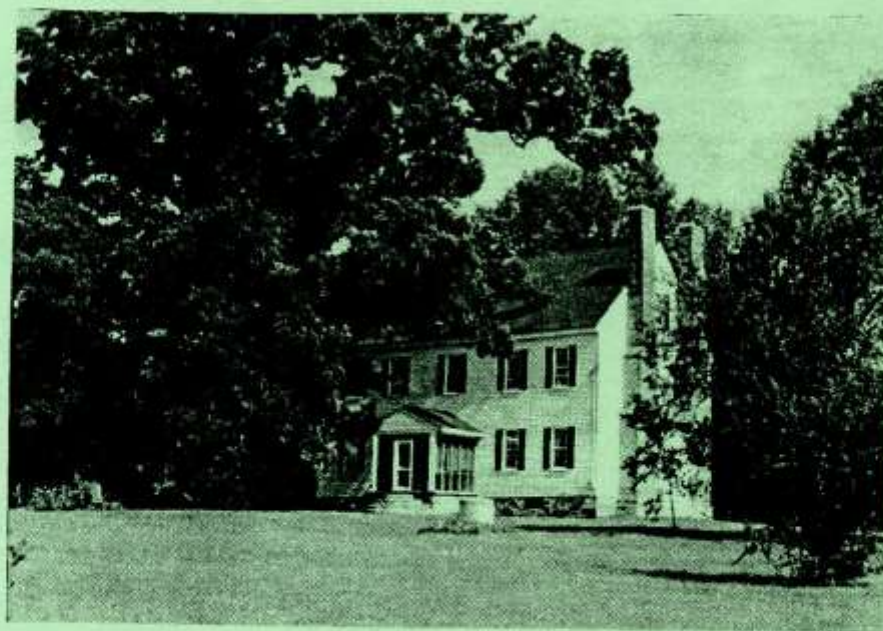

Permelia Nickell Hawkins, wife of Andrew J. Hawkins (s/o Wm.
R. Hawkins) Permelia d. 1899 in Somervell Co., TX.

"Morehead, Ky.
March 24, 1891

Dear Aunt Permelia,

.....You must excuse me for not writing sooner
for I have been busy cleaning the yard, and Uncle
Wat Hawkins and his wife are here. They have been
here since Thursday and this is Tuesday night. He
is blind and cannot help himself much. Ma says he
looks so much like Grandpap, she thinks about him
every time she looks at him.....They are moving
back to the Old Place. They moved up in the upper
edge of Rowan County three years ago, and are just
going back.....Ma is quilting a quilt for Aunt
Margaret. I pieced the quilt for her and Ma quilts
them.....Emma's health is bad yet. She lives up
at West Liberty.....I'm sorry to tell you that we
haven't got any Morehead paper. The man that printed
the paper has left....."

Tell all the girls to write. From your neice.
Addie Lane"

**PIONEER GHOSTS OF KENTUCKY.
REST IN PEACE JOHN JAY DICKEY. A
Comprehensive Name Index of the
Dickey Diary. Volume 1. A Through J.
Abstracted and arranged by Wilma WINTON.
Published by Pearl BULLOCK.**

John Jay DICKEY (1842-1934), the son of William and Malinda (QUINN) DICKEY, was the fifth of seven children. John Jay was born in Fleming County, Kentucky. John Jay married Sara Ida PHILLIPS in Flemingsburg, Fleming County, Kentucky, no children blessed this union. As a circuit riding preacher and teacher, Rev. DICKEY felt an urgent need to make a genealogical record of all the families who would cooperate. Rev. DICKEY mentioned several times that he did not know why he felt compelled to record this information. Ms WINTON purchased seven rolls of microfilm comprising the "Dickey Diary" in 1978 and has spent the past six years abstracting names onto about 10,000 3x5 cards - together with pertinent information. Many pedigree charts and family record forms were also compiled. This comprehensive name index gleaned from the DICKEY Diary includes the names mentioned in the diary beginning with A through J. This unique genealogical source may open new vistas to researchers with family connections in Kentucky. It is the author's firm belief that this comprehensive name index to the DICKEY Diary will prove to be a shortcut to solving their genealogical dilemmas.

Bits and Pieces of the Hawkins Family Puzzle

Joanna Burns Neilson has been interested in genealogy for many years and contributed information on the Hawkins families to both THE EDWARDS FAMILY and to this book.

