SUMMARY OF NEWS.

Annual elections were held yesterday, it being the first Tuesday in November, in Massachusetts, New York, New Jersey, Maryland, Delaware, Michigan, Illinois, Minnesota, Missouri, Wisconsin, and Kansas. An Incorporation has been formed under the name and style of "The Benton County Monument Association," the object of which is to erect a monument to the memory of those of our Fathers, Sons, Brothers, and Friends, who have fallen victims to the late conspiracy for the overthrow of the Government. All that is mortal of them, may be found slumbering beneath the bloody field of Donelson, of Shiloh, of Corinth, of Winchester, of Atlanta—on the plains of Mississippi and Alabama—in the swamps of Louisiana and Arkansas—and from thence to the barrens of the Carolinas and Virginia—everywhere, in those Southern wilds, where foot of man has trod, can be found the remains of the noble Sons of Iowa—the bravest of the brave—who from the commencement of this sanguinary struggle to its latest death-grasp, have ever been in the front rank of the nation's defenders, and who have dared to sacrifice their lives, that the blessings of a free Government may be perpetuated to the latest generation.

Though dead, yet shall they live—and we, their survivors who have escaped the perils of the war, will raise a marble column, to commemorate their lives, their virtues, and their untimely death.

To further this cause, and to secure the early completion of this good work, this association has been formed, composed of your fellow-citizens, men from each township, whose integrity and business capacity, is a guaranty that under their fostering care, this enterprise will be pushed with energy until success shall be attained; and we appeal to a generous public, feeling confident that the people will nobly sustain the movement.

The working plan of the association is as follows: Any person may

become a member of the Incorporation, upon payment of \$1 to the Secretary, and a Certificate of Membership will be issued to the person so making payment. Subscription lists will also be made, and the public invited to make such liberal subscriptions as they may think proper. The money so realized, both from membership and subscriptions, will be devoted to the purpose for which the association is formed. Such, in brief, is the manner by which we hope to carry on this work to a glorious termination, and erect a monument which shall do credit to the hearts of a grateful people.

"Not lost, but gone before." We earnestly hope this appeal may not be made in vain: but that the people, without dissension or difference, will unite as one man to further so good an undertaking. A Book of Membership will be kept by the Secretary, and we hope to be able soon to chronicle the fact, and publish to the world, that every man, woman and child, in Benton county, have been enrolled as Members of this Association.

We beg to call your attention, also, to the Subscription Lists. It is the universal desire to build the Monument as fine and large as can be made with all the means we can raise; and to do this effectually, we must make our donations as liberal as possible. Do not be close-fisted in a matter of this character, but make your subscriptions large—and when the column shall be erected, attesting our respect to the departed heroes, we shall never regret the amount devoted to this object. Correct Rolls of the Members and of the amount of the subscriptions, will be published, and also deposited beneath the monument, in a box to be prepared, for that purpose.

The association will be materially assisted in its labors, if those who have lost relatives or friends in the army, and who entered the army from this county, will give their correct names, the Company and Regiment to which they were attached, and also, the date, and place of death, in order that the same may be engraved upon the Monument—it being the design of the Association, that the name of every soldier who has died in the service, together with the other facts above stated, shall appear.

THE PRINTER. Perhaps there is no class of labor so poorly appreciated as that of the printer. An easy matter to fling a paper aside with the remark "Nothing there of interest," while both the editor and "types" have labored assiduously the whole week, to place before their readers something attractive. And then there is another class who think the paper is ably conducted, and are pleased with it, but who cannot take the time to stop in and pay for the one they have been receiving regularly for a whole year or more, yet they have both time and money to spend for a thousand other things, for which, instead of reaping a benefit, in very many instances, they receive a curse that will follow them beyond the grave; for these they pay their money and spend their time, without the least hesitation, while they carefully avoid the presence of their true friend and benefactor, the editor, for fear he may ask them for what their consciences tell them should have been paid long since.

My object, however, is not to present the subject of dunning delinquent subscribers, but to show, as well as can, the depreciation of the labor of a printer, the practical printer; he upon whom devolves the task of picking from the case, one at a time, the "leader" messengers of thought, until words and sentences have been formed; he who takes the most unattractive manuscript of correspondents, and, as might be said, makes common sense out of it. For oftentimes if printed as written it would hardly be recognized as belonging to our language, but which, after having been re-arranged and corrected by

the printer, become "noble efforts." How often do you hear surprise expressed, that such and such a one could write so sensible and interesting an article, when in fact the author himself would hardly recognize it as his own, were it not for the signature.

And yet the author, and not this printer, receives the praise. I do not mean this as a disparagement to those who attempt to write for the press, for those who seek to enlighten and better their fellow-man through the medium of the press, engage in a laudable act. Only mention this to call attention to the fact that the PRINTER receives but a small portion of the credit due him.

MR. HORACE GREELEY. In his late address in Chicago, thus referred to West Point: "I am not a friend of our national military academy at West Point. I am a disbeliever in the policy of giving to any institution, however excellent, the privilege of officering our armies. I believe that we should have not one such, but a hundred in this country. I believe that every seminary should have its instruction in military drill, and every university its course of instruction in military tactics. And when officers are wanted for the army, I believe there should be the freest competition, and the question not be, 'Where did he learn,' but 'What does he know?' [Cheers.] But when I have said all this, I maintain, that to-day West Point is the best practical school in the country. If I had a child in whom I took an interest, and was offered education for him where I chose, I would say give me West Point, merely because West Point is an institution where the pupil is trained with direct reference to practical things. What is taught there includes health, muscular physical activity, and a knowledge of what is necessary to be known, I say, without reference to military affairs, I believe West Point, which I do not like, is the best practice school for boys in this country to-day."

LIQUIDATION OF THE NATIONAL DEBT.—According to the official figures (says the New York Times) the national indebtedness was reduced nearly thirteen million dollars in September, or at the rate of one hundred and thirty-six millions a year. Such an energetic process of liquidation would result in the discharge of all the national pecuniary obligations in about twenty years. Rapidly, however, as the public debt is diminished the interest charged, will, of course, fall off.—Economy in this important item must lessen materially the national expenses and accelerate the liquidating process. Hence it may be safely assumed that before the long six per cents (now having sixteen years to run) shall have matured, Government will have paid off all other claims upon it, and made adequate provision for the prompt cash redemption of the 1881 bonds, "on presentation by the holders."
