Be it remembered, that on the twenty eighth day of May of the term of May of the Court of Common Pleas of the County of Washington in the State of New York in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred & twenty two, Daniel Squier of the town of Salem in the County of Washington & State aforesaid personally appeared in the said Court of Common Pleas in open Court, the said Court being a Court of Record established by the Constitution and laws of the said State providing according to the form of the Common Law keeping a record of its proceedings & having a seal, and exhibited to the said Court of Common Pleas, being the Court of Common Pleas of the County in which he the said Daniel Squier resides a schedule subscribed by him and which is hereto annexed containing his whole estate and income (his ordinary clothing and bedding excepted) and did then & there in open Court take and subscribe, and produce to the said Court the following oath viz:

I Daniel Squier do solemnly swear that I was a resident citizen of the United States on the eighteenth day of March one thousand eight hundred and eighteen, and that I have not since that time by gift sale or in any manner whatever, disposed of my property or any part thereof with intent thereby so to diminish it as to bring myself within the provisions of an act of Congress entitled "An act to provide for certain persons engaged in the land and naval service of the United States in the revolutionary war passed on the eighteenth day of March one thousand eight hundred & eighteen, and that I have not, nor has any person in trust for me any property or securities contracts or debts due to me, nor have I any income other than what is contained in the schedule hereto annexed and by me subscribed.

Daniel Squires of the Town of Salem, in the County of Washington and State of New York aforesaid being duly sworn doth depose, swear and say, that in the Month of May, in the year one thousand eight hundred and seventy six, this deponent did enlist, <sup>into</sup> Captain James Davis's Company, in Colonel Ward's Regiment in the Continental Service for one year as a private and that he did serve as a private in said Company and Regiment during the said year in the State of New York, Maryland and Pennsylvania in the War of the Revolution against the Common enemy on the Continental Establishment and was honorably discharged on the fourteenth day of May, one thousand seven hundred and seventy seven - but this deponent has no knowledge or recollection of receiving any written discharge, and if he did receive one, it has been lost by some bad accident. And this deponent further swears that he is still a Resident Citizen of the United States, and that by reason of his reduced circumstances and condition in life he is in need of assistance from his Country for support. In addition to the above term of one year service, this deponent swears that he was at the Battle of Bunker Hill, and further swears that Daniel Squires

Dear Sir:

Reference is made to your letter relative to Daniel Squires, a soldier of the Revolutionary War.

The data contained herein were obtained from the papers on file in the Revolutionary War claim for pension, S.42376, based upon the military service of Daniel Squier in that war.

The date and place of birth and the names of the parents of Daniel Squier, the name is also shown as Squiers, are not stated.

Daniel Squier was in the battle of Bunker Hill, no details of this service given. While a resident of Mansfield, Tolland County, Connecticut, Daniel Squier enlisted in May 1776, served as private in Captain James Dana's Company, Colonel Andrew Ward's Connecticut Regiment; was in the battles of Trenton and Princeton and was discharged May 14, 1777.

He was allowed pension on his application executed April 8, 1818, at which time he was a resident of Salem, Washington County, New York, and aged about sixty-two years.

In 1820 Daniel Squier, Jr., and Sheubel Squier were living in Salem, New York, their ages and relationship not shown.

In 1822 soldier's wife, was aged sixty-six years, her name not given.

Soldier had children living in 1820, their names and ages not designated. There are no further family data.

Daniel Squier died January 25, 1828, place not given.
