There are now 213 participants in our Hawkins Y chromosome DNA project. To date we have defined 23 family group lines, placing 169 of our participants. There are 44 participants that do not yet have a match.

Your matches and ancestral origins largely depend on how your DNA compares to our database. The question has come up in our Y-Project as to why matching cousins many times do not show a relationship when they also do the Family Finder test. Following is an explanation from Family Tree DNA.

What is the probability that my relative and I share enough DNA for Family Finder to detect?

• If your relationship is within recent generations (2nd cousins or more recent relatives), Family Finder is almost sure to detect your relationship. Testing will also detect many 3rd cousins and about half of your 4th cousins. It will detect a small percentage of 5th and more distant cousins.

- For example, if you have 100 of your 3rd cousins test, Family Finder will detect about 90 of them as your 3rd cousins. It will not detect the other 10.
- Family Finder only detects a small percentage of 5th cousins and relatives that are more distant. However, the number of such cousins in the population increases exponentially with each generation. This means that if 1,000 of your distant cousins test, you can expect to see a few of them in the Speculative Relative category.

• For genealogists, it is best to use Family Finder to prove recent relationships (1 to 5 generations). However, after testing, you may discover distant cousins.

In a past newsletter I had mentioned that in the 1990 census Hawkins was the 159th most popular name in the U. S., Smith being number one. Checking the 2000 census, Smith is still number one, but we have dropped to 291st. A lot of Spanish surnames on the list that were not there before.

Technology Tip of the Month — Adobe Photoshop/Elements, A Look at Blending Modes, what to do with Screen, Overlay and Multiply Blending Modes, Part II by Kay Spears

Now we are ready to experiment with some of the Blending Mode options. I chose Screen, Overlay and Multiply because those are the three that I use most often. However, I suggest that you experiment with all available choices because, as I have stressed previously, what works for one photograph may not work for another.

The first step is to open a faded photograph, either color or black and white. Make sure that the Layers Palette is also open. Once the photograph is open, look at the Layers Palette. You should see one layer that says Background. You also should see a drop-down box with the word "Normal." Normal is the default setting for Blending Mode and at this time it should be grayed out or inactive.

Next, we are going to create a duplicate layer. To do so, select the background layer and right click, then choose Duplicate Layer and left click. At this point, there should be two layers, one labeled Background and one labeled Background Copy. (Incidentally, there is also a method for creating a duplicate layer using the Levels tool, but for this article, we are going to keep it simple.) Select the layer labeled Background Copy and in the drop-down box that says "Normal," select "Screen." This should cause the image to get dramatically lighter.

Make sure the Background Copy layer is still selected and right click on Duplicate Layer again. Now there are three layers and a very light image. Select Background Copy 2 and change "Screen" to "Overlay" in the Blending Option drop-down box. If the image is still too light, change "Overlay" to "Multiply." Remember, the success of these tools depends on the original image, so you may need to experiment with different combinations to get the desired result. But this is one more option available in Adobe for improving your faded photographs.

This Easter my family had a small family reunion of sorts. It has been a very special time of getting in touch with family members that I used to see a lot, but now see only on occasion.

My Hawkins DNA group #1 Hawkins line descends from Thomas R. Hawkins who was born c. 1797 and lived all of his life in Orange County, Virginia. T.R. Hawkins is my brick wall. I hope to tear down that wall this April with a trip to Richmond. T.R. Hawkins had only one son, Edward Pinkard Hawkins. E.P. Hawkins lived much of his adult life in Louisa County, Virginia among his wife's family.....but only a few miles from where his father lived on the Orange/Louisa County border on the North Anna River.

Edward Pinkard Hawkins had three sons who lived to maturity and had sons: Edward Powell Hawkins, John Lee Hawkins, and Jesse Marshall Hawkins. I have written about Edward Powell Hawkins' descendants in another Newsletter. John Lee Hawkins moved to Huntington, WV where I still live today. I attended a family reunion about ten years ago of family members who descend from this brother with my parents. We were struck by the fact that the only two people in the room at that reunion who carried the Hawkins surname were my mother and father who did NOT descend from John Lee Hawkins....this line had "daughtered-out". There was no male Hawkins descending from this man in attendance at that reunion.