Roddy Hawkins, son of Reuben and Rebecca Edwards was born ca 1785 in Virginia. He married the first time, Alice Chamberlain in Orange, CO., VA, with his grandmother Elizabeth Wall signing the marriage license. They had children: Francis, Susan M. and Edwin E. b. Oct. 10, 1821. Roddy was an early settler of Franklin CO., KY. He is mentioned in THE HISTORY OF FRANKLIN COUNTY KENTUCKY by L.F. Johnson as being one of "the prominent men in Franklin CO prior to 1800," pg. 19. On pg. 28 of the same book, "In the year 1775, the Cherokee Indians sold to the Transylvania Company all of that part of Franklin County which lies south or west of the Kentucky River: purchased by the company through Daniel Boone as agent. There were no settlements made on that side of river until about 1784, the first being by James Arnold who built a double log house opposite the mouth of Glenn's Creek. His land extended from the mouth of the Little Benson, down the river to the mouth of Cedar Run. About the year 1790, John Cardwell settled on a tract of land located near Carlisle and Roddy Hawkins located in the same neighborhood."

Roddy returned to Virginia and married his second wife, Elizabeth Jones on Feb. 28, 1817. Her father was Francis Jones. They had children: Dudley M. b. Oct. 10, 1821, William W., Roddy Hutson, b. ca 1824 and Reuben Arculus, b. ca 1828. Roddy died June 15, 1841 in Franklin, CO., KY.

Roddy's dau. Susan married Norman Green on Mar. 16, 1841 in Franklin CO., KY and they had children: Jane, William, Daniel, James, Reuben, Norman, Dudley, Sarah B. and Susanna. They lived in Grant Co. KY.

Francis J., son of Roddy and Alice Chamberlain. He died before Sept. 1848 in Franklin CO. He was never married and in his will stated his desire to be buried beside his parents in the Hawkins Family Cemetery in Franklin County.

Edwin F. Hawkins, son of Roddy and Alice Chamberlain died on Aug. 4, 1849 in Anderson CO., KY. He married Jane Brown on Oct 24, 1824 in Shelby CO., KY and his second wife was Sally Ann Bailey. They were married on June 7. 1820. His third wife was Mrs. Eliza McGuire. Edwin and Sally Ann Bailey had a daughter, Sarah Jane. She died Aug. 12, 1852 in Anderson, CO. at the age of five.

Dudley M. , son of Roddy and Elizabeth Jones was b. on Oct. 10, 1821 in Franklin Co., and died on Oct. 23, 1867 in Anderson CO., KY. He married on Dec. 16, 1844, Susan Jane Thacker, b. Aug. 21, 1824 in Franklin, CO. She died on May 29, 1902 in Anderson CO. They had children: Elizabeth Jane, John William b. July 24, 1848. Elizabeth was b. Dec. 11, 1845. Mary Ann was b. Feb. 21, 1850, An infant b. July 25, 1852, Samuel Hutson, b. Oct. 21, 1853, Dudley James , b. Mar. 12, 1856, Jefferson Davis b. Aug 19, 1861 and Alvin Hines, b. Nov. 22, 1863. All were born in Anderson CO.

William W. Hawkins, son of Roddy and Elizabeth Jones died prior to May 13, 1848. He was married and a son William was mentioned in his will .

Roddy Hutson , son of Roddy and Elizabeth Jones was b. ca 1824. He married his cousin Agnes Ann Hawkins. She was the dau. of Moses and Elizabeth Hawkins. They had children: Belle Zora b. June 8, 1846, Eller Norah, b. May 3, 1849, A boy, b. July 20, 1854 and Susan Hallie b. ca 1861 in Franklin County. Belle Zora died Jan, 19, 1867 . She was Mrs. William Saunders. Eller Norah died June 4, 1872 in Franklin, CO., . Her husband was J. Tyler Redden. They were married on April 21, 1849. Susan Hallie married R.L. Reddin and had a son Gilbert. She was the last living member of their family.

On pg. 797, KENTUCKY A HISTORY OF THE STATE by Perrin, Battle and Kniffin, we find that after Agnes Ann died, Roddy married Ellen Chalk of Mercer CO. on Mar. 4, 1877. She died on Aug. 5, 1880. She was a Roman Catholic and Roddy and his daughters were Baptists. Roddy is buried at the Frankfort Cemetery.

