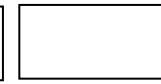
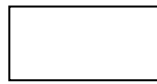

Technology Tip of the Month--Adventures with Microsoft Office Suite 2010 by Kay Spears

Here at The Genealogy Center we recently experienced the joy of upgrading to Microsoft Office Suite 2010 from Version 2003. As you might imagine, this process was interesting. So, in the next few articles, I have decided to share some of the problems, solutions, and work-arounds that may be helpful to those of you who have the same frustrations.

At the top of the screen in any program of the new Microsoft Office Suite (Power Point, Excel, Word, or Access), you'll notice the "ribbon," which was introduced in 2007 as a replacement for Microsoft's menus and toolbars. Tabs on the ribbon separate each group of commands. I'll discuss the ribbon

more in my next article.

First, I'd like to address the BIG changes made to Word. Microsoft, in their infinite wisdom, changed the default line spacing from the publishing standard of 1 to 1.5. It is my understanding that this was done for better online compatibility. Here are two ways to change it back.

One way to change the spacing is to click on the ribbon's "Home" tab, then on "Change Styles." Select "Style Set" and click on "Word 2003" in the list of choices. Your line spacing will now change to 1. You can always change it back if you want to.

Another way to change the line spacing is to go to the "Paragraph" group under the "Home" tab, then click on the tiny drop down arrow in the bottom right hand corner of that group. This opens the "Paragraph" dialog box. You may also get to the paragraph dialog box by right clicking on the document. Under the "Indents and Spacing" tab, change the "Line spacing" from Multiple or 1.5 to Single. Then click "Set as Default" at the bottom of the dialog box. A message box will pop up giving you two choices, to set the default for "This document only?" or for "All documents?" If you don't want to do this every time you open a Word document, choose "All."

While you are changing defaults, you also may want to change the default font from Calibri to Times New Roman. Once again, Microsoft altered this default setting based on web usage. They also assumed that all recipients of your documents would have Calibri on their computer. To change your font default setting, go to the "Font" group under the "Home" tab and click on the tiny arrow in the lower right hand corner of that group. This will open the "Font" dialog box. As before, a right click on the document will also let you open this dialog box. Scroll through the options and find the Times New Roman font. You may, of course, choose another font, but remember that your documents will not display properly when sent to a recipient whose computer does not have the same font. As you did with line spacing, click on "Set as Default." Again, you will be asked whether you want to change the default for "This document only?" or for "All documents?"

1. ROBERT (JR.)⁴ HAWKINS (*ROBERT³, BENJAMIN², BENJAMIN¹*) was born 1805 in Amelia Co., VA, and died December 1865 in Nashville, Tennessee - Davidson Co.. He married ROSETTA INYARD January 07, 1829 in Nashville, Tennessee - Davidson Co., daughter of UNKNOWN and UNKNOWN. She was born

1812 in Kentucky, and died 1884 in Manchester, Tennessee - Coffee Co..

Notes for ROBERT (JR.) HAWKINS:

The information concerning Robert Hawkins Jr. of VA. is my assumption based on the dates, locations, and information I found in the 1830, 1840, 1850 and 1860 census for Davidson Co.

The search was made at the Dallas Public Library in July of 2000.

The 1830 and 1840 census names only the head of the household, which was Robert. The clues I used to form my assumptions are: 1830 census shows one son under five. (Thomas James)*, 1840 census shows 2 sons under five (George & William), 2 sons bet. 5 & 10 (Thomas & *unknown; died?)*, daughter bet. 5 & 10 (Julia).

The 1850 census shows Robert & Rosetta living in Davidson Co., with children; Julia, 16; George, 13; William, 10; Virginia, 4; and Robert, 2 months. Dwelling # 113; Family # 1015

The 1860 census shows Robert & Rosetta living in Davidson Co., with children; William, 20; Virginia, 13; Robert 10; Silas, 8; and Samuel 4.

The 1870 census shows that Rosetta had moved with children (see notes on her) to Manchester and was listed on the same census page as Thomas James, but different Dwelling and Family #'s.

Robert's Last Will and Testament was witnessed and signed on November 17, 1865 and recorded May 3, 1866 after his passing on December 16, 1865. Rosetta apparently moved to Manchester, TN. with the younger children, Robert, Silas, and Samuel, near Thomas James Hawkins and his wife, Selina and children.

Buried 12-17-1865 of Consumption, buried in Nashville City Cemetery in Thomas Speeces lot; Section 11, Lot 23 {Interment Records of the Old City Cemetery}

Will and Testament of Robert Hawkins, November 17, 1865: {Davidson Co. Archives, Nashville, TN}

This Will is the confirmation needed to prove Thomas James was Robert and Rosetta's son.

Bits and Pieces of the Hawkins Family Puzzle by Millie Showalter Farmer

Moses Hawkins, son of William Hawkins and Elizabeth Bourne served in the Revolutionary War. His wife was Georgia Quisenberry. They had children: James who married Mary Frances ---. William mar. Margaret Ranson, Elizabeth mar. John Cook, Moses mar. Martha McConnell in 1839. It is not known if Benjamin was married. Moses also had a daughter, Polly who mar. -- Dunbar. Strother Hawkins mar. ---Miller, Ann mar. John Missick and Jane mar. James Missick. Ref. Richard D. Bourne Records, Mrs. Annie Miles letters and Mrs. Elizabeth Cook information. Moses died in 1832 in Ontario. Capt. Moses Hawkins who died at Germantown in the American Revolution was the uncle of this Moses. William was Capt. Moses' brother.