My own line which descends from the third brother, Jesse Marshall, is down to only two male Hawkins': Burke McGregor Hawkins and Marshall Laylon Hawkins. So my family reunion began with my meeting with the two sisters of Burke McGregor Hawkins in Jacksonville, Florida on the Monday before Easter. These were the people that we spent holidays with all of my childhood! Never was there a Christmas that we did not see these three first cousins of mine. Now as it seems to be for all holidays, we rarely communicate much less get together. It was wonderful to catch up with all of their lives. The oldest of the three siblings is trying to move her family to Berlize---at least part time if not full time and is trying to downsize belongings. She wanted a family heirloom to be available in case there was anyone else in the family who would use the mirror that had hung in my grandparents' home all of our childhood.



Then on Friday my three siblings and some of their children came in to Huntington, WV (where I still live) to be with my mother for the holiday. Among our group, there is only



one male who carries the Hawkins name in the generation of our children:
Marshall Laylon Hawkins. Marshall is named after my father as well as his
mother's grandfather. Both he and I carry names that come down from my grgrandfather and his 2-gr-grandfather, Jesse Marshall. (my name Marsha is a female
version of Marshall) Marshall is a wonderful young man who is newly married and
lives in Richmond, Virginia. It remains to be seen if they will eventually have
children and if any of the children will be male. But it is of great interest that he
and his wife have chosen to live quite close to where our family lived generations
before! (Orange County, "A" in pink, in relation to Richmond.)

The DNA is fascinating! We spent much of the weekend commenting on how each of the young children present had their father's eyes, or their mother's hair, or that one walked like his father....and, of course, there was the conversation about who had a Hawkins nose....who had a Moses nose....who had been spared the Hawkins or Moses nose.....it is who we are. The DNA goes on.

Hawkins Family Group-04 (My, your editor's, family group, phil hawkins@sbcglobal.net.): Earliest known common ancestors are Jeffery and Dorothy (Mattock) Hawkins, emigrating from Wilts, England in 1682 to Bucks Co., PA.

Participants in our Family Group-04 are requested to test, if funds allow, at the <u>Y-67 level as a minimum</u>, and **if possible at the Y-111 level**. It is appropriate for cousins in the same generation to contribute to testing one of the males that **will** be representative of all.

Though this is the last of the current series of the Hawkins DNA project newsletter it is my intention to keep working on our family group-04 Jeffrey/Roger research. If you would like to be included in a new email list that I am creating for Jeffrey/Roger information send me an email to that fact.

Were James, Susanna and Elizabeth Hawkins, "proven" passengers on the *Welcome*, the children of Jeffrey and Dorothy (Mattock) Hawkins?

?

The baptismal records for Jeffrey and Dorothy from all Saints, Norton Bavant, Wiltshire, lists eight children, with the death of one (Anne) in 1672, leaving seven that might have embarked on the *Welcome* in 1682 for America.

If Margaret, born in 1663/64 and 19 years of age, married and remained in England, there are six children, Daniel, Jane, Jeffrey, John, Roger, and Sarah as likely accompanying their parents to America. This would agree with the certificate, following, as published by George E McCracken in his 1970 book, *The Welcome Claimants Proved, Disproved and Doubtful.*

The following certificate was published by W. J. Buck 1* who does not say where he saw it:

These are to certifie all Friends in Truth and others whom these concern, that Jeffry Hawkins of Norton-Bavant in the County of Wilts being desirous to Transport himself Beyond the Seas with his wife and six children, hath behaved himself honestly and that he is under no engagement of Debts nor any other Misdemeanour as far as we know. In Testimony whereof we have hereunto set our hands- this 12th day of the 6th month, 1682 [before the October departure].

To my knowledge, there is no further mention of two of the children. John, and Sarah. During the voyage of the *Welcome*, it was reported that 30% of those aboard died of smallpox and it might be assumed that John and Sarah could have been buried at sea.

The four remaining, children from the All Saints Parish register appear in Pennsylvania records:

- Daniel, in 1687, was conveyed 100 acres from his father, in 1688 he witnessed the will of Joshua Boare, and at his death, Thomas Coverdale was his sole administrator.
- Jane Hawkins, with her husband Thomas Coverdale, who as stated in the probate record was the administrator of her brother Daniel Hawkins' estate.
- Jeffrey, of Philadelphia, Laborer, in 1706 gave relief to Elizabeth, relict of William Darby, to sell property formerly belonging, in succession, to his father Jeffrey and his uncle Roger.
- Roger was the administrator of his father's estate in 1712; married out of unity the first time, believed the second marriage was to Elizabeth Holman at St. Mary's, Burlington, in 1712. He gave

release and quitclaim to Jonathan McNutt, was also administrator of John Graves.