Reuben Arculas , son of Roddy and Elizabeth Jones was b. ca 1828. He married Eliza Jane Hawkins, b. ca 1827. Their children were : James B. b. ca 1848, Benjamin, b. Aug. 12, 1852, Roddy, b. Aug. 12, 1852, Roddy, b. Aug. 10, 1855 and Susan M. b. ca 1869. All were born in Franklin, County. Eliza Jane Hawkins was the dau. of Benjamin Hawkins and Eliza Beth Church of Thorn Hill in Frankfort. Benjamin was the youngest son of Reuben and Rebecca.

Reuben A. was in the Mexican War 1846-1848. He walked back to Texas to show men who met him at New Orleans, where the bodies of fallen comrades from Kentucky were buried. They escorted the bodies back to Frankfort where they were buried with honors at the Frankfort Cemetery. The HISTORY OF WOODFORD COUNTY, KENTUCKY by Railey goes into detail about the ceremony.

Roddy Hawkins, son of Reuben and Eliza Jane Hawkins was b. on Aug. 10, 1855. He married his kinswoman, Ruth Elizabeth Wright who was the dau. of William Winfield Wright and Julia Ann Hawkins.

Arculus Hawkins, son of Reuben Hawkins and Rebecca Edwards was born in Virginia. He married Lucinda Hawkins on Dec. 19, 1808 in Franklin CO., KY. Their son Reuben-L. b. 1811 mar. Jane Bartlett on Sept. 23, 1837. They had children: Thaddeus, b. 1809, Ann M.E. b. 1842, William, b. 1844 and John O. Reuben Lewis Hawkins died of lung hemorrhage on Mar. 23, 1852.

Reuben Hawkins Jr. was the son of Rueben Hawkins and Rebecca Edwards. He married Elizabeth Quigley of Mercer CO., KY on Aug. 27, 1812. They had a daughter Emeline who married Rowen Hurst. Their child was Elizabeth Jane Hurst.

Lucy Hawkins, dau. of Rueben Hawkins and Rebecca Edwards married William Anderson of Orange CO. VA on May 25, 1809. Her second marriage was in Franklyn CO., KY to Squire Jenkins.

Moses Hawkins son of Reuben Hawkins and Rebecca Edwards was married on Oct. 27, 1819 to Permelia Alsop. Her parents were George Alsop and Ann Bartlett.

Uriah E. was the son of Reuben Hawkins and Rebecca Edwards. He lived in Mercer CO, KY and married Nancy Dean on Aug. 14, 1826.

Milly Hawkins, dau. of Reuben Hawkins and Rebecca Edwards married William McKendrick on Aug. -, 1820 in Franklin CO. Her second marriage was to---- Phillips.

Elizabeth Jane Hawkins, dau. of Dudley M. Hawkins, (son of Roddy) and Sarah Jane Thacker, married James S. Long in Anderson CO., KY. Their children were: Bessie J. Long b. Apr. 5, 1867 in Anderson, CO., KY, William, b. July 18, 1870, Susan Mary, b. Dec. 15, 1876, Hallie, b. ca 1884 and Hattie, b. ca 1887/88. All were born in Anderson, CO.

Mary Ann Hawkins, dau. of Dudley M. and Susan Jane died on May 3, 1929 in Anderson CO., KY. Her husband was Solomon M. Hedded. They were married on Oct. 13, 1874 in Anderson CO. Her second husband was James S. Coke. Her third marriage on Sept. 17, 1916 was to Henry Clay Melear.

Samuel Huston, son of Dudley and Susan Jane was married on Nov. 15, 1877 in Anderson CO. to Mary L. Mothershead. He died on June 13, 1927. Their children were Clara Hutson b. Feb. 23, 1880 and Clarence, b. March 15, 1882. Both were born in Anderson County. Clara mar. Allie Gudge and their son Samuel was b. June 10, 1899. Her second husband was Clarence Young. They had Lucy Eloise and Thomas C. Samuel Gudge died Sept. 20, 1940. He mar. Verna Hutchison.

Dudley James Hawkins, son of Dudley M. and Susan Jane died on Jan. 26, 1923 in Anderson CO. He married Mary A. Ansden on Oct. 30, 1863 in Anderson CO. Their children were: Amos B. b. Dec. 12, 1883, Helen Wright b. July 28, 1885, Clarence Lester, b. Jan. 5, 1887, Estelle H. b. Feb. 14, 1891, Nancy Belle, b. Nov. 30, 1897 and Alton Davis, b. Nov. 29, 1904. All were born in Anderson CO.

Jefferson Davis Hawkins, son of Dudley M. and Susan Jane died ca 1925. His wife was his cousin, Mary Frances Hawkins, dau. of Jephtha D. Hawkins and Catherine Watts. They were married on Feb. 5, 1885 in Franklin, CO. Their children were: Kate and Lester, b. Jan. 10, 1892 in Anderson, CO.