Another Moses Hawkins possibly related closely to these two men named Moses was a blacksmith who lived in Fleming CO., KY.

Moses R. Hawkins was the son of James Hawkins and Margaret---. He was b. on June 16, 1812 in Virginia and died on June 4, 1874 in Fleming CO., KY. He is buried in the New Hope Cemetery near Hillsboro, KY.

Moses married Nickell sisters. His first wife was Melvania Nickell b. Mar. 6, 1815. She was the dau. of Robert Nickell and Eleanor Perry. She died on Aug. 3, 1843. They had two children James R. b. ca 140-50 and William Morton Hawkins b. ca 1841-50. James R. served in the Civil War in the 24th KY Regiment and William M. served in a Missouri Regiment.

Moses R. married wife:: 2 on Nov. 12, 1843. She was Martha Jane Nickell, the sister of his first wife. Martha Jane was b. Jan. 22, 1826. She died on Mar. 6, 1895. She is buried in the New Hope Cemetery in Hillsboro. Their children were Martha E. b. 1844, Mary Jane, b.. 1846, John H. B. 1848, Mahalia b. Jan. 1856, Joe b. after 1860 and George Ann Hawkins b. Feb. 15, 1864. She mar. William Henry George on Sept. 6, 1880. She died on Dec. 26, 1907 in Salt Lake City, Utah. John, son of Moses R. and Martha Jane mar. Jinnie Crane. Mahalia Hawkins mar. William L. Shields on Sept. 3, 1872. This information is from Willard L. George, a descendant.

From a Hawkins Family Bible copied by Len George, we find John R. Hawkins, father of Moses R. John R. was b. in 1792. His children were: Robert S., b. 1825, Mary A. b. 1823, Richard, b. Aug. 27, 1827, Farmer D. b. July 1831, Marquis N. b. Feb. 2, 1833, James M. b. Jan. 31, 1835, John B. b. Dec. 10, 1836, Acles C. b. Jan. 19, 1839, Lewis P. b. Mar. 14, 1841, America Howe b. Oct. 25, 1842 and Virginia Morton b. Jan. 29, 1846.

John R. Hawkins and Sarah Barnett were mar. on Oct. 2, 1822. Their son, Richard mar. Sarah America Gray on Nov. 25, 1847. Farmer D. his brother, mar. Hannah H. Lewis on Mar. 15, 1854. Marquis m. Mary J. Dillon, James H. mar. Sarah A. Pound, John mar. George A. Hederick on Mar. 22, 1874 and Acles mar. Dorothy Navity on Feb. 23, 1862.

In the same Bible are listed Births.. Lillie May Hawkins b. Sept. 16, 1875. John William Gray b. Nov. 6, 1873, Clara Virginia Gray, b. Dec. 23, 1861. Edward Lou Gray b. Oct. 31, 1867 and Jesse Monroe Gray b. May 6, 1869.

America Hawkins mar. M.H. Gray on Oct. 7, 1858. Virginia Morton Hawkins mar. W. H. George on Feb. 14, 1866 and J.R. Hawkins and George Ann Hedrick were mar. on Mar. 22, 1874.

Richard Hawkins d. Apr. 22, 1900. Mary A. D. July 1823, Robt. S. d. Aug. 16, 1845, Farmer D. d. Oct. 31, 1854, Marquis d.?, Lewis P. d. June 8, 1876, Sarah d. Apr. 13, 1878, Virginia Morton George d. May 11, 1879 and John R. d. Oct. 13, 1881.

William Henry George was the husband of Virginia Morton Hawkins and George Ann Hawkins. He was b. Feb. 26, 1841 in Bath CO., KY and mar. Virginia Morton Hawkins on Jan. 29, 1846. He died on May 17, 1833 it Retsil, Kitsap CO. WA. Virginia was b. on Jan. 29, 1846 at Hillsboro KY and d. May 11, 1879 in Tollesboro, Lewis CO., KY . Their son was A. Lennie George b. June 4, 1878 in Tollesboro, Lewis, Ky. and mar. Harriet Edith Theobald on Oct. 8, 1903. He died on Feb. 16, 1945 at Salt Lake City, Utah. A. Lennie George and Harriet had a son William Lennie George who was B. July 23, 1904 in Salt Lake City, Utah. He mar. Janice Holmes Snow b. Apr. 5, 1904 in Salt Lake City, Utah. She died there on Mar. 22, 1948. William Lennie George, her husband died on Jan. 24, 1973 at Palo Alto, Santa Clara, CA. They had a son Willard Lennie Snow George b. Feb. 9, 1934 at Salt Lake City, Utah. He was mar. to Barbara Joan Worthen who was b. Jan 15, 1939 in Salt Lake City, Utah. Her parents were Frank Waldo Worthen and Edith Louise Chugg. Barbara Joan and Willard Lennie were mar. on Sept. 4, 1966. They live in Irvine, CA where both are interested in Geneology.

