Technology Tip of the Month--Inserting Images into Shapes Using Microsoft Word by Kay Spears

Contrary to what some might think, working with Microsoft Word can be fun. For example, I often want inserted images and graphics to be more than just rectangles. While Microsoft Word is made primarily for text and is rather limited in its graphics capabilities, there are some simple things that can be done to tweak an image.

Graphics may be inserted into AutoShapes and WordArt. There are several AutoShapes to choose from: oval, octagon, star, banner, etc. These shapes can be found in the Drawing Toolbar, which I always have opened.

To try out your first option, go to AutoShapes>Basic Shapes and choose the oval. As soon as you click on the oval symbol, a box appears that says “create your drawing here.” I never use that box because I usually want my text to wrap around the shape. Tap the Escape key on your keyboard and that box disappears. Your cursor will be in the shape of a cross. Hold down the left click button on your mouse and drag your cursor until you have an oval shape in your document. There are several ways to insert an image into the oval: by right clicking and choosing “format AutoShape,” by using “Format” on the main menu bar, or by using the paint bucket tool. The paint bucket tool is located on the Drawing Toolbar. Make sure the oval shape is selected. There should be white dots around it and one green dot at the top of the shape. Go to the paint bucket tool, click on the arrow, choose fill effects>picture tab>select picture. This opens up a dialog box that will allow you to select your image file. Find the folder with your image in it, click on it, then click on “insert.” Your image will appear in the dialog box. Before you click on “OK,” check the box that says “lock picture aspect ratio.” This prevents the graphic from distorting when it is inserted into your selected shape. You cannot adjust the placement of the image in the shape, so you may have to do some tweaking of the image outside of Word.

You can also have some fun inserting graphics inside of text by using the WordArt tool located on the WordArt toolbar. The WordArt tool is the large capital A on the far left of the tool bar – click on it. A WordArt Gallery opens providing a number of selections, all of which you may edit later. Choose any option and type a word, then click “ok.” That word will now be in your Word document as an inline object. Change it to a floating object by picking a text wrap option. Now, go through the same steps that you did to insert a photograph into the shape object.

Once the graphics are inserted into AutoShapes or WordArt, you can add shadows and lines or twist/warp and rotate them. All of these options are located on the Drawing and WordArt toolbars, which have dropdown arrows that allow access to even more tools. The green dot I mentioned earlier is your rotate tool. I suggest you experiment with these tools until you get the result you want. Let your imagination run wild and have some fun!

In copying page 212, a bit of the far right hand side of the document was missed. Hence the “?”.

If we were to assume that all the Hawkins (Hawkings) are members of the same family line (Hawkins DNA Family Group-04), the dates would indicate to me that:

- James Hawkings is definitely our James I that married Mary Elliot.
- Amos, dismissed in 1806 is probably not a son of our James (b. in VA), but the son of one of the other sons of James & Mary; William, John, Joseph, or Isaac.
- Hannah dismissed, married contrary to discipline, 1771, Isaac complained of, married out of society. 1756, and William acknowledge, married contrary to discipline, 1754 are possibly the children of James & Mary.
- Jesse was likely born circa 1742 (28 is the average marrying age in my line). He is not listed anywhere in the history that we have on our James, so, it is likely that he is a son of one of our James’ brothers William, John, Joseph, or Isaac.

Bits and Pieces of the Hawkins Family Puzzle by Mildred Showalter Farmer Continued from the last issue [#3, Apr 1988].

Elisha Hawkins, son of William Hawkins and Elizabeth Wall was b. ca 1752 in Orange, CO., VA. He married Elizabeth Edwards, the dau. of Uriah Edwards and Mildred Head of Spotsylvania, CO., VA. Elisha enlisted in the Regular Army in 1776 under Captain Francis Taylor. He served for two years and belonged to the 2nd Virginia Continental Regiment. He was discharged at Valley Forge. Elisha and Elizabeth had four children: Elisha, Jr., Moses, Frances and John Carlostin.