Alvin Hines Hawkins son of Dudley M. Hawkins and Susan Jane Thacker, died Feb. 24, 1938 in Anderson CO., KY. His first wife was Maggie L. Cole, died Oct. 1, 1890. Their son was Paul, b. Dec. 2, 1889.

Alvin Hines married June 28, 1893, Sarah Frances Barnes. They had children: Sadie Flora, b. Jan. 9, 1895 in Anderson CO., an Infant, b. Aug. 1, 1896 and Ollie A. b. Feb. 8, 1898. Ollie died on Feb. 14, 1966.

Alvin Hines Hawkins, son of Dudley M. Hawkins and Susan Jane Thatcher, married Stella Sherwood on Dec. 28, 1910. She was b. Jan. 22, 1883 in Anderson, CO. They have two sons: Hugh Hines b. Oct. 3, 1911 and Ralph Catlett, B. May 6, 1915. Both were born in Anderson, CO. Alvin raised tobacco on his farm which has been declared a historical landmark. Stella lived on the farm with her sons until her death. She lived to be in her nineties. Hugh and Ralph are tobacco farmers and live in the home which Dudley built. Hugh has been a genealogist for many years and contributed much information on this branch of the family to THE EDWARDS FAMILY and to this book.

Sally Hawkins, dau. of Rebecca Edwards and Reuben Hawkins was born after 1800. She died between July 27, 1840 and Mar. 5, 1841 in Mercer CO. KY.

Benjamin S. Hawkins, son of Reuben Hawkins and Rebecca Edwards was b. in 1800 in Orange, CO., VA. He lived with his mother in Franklin CO. in 1820 and was married to Elizabeth Church on Feb. 19, 1822, in Franklin CO. Her parents were Thomas Church and Mary White. They lived in a log house, built in 1792 which is still standing. It is covered with wooden siding and had two huge fireplaces. One of the stone fireplaces was removed and reassembled in the Museum belonging to Mr. Richard Luscher, the present owner of the property. The house is located in Thorn Hill, Frankfort, Franklin, CO.

Benjamin and Elizabeth had the following children: Rebecca, who married ----Hirsch. Laura, who married M. Forbes, Eliza Jane married her cousin, Reubin Arculus, Mary m. b. in 1823, Susan, Thomas, b. 1832, Malvina, Almira, Charles William, Lavinia, (Aunt Puss) b. 1842 and some say, a daughter Katherine.

Malvina, Almira and Livinia were three "old maids" who lived with their brother Thomas in the family home after the death of their parents. Thomas was in the Civil War serving with Gen. John Hunt Morgan. There is a family story that he and his friend were crossing a river on horseback with the Yankees in pursuit when the friend's horse was shot. The man was unable to swim. Thomas Hawkins grabbed him by the hair and pulled him to safety. "Thomas came home from the Civil War riding a stolen horse and playing a violin." He was never married and is buried in the family grave yard. The property belongs to a family named Temple now.

Benjamin was a prosperous farmer before the Civil War and owned many slaves. Each of his children had his own personal servant. His home was large and comfortable. The children were provided with a good education including music lessons. There was a large square grand piano in the house that was a delight to the great grandchildren who liked to visit there.

Malvina and Almira became senile in their old age and one wandered away and died. The other drowned in a pond on the property.

Lavinia, a cantankarous, selfish, old lady spent her last years visiting among her relatives. There is a family story that she was very demanding and called her great nieces and nephews "Niggah". One day she threw her laundry at Mary Martha, her great niece, and Bessie, her great nephew's wife and said "Heah, Niggah, wash my clothes." Mary Martha ("Mattie") and Bessie did her laundry for her including the starching and ironing. "Her drawers were starched so stiff that they stood up."

Aunt Puss spent her days tatting and when one finger became infected, she had to have her hand amputated. Lavinia died in the "Poor House" in Frankfort.

Charles, the younger son of Benjamin and Elizabeth served in the Civil War with Morgan's Raiders. He married Martha Ann Easley, daughter of Woodson Gale Easley and Martha Ann West Foster. Their wedding was on May 31, 1864 in Franklin CO., KY and they lived on land adjoining his father's property in Thorn Hill. Charles William was a musician and played the fiddle at dances and social gatherings in Frankfort. He and Martha had four children: John, b. in 1865, Mary Louise, b. ca 1867, "Little Weel" and Elizabeth, known as "Betsy". Little Weel (William) and Mary Louise died in early childhood. Charles d. on Oct. 29, 1913 and Martha in 19 .