John R. Hawkins (who was the father of Virginia Morton Hawkins) and his wife Sarah Barnett also had a son Acles C. Hawkins who was b. Jan. 19, 1839 in Hillsboro, KY. Acles Calemise Hawkins was a farmer, laborer and Civil War Private on the side of the. Union, was mar. 1. to Dorothy Navity, 2, Eliza M. and 3. Elizabeth E. Christy on Aug. 24, 1885 in Fleming CO., KY. His children were Laura Ione b. Nov. 15, 1864 d. 1888. She mar. Charles Graham. Allie May b. Sept. 25, 1867 in Lewis CO., KY d. in Fleming CO. She was mar. to Allen Taylor Emmons. John Henry , a horse trainer was b. on Feb. 11, 1870 and d. ca 1945-59. He died in Illinois. He mar. in 1897, Rebecca--- and Jennie---. Arthur Carroll was B. June 11, 1872 in Vanceburg, KY and d. Dec. 2, 1966 in Erlanger, KY. He mar. Harriet Emmons in 1894. Winsom " Winston" William b. Jan. 22, 1875 in Lewis CO., KY died in Hillsboro, KY. He mar. Mae---. Jesse Othel b. Mar. 16, 1877 died in Decatur, IL. He married Louise Hannah Jordan. Clara Virginia b. Mar. 1, 1882 in Fleming CO., KY died in Los Angeles CA. She mar. Lewis Markwell in Fleming CO. on Mar. 14, 1900. Guy Claude was b. June 15, 1883 in Hillsboro, KY and died on July 18, 1959 in Decatur, IL. He mar. Mable Pearl Kemp in Springfield IL. in March 1907 on the 14th. Joseph J. "Jodie" or 'JJ " was b. Dec. 20, 1889 in Fleming CO., KY and died on July 30, 1959 in Macon CO. IL. He mar. Ida Mae Tencher in 1908 in Fleming CO. , KY. Information on Acles Hawkins from Mary Kathleen Hawkins Briglio and Norma Markwell.

Acles C. Hawkins' daughter Clara Virginia Hawkins mar. Lewis B. Markwell who was b. Mar. 25, 1876 in Fleming CO., KY . They were mar. on Mar. 14, 1900. He d. June 8, 1948. Clara Virginia d. Feb. 28, 1974 in Los Angeles. Their son Lewis Burman Markwell was b. June 26, 1923 in Flemingsburg, KY and Mar. on Aug. 23, 1952 Norma Marie Harmon who was b. Mar. 20, 1926, They live in Las Vegas, Nevada. Norma is from Ironton, OH.

AclesC. Hawkins'son Guy Claude married Mabel Pearl Kemp in Springfield, Illinois. Guy Claude was b. June 15, 1883 in Fleming CO., KY and died on July 18, 1959 in Decatur, IL. Mabel Pearl was b. July 12, 1886 in Macon CO. IL and died Oct. 12, 1937 in Decatur, IL.

Guy Claude Hawkins and Mabel Pearl Kemp had a son Guy Curtis Hawkins, b. June 16, 1922 in Decater, IL. He married Frances Ellen McCarthy on May

13, 1943. Frances Ellen is the daughter of James Howard McCarthy and Helen Louise Maxson of Decatur, IL.

Mary Kathleen Hawkins, dau. of Guy Curtis Hawkins and Frances Ellen MC Carthy was b. Mar. 23, 1945 in Kingman, Arizona. She was a Home Economics major in college and taught school for many years in Canada. She married Tano Briglio on Aug. 1, 1980 in Victoria, British Columbia, Canada where she lives. She is active in genealogical research and teaches classes on the subject. "Kathleen" has a rare combination of beauty and brains and best of all, she is a cat lover. She has contributed many bits and pieces of information on her line of the Hawkins puzzle.

Richard Hawkins, son of John R. Hawkins and Sarah Barnett was living in Rowan CO., KY in 1860. His family as listed in the census was Sarah America age-22. Elizabeth was 4 and Isadora was 3. He is listed as a Civil War Veteran and he died April 22, 1900.

Marquis N. Hawkins, son of John R. Hawkins and Sarah Barnett was b. Feb. 20, 1833 and mar. Mary Jane Dillon on Jan. 6, 1853. Their children were: Melvania, Ellen, Hester and Luther. He was b. in 1862 and d. in 1938. He mar. Ella Mae Vice b. 1889, d. 1972. His first wife was Nannie Myers, b. Jan. 17, 1867 and died May 25, 1909. All are buried in Hillsboro, Cemetery After Luther died Ella Mae mar. Isaac Conway.

Laura Hawkins, dau. of Marquis and Mary Jane was b. in 1868 on May 2, 1867 and died on Dec. 25, 1883.

After Marquis died, Mary Jane mar. Daniel Lyons and had children: Mina, Sarah and Charles.

James M. Hawkins, son of John R. Hawkins and Sarah mar. Sarah Pound who was b. in 1847. James was b. in 1836. Their children were: Presley P. b. 1874, Nancy A. b. 1877 and Virginia K. B. 1879-1880.

