Gentlemen.—In compliance with the above requisition, I signed almost every elector in Gipps Land, a district in which I have resided for many years, and where my general sentiments and opinions are so well known. I am now offering myself as a candidate for a seat in the Legislative Council of the Eastern Province, and to state briefly my opinion on the subject, which will form the subject of consideration in the new Council.

Viewing the great social consequences of education, that of improving and expanding the mind with a view to all subsequent political and social life, it is of the highest importance to the first interests of a State to provide a well-ordered system of education for its rising generation. Of the two systems of education which the Colonies have adopted, the denominational one suited for towns and districts, and the educational one suited for the country, the former is the more appropriate for the rural districts. Both will have to be supported in the mean time, but the educational system will be more easily and inexpensively supported, at a distance from schools, should a country school be established.

I do not think that the colony is yet ripe for dispensing with the Government grant for the support of public works, and numerously populated districts, the amount of contributions of the Christian community but not so in the thinly-inhabited districts, and those where the people are continually moving, as in the case of the miners.

It is the more necessary that I should at once state, in reply to your request, my opinion on the more important political questions of the day, because very recently, been of a purely professional nature.

I abstained from taking any prominent part in political affairs generally, and it is therefore probable that many of the electors may be in ignorance of my views on some of the questions which at present excite a great deal of interest.

One of the subjects which has most excited the public mind has been the introduction of elections by ballot into this country. I should have thought it unnecessary to have said anything upon a point which had been decided by the Legislature, after long discussion, were it not that there appears to exist in the minds of some persons a desire to overturn this decision, and that an attempt should be made in the ensuing session to do so.

I shall oppose any such attempt. If it be made, and should the mode of election now established prove to be in some respects defective, I shall be more disposed to adopt such amendments as may improve its working, than to revert to the bygone.

Such a decision has taken place both in and out of the Legislature, with regard to the 3rd clause of the New Constitution, which requires that a sum of £50,000 should be annually set apart in aid of education. This is a sum which I consider to be excessive, and that this provision is wrong in principle, and ought therefore, at once to be abolished; but I have myself been unable to come to that conclusion. Were the body of men of this colony such that any one religious body became master of the funds, and with subservient to the State, no one would more strongly object to it than I should to its maintenance; and I say, with confidence, that any proposition which might have the effect of giving to the Government any interest or influence, direct or indirect, in the affairs of any one or more religious sects, whether by means of patronage or otherwise, would always meet with my unqualified condemnation. No such power can or can be exercised under the law as it present stands. I feel sure that in many parts of this country where the population is small and scattered, the cause of morality and religion would suffer serious detriment were this payment to be stopped.

Such a proposal would be a violation of the New Constitution, which is well known to the members of the Legislature, during what ought to have been the period when it was adopted.

On the other hand, the Legislature, in their

attempt to regulate the conduct of the colony entirely cease. I am therefore anxious to inquire, if the above and紧接着的 question I may observe, that the alteration of the laws of the colony, which will be necessary to secure the recovery of gold and the unforeseen influx of miners, render the departure of the orders in Council necessary. Government, in my opinion, possessed the power of giving notice, of reserving a portion of the land for intermediate districts, during what ought to have been the period when it was adopted.

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