Betsy married Fred Craig and had twin daughters, Laura and Lou. One had dark hair and eyes and the other was blond with blue eyes. Betsy decided that she didn't want but one daughter and gave Laura to her mother to raise. Because she had dark hair, Aunt Puss always called her "Niggah." Fred Craig and Betsy had a son Albert whom she raised.

Betsy seemed to have inherited Aunt Puss's personality and while she probably didn't call people "Niggah", it is said that she was so mean that she "growled in her highchair." She and Fred moved back into her mother's home after Martha became a widow. They lived next to her brother John's farm where his widow Kate was struggling to raise her large family. Betsy didn't like Kate, so she shot her chickens and poisoned Kate's cow and calf.

Betsy died of cancer in the 1930's and is buried in the Hawkins Family Cemetery just outside of the stone wall surrounding the older members' graves. Long suffering Fred Craig, a very soft spoken man and his son, Albert died of cancer within a short time of each other, in the early 1950's. Their graves are next to Betsy's and are the last of the family to be buried there.

John William Hawkins, the older son of Charles and Martha was born in Frankfort on March 17, 1865. He married Mary Catherine ("Kate") Peffer in The Good Shepherd Catholic Church in Frankfort. Mary Catherine was born in Thorn Hill on Jan. 1, 1870, the dau. of Conrad Peffer and Mildred McDonald.

John and Kate lived on a farm adjoining his father's farm in Thorn Hill and also owned a house in Thorn Hill Heights where the family lived part of the time. John was a farmer, worked at a distillery and sometimes played the violin with his father at social functions and dances.

John and Kate had ten children. One died in infancy and the other children were: Frances Belle, b. Aug. 26, 1891, William Paul, b. Dec. 22, 1892. Anna Emmerine was b. Feb. 24, 1895, Mary Martha b. Dec. 13, 1896, Mary Elizabeth, b. Mar. 7, 1898, Joseph Goebel, b. Feb. 26, 1900, Duarte Thomas, b. Dec. 12, 1902, Mildred Catherine, b. Apr. 3, 1904 and John Chester, b. Dec. 3, 1907.

Our Hawkins Ancestors: What Did They Look Like?

by Kathleen Briglio

Here are the responses I recieved to the questions and requests for photos that were sent out with the April '87 newsletter. There was a greater response in photos than in questionnaires. Most of the pictures are reproduced for this issue. I could not fit all the pictures in this issue without undue expense to reproduce them so I selected all the earliest ones and most of the ones of men. The women who are not shown do not portray the "Hawkins" features as well as the men. Most of the pictures shown are reproduced for this issue from photographs. A few are copied from photocopies and that makes the difference in quality that you will see.

What characteristics are "Hawkins"? It has not been easy to express Hawkins family traits in words, yet there is a feeling about them. Perhaps someone else may be able to explain it better but I shall try. The pictures of our ancestors show some reoccurring features however they do not give the whole story. In fact looking at living Hawkins people may have given me a clearer idea of what features are Hawkins traits. These are my observations and conclusions.

Hair color is usually brown but red hair appears also. The Hawkins reds I have seen are not the bright orange-reds of some people, instead they are red-blond, red-brown, or auburn. The earliest red hair that I have recorded is that of William R. Hawkins, born 1776, because of his nick-name "Red Head Billy". His cousin, William Benton Hawkins, born 1781, was called "Black Head Billy". He is the only example I've heard of a black haired Hawkins, unless the name was referring to a skin problem. Both Billies were farmers in Franklin County Kentucky, with ancestry from Virginia. Hawkins hair also appears to have some natural wave or curl.

Eyes have appeared in every color but blue and grey or hazel eyes predominate over brown. The photos show mostly light colored eyes. Complexions vary, no consistency here but freckles are frequent.

Hawkins men are generally average height or taller while the women are average height or shorter. Both have small to average frames and tend to be slender or an appropriate weight. The farmers are slightly thinner than the professional men as can be expected from greater physical activity.

In looking at the photos I see faces that share an oval shape with English fine bone structure: a pleasant shape with nothing prominent. The Hawkins nose is long, narrow, and straight. Again, it is well proportioned, not very long or really narrow. The noses are neither wide nor turned up and none show humps, sharp corners, or puffiness.