John Hawkins, son at John R. And Sarah was b. Jan. 31, 1835. He mar. George Ann Hetrick, b. 1858. She was the dau. of M.B. and Annie G. Hetrick. John and George Ann's dau. was Lillie M. b. in 1876.

Lewis P. Hawkins, son of John R. and Sarah Barnett was b. on Jan. 29, 1846. He mar. Matilda Turner on Jan. 5, 1871.

America Howe Hawkins was b. Oct. 25, 1842 and mar. Madison Harrison Gray on Nov. 13, 1857. All of the children of James R. and Sarah Barnett were born on the family farm. In the beginning it may have been called Triplet in Rowan CO.

Information from Hawkins Family Bible, family records and research of Norma Markwell, Bill and Joan George, Fleming CO. records from Maurice Bishop and tombstone inscriptions from Edna Colgan and Caren Curatto.

James Hawkins and Margaret--- had a son Walter who was b. in 1818. He was called "Wat/Watt". Walter was a blacksmith and married twice. His first wife was Angelina* and Mary was his second bride. His children were: William R. b. 1841 in Kentucky. James R., b. 1843, John R. b. 1845, John mar. Jennie Crain. Thomas R. was b. in 1847, Lucy J. b. 1849, Lewis, Moses b. 1854, Sarah E. b. 1856 and Alonzo b. Ja. 1860. All were born in Kentucky.

William R. Hawkins son of James Hawkins and Margaret was b. Mar. 31, 1791 in Virginia. On Sept. 2, 1821, he mar. Judith (Judah) Hawes b. Aug. 2, 1799. Judith's parents were Alexander Hawes and Lucy Fawke. William and Judith had children: James A. b. June 17, 1822 in Kentucky. He mar. Susanna Logan on June 7, 1841. Lucy Ann was b. Sept. 20, 1824. She mar. Isaac E. Phelps on Mar. 16, 1843 in Fleming Co. Joyce (Joice) was b. Sept. 21, 1826 and died on Aug. 4, 1828. Andrew Jackson was b. Feb. 2, 1829 in Virginia and d. July 22, 1909 in Galveston, Texas. He mar. Permelia Florence Nickell on Sept. 18, 1859. A baby son was h. Jan. 8, 1831 and d. on the same day. William Morton

** Marriage record of Bath Co., KY & vital stats of KY say Angeline Snedeger. O. A. H.*

was b. Jan. 11, 1832 in Virginia and mar. Rose Ann Cassity on Feb. 17, 1853. They had children: Martin J., Arena S., and Gessela N. They were members of the Christian Church. Margaret Jane was b. Aug. 24, 1834 in Virginia. She mar. Matthias Lee on Nov. 8, 1851.* Joanne was b. April 4, 1838 in Virginia and mar. Lewis R. Lane on Sept. 23, 1858. Information from Bible records and Olyve Abbott, a descendant of Andrew Jackson Hawkins and Permelia Nichols.* She lives in Fort Worth, Texas.

Another family of Hawkinses who may have a connection to this family is John B. Hawkins who mar. Ann Ford in Orange, CO., VA on Oct. 4, 1812. Ann Ford was the dau. of William Ford, b. 1764 in Virginia, died 1829 in KY. Ann Moore was his mother. She was the dau. of Francis Moore who mar. Lucy Hawkins. This has not been proven. William Ford's father, John Ford mar. Apphia Petty in 1753. Joseph Hawkins mar. her sister Susanna. Rebecca and Jemima Petty other sisters of Apphia both mar. men named Boston. Reuben Boston married ---Hawkins and they lived in Anderson CO., KY. The children of Ann Bourne and Benjamin Hawkins of Culpeper CO., VA lived in Anderson CO. on land adjoining Reuben Boston's property.

John B. Hawkins and Ann Ford had children: Elizabeth b. May 15, 1814. She mar. William M. Peed. Her death was on Oct. 17, 1849. Benjamin F. Hawkins was b. Apr. 18, 1816. James Hawkins b. Oct. 1, 1823 mar. Hannah Ann Hixon on Dec 25, 1850. He died in Washington, Daviess CO., IN on Mar. 28, 1891. Alexander Hawkins was b. Jan. 22, 1827. He died in 1904 in Henry CO., IN. William Henderson was b. Nov. 29, 1853 in Owen CO., KY. He mar. Louisa b. Sparks on Nov. 29, 1853. He died in 1910, 8 miles from Lathrop, MO. where his nephew Jacob lived at Plattsburg.

Harbin Ford Hawkins was b. Jan. 22, 1820. He married Elizabeth Jane Clift on July 10, 1851 in Mason Kentucky. She was the dau. of Hensley Clift and Margaret Pede. Elizabeth Jane Clift was b. Mar. 8, 1830 in Mason CO., KY and died there on July 15, 1896. She is bur. in the Mayslick Cemetery. Harbin Ford died on Aug. 10, 1890.

