Montgomery County &c On this thirteenth Day
of April 1810 before me the Subscriber one
of the Judges of the Court of Common Pleas
in and for the County aforesaid personally
appeared Jonathan Pinckney ^{aged fifty four years} of the Town
of Florida in said County who being duly
~~sworn~~ sworn according to Law doth
on his oath make the following Declaration
in order to obtain the provision made
by the late act of Congress entitled an
Act to provide for certain persons engaged
in the land and naval Service of the Uni-
ted States in the Revolutionary war
That the said Jonathan Pinckney enlisted
in the Town of Fishkill County of Dutchess
State aforesaid in the Company commanded
by Capt Henry Tebault of New York and
was joined to the Third Regiment command-
ed by Colonel Peter Gansevoort under
the Command of General Clinton this
department enlisted in September bounded
Security, six and continued to serve in
the same Corps until the close of the
war and was discharged from the service in
the year Eighty three, ^{at June} at ~~the~~ Dutchess
on the Hudsons River in the State of
New York that he was in the Battle of
Pecks Kill at the Siege of Fort Stanwix and
at York Town at the taking of Cornwallis
and some others of less importance
and that he is in reduced Circumstances

and stands in need of the assistance
of his Country for Support and that
he has no other evidence now in his
power of his said Service ~~and~~

I Benedict Arnold One of the Judges of the
Court of Common Pleas of the County of Montgomery
do Certify that it appears to my satisfaction that
the said Jonathan Pinckney did serve in the
Revolutionary War ^{was} as stated in the preceding Declara-
-tion against the Common enemy and I now
transmit the proceedings and testimony taken
and had before me to the Secretary for the de-
partment of war pursuant to the directions of the
aforesaid Board of Congress

-tance of his Country for Support

 Montgomery County } ss. **Be it Remembered,** That on the thirteenth
 day of October in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and twenty
 personally appeared in the Court House at the town of Johnstown in the
 County of Montgomery in the Court of common Pleas
 in open court, the said court being a court of record for the County aforesaid having then
 and there present and in presence of James A. [unclear] Judge of the Court of the County
 with a Jurisdiction unlimited in point of amount keeping a record of their proceedings
Jonathan Pughney aged thirty six years
 resident in Florida in the County aforesaid
 who being first duly sworn according to law, doth on his oath declare, that he

served in the revolutionary war as follows: that on the third day of March 1746
 he enlisted as a private soldier at the town of Fort Sale in the
 County of Dutchess and State aforesaid into Captain Henry Feabont
 Company Colonel Peter Garrison's 1st Regiment and New York
 being the third New York Regiment for during the War said
 continued in said company and Regiment until after the
Western Expedition under General Sullivan when the
consolidation took place and his Captain and Company were
 transferred into the first New York Regiment commanded by Colonel
Gooshee Van Schaick and continued in said company and
 Regiment until the close of the War on the 9th day of June
 17th 79 when he was honorably discharged at Newburgh in the
 State of New York, that he was in the battles with General
Sullivan against the Indians at the siege of Fort Stanwix and
 at the taking of Cornwallis at Yorktown in Virginia that
 he has been placed on the pension list under the Act of the
 15th March 1818

and that his original declaration is dated the thirteenth day of April
 one thousand eight hundred and eighteen and that his pension certificate is No. 9,857

AND I do solemnly swear — that I was a resident citizen of the United States on the 18th day of March, 1818, and that I have not since that time, by gift, sale, or in any manner, disposed of my property, or any part thereof, with intent thereby so to diminish it as to bring myself within the provisions of an act of Congress, entitled, "An act to provide for certain persons engaged in the land and naval service of the United States, in the Revolutionary war," passed on the 18th day of March, one thousand eight hundred and eighteen: and that I have not, nor has any person in trust for me, any property or securities, contracts or debts, due to me; nor have I any income other than what is contained in the schedule hereto annexed, and by me subscribed, to wit:

Personal Estates, One bow two chairs one pair one small pot one frying pan one pair smoothing irons one iron wedge and Beets Peppers six knives four forks six table spoons one earthen bowl, two wooden bowls, one keeler one chair, one five line cups & saucers, one cream one tea pot one sugar bowl one Pepper box one small wheel one table & one barrow-axe that I am by occupation a labourer but cannot work being lame and infirm that I have a wife aged sixty four years Eleanor sickly son Parker aged fifteen hearty and grandson Jay seven years who I am obliged to support that I owe no legal debt to the amount of \$100 and have no other means of support than what is above stated except my pension which I receive from the United States and which I received up to the fourth day of March last.