Eyes are also very regular and well shaped. They have a tendency, quite pronounced on some, to turn down at the outer corners, especially when the upper eyelid droops with age and hoods the eyes. Eyebrows were described as heavy by one respondent. I think that applies only to the men and that they are only slightly heavy as nothing about these faces is very extreme, they are very regular and thus are hard to describe. The brows shown are fairly straight or curl up

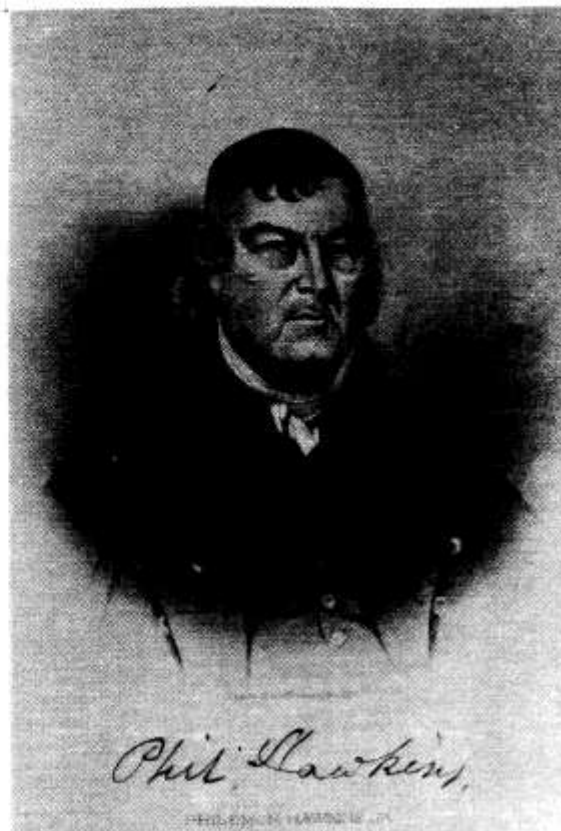

on the outer corners.

Mouths are average in size or slightly smaller and the lips are average thickness or thinner. The expression is pleasant, serious, terse.

Hawkins men have adapted well to many occupations and have varied interests. When farming was the primary occupation, most farmed but their descendants, with more education, pursued other careers and professions. I suspect that a look at today's Hawkins would provide some interesting tendencies in occupations and interests that earlier generations did not have the opportunity for. I don't have sufficient data on contemporary Hawkins people to comment. One tendency that does appear regularly is musical ability. There may be no composers and conductors among us but there have been plenty of people who play, sing, dance, and enjoy music. Some have talent in art and/or poetry as well.

Some people can analyze handwriting and even though I can not, I enjoy seeing the signatures of earlier Hawkins. What a nice idea it is to get the autograph of each family member whose picture you collect. Many years ago I studied astrology to help in understanding different people. There is a tendency for similar astrology signs to run in families and they have done so in mine. In five generations of my Hawkins family, among 37 people, there are 16 air signs - noted for being intellectually inclined and usually good talkers. There are 11 fire signs, noted for action, for being doers, and for warmth. There are 7 water signs, noted for their emotional qualities, and only 3 earth signs, the solid and practical people. Air and fire people complement each other and can produce vitality. You may not be able to swallow astrological analysis but you most likely have signs that run in your family too. I wonder if other Hawkins families are mostly air and fire.

It has not been easy to express in words the characteristics of the Hawkins family members, yet there is a feeling about them When I met Millie Farmer she was strongly impressed with my "Hawkins" features and saw a resemblance to her Hawkins mother. She felt sure we were cousins. Eventually we discovered that we are cousins.

Last May I had a similar feeling of recognition when I went to speak at the Victoria Genealogical Society. My talk was on family organizations, with this one particularly as an example. Therefore I thought it would be good to call all the Hawkins in the local phone book to invite them to come and learn about the two Hawkins organizations and their newsletters. I discovered there were over 50 Hawkins in the Victoria phone book. I only had an hour to spare so I called 16 and all but one were interested in their genealogy! Nearly all had come to Canada from England and the places of origin in England were Devon and Cornwall, the same areas our Virginia ancestors came from.

When I stood to give my talk I looked over the crowd and a row of people near the front caught my eye. They had pleasant faces with regular features and there were two red heads among them. I instantly felt they must be some of the Hawkins I had called and that they must be cousins! I was at least half right but it may be a long while before we can prove we are cousins. That night I realized that we could organize a Hawkins study group in this town to work on the early English lines. Several that I called have already done research. It is

an exciting idea to have a local Hawkins group but I can't manage to do anything about it right now, so perhaps another year.