Elisha moved to Kentucky and it is thought that Elizabeth did not accompany them. It is not known if she died or just didn't want to leave Virginia. Elisha married Rachel Scandlund in Kentucky where he lived before 1796 on Dry Run in Franklin, CO.

Elisha Hawkins Jr. son Of Elisha Sr. and Elizabeth Edwards was b. in Orange CO. VA.

Moses Hawkins, son of Elisha Sr. and Elizabeth Edwards was b. in Orange co., VA and moved to Franklin CO., KY. He married Sarah Steele ca 1819 and their dau. Elizabeth was b. ca 1820. Elizabeth married Lawson F. Noel in 1859 In Woodford, CO., KY and she had a dau. Frances Noel b. ca 1861.

Frances Hawkins, dau. of Elisha Sr. and Elizabeth Edwards was b. ca 1779 in Orange CO., VA

Va ca 1798 married William Barnes ca 1798 in Culpeper, CO,. They had 9 children: Hawkins, Richard, Leland, Ellen, Patsy, Evtack, Malinda and Frances.

John Carlostin Hawkins, son of Elizabeth Edwards and Elisha Hawkins was b. in Orange, CO., VA. He married Melissa Barnes and they had a son Jeremiah Vardiman Hawkins, b. March 8, 1811 in Mercer CO. KY.

William Hawkins Sr. was the son of William Hawkins and Elizabeth Wall of Orange, CO., VA. He was b. there ca 1760 and married Mary---. Their children were: Jehu Dyer, Tabitha, William R. (Red Head Billy), Azubah, and Annie.

William's second wife was Ann Bohannon Smith, whom he married in Culpeper, CO., Va. They were married by Nathaniel Sanders. Their children were: Smith, Agnes, Lucinda, Elisha Commodore, Sally, Juretta, Joseph, Franklin, John Scott and Virginia Ann.

There was a mulatto son named Menoah, b. prior to William's marriage to Ann Bohannon Smith. On the Property Tax List for Culpeper, CO., VA of 1783,

William Walker, Gent., listed Menoah as a "Tom". William remembered Manoah in his will but his name was erased from the Family Bible. It was rewritten in the Bible later.

Information on this branch of the Hawkins family is from Mrs. Dorothy Rutherford, of Frankfort, Ky., Mrs. Jean Abrams, a descendant of Sarah Hawkins Hayden and Mrs. Anita Hannah, a descendant of Elisha Commodore Hawkins. Their information is from family tradition, the Steele, Hawkins and Onan Cemetery, The Onan Family Bible, Franklin CO., KY Marriages by Ellisberg, Census Records, Franklin CO. Death Records, Bible records found in the Franklin CO., Historical Society Library in Frankfort, Forks of Elkhorn Church by Erma Jett Darnell and Franklin County Records at the Court House in Frankfort. Information on Mrs. Jean Abrams is on pg. 32.

John Dyer Hawkins, also know as Jehu, Jehudiah, Sebree and William Sebree may be the same person or several. The spelling for Dyer is seen as Dier and Deer. One of these men was the son of William Hawkins Sr. and Mary- his first wife. He married Mrs. Mary Gaines in Jan. 1773 in Orange CO., VA. There will be more on this family later.

Tabitha Hawkins, dau. of William Hawkins, Sr. and Mary ---, married William Foster.

Azubah Hawkins, dau. of William Sr. and Mary --- was married on Sept.9, 1792 to John Long in Culpeper CO., VA. He was b. in 1750 and d. in 1820. Azubah married her second husband, John Craig in Kentucky.

John Long and Azubah Hawkins had children: Moses, William, Elizabeth, Susannah (Ann), Mary (Polly) and Rebecca.

Moses Long, son of John Long and Azubah Hawkins was b. ca 1801 in Kentucky and married Elizabeth Green, b. ca 1801 in North Carolina. Their children were: Cynthia, b. ca 1831 and mar. Joseph Settle on Mar. 30. 1852. The children of Cynthia and Joseph Settle were: Henry, b. ca 1853, George, b. ca 1857, John L. b. ca 1860, Joseph, b. ca 1869, Aggie, b. ca 1864, Mary L., b. ca 1864 and Millana F. b. Oct 1, 185[6], d 15, 1856.