Harbin Ford Hawkins and Elizabeth Jane had children: Hensley Clift b. Apr. 20, 1852. He mar. Lydia Laytham and Ann Kennedy Poage. He died in 1940. Benjamin Franklin b. May 8, 1854 was mar. to Sarah Elizabeth (Lizzie) Thackston. He d. on Oct. 8, 1930. Anna Elizabeth Hawkins (Annie) was b. July 6, 1859. She mar. George S. Collins on Feb. 19, 1880. She died in 1934. They had 8 children. Margaret Ellen (Maggie) was b. Jan. 6, 1862. She was never married and lived with her brother Jacob near Lathrop, MO. William B. Hawkins b. July 14, 1863 mar. 1. Almira Frances Mullikin and 2. Martha Anders Blair. He died in 1906 in Fleming CO., KY and is buried in the Elizaville Cemetery.

Mixtha Blair was the dau. of William Wallace Blair and Melinda Sousley. On William Wallace Blair's death certificate his first wife Cassandra Hawkins was listed. Cassandra Hawkins was from Nicholas CO., KY.

William B. Hawkins and Martha Blair had a son Archie Lane Hawkins b. Feb. 23, 1903 in Elizaville, Fleming CO., KY. Archie Lane mar. Mildred Sue Frances Fuller on Dec. 25, 1926. She was the daughter of David Leonard Fuller and Pearl Louise Vanlandinham of Bath CO., KY.

Archie Lane and Mildred's son William Leonard was b. Mar. 13, 1928 in Elizaville, KY. "Bill" made his career with the United States Marine Corps and retired after 28 years of service. He married Gail Brown on Feb. 11, 1949 in Lexington, KY. Her parents were John David Brown b. June 16, 1887 and d. in 1943, and Hallie Mae Hiatt, dau. of Richard Thurston Hiatt and Ladassah Jane May who died on Feb. 27, 1984 in Hillsboro, KY. Bill and Gail live in Houston Texas. Gail is interested in Genealogy and contributed the above information on her husband's family.

Rita Souther of Alexandria, VA has an ancestor Isaac HaWkins b. 1790-1800 and mar. ca 1820 Sarah T---. He died in Bath CO., KY 1846-1849. He is possibly the Isaac Hawkins buried in a cemetery in Nicholas CO. 2 1/2 miles from Sharpsburg, KY. (1799-1840) Sarah was b. ca 1793 and died after 1860 at which time she was living in Bath CO., KY. Isaac and Sarah had a son Levi Hawkins b, Nov. 7, 1826 in Nicholas CO., KY. He mar. Elizabeth Ann Coons and they had one daughter, Elizabeth Ann b. Dec. 11, 1853. She mar. Elias Ullery. Elizabeth Coons was the dau. of Thomas Coons and Lucinda Hon.

Levi mar. Elizabeth Edwards who was b. Jan. 25, 1838 in either Kentucky or Independence, MO. She died on July 23, 1929 and is bur. in Cass CO., MO. She was the dau. of James M. Edwards b. Jan. 28, 1812 in KY and mar. June 24, 1834 in Montgomery CO., and Sarah Coons (Coonce). Sarah was b. on Oct. 10 1814 in Kentucky and died in 1883 in Cass CO., MO. Her parents were John Coons

and Elizabeth Ellis. Agnes Brooks Carr was her mother and William Ellis was her father. John Coons was the son of Jacob Coons (Kuntze) and Elizabeth Handback.

James M. Edwards, the father of Elizabeth Edwards, was the son of Joseph Edwards b. ca 1780-85 in Virginia and Malinda Mc Ilhaney b. ca 1791 in S.C. Joseph Edwards is thought to be the son of Thomas Edwards and Grizelda Barnes. Malinda McIlhaney was the dau. of ----McIlhaney who. mar. May 12, 1792 1793, Grizella Graham who may have been his second wife.

A Hawkins couple who deserves recognition is William Hawkins and his wife, Mary who lived in Stephans CO., Texas. It is said that they have had nineteen children of their own and raised some of their grandchildren.

In the Stephans CO., TX 1880 census William is shown to have been b. in Tennessee and was 64 years of age. Mary was b. in Alabama. Their children at home at the time were Peter Thomas, 16, and Lewis MCK. 10. Both were born in Texas. Also living with them were grandchildren, Delita Jane, 14, James 12, and Sarah C. 10.

Mary Ann Hawkins (b. Aug. 29, 1841 d. Dec. 21, 1872 was the dau. of William and Mary. She mar. John W. Berry b. Mar. 4, 1828 and d. July 6, 1873. Their children were: William Henry b. Jan. 27, 1860, d. Feb. 2, 1860. Mary Suzanah b. April 23, 1861 mar. William Griffin. Safronah Alabama b. Feb. 27, 1863, d. July 1, 1951. Delita Jane b. Mar. 18, 1866. James French b. Mar. 4, 1868. Sarah Caroline was b. June 27, 1870 and d. April 13, 1949.

Carolyn Sue writes, "Sarah Caroline was my Grandmother. When her mother and father died, she and her brother and sister went to live with her Grandpa and Grandma Hawkins."

"Sarah married 18. June 1891 Marion Wesley Martin at Vernon, TX. Their first two children were b. at Stephenville, TX. They moved to Floydada Floyd, Texas and this was the last time she saw her Grandpa and Grandma Hawkins. I don't know when they died."