And now, back to the photos. Some of you may want a photograph rather than just the newsletter picture. I have been hoping to find someone willing to make copies and negatives available to all of us for ordering. If anyone wants to volunteer to do this I will send you all the prints used in the newsletter and you can send the editor a list of the costs for ordering a print or negative, and the list could be put in the newsletter. If no one volunteers to do this then I will try to provide the service. Currency exchange rates fluctuate so you can send \$1.00 for each print that you want with the number of the picture you want as found in the newsletter. The two pictures, one in each of the first two newsletters will be numbers one and two. If you want a negative then request one but don't send money until I make them. I will make negatives in the summer if I get enough requests. Then I can give a price for them in a subsequent issue.

If you would like to see more Hawkins pictures, or better descriptions of them, then please send your contributions and requests to the editor of the newsletter. We can continue to share photos in each issue and everyone can get a good collection of their ancestors if we can keep finding their pictures.

DID YOU KNOW?

Of course you do! Just because a supposed fact has been published by a respected author, it does not necessarily mean it IS a fact. We know that we must have documented proof before it becomes factual. For five years I searched for an ancestor who Hayden's Virginia Genealogies stated was named "William", killed in the Revolution. After further research, this Revolutionary soldier simply could not be my ancestor. I have recently discovered that "William" was guardian and older brother of my ggg gf, not his father, who was not named William at all! This new discovery enabled me to take the ancestry back three more generations, with proof all the way. This simply means that we shouldn't take someone else's word for it. In exchanging family group sheets, it's always a good idea to request sources!

After visiting the lush green beauty of Kentucky, and its charming small town Court Houses, I planned to try my luck in "Virginia Research". Since my husband, Tom, had toured with me two years in succession through the backroads and green valleys of Kentucky, I decided to take Virginia on alone. It wasn't that he doesn't enjoy my interest. I just didn't want to press my luck three years in a row!

Before flying to Richmond, I made reservations at a downtown hotel, and arranged for a rental car needed later on my trip. My early afternoon arrival in Richmond allowed me time to plan my attack the following morning on the Virginia Historical Society. My hotel room was on the tenth floor. Please don't accept a room on the tenth floor. Genealogists don't have time to wait on elevators.

A #6 Broad Street bus took me 20 blocks to the "getting off" corner. A brisk walk of seven additional blocks led me to the grounds of the impressive VHS building. After locating a book listed in the card file, a call slip is handed to the attendant, who then retrieves it from the archives room. There is a card catalog for personal family files, which are also individually brought out from the archives. No HAWKINS were found at this time that I could call "our own".

At the end of the day, another researcher and I started for the bus stop. My, how the crowded buses did pass us by. No problem. We just walked the 27 blocks back to our hotels. You see a lot of Broad Street that way. Saturday was another day, so onward to the Virginia State Library, which was only 10 blocks from my hotel. It opened at 8:30 a. m., and I was waiting on the doorstep when the key turned.

My original plans were to drive to the Court Houses of about seven different counties, but after hearing that all really early information was in the VSL, I decided to find out for myself. The archives reading room is full of Deed, Will, and Marriage books for all counties. There are four large index books that list what is available in books or on film. This compiled index gives the county and years in which the researcher is interested, listing that index reel number to be placed on the reader. That reel then directs you to the reel number and page on which your ancestor is found. It's a step by step process and works very well. Some of us really enjoy visiting old court houses, but to have almost everything in one location is surely a plus. You will find courteous help in both the VSL and the VHS.

By 1:00 that afternoon, I had discovered three more generations on one surname line, plus its unpublished but fully documented family history. Wills and records of

another line were easily found and copies were ordered. Copies were paid for in advance, and they were mailed to me about six weeks later. The librarians will xerox pages of family manuscripts while you wait, with a page limit per day. With such good luck on this day, surely James and Margaret Hawkins will be right there in the next book, waiting for me. Not easy! Elsewhere in our Newsletter is the record of James Hawkins in Stafford Co. from 1793 to 1826, listing the taxation records. This includes the male members (no names) of the family who had reached taxable age.

The very large research room of the VSL has two walls of shelves devoted to County records. Smaller published books of extracts are on the top shelf above the county. Most of our large local libraries have many of the latter. Another wall is devoted to card files of Northern Neck land grants, Wills, Service Index Cards, etc.

