On this 21st day of September in the year of our
Lord 1832 personally appeared in open court before the court of common
pleas of the said county of Putnam, William Barrett a resident of the
town of Kent in the county of Putnam & State of New York aged eighty
years who being first duly sworn according to law doth on his oath
make the following declaration in order to obtain the benefit of the provision
made by the act of congress passed June 7. 1832 that he entered the service
of the United States in the month of August 1776 he enlisted in Fredericksburg
into Capt. William Clark's company for three months & served the time
in within the county of Dutchess in the state of New York, Melancthon
Smith was captain of another company and commandant of both
that in or about 1780 he went as a substitute for John Russell, John Wing &
Titus Travis for three months & served under Capt. DeLivan & John Pown
was a lieutenant, the Colonel, ^{was} New Yorklandt the service was performed
in New Jersey - & the service was performed in the light infantry which the
said Barrett had enlisted into soon after he got into the service that
he served at several times on alarms and one time in January
32nd of the revolutionary war he served twenty two days
on an alarm and under Captain Hezekiah Mead & Colonel Paulus
Furness.

He hereby relinquishes every claim whatever to a pension or annuity
except the present & declares that his name is not on the pension roll
of the agency of any state.

He further declares on his oath aforesaid in answer to the inter-
rogatories propounded by the court that he was born in Bedford
(now purchase) Dutchess county & state of New York in or about the
year one thousand seven hundred & fifty two, that he has no record
of his age - truly from memory - that he served in what was then called
Fredericksburg when he went into service at the same place where
he now lives, the town is now called Kent in the state of New York
The first term of service was a volunteer, the second time he was
a substitute for John Russell, John Wing & Titus Travis but afterward
enlisted - when called out by the militia officers -
that he was under Colonel Henry Livingston principally as Colonel

That he cannot recollect that he ever received any discharge from his
service

Putnam County Jo. Jolley Berry being duly sworn oath de-
pose & say that he was well acquainted with William Ber-
rett who has signed the above declaration in the revolutionary
war. & knows that he was then a soldier in the service of the
United States, that for three months he was a soldier in the
company in which the deponent was a sergeant, and company
commanded by captain William Clark. This was in the year
1776. the said Morritt performed his duty as a soldier for
the said time

men composed a clop for the purpose of furnishing a soldier
that the deponent John Wey & Litus Traas were in a
clop of the deponent for the clop heard the said William
Berrett who has signed the preceding declaration to de-
clare of duty for three months, that the said Morritt
left the neighborhood & was absent as the deponent un-
derstands in the service. & after he returned the clop paid him
the stipulated price

designated a Justice of the Peace in & for said County William Barrett
who being duly sworn deposes & saith that by reason of old age &
the consequent loss of memory, he cannot swear positively as to
the precise length of his service, but according to the best of his
recollection he served not less than the periods mentioned below
in the following grades for three months as a private in the
company commanded by Captain William Clark, I served as
a private for three months in a company commanded by Capt
George Delaware; he was also for twenty two days as a
private and in various other regiments during the war I served as
a private not less than three months; and for such services
I claim a pension

This declarant in explanation of his declaration says that he does not
now remember who commanded the ^{company} to which Russell's
1st & 2nd Wm. Delaware's Regt. for whom he served three months. It was very soon
after he was hired by them that he joined a company of Light
Infantry, commanded by Capt. Delaware, I served under him about one
month when he left the company & Lieut. John Brown took the com-
mand & kept it about a month when Delaware returned & continued in
command of the company until they were discharged

Madam:-

In response to your recent communication you are advised that there are several Daniel Rogers upon the Revolutionary war pension records but neither corresponds with the data furnished in your letter.

William Barrett made an application for pension on September 11th, 1832, at which time he was 80 years of age and residing at Kent, New York, and his pension was allowed for six months and twenty-two days' actual service as a private in the New York troops, Revolutionary war. He enlisted at Fredericksburgh, N. Y., and served under Capt. Delevan and Col. VanCourtland.