William Long, son of Azubah Hawkins and John Long was married on Mar. 29, 1826 to Lavinia. Green b. ca 1811. Their children were: Moses b.ca 1830, azarby, b, ca 1833, Elizabeth b. ca. 1837, Julie, b, ca 1832, William, b. ca 1852, Martha b. ca 1836, Bella, b. ca 1857 and Jetta b. ca 1859.

Susanna Long married Samuel Bristow. She was the dau. of Azubah Hawkins and John Long. She married Samuel , (who was b. ca 1798 -d. May 18. 1868) on Oct. 11, 1820. Their children were: William M. b. ca 1827, John, b. ca 1829, Benjamin, b. ca 1831, Mary J. b. ca 1830, Samuel P. b. ca 1834, Franklin and Francis who were twins b. ca 1843, Zulay b. ca 1837 and Demasthenes, b. ca 1840. Samuel Bristow died at Whitley Point, Moulitary CO., Illinois on May 18, 1868.

Mary Long dau of John Long and Azubah Hawkins mar. Benjamin Long.

Rebecca Long, dau. of John Long and Azubah Hawkins m. Joshua or Josiah Green.

Elizabeth Long, dau. of John Long and Azubah Hawkins mar. William S. Hayden on Aug. 22, 1813 in Franklin CO., KY.

Moses Long and Elizabeth Green also had children: Agnes Rebecca b, ca 1835. She died on Sept. 11, 1855.of typhoid fever. Leander was b. ca 1837.

Mary E. Long, dau: of Moses and Elizabeth Green was b. in 1829. She m. Lawson F. Noel and died of an abortion on Sept. 3, 1859. Lawson F. Noel later married Elizabeth M. Hawkins, dau of Elisha and Sarah Campbell Steele Hawkins.

Annie Hawkins, dau. of William Hawkins Sr. and Mary-- was b. ca 1776. She married Edmund Scandland on Apr. 16, 1796. They lived in Franklin CO., KY.

William R. Hawkins (Red Head Billy) was the son of William Sr. and Mary-- and was b. in 1776. In 1799, he married Hannah Clemmons who was b. in Pennsylvania. He died in 1854. Hannah was still living during the Civil War and when the Yankee soldiers came to their farm, she stood in front of the smoke house to stop their entry. She was thrown to the ground but, because the hams and bacon were hanging high in the room, they were not discovered., The Yankees took the apple butter instead.

William R. Hawkins and Hannah Clemmons had children: Fielding, Elizabeth, Mary B., Amanda, Emerine, Julia Ann, Thomas Jefferson, Ruth Ann, James C., William H. and Smith.

Fielding Hawkins, son of William R. Hawkins and Hannah Clemmons married --- Coons. They had sons: James, Smith, Jefferson, and William. Fielding moved to Missouri.

Elizabeth Hawkins dau. of William R. Hawkins and Hannah Clemmons married Samuel Miles in 1825 in Franklin CO. KY. He was called " one eyed Sam",

Mary B. Hawkins, dau of William R. Hawkins and Hannah Clemmons married Daniel Epperson in 1825 in Frankfort, KY.

Amanda Hawkins, dau. of William Hawkins and Hannah Clemmons married John Scandland. He was the son of Ann Hawkins and Edmund Hawkins. Ann was the dau. of William Hawkins Sr. and Ann Bohannon Smith.

Emerine Hawkins, dau of William R. Hawkins and Hannah Clemmons married John Julian.

Julia Ann, dau. of William R. Hawkins and Hannah Clemmons married WM. W. Wright.

Thomas Jefferson, son of William R. Hawkins and Hannah Clemmons moved to Missouri.

Ruth Ann, dau. of William R. Hawkins and Hannah Clemmons m. John B. Gaines in 1838 in Franklin, CO., KY.

William R. and Hannah's farm was on the Frankfort Lawrenceburg Road in Franklin County.

