists of 29 April 1785 through 22 September 1785 identify the Acadians who boarded vessels in France for Louisiana. Finally, the debarkation lists of 29 July 1785 through 19 January 1786 enumerate the Acadians who arrived in Louisiana. To further complicate research, the embarkation lists are in French, since they originated in France, while the debarkation lists are in Spanish since Spain owned Louisiana in 1785. This resulted in the ship L’Amitié being “renamed” L’Amistad on its arrival in New Orleans, LA.

NOTES

* The dates of embarkation and debarkation for a specific ship often differ among the various sources. The date of embarkation cited by one source may be the date the passengers actually embarked on the vessel while another source may cite the date that the vessel actually departed Nantes, France. Several days could elapse between these two events. The debarkation dates may differ because the ships sometimes lingered at the mouth of the Mississippi River due to their size and, therefore, arrived in New Orleans days or weeks later than they arrived at mouth of the Mississippi River. One source may use the date of arrival at the mouth of the Mississippi River while another source may use the actual date that passengers debarked from the vessel.

* The ship L'Amitié is referred to by this name in the French records; however, in the Spanish debarkation lists it is called L'Amistad. In French the word 'L'Amitié' means 'friendship' which is the same meaning of word 'L'Amistad' in Spanish.