McCracken, in his book, lists as "Proved" passengers on the *Welcome*, the Hawkins Jeffrey, Dorothy, Roger, James, Daniel, Jeffrey, Susanna, and Elizabeth. He lists as "Possible" Roger and Sarah Hawkins. Who are this James, Susanna, and Elizabeth?

- James, if a son of James and Dorothy, probably born after 27 May 1681. Hinshaw, volume 2, page 1000, Falls MM: 1704, 5, 5 James ltm Mary Ellot, 1710, 7, 6 James & w, Mary, rocf Abbington MM, PA dtd 1709, 11, 30. In 1734, he was among the land holders of Moreland Manner with 50 acres of land. His 1755, will, Philadelphia County, Pennsylvania, book K, number 175, PP 270-272, "whereas: I, James Hawkins of the Manor of Moreland...... a Yeoman —......
- Susanna: John and Susanna Collins purchased from Jeffrey Hawkins, bachelor, 110 acres (PA, deed records, 1684-1763, P 48, one. July 1686). Per Hinshaw, volume 2, p 441, Susanna Collins bur, 2-6-1698.
- Elizabeth: From Bucks County, Pennsylvania, deed records, 1684 to 1763, 2 Jan 1685, Jeffrey Hawkins, planter, of Baltimore County, Maryland. To his brother Roger Hawkins, of same, £8.75, 100 acres... bounded by John Wood, and Phillip Conway. Signed Jeffrey (X) Hawkins. Wit: Margaret (X) Boare and Lawrence (X) Bannor [1st husband of Elizabeth?]. Per Hinshaw, volume 2, p 992, Falls MM: 1697, 10, 1 William Darby declared intention of m. Elizabeth Banner. Again from Bucks County, deed records, p . 313, 1 Mar 1706, Jeffrey Hawkins, bachelor [son of Jeffery], of Philadelphia County, Pennsylvania to Elizabeth Darby (Widow of William Darby), of Falls Township, Bucks County, Pennsylvania, 100 acres... Pat, 1684, a release and quitclaim of the land purchase of Roger Hawkins, purchased of Jeffrey Hawkins [that Elizabeth is selling to Thomas Kirkbride].

Listed as possible passengers on the *Welcome* is Roger Hawkins, the elder, and his wife Sarah. This Roger is identified as brother of Jeffrey Hawkins, the elder, by a record of Falls MM dated 6 9th mo. 1689, shortly after the death of Roger.

- 1685, Jeffrey Hawkins, planter, conveyed to Roger Hawkins, planter, for L8/15, 100 acres, part of a grant confirmed to Jeffrey Hawkins by William Penn. This deed does not call the grantee a brother but on 1 March 1706, Jeffrey Hawkins of Philadelphia, laborer, gave a release to Elizabeth, widow of William Darby, in which he recites that his father Jeffrey had sold to his brother Roger (uncle of the younger Jeffrey) the property mentioned in the deed of 1685. In a deed of Jeffrey Hawkins to his son Daniel dated 1 10th mo. 1687, the mark of Roger Hawkins appears as witness.3* Roger Hawkins was also a witness on 17 4th mo. 1683 to the marriage of Samuel Dark and Ann Knight and again in 1684 to the marriage of Richard Lundy.
- From the Welcome Claimants Approved, Disproved and Doubtful by McCracken, page 223. "In the release by his nephew Jeffrey, cited above, reference is made to a will of this Roger, "dated" but the date is left blank, in which the 100 acres bought from his brother were willed to William Darby. [Wm Darby is the husband of Elizabeth Hawkins. PAH] No Hawkins will has been founded in the counties of Bucks, Chester, or Philadelphia, or in New Jersey.
- From The Welcome Claimants Proved, Disproved and Doubtful by McCracken, page 223. "The Makefield MM records the death of Sarah, wife of Roger Hawkins, 20 5th mo. 1687.

The late Carl Hawkins of Richmond, Indiana stated that Elizabeth was baptized as Jane (he also stated that Susanna was baptized as Margaret, and that James (my line – Hawkins DNA Family Group-04) was baptized as John). Mr. Peter Horton, respected Wiltshire genealogist states that in the 17th century and prior to, there was no custom to be baptized with a name different than the given name, that quite to the contrary, any legal proceedings must use the baptized name. It was a hundred years later that first and middle names begin to come into practice.

In respect to the preceding information, I contend that there is a strong case for Roger and Sarah being aboard the *Welcome*, and that proven passengers Susanna and Elizabeth Hawkins were daughters of Roger and Sarah, not Jeffrey and Dorothy. I also contend the possibility, if not probability, of this, our James being the son of Roger and Sarah.
