Mr. Benjamin Garside died at his home in the town of Holland, Saturday night, October 18th, at about ten o'clock. He was in usual health until within two hours of his death, which was caused by heart disease and was painless.

Mr. Garside was born October 8th, 1819, in Worksop, Nottingham Shire, England, where he learned the trade of a cooper. In 1842 he came to Alton, Illinois, where he worked at his trade until 1845. He then returned to England, and on December 16th the same year, was married to Miss Frances Kennen. He remained in England until the year 1857, when, with his wife and six children, he returned to America and settled in Detroit, Michigan. In 1861 he moved with his family to Chicago where he was foreman of cooperage at Lill and Diversey's brewery. His interests in Chicago being destroyed by the great fire of 1871, he moved upon the farm in the town of Holland, Sheboygan County, where he continued to reside until the time of his death.

Mr. Garside gained the love and respect of many friends by his honesty and genial disposition. The funeral occurred on Wednesday, October 22nd, at the Methodist church in Hingham, and was largely attended. The remains were interred in the Hingham cemetery. Rev. Eldredge conducted the services.

Mr. Garside is survived by his wife, four sons and four daughters. Geo. resides at Random Lake, Benjamin and Joseph in Indian Territory and Henry in the town of Holland, this county. The daughters are Mrs. Henry Thirsk, of Kansas, Mrs. Thos. Holmes, of Wheaton Illinois, Mrs. Wm. Boyer, of Chicago, and Mrs. John Louret, of the town of Holland. Benjamin and Joseph and Mrs. Thirsk were unable to be present in time for the funeral.
