Scout Lewis A. Farley

Lewis Farley's grandfather, Captain Matthew Farley, was a Veteran of the Revolutionary War, and in his own time a famous Indian Scout.

Scout Lewis A. Farley, was the son of James Farley and Nancy Harvey (Paul). The Farley family history is put together using a number of sources, including much information from reader Donna Tauber's site at:

An interesting quote from Donna's site says;

"Louis [Lewis] married Mary Lanham. To them were born four children, two boys and two girls. Nancy Belle, Laura, Hutz and David. Louis and his son Hutz were acting guides for a body of soldiers in the western plains of Kansas during the Indian War. Louis died of a wound received in a battle. He went through the War of Rebellion, coming through without a scratch." Source: Committee of family members (un-named) who wrote a two-page description of the family entitled "History of the White and Farley families."

Note; Hutz, is Hutson, often called Hudson or Hutch.

Lewis (Louis) # iii, and Hutson (Hutz) are listed under # 6. James Farley.

The Farley Family History

James Farley, b. APR-11-1795 in Monroe County, (now West) Virginia, (son of Matthew "Matt" Farley and Esther McCullen).

He married Nancy Harvey (Paul), OCT-02-1818 in Monroe County, (now West) Virginia, b. APR-02-1796 in Monroe County, (now West) Virginia, (daughter of John Harvey and _____) d. OCT-12-1863 in Marion County, Indiana.

James died APR-11-1856 in Hamilton County, Indiana. James and Nancy are buried in Farley Cemetery, Carmel, Indiana.

He married (2) Clementine Dawson, AUG-04-1859 in Hamilton County, Indiana.

Freeman died ___-___-1905, buried in Farley Cemetery, Carmel, Hamilton County, Indiana. His children were, Alvina, James Daird, Levi W., Charley, Nella and Lula M. Farley.

- vi. Samuel Farley, b. APR-12-1831.

He married Dorothy.

Samuel died NOV-10-1888 in Noblesville, Hamilton County, Indiana.
- vii. James Farley, b. ___-__-1833. He married Lucinda. Their children were Candice I. and Alice Farley.
- viii. Thomas P. Farley, b. JAN-___-1835 in Indiana.

He married (1) Martha Kenyon, JUN-10-1856 in Hamilton County, Indiana.

He married (2) Prudence C. _____ (Wright), about 1877.

Thomas died FEB-21-1911 in Noblesville, Hamilton County, Indiana.

In 1880, Thomas, Prudence, her children, Charles, Myrtle O. and Minnie H. Wright, were living in Pleasant township, Lincoln County, Kansas, where his nephew, **Scout Hutson Farley** and family still lived. Later they went to North Dakota, before returning to Indiana.

ix. Mary Jane Farley, b. AUG-27-1837 in Indiana.

She married Jonathan "John" Cloud, b. AUG-21-1836 in Westfield, Hamilton County, Indiana.

Mary died DEC-08-1865, buried in Carmel Cemetery, Hamilton County, Indiana. Their children were Robert B., James W., Mary J. and Nancy A. Cloud.

In 1860 **Scout Lewis Farley's** oldest daughter, Nancy was living with the Clouds, following the death of her mother.

2. **Scout Lewis A. Farley**, b. about 1828 in Monroe County, (now West) Virginia.

He married Mary Lanham, ___-__-184_ in _____, _____ County, Indiana?, b. ___-__-1831 in Kentucky, d. JAN-20-1859 in _____, Hamilton County, Indiana, buried in Farley Cemetery, Carmel, Hamilton County, Indiana.

Lewis died SEP-26-1868 at Beecher Island, now Yuma County, Colorado Territory, and originally buried at Beecher Island Battleground, Colorado Territory.

He had been wounded in the leg at the outbreak of the battle and spent the day behind a riverbank and is credited with much accurate shooting, despite his serious, painful and eventually mortal wound.

Immediately following the relief of the Scouts at Beecher Island by Colonel Carpenter and the 10th Cavalry, Surgeon Jenkins Fitzgerald found it necessary to amputate Lewis' badly infected leg. He died of complications.

On DEC-28-1868 he was re-buried at Fort Wallace Post Cemetery, Wallace, Kansas.