George Hawkins a cooper, lived in Lower Norfolk CO., VA in 1647-1655.. In 1654 he was a debtor and in 1659 he was paid from the County levy. In 1653 he was a constable of Lower Norfolk and was also convicted of a theft the same year. For a crime unknown, he was arrested, 1655 and 1657. He was fined in 1653, 1655 and 1656. He was a plaintiff in 1655 and judgement is listed in 1650 and 1659. Payment was ordered to him in 1658. He was a defendant in 1656 and payment was ordered from him in 1656 and 1657 when he is listed as having petitioned the court. He was involved in a court case both years and probate of an estate was granted to him in 1660. His earliest known listing in a court case was in 1652.

Lucretia Hawkins b. 1810-15, 1905 mar. Jerimiah Vardeman Munday (1808-1875) on Sept. 26, 1834 in Woodford CO., KY. Their children were: Susan Mitilda, (sic) Aug. 16, 1835 d. July 1913. She mar. Joseph T. Curd. She died in Fresno, CA. Thomas b. Dec. 23, 1850, John b. 1844 and William b. 1849.

James S, Hawkins was b. Sept. 30, 1840 in Woodford CO., KY was the son of Senate A. Hawkins and Mary Dodd. His grandfather James was b. in Virginia. James S. served under General John Hunt Morgan in CO. E. Second Kentucky Cavalry and was wounded in the shoulder at Cynthiana in 1863. He was

wounded in the side and right hand at Bull's Gap. He surrendered with Gen. Taylor in Mississippi on Apr. 15, 1865. He returned to Woodford County and opened a general store and raised cattle. His wife was Dolly Reed of Jessa - Mine CO. He was a Presbyterian. Information from Biographical Sketches in Kentucky A History Of The State by Perrin, Battle and Kniffin.

John Hawkins b. 1750-60 mar. ca 1770 to Elizabeth ---. Their children were: Delila, John, Elender, Joseph, Milly, Elizabeth, Nancy, all born in Kentucky. In 1790 he was in Nelson, CO. KY and in 1791 a daughter was born. In 1815, he deeded one and one third acre of his property for a Baptist Church meeting house and burial ground. It is now called Lincoln Memorial Cemetery on Fort Knox near Mill Creek. In 1820, he was in Harden CO. and died 1830-31.

Mrs. Willie Shearer wrote a family history on her Hawkins line in 1976. A copy was made for me at the Spotsylvania Historical Society in July, 1983. She wrote: "The foregoing family history was given to Mr. Mays or Judge Edward Mays by a--- in a letter bearing the date of Oct. 30, 1893, she being then 72 years old, and having gathered the same from family letters and family conversations." All attempts at contacting Mrs. Shearer were in vain and the identity of "she" remains a mystery.

The "foregoing" information given to Mr. Mays is this: "John Hawkins left his wife, Mary (Waller) Hawkins the following children: 1. John Hawkins, 2. Hardress (Hardy) Hawkins, 3. Elizabeth Hawkins, married John Dick, who died in a year, leaving a daughter Mary Hawkins Dick, who subsequently became the mother of Mrs. Mary Hawkins Jackson of Nashville, TN. Elizabeth Hawkins Dick married Thomas Crowder and left several children, one of whom married a Mr. Nash. 4. Mary Hawkins, born Sept. 9, 1771, married Emsley Parke on Oct. 16, 1794. Children: 1. Pleasant S. Park, 2. Alfred W. Parke, 3. Frances Eliza Park. 5. Frances M. Hawkins married a Mr. Duggar. Children: 1. Elizabeth Duggar, married a Dr. Williams. 2. Caroline Duggar, married a Dr. Battle. Dr. Williams and Dr. Battle were from LaGrange, GA."

Who was this John Hawkins? The Tennessee D.A.R. State Records show that Captain John Hawkins born February 14, 1733, died on Dec. 19, 1786. He was married to Mary Waller and was in the 5th Maryland Battallion 1771-1781. Ref. Heitman's Official Register Pg. 214.

Mrs. Shearer uses Marriages of North and South Carolina by Clemmons, Pg. 120 as her reference for the following: "John Hawkins, oldest son of John and Mary Waller Hawkins went to Rowan County, North Carolina. John married Mary (Polly) Goodman, daughter of John Goodman, on December 27, 1796 in Rowan CO."

The Randolph CO. Deed Book 13, Pg. 354 shows John was married to Elizabeth Varner, dau. of Jacob Varner. Elizabeth Varner of Randolph CO., NC married Benjamin, son of John and Polly Goodman in April, 1831. It is not clear if this is his sister-in-law or another Elizabeth Varner.

Orange CO. NC Deed Bk. 8, Pg. 360 shows that John and Hardress Hawkins, brothers and heirs of John Hawkins came to an agreement on the division of land owned by their deceased father, John. "John agrees to: One tract whereon my father lived, adjoining John Lin, George Fogleman, and the Orange CO., line, 640 acres and one other tract adjoining Robert Fields, Jeremiah Fields, 641 acres," and was witnessed by J. Scott and Isaac Holt. Pro. May, 1800.

