A Hawkins photo from about 1905. The background is a tobacco barn in southwest Kentucky, probably Christian County, but if not, one of the nearby counties such as Todd or Hopkins. The two men on the left are Harry Wilmer Hawkins and his half brother Thomas Jefferson Hawkins, both from Indiana, across the Ohio River from Owensboro in Perry County, a town called Tobinsport or Tobin Township. Next to Tom is his wife Irma Lewis and their son Alfred, standing on the bench. Next to Irma is a couple that were moving away—the reason for the photograph—but my grandmother couldn't remember who they were exactly. The last woman on the back row is Daisy Lewis, Irma's sister. Next to Alfred and seated on the bench is 100-year-old Mary Ann Oran Palmer. She is the maternal grandmother to the Lewis sisters, Irma, Daisy, and Clara, sitting next to her. Notice the large sunbonnets that Clara and Daisy are holding. Beside Clara at the end of the row are the two older daughters of Tom and Irma, Mary Hawkins who married David Williams in Pennsylvania and Helen Hawkins, who like her Aunt Daisy, never married. Harry and Clara were the parents of my uncle, James Robert Hawkins in the Hawkins Family Group-01, and my mother, Betty Sue Hawkins Norton who just died on April 6. [Thanks Julie.]



Our Hawkins DNA Project is a worldwide project. Where ever we are most of us trace our surname lineage to the UK where surnames came into general use sometime after the early 1300s. We are trying to identify our connections within our native countries, and to forbearers in the UK. Our Hawkins name is common in the UK, the US, Australia, NZ, etc. I speak pretty good American, but I am not at all fluent in Australian or South African. I need some help from our non-US cousins. If you

We now have 99 Y tested men in our project. We also have women that have joined the project by submitting mtdna samples (a program for them has not yet been developed). Other surnames that have joined our project (their results match with our Hawkins lines) are Hankins, Hawkings, Ferguson (2), Ottessen, and Murray (2). There are two individuals that have been mailed sample kits (at their request), but have not yet returned them. Either one could be number 100.