In May of 1886, following the closing of Fort Wallace, he was again re-buried at Fort Leavenworth National Cemetery, Leavenworth, Kansas.

Was Lewis in Kansas once before? Before the Civil War, there was a Lewis Farley involved in some Free State issues around the Lawrence, Kansas area in

the 1850's. Some census records indicate that the second oldest Farley daughter, Laura, was born in Kansas in 1857.

Following the death of his wife, on September 20, 1861, Lewis, enlisted as a farrier (blacksmith) in Company G, 3rd Cavalry Regiment. Apparently he left the four children with relatives.

Lewis and Hutson had already spent some time on the plains hunting and scouting before being recruited by Scout Jack Peate to join the Forsyth expedition. They were among the first settlers in what would become southwestern Lincoln County, Kansas, settling about 2 or 3 miles southwest of the site of Sylvan Grove.

She may have married a James E. Sharpe on OCT-03-1872 in Hamilton County, Indiana, but more research is needed here. She may have had family and descendants.

- iv. David Farley, b. ___-__-185_ and is not found after the 1860 census, so must have died young. His mother died JAN-20-1859, could this be when he was born?

3. **Hutson Lewis Farley**, b. JAN-11-1849 in Noblesville, Hamilton County, Indiana.

He married Lydia Eugenia "Jennie" Phelps, OCT-10-1870 in _____, _____ County, Kansas, b. AUG-03-1846 in Hopkinton, Middlesex County, Massachusetts, (daughter of Edmund Weir Phelps and Hopedill Corbet Pond) d. JUN-26-1930 in Sedro Woolley, Skagit County, Washington.

Hutson returned to Lincoln County following the battle. He married and started a family, farmed and for a time operated a hotel. About 1883 the Farley's and his wife's sister and her family, the Bliss' moved to the area of Tacoma, Washington.

Eventually Hutson and his family and his mother-in-law, moved to Sedro Woolley, where they lived the rest of their lives.

Hutson died JAN-09-1911 in Sedro Woolley, Skagit County, Washington.

Hutson and Jennie are buried: in Union Cemetery, Sedro Woolley, Washington.

Scout Thomas O'Donnell

Like Scout Wilson, little or nothing is known about Scout O'Donnell.

He was wounded in the battle and survived until the relief arrived, and then the torturous ride back to Fort Wallace.

Some of the wounded stated that they walked back, as riding in the government wagons was too rough and caused more pain than walking.

He died at NOV-18-1868 at Fort Wallace Post Hospital, Wallace, Kansas, and was buried at the Post Cemetery. He is still buried there along the east side of the old cemetery, near Scout Abner T. "Sharp" Grover.

A few years ago, author, Orvel Criqui lead an effort to get both Scouts O'Donnell and Grover, permanent markers, rather than the wooden markers that had been used since their burials. By an act of Congress in the early 1900's, when the surviving Scouts and their surviving widows were pensioned, the act also allowed for a military style marker. A fitting tribute I think. Great job Orvel.

In the spring of 1869, when most of Scout Thomas Alderdice's family along with a number of other citizens of what would become Lincoln County, Kansas, were killed during the Spillman Creek Indian raid, his wife, Susanna, a sister of Scout Eli Zigler, was carried away by the Indians. Another woman, Maria Weichell, who's husband, George was also killed, was taken along with Susanna.

On July 11th, 1869, Col. Eugene Carr's 5th Cavalry, lead by a yet unknown scout named Bill Cody, raided the Indians Summit Springs, Colorado camp to attempt to recover Susanna and Maria. Sadly Susanna was killed, but the wounded Maria Weichell was rescued. After recovering at Fort Sedgwick, Maria went east on the Union Pacific and pretty much disappeared from history. Earlier this spring, Jeanette Lyon, a great great granddaughter of Maria Weichell was finally located and came to Lincoln County to see her ancestral home.

Now, courtesy of Jeanette, for the first time outside of her family, we have a photo of the long missing Maria Weichell - Mantz. It will be formally published for the first time in Jeff Broome's *Tales Along the Overland Trail: The Denver Trails and the Indian War 1864-1869*, due out by the Lincoln County Historical Society in 2009.