William Hawkins Sr. and Ann Bohannon Smith's daughter Sarah A. mar. Thomas Haydon. He was b. Oct. 13, 1795, they were married on June 22, 1814 and his death occurred between 1860 and 1864. His parents were James Haydon and Susannah Gore. Sarah and Thomas had children; Moses b. ca 1830, Sarah, bl. ca 1832 and Mary A. b. ca 1838. Moses Haydon married Mary Webster and they had children: Annie L. b. 1852, William A. b. 1854, married Teresa Shaw ca 1877. George L. was b. in 1856. Sue P. was b. in 1858.

William Haydon and Theresa Shaw had children Mary, Mattie B. and possibly others.

Juretta Hawkins, dau. of William Sr. and Ann Bohannon Smith married Thomas Wallace on April 5, 1831. Their children were: James b. ca 1833, Reuben,

b. ca 1836, Sarah, b. ca 1838 and Nancy, b. ca 1841. Thomas Wallace was b. ca 1796 and his wife, Juretta was b. ca 1802.

Joseph Franklin Hawkins was b. ca 1803. He was the son of William Hawkins Sr. and Ann-Bohannon Smith. He married Mary Ann Hancock, dau. of Benjamin Hancock on Aug. 30. 1824 in Franklin CO., KY. Their children were: Milcha, b. ca 1835, Adelia, B. ca 1839, Albert, b. ca 1841, Thomas B. b. ca 1843 and Joseph, b. ca 1846.

Joseph Franklin Hawkins lived in Owen CO., KY and in 1860 he married America ---. in the New Liberty area of Kentucky.

A descendant, Mary Etta Power (Mrs. Albert Smith) of Frankfort, KY has another list of the children. Her list is as follows: 'Joseph and Mary Ann Hancock's children were Bea, Seth, Rhoda, George Ann, Milkey who married a man named Glass, Adley, Albert and Joanna who was her ancestor. At the time of their marriage, Joseph Franklin was 57 and America was 33. Their children were: Joseph, Henry, John W. Mary E., Edward, Samuel and Melinda.

Joanna Hawkins was b. Feb. 8, 1834. She married on Dec. 6, 1856 in Owen CO., KY William Washington Power b. Jan. 2, 1836 in Bath CO., KY. Joanna died on May 4, 1903 and William Washington died on Mar. 22, 1926.

It is thought that Joseph Franklin Hawkins and Mary Ann Hancock lived in Grotz, KY.

John Scott Hawkins, son of William Hawkins, Sr. and Ann Bohannon Smith was b. ca 1808 and d. Mar. 30, 1835. He married Virginia Ann Bryant.

Agnes, dau. of William Hawkins Sr. and Ann Bohannon Smith married Moses Hawkins, Jr. on Nov. 9, 1815 in Franklin CO.

Smith Hawkins, son of William Hawkins Sr. and Ann Bohannon Smith remains a mystery. There is no available information at this time.

Lucinda Hawkins, dau. of William Hawkins Sr. and Ann Bohannon Smith was b. ca 1791 and married Willis Bartlett on Oct. 9, 1816 in Franklin Co.

Elisha Commodore Hawkins, son of William Hawkins, Sr. and Ann Bohannon Smith was b. May 4, 1795 in Franklin CO. KY. He married Sarah Campbell Steele who was b. Mar. 12, 1800 in Greenbrier, CO. VA. Her father was Robert Steele and her mother was Jane Mc Clung. Robert Steele's mother was a Campbell. His father, Samuel Steele died in 1799 in Augusta CO. VA.

Elisha Commodore and Sarah had the following children: Robert S. was b. ca 1821, mar. Eliza Gault ca 1855.

Ann S. b. April 10, 1822, marr. William B. Onan on Oct. 16, 1849. She died on Mar. 29, 1891 and she and her husband are buried in the Steele, Hawkins, Onan Cemetery. Their great granddaughter is Anita Hanna of Raleigh, N. C. She is from Frankfort originally. She is married to Charles Hanna.