Had it not been for my planned Sunday visit to a friend in Reston, Va., a rental car wasn't really needed. However, it had to be picked up out on Broad Street, a long taxi ride out on Broad Street. No, they didn't have a car reserved for me, but after an hour, one was finally delivered. Off I drove to Reston, making the first stop along the way at "Gunstan Hall" on the Potomac, in Stafford Co. "Gunstan Hall" was the home (now museum) of George Mason in the 1600's. George Mason was a cousin of my ancestor, Gerrard Fowke, with whom he came to America. Since this home was a duplicate of the "Gunstan Hall" of the Fowke family of Staffordshire, England, it held much interest for me. William R. Hawkins, son of James and Margaret, married into this family line.

On to Reston! Well, so I missed a turn. That 18-wheeler in front of me had to have obscured the one imperative sign. Soon enough the Washington Monument was soaring above to my left, when it should have soared several miles to my right. Sailing down Pennsylvania Avenue on Sunday afternoon couldn't be called bad. Afterall, it had been years since I'd visited Washington. Finally I was at my destination, again sailing, but on a boat with my friends. The next morning I returned to Richmond, changing lodgings to the hotel where the car rental was based.

The VSL has no patron parking, although there is a large lot about four blocks NW of the building. Saturday street parking is permitted, as well as on Capitol grounds only a few yards away. Several hotels are within walking distance.

After turning in my car at the airport, my Sunday return to Dallas/Ft. Worth allowed me just enough time to hurriedly repack for an early morning departure on a Colorado fishing trip with Tom. I'm not a fisherperson, but sitting by the side of a beautiful lake, reading through research notes, is something I can handle any time!.....Olyve H. Abbott

James Hawkins in Stafford County, Va.

This is not proof, but circumstantial evidence, that the James Hawkins found in Stafford Co., Va. is the James for whom many of us are searching. A Kentucky vital statistics card of the birth of Alonzo Hawkins, son of Walter R., states that the birthplace of Walter was Stafford Co., Va. If this statistic is correct, then it is quite possible that the following James, b. ca. 1765-70, is "ours". He was the only Hawkins recorded in Stafford Co. during that time period. Up until this time, we have known only that James and Margaret Hawkins were born in Virginia. They died in 1833 and 1838 in Kentucky, probably Fleming Co.

The 1820 census records place a James Hawkins in Stafford Co. He is not listed there in 1810. During my recent visit to Richmond, Va., I studied the records of burned Stafford County. The personal taxation lists show James Hawkins as being taxed from 1793 through 1825, the last year he was shown.

Consider the birthdates of William R.-1791; John R.-1792; James R.-ca. 1794; Walter R.-ca. 1718; Moses R.-1813. John R. married in Jessamine Co., Ky. in 1822. William R. was married in 1821 & in Clark Co., Ky. in 1822.

I mention my ggg gf, Alexander Hawes, to show the area in which he lived, and the connection with James Hawkins. He was married in 1794 in King George Co., Va. His and Lucy's daughter, Judah, married Wm. R., the son of James Hawkins.

King George and Stafford were, as you know, neighboring counties.

There were several Mortons on the personal taxation list, not all of whom were shown on the census records. There is a definite connection with this surname, and perhaps these Mortons might help form that connection. Mortons in Stafford Co. when James Hawkins lived there, were Richard Morton, Ursly Morton (fem.), Edmond Morton, Thomas Morton, and in 1813, Margaret "Peggy" Morton was listed. Richard Morton was not listed that year. Other names were Atchison; James, Sam, and John Holliday, John & Enoch Conyers, James Ford, Elizabeth Ford, and William Gaines, all surnames that were in NE Kentucky when our Hawkins were there.

If anyone has ideas on the above information, or on a Morton connected with James Hawkins, prior to the maternal ancestry of Sarah Barnett, wife of John R. Hawkins (mrd. Jessamine Co. Ky., 1822), please write.

"Hawkins Graveyard"

This old graveyard is located on the J.A. Standiford farm, at the boat landing, near the Licking River bank.

Only word of mouth data is available.

Members of this family had cholera in 1833. They lived across the river, opposite the graveyard. They brought their dead across the river to bury them.

In 1926, there were several native stones standing or leaning; one had the initials H.H. on it - no date. There was a daughter, Hannah Hawkins, and it is supposed this stone marked her grave.

The men of the family were known as "River Pirates". They used boats to steal along the banks of the river from gardens and cornfields. This graveyard was called "The Horse Thief Graveyard", as some of the men of the family would steal horses from their neighbors.

The Licking River often overflowed this graveyard. Today it is a round mound, from having been plowed around so many times.
