A Christmas gift for the man that has everything, and for your grandchildren. A gift that will last forever - DNA testing with the HAWKINS DNA Project.





The **GOAL** for our project is to identify, using DNA, the Haplotype for each of our Hawkins lines, and to construct a single tree that connects each and every participant.

Achievement of this goal depends on the unselfish giving of a very large group of participants. I think that it is time to take a very serious look at how we are doing. Take a look at the input to our defined family groups starting on page 3. What do you think?

You can help (if you really want to), or you can monitor (hide) and take from those that are giving (pretty common). Following are a few points that I feel are quite important to the proper development of this project (our project).

- First, and one of my greatest disappointments, is the almost total lack of testing participants in well documented lines like mine. Hawkins Family Group-04 is a Quaker line, and the records are abundant, so why test? Our tree is quite large, but lack of testing participants is causing us a real problem that could be easily resolved (confirming the correct common value of our marker # 09 that has mutated in two of four branches of our eight branched tree. I have identified male descendants in three of the four other branches, but have been unable to induce any interest YES, frustrating!). This problem is existent in all the family groups. An *iPod nano* for Christmas costs about \$150. That is about the same cost of doing an adequate DNA testing. Dang-nabitt, you contrary Hawkins men, give something of lasting value to your family (present and future).
- Are you in cooperation with your Group Leader? Are you providing any material, thoughts or suggestions to help the group to our **GOAL**, are you sending information to share with others in the newsletter, are you "recruiting" test participants for your line and the project in general. There really are a lot of things that you can do to help.
- If you are a Hawkins male, **Just Do It**. Give of yourself, and help someone else.

Are you a participant in our Hawkins DNA Project? If you have tested and received your results, and your kit # is not shown in the selection table at the top of our Family pages, then you are not a member of our project, and I am not aware of your existence. Please join. If you have questions please contact me.

The clone tool is the most important tool in photograph restoration, so make sure it is part of any Photoshop program you purchase. The clone tool takes a pixel or pixels from one place and puts them on top of another place in a copy and paste action. It can be used to cover almost all spots, cracks, signatures, crayon marks and other surface problems. The clone tool is located in the toolbox in Adobe Photoshop and looks like a rubber stamp. Besides the clone tool, Adobe Photoshop also has a spot healing brush, healing brush and patch tool. I have had occasion to use all of these tools, but you will find that the basic clone tool will do everything you want once you become comfortable using it.

You'll notice that your cursor changes to a small rubber stamp after you click on the clone tool. If you are not using Adobe Photoshop, you will want a program that allows you to vary the brush size, and change from an opaque to transparent mode that will let you see the area you are pasting over. For complex restorations, you may find that you change the size of the brush often, and need to zoom in and out of the area you are correcting. There can be a lot of movement involved with cloning. Eventually you will develop your own technique, but to begin I recommend the following: choose a brush that is small in pixel size and fades at the edges; set the transparency option to 75%; and make sure the mode option is set to normal.

You want to transfer pixels that duplicate those in the damaged area and these will usually be found close to the imperfection. Put the cursor/clone stamp on pixels that are closest to the crack/scratch/mark, hold down the ALT key and left click. This is the area that is going to be picked-up. Watch your cursor when you do this; it should change to a circle with a cross in it, similar to a target. Next, move your cursor over the imperfection and left click. Two things should happen – your cursor should change to a cross and the imperfection should disappear in the small area on which you cloned the chosen pixels. You have now started to restore your photograph!

Continue to clone small groups of selected pixels onto the damaged area. Move slowly and pay attention to what you are clicking. Notice how the shadows and lines on the image change as you work and change the selection area accordingly. I recommend that you zoom in to the image at 100% so that you can see the pixels up close. Especially when working on difficult areas like the face, corrections will look more natural if you zoom in closely and use a very small brush. The nose is the most important reference point on the face, so work carefully around it. Zoom out occasionally for perspective and to check your work. Try to avoid dragging the cursor, because that will leave a pattern. Depending on what I am trying to fix I sometimes work in a circular motion and sometimes in a straight line.

When I begin a photo restoration project, I usually work with a round brush. As my work becomes more complex and I start working in smaller areas, I change my brush to a square one. Cloning isn't easy – it takes practice – so don't give up if your first few tries aren't perfect. Adobe has provided a handy dandy step backward function in case you do something you don't like. As always, remember to "save as" and never work on the original image file.

Mylar sleeves and pockets are a safe and practical way to protect both photos and documents. Mylar comes in different thickness and sizes. Charcoal, graphite, and pastel drawings should NOT be stored in Mylar as it can lift the drawing medium from the paper.

Laminating is irreversible and should never be used to preserve photos and documents. [Becky Schipper]

OLD LETTER: Establishes the death of Mary (Molly) Hawkins, State of Indiana Wayne County

To - AMOS HAWKINS

This 28th of 7th mo. - yr. 1826

Living in State of Ohio, Warren County

Respected brother Amos Hawkins, I take this opportunity to inform thee that we are in a reasonable state of health - hoping these few lines find thee and thine enjoying the same blessing.

I must also inform you our mother (Mary) separated this life the 20th instant — the disease was the flux - she lay 'eighteen days - she took but very little nurishment in that time.

The rest of our people are well, as far as we know. I may inform you that two acquaintances saw our brother Nathan and informs that they are well.

I want thee to come at yearly meeting if not sooner. There are some things to see into (probably settling Mother's estate). So having nothing further I conclude my letter - with love to you all.

Will of John Hawkins Sr. (1744-1816) (From files of Carl H. Hawkins) Recorded - Wayne County, IN, Book 1 -13, Proven - March 5, 1816

Be it known unto all Christian people whom these presents may concern. That I, John Hawkins being weak in body but calling to mind the mortality of this life and being desirous of settling my affairs while life and health permits - do make ordain and constitute my last Will and Testament in the following manner:

First I desire that my Body be buried in a plain, decent and Christian manner at the direction of my Beloved wife. My funeral charges and just debts shall] be paid and discharged with all convenient speed after my decease.

Second: I give and bequeath unto my son Nathan Hawkins a tract of two-hundred acres of Sand more or less in South Carolina on the branch of the Tyger River called Long-Rung, to have and to hold by him and his heirs and assignees forever.

Third: It is my will that all other of my South Carolina Sands be sold and the money equally divided between my wife and our eight children here named -James Hawkins, Martha Comer, Mary Comer, Sarah Cook, Ann Hawkins, Rebecca Hawkins, Tamar Smith, and Lydia Wright

Fourth: I give and bequeath unto my Beloved wife, eight head of cattle and all my household goods - and it is my will at her decease that what is left shall be divided amongst all my children [12 named throughout the Will.]

Flfth' I give unto my son William Hawkins two-hundred and fifty acres laying on the West-River of Wayne County and also one wagon with all the utensils belonging to the plantation.

Lastly: I do hereby nominate constitute and appoint my sons, Amos Hawkins and John Hawkins to be the executors of this my last Will and Testament -disallowing and revoking all other Wills by me made -and confirming this only to be my last Will and unto this set my hand and seal

Signed John ((X)) Hawkins Sr.