Mrs. Shearer shows that a John Hawkins was a Sheriff and Hardrip Hawkins was a Deputy Sheriff in Orange CO., NC. In Sept. 1786, he had a license to keep a tavern or "Ordinary" at his dwelling home. In 1787, she shows that John Hawkins drowned accidentally in the Haw River.

Benjamin Hawkins, son of John Hawkins and Polly Goodman was b. June 3, 1803 in Randolph CO., NC. He purchased 250 acres from his father, John in 1825. His wife was Elizabeth Kindley whom he mar. on Feb. 28, 1825 in Randolph CO. They had children: John b. Nov. 25, 18--. He mar. Louisa Smith in Smith CO., MS. Martha (Patsy) was b. May 1, 1827 in Randolph CO. and mar. Anguish Gunn in 1848 in Smith CO., MS. Pleasant [?C?] Hawkins was b. Jane 9, 1829 and mar. Polly Westbrooks.

After Elizabeth Kindley's death in January 1830, Benjamin mar. Elizabeth Varner on Apr. 3, 1831. Their children were: William b. Sept. 16, 1832 in Randolph CO., NC. William mar. Mary Quinn on Jan. 24, 1855 in Smith CO., MS. Anderson b. in Randolph CO. mar. Martha E. McQuinn, Sept. 20, 1855 in Smith CO. Jesse Dobson b. 1838 in Randolph CO. mar. Catherine Johnson on Apr. 16, 1867. Charles (Brim) b. 1840, Mary Ann b. Dec. 12, 1842 mar. Moses Lingle on Aug. 2, 1861. Nancy b. 1844, probably in MS, Thomas b. 1847 mar. Lucy Shirley of Smith CO., MS. Before moving to Mississippi, Benjamin was a member of the Assembly (House of Representatives) from Randolph in 1833/34. He owned over 1,100 acres in Randolph County. He is said to be a descendant of Sir John Hawkins.

Another interesting fact that Mrs. Shearer discovered is that Elizabeth Kindly Hawkins was a descendant of John and Ursula Briles who came from Germany in 1717 to Gernanna, VA. Gernanna was located on the Rapidan River in Orange, CO., VA. This was the location where Gov. Spotswood established his community of German workers. Remains of living area and place of worship is still there. The location is on the Orange County side of the Rapidan River to the left of the bridge to Culpeper CO. on Hiway 3. from Fredericksburg. The pictures below on this page were taken there. It is still a woodsy and beautiful place. Flat Run is near this area. William Hawkins of Orange CO. left property on Flat Run to his sons, Reuben and Elisha in 1799.

Henry Hawkins of Shenandoah County Virginia has a great, great, great, granddaughter, Katherine Ann Hawkins who wrote the following information:

"Henry Hawkins was b. in 1765 in England. He originally came to this country with a man named Pennywit around 1799 to do some fur trapping and trading with the permission of France in what is now the states of Oklahoma and Arkansas. They returned to England in 1802. Henry and his family returned to this country in 1808 and settled in the above mentioned county.

Phillip Hawkins was b. in 1798 in England and mar. Elizabeth Pennywit. He died in 1870 in Van Buren, Arkansas. Phillip returned the family to Arkansas. His wife and her brother Charles were cousins to the man who had come to this country with Phillip's father. Charles and Phillip built the first paddlewheeler type boat for that area. When the Indians I know as the Five Civilized Tribes were moved from the south east in the late 1820s and into the 1830s to Oklahoma, Phillip was in on the last day of the move. He also saw Lincoln sworn in as president. At the time of the American Civil War also known as the War Between the States, he owned a 2,000,000. dollar farm. At the end of the war he owed nothing on it. At that time he also owned slaves.

Harry Wallace Hawkins was b. July 12, 1855 in VanBuren Arkansas. He mar. Josephine Lemley on April 15, 1884 . He died on Jan. 12, 1903 and is buried in the Family Cemetery in Oak Grove Arkansas. Harry and Josephine had 3 children: Roy, James E. and Henryetta. Like his father he had many irons in the fire. Besides being a farmer he also owned a saw mill and a cotton gin. While operating the cotton gin he got caught in the line and was badly injured. He had many broken ribs as well as his left knee being crushed. He had several operations on it of which took place in St. Louis, MO. But the medical profession wasn't as good then as it is now. Great grandmother Jo remarried in 1910 to a Myron Richard West and they had one daughter Thelma Marie who was b. in March, 1913.

Roy Hawkins was b. June 28, 1889 in Van Buren Arkansas. He mar. Lucille Sangster on Dec. 15, 1906. He died May 26, 1924 in Van Buren, Ark. and is buried in the Gill Cemetery in Van Buren.

G.P. Hawkins father, b. Sept 16, 1914 in Fort Smith Arkansas. He mar. Katherine Lake on Aug. 20, 1940. He died in Muskogee Oklahoma on Aug. 7, 1976 in Muskogee and is buried there at the Memorial Park Cemetery.

James E. Hawkins, Great Uncle was b. May 1, 1895 in Van Buren, Ark. He mar. Reba Weaver. He died at Quitman, Arkansas sometime between 1973 and 1975.

