George Reeves of Stafford County One certain bad or p<sup>ar</sup>  
cell of Land containing Nine hundred forty one Acres, Situate lying and being in Staff<sup>ord</sup>  
County on the Rushy branch of Bull run and bounded as followeth Viz<sup>t</sup> Beginning  
all A, at a Oak Corner tree of the said Reeves other tract and running thence North five and  
a half degrees, West One hundred and fifty eight pole to B, at a Oak near the line of Rich<sup>ard</sup>  
Mellon, North three deg<sup>s</sup>, East down a small branch Seventy pole to a Poplar on the  
North side Buck hall branch, North fourteen and a half deg<sup>s</sup>, East Sixty pole to C, at a Oak
