WORKSOP AND NEIGHBOURHOOD.

WORKSOP, a parish, and small but neat market-town, in the Hatfield division of Bassetlaw wapen-take, is 146 miles from London, 29 from Lincoln, 26 from Nottingham, 21 from Newark and 12 from Mansfield; pleasantly seated in a valley, near the source of the river Royton. Worksop, anciently Wirkensop, was before the Norman conquest the property of a Saxon nobleman: long afterwards it property of a Saxon nobleman: long afterwards it belonged successively to the families of Furnival, Nevill and Talbot, earls of Shrewsbury. The Talbot estates descending to co-heiresses, a part was conveyed to the Howards, earls of Arundel, afterwards dukes of Norfolk, by whom the lands of Worksop are still possessed, and who, on this account, enjoy the privileges of furnishing a glove for the king's right hand, at his coronation, and of supporting that hand white he holds the sceptre. Near the town is the noble seat of the Dukes of Norfolk, commonly called 'Worksop manor,' which, about the year 1764, was destroyed by an accidental fire, together with all its furniture and pictures, except one wing. After this destroyed by an accidental nry, together with all its furniture and pictures, except one wing. After this accident the present structure was creeted, which is considered a master-piece of architecture, and is certainly one of the noblest mansion-houses in the kingdom. The whole front displays a beautiful simplicity, without raising the idea of a want of ornament. Not far from the house are the pleasure grounds, laid out and decorated with exceeding the statues with which it was formerly furnished.

Worksop was in former times defended by a castle, long ago destroyed; but its site is still pointed out on a circular hill, encompassed with a trench, at the west side of the town. This place was formerly noted for its monastery, founded by William de Lovetot, in the reign of Henry I. for canons regular of the order of St. Augustine, which was subsequently enriched by the gifts of various proprietors of the town; but at the general dissolution its possessions were seized by Henry VIII, and few vestiges of the monastery now remain; but the church partly subsists, and is a noble specimen of ancient architecture, with two lofty towers; the west entrance consisting of an arch, with zig-zag ornaments, whilst the towers have arch, with zig-zag ornaments, whilst the towers have the windows in a gradation of different styles of archi-tecture. The interior of the church, in length about tecture. The interior of the church, in length about one hundred and thirty-five feet, consists of a nave and two aisles; the roof is supported by eight pillars, alternately octangular and cylindrical: the ancient pulpit is still preserved. The most curious vestige of the ancient buildings is a ruinous chapel, at the southeast corner of the church, now used as a place of burial, of which the windows, still well preserved, furnish examples of the lancet form. The gate of the monastery is nearly entire, and retains a few of the status with which it was formerly furnished. HE smallest county in England, being only 18 miles in length, at its greatest breadth 16, and containing 130,566 acres, is bounded on the west and south-west by Leicestershire, on the south-east by Northamptonshire, from which it is separated by the river Welland, and on its north and north-eastern sides by Lincolnshire. It is reputed to have received its name from the red colour of its soil, which yields in many parts a sort of ruddle, used for the purpose of staining the fleeces of sheep. The air is pure, and the face of the country beautifully varied by gentle hills and pleasing vales, the eminences forming a chain from east to west, alternately rising and falling, the vallies being commonly half a mile in breadth. It is watered on its south-western side by the Eye, on the south-east from Northamptonshire by the Welland, while its centre is irrigated by several streams flowing from the hills, which fall into the Wash and the Chater, small rivers, which rising on the Leicestershire border, empty themselves into the Welland, the former below, and the latter above Stamford, in Lincolnshire. The productions of the county are, grain, corn and sheep. Its wheat in particular is highly esteemed, and is chiefly sold for seed; but its manufactures are of very little consequence. Rutlandshire is in the province of Canterbury and dioceses of Peterborough, and is included in the midland circuit. It is divided into five hundreds, viz. Alstoe, East, Martinsley, Oakham-soke, and Wrandike; these contain two market-towns (Oakham and Uppingham) and fifty-three parishes. Two members are returned to parliament for the shire; those elected in 1826 were, Sir G. N. Noel, Bart. and Sir Gilbert Hearhcote, Bart. According to the parliamentary census of 1821, the whole county contained 3,675 houses, occupied by 3,936 families, consisting of 9,223 males and 9,264 females; total, 18,487 inhabitants. From the year 1700 to 1821 this county had only increased its population about 2,300 persons.

OAKHAM, LANGHAM, WHISSENDINE, &c.
