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Why are we spending our time with Family History? I for one am interested in the trials and victories of my ancestors, and I early on realized that my life in many ways is a reflection of the lives of those ancestors. Yes, things change, but I think not the important ones. What are some of my hopes, that maybe DNA could help with?

- I hope to someday find pictures of my gg-grandfather Charles (d. 1858) and his wife Martha (Mills), and my ggg-grandfather Henry (d. 1877) whose wife Ann (Pearson) d. 1821, and maybe my gggg-grandfather Amos (d. 1844) and his wife Ann (Milhous). They were Quakers at Caesar's Creek MM in Ohio. DNA might be the key that puts me in touch with that unfound cousin that has those pictures.
- I, like you, want to find the parents of my first known ancestor Jeffery (c. 1636 1711/12) and his wife Dorothy (Mattock), wed in Wiltshire in 1662. There are Englishmen (or Australians, New Zealanders, Afrikaners, or ??) somewhere that can maybe provide a key that will lead to a break through of that brick wall. Come on out there, I need to get matched up with some of you.

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The counter on our web site has passed 3300 since its inauguration in August of last year, and the hits are increasing as we grow. Following is the end of September participation results:

- Test results pending...... 03
- Join requests in process....02

We have to date identified 21 distinct Hawkins lines. My guess is that with the increase in the separate lines we will now begin to see more of the new participants begin matching the established lines. As that happens, and the newly matched participants begin to share information, the magic of DNA will show that it can break through some of the old "brick" walls/corners that had existed.

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We are seeing our numbers increasing again, and October is looking very positive. If you have been considering testing, I encourage each of you to take that step. I feel very confident that you will be pleased with your decision once you have acted.