Henrietta Hawkins Great Aunt, b. Oct. 14, 1902 in Van Buren Ark. She mar. Pate Bridges and Clarence Gardner. I have heard her called Henry even though I never met her. She is my grandfather's sister and even though there is 13 years and another child between them they could pass for twins.

In the obituary on my great grandmother Jo it says that she was survived by two daughters and a son. At that time 1938 my father was already dead. Great grandmother Jo was living with one daughter at that time and the other daughter Mrs. Clarence Gardner was living in Elwood, Indiana. "

John G. Hawkins, son of Roy Hawkins was b. Nov. 24, 1941 in Pryor, OK and was raised in Muskogee. He mar. Nancy Edwards and is now divorced from her. He mar. Katharine Ann Carsy on Jan. 21, 1967 in De Kalb, IL and they have a dau. Stacy Leigh, b. Oct. 28, 1970.

John is now a Puma County, Arizona Superior Court Judge and Presiding Criminal Judge.

Katherine Ann Hawkins was b. Oct. 29, 1947 in Muskogee. She mar. Dec. 14,

Mrs. Barbara Rethke¹ sent additional names and pictures of the descendants of Philip Hawkins. See pg.⁴⁰ for the beginning of this story. Included too, is a family history written by Warner Hawkins. It was written when typewriters and ribbons didn't produce work which copied well. There are a few typing errors but his signature and story is much more important. Mrs. Rettkn's information is well documented.

She had no children.

William Hawkins, son of Philip Hawkins and Elizabeth Martin mar. Vertillus (Tillie) Brown and had Theodore, who mar. Rachel Allen. Theodore b. 1858, d. in 1910. He mar. Rachel on Dec. 4, 1881 and their dau. was Myrtle Zuma or Zurma was b. Jan. 30. 1885. Myrtle mar. Wm. B. Curless. Their son was Burnell Curless. Rachel Allen's parents were J.V. Allen and Hannah Ried. She was b. in Indiana one mile south of Jerome, on Aug. 12, 1860. She d. Oct. 26, 1921.

Willliam Hawkins' son Cameron was b. in 1864 and mar. Ida Downey on Mar. 28, 1885. They had no children.

Alie Hawkins was the child of William.

Louisa J. Hawkins, dau of William mar. John Knoté on July 4, 1874. She was b. ca 1856 and d. in Howard Indiana on Aug. 18, 1875. From the tombstone at Jerome Cemetery on the same marker with Louisa and John is this inscription:" Louernist A; son of J.A. and L.J. Knoté: d. Aug. 31, 1875 aged 3 mo. and 29 ds."

Thomas J. Hawkins, son of Philip and Elizabeth Hawkins was born in Green county, Ohio, June 1, 1841. He was one of a family of two sisters and seven brothers. His father moved from Ohio and settled on 160 acres of land entered by him in Union township, Howard county, Indiana, in the year 1846, and lived there until his death. Thomas lived on the farm and helped to clear it up until the Rebellion broke out in 1861, then he enlisted on the 10th day of September 1861, in Company K, 34th regiment, Indiana volunteers and served until the 27th day of September, 1864, serving three years and seventeen days. During this period he was severely wounded in the battle of Champion Hill, Miss., where one half of the company was wounded. After the expiration of his enlistment, he went into the harness business for some time. In the year of 1865, April 2, he and Mary M. Brown were married; to this union was born one son, Warner Hawkins, who is living in Nebraska. On March 12, 1868, he was married to Virginia A. Allen and to this union was born seven children, Otto, Zella J., Roland V., Bryant, Lida, Gloria, and George O., all of whom are living except Otto who died December 19, 1898. After working at the harness business about two years he went to farming and engaged in farming until the fall of 1894, when he moved to Greentown and went into the real estate and insurance business. In September, 1905, Virginia, his wife, de-

parted this life. In the year 1906 he joined the Friends church at Greentown. He and Mrs. Alwilda Carr were married November 12, 1907, she remains to mourn his loss. These years of affliction had endeared each to the other. Though his was a daily struggle for life, yet the thoughtfulness, hours of wakefulness and loving ministrations required only enlarged the sad vacancy his departure created. Early on the morning of June 26, 1914 all that was immortal of Thomas Hawkins left the mortal for eternal habitation. Slowly and lovingly life receded, not perceptible to the eyes of friends, but suddenly the muffled beat of the heart ceased and days of weariness were done forever. Most of this obituary was written by Thomas Hawkins. The years and feebleness came upon him, all his close family ties had been so broken that he felt it necessary to write his obituary to the point where he could be completed. After his hand had ceased to write, and mortal life slipped away. Faint and more relevant facts will now be added. Thomas Hawkins and wife found it most convenient for them in these later years to transfer their church relationship to the church of the Disciples in Greentown. Here they worshiped as health made it possible. Thomas Hawkins was a true Christian. He was of fine gentle mould of strength and expression. Boundless good will to all men was a chief characteristic of his life. A true man went home to God.

The funeral of Thomas Hawkins will occur from the Meridian Street Christian church Saturday morning at 10 o'clock. Rev. J. H. Baird, pastor of the church will have charge of the services. Interment in the I. O. O. F. cemetery.