Elizabeth M. Hawkins, dau. of Elisha Commodore and Sarah Steele was b. ca 1824 and married Lawson F. Noel on Aug. 11, 1860. She was his second wife. He was the son of Rev. Silas Mercer Noel (1783-1839). Lawson Noel's first wife was Mary Long, the dau. of Moses and Eliza Green Long. Moses was the son of Azuba Hawkins and John Long. Azubah's father was William Hawkins, Sr.

Agnes Hawkins, dau. of Elisha Hawkins and Sarah Campbell Steele mar. Ruben Waites on Aug. 10, 1865. She was b. in 1826 and died in 1926.

Anita Hanna remembers her "Aunt Aggie" Waites when she was almost 100 years old. She remembers visiting her when she was very young and shortly before Agnes died. She was living with Willie Pope who was married to either her daughter or a granddaughter. He could also have been her grandson. They lived in a house located where the Trailer Camp is located now, on the Kentucky River, 7 miles north of Frankfort. Agnes is buried in the Steele, Hawkins, Onan Cemetery.

Mary J. Hawkins, dau. of Elisha C. and Sarah, was b. ca 1828. She married William B. Johnson on Dec. 23, 1875 and they lived in Franklin CO.

Samuel S., son of Elisha Commodore and Sarah Campbell Steele, was b. ca 1830 in Franklin County, KY.

John S. son of Elisha C. Hawkins and Sarah Steele was b. ca 1832 and mar. Susan Meany Johnson on Mar. 16, 1876.

Alice, dau. of Elisha C. Hawkins and Sarah was an Epeleptic and was never married.

Charles, M., son of Elisha C. Hawkins and Sarah was b. ca 1836 in Franklin CO., KY.

Ellen C. dau. of Elisha C. Hawkins and Sarah Steele was b. ca 1838. She married A.G. Walthall on Dec. 20, 1859. Bk. 3, Pg 155 Franklin CO., KY. Another record shows that she married A. G. Walthall on Aug. 10. 1865 at the home of her mother Sarah Campbell Steele Hawkins. Wit: William Onan, John Downing and Robert Onan. A.G. was 21 years old and was from Paducah, Ky. He was b. at Mt. Vernon, Indiana. (Marriage Records, Franklin, CO., KY.) In 1860, the couple are living with her parents, Elisha C. and Sarah Hawkins. He is shown in the census as being 23 years old and Ellen as 21. In the 1870 census, Bettie B. Walthall is shown living with Ellen C. Walthall's mother. Elisha C. died Dec. 25, 1860. In 1860 Ellen is living with her mother but her husband and daughter are not shown. They had a son George who was b. Aug. 17, 1862 who died Jan. 14, 1863. He is buried in the Steele, Hawkins, Onan Cemetery.

Ellen was married again to J.O. Chambers, May 3, 1886 in Franklin CO. At the time of her marriage to J.C. Chambers, she was Ellen Sumners, a widow.

William C. Hawkins, son of Elisha Commodore and Sarah Steele Hawkins was b. ca 1842. He died in Mar. 1927. He was a "Captain of a Riverboat" and used to dock the boat near the Hawkins Property, and across the river at Onan's Landing. His sister was Ann Hawkins Onan.

Othello T. Hawkins, son of John Scott Hawkins and Virginia Ann Bryant was b. ca 1836. He had brothers, Lucian B. b.ca 1838, Walter Scott, b. ca 1843-44 and died on Oct. 17, 1855 of typhoid fever. Stephen B. Hawkins was another brother. He was b. ca 1847. There was a sister Sarah, b. ca 1842. Ann Bryant Hawkins died just 5 days after her son Walter. She also had typhoid fever.

What happened to Mary Hawkins, Watson, Mankspile? She was the sister of William Hawkins, Sr. Elisha, Arculous, Reuben and John. A Hawkins family tradition says that "two sons (descendants) of Sir John Hawkins came to America in 17??. and settlod in Orange, CO. Their names were William and John. William lived to be 115 years of age. He died in 1789 on Dec. 31. He had sons, William, Reuben, Arculous, Elisha, John and a daughter Mary Fisher." Was Fisher Mary's middle name or did she marry a man named Fisher for her third husband?
