Obituary: Elizabeth Kinne Relihan, daughter of Lucius Bingham Kinne and Esther Harrison Kinne, was born June 22, 1885, at Moran, Allen county, Kansas, and died at Merhorial hospital, Smith Center, Kansas, on July 24, 1962 at the age of 77 years, 1 month and 2 days.

She was married to Doctor Frank H. Relihan on October 8, 1910, and to this union was born one daughter, Esther Catherine. From the date of her marriage she made her home in Smith Center where she had a wide circle of acquaintances and friends. Dale Lerew Was Leader In Church

Dale Kurtz Lerew, the son of George and Mina Weaver Lerew, was born at Portis, April 2, 1917, and passed away Monday morning, July 23, 1962, at the age of 45 years, 3 months and 21 days.

Dale spent his entire life in the Portis community; he attended the Portis schools and began his adult life farming with his father on the Lerew farm north of Portis. In 1955 he became the Portis Co-op tank wagon operator which he continued until the time of his death.

On October 11, 1942 he was united in marriage to Alberta Schoen. The Lerews had no children of their own; however, the nieces and nephews as well, as the children of the community spent many happy hours and days with Dale and Alberta both at the Lerew farm and at their home in Portis.
