Dear Mrs. Gifford:

In June, 1935, I had a very singular experience upon my trip returning from attendance of a reunion of my Class at the United States Military Academy. I had done considerable research in genealogy of my parents' families, and I was particularly interested in the problem of the wife of Capt. Duncan McVicker. So among other projects at Washington, D.C., I went to see Miss Ida Rosanna Hamaker because she had researched in New Jersey and had reported the name of the wife as Annie Laurie. I wished to ask her about the records which she had searched in New Jersey. Upon inquiring for her at the Annapolis Hotel where she had made her home, the clerk told me that she had been expecting me but that she had just two or three days before been taken to a sanitarium. I had received her letter in answer to some inquiries written her some weeks before, but there was nothing in my letter to indicate that I might ever go to Washington to see her. I was referred to her cousin, an attorney in Washington who was acting as her guardian in her business affairs. I was told that she had lived too much as a recluse in her quarters and that had probably caused her mental breakdown. She was living in a private sanitarium, but could not be seen. The clerk of the Hotel Annapolis told me that it was too bad that I had not arrived several days before because he said that it would have pleased her very much to see me. As I understand, she is still in the sanitarium but cannot be interviewed or written to.

A few days later I was in Fayette County, Pennsylvania, where my Mother was born near Masontown in 1849. A cousin took me to Smithfield, a few miles from Masontown. There I inquired for Mrs. Carrie Stewart Mathiot Metcalf, to whom I had been referred by the National D.A.R. Librarian and the D.A.R. Regent for Pennsylvania because Mrs. Carrie Stewart Mathiot Metcalf had researched in New Jersey. However, she had reported the name of Capt. Duncan McVicker's wife as Nancy McCollum. But I could not get to see her. Her son, with whom she lived, said that it was necessary to keep people from seeing her because she too had suffered a nervous breakdown. She had been very active in searching genealogy. According to her son, she had a great mass of records but he may not have known what she had. He claimed that she had filed a report of her searches with the D.A.R. Chapters at Morgantown and Uniontown, but I suppose that all that she had given them was her lineage upon joining the D.A.R. At any rate, I secured by letter later on from an Officer of a Uniontown Chapter the facts that she reported as follows:

"Captain Duncan McVicker born in Glasgow Scotland in 1739 died in Schellsburg, Pa., in 1818 Nancy McCollum born in 1748 - died in 1820 No marriage date given"

Now it may be that Mrs. Metcalf does have notes of her searches in New Jersey that give more than this, but her notes are inaccessible as her son said that he would not touch them for anybody and that he would not let anybody talk to her.

Mrs. Metcalf's dates given as above bear the impress of original research for they are the only correct ones I know of given by those who joined the D.A.R. They agree with the Family Bible record of Alexander McVicker (1773-1832). I am unable, however, to retrace where she got the dates as to Nancy McCollum, for I have assumed that she died in New Jersey before the Captain went to Pennsylvania shortly after the Revolution. However, if she lived until 1820 it is very strange that no record has been turned up about her in Bedford County, Pa. The Captain spent his declining years with his son Alexander McVicker near Schelbburg, Pa., and it would seem strange that there would be no trace at all of his Mother if she lived until 1820.

The difference in spelling is not conclusive. Your reference to Thomas McConnell as of S omerset County is interesting. The copy of the will shows Pasex County. Somerset County may have been a part of Pasex County when this will was made, and divided of subsequently. So I would appree ate copy copy of the letter and itw examents as to Jean McCommell as the wife of Buncan McVicker. I do not doubt this, but I b lieve that this may have been another Duncan McVicker. There is no identification. The overwhelming preponderance of all evidence is that Mancy McCollum was the wife of Capt. Duncan McVicker, married him in New Jersey, and was the mother of his children who went with his to Bedford County, Pa. However, there may have been a second wife who also died before he went Pennsylvania. All the descendants of Capt. Duncan McVicker who have become members in the Daughters of the American Revolution or Sons of the Revolution have traced descent through Nancy McCollum, so far as my investigation has shown. This would not be conclusive that there was not another or second wife.

I will appreciate having copies of any records such as the deed to Thomas McBride. He would be a son-in-law of Duncan McVicker. I am collecting all materials I can obtain as they will be very useful to use in sketches, which is the form I plan to use when writing out from my materials.

I am interested in the possibilities of that record in the old family Bible of Thomas McBride. It might be well to copy it all out for me if you can do so, as another might leave out some important fact. In that record he may even have recorded that Mary McVicker was the daughter of Duncan McVicker, as such information was often given in such records. All information would be very acceptable and even earnestly desired by me. I would like to have it very much and I am hoping that you will be able to obtain it conveniently.

I am interested also in what you find out from Mr. Chew. He may have a valuable source of history for us, and his relatives in the East may have, so it is desirable to find out from him who they are, and see if it may be advisable to write to them. One will often be surprised at what is gained from nearby as well as faraway sources.

So I will be glad to have all of these records at your convenience.

I have a copy of the will of Thomas McConnell. I am referring the matter of this will to a correspondent in New Jersey who may find something of value. It is supposed that Nancy McCollum and "Annie Laurie" were the same person, perhaps her name was Annie Laurie McCollum called familiarly Nancy McCollum, just as other members of the McVicker family, two whose names were Elizabeth were always called Betry.

I will enclose a blank for your sister to fill out with regard to her family. I will appreciate all the information given.

I am glad you mention the family of McVicar in Mansfield. As you suggest, they might be of the same stock. I have found some named McVicar who formerly spelled it as McVicker. Note that Capt. Duncan McVicker signed his first name as "Dunken." Especially in an early day and even later people varied the spelling of surnames. You mention one given name as Duncan. It is strange, but the son of Capt. Duncan McVicker, who was Duncan McVicker Jr. has left no trace in all the records I have been able to collect, and is supposed to have gone west. My father said he had an uncle who went to Ohio, probably long over a hundred years ago, and that may have been this Duncan McVicker, the son of Capt. Duncan McVicker. My father told me this many years ago, but he did not know the name of this uncle as I remember.

Would you be willing to send me a copy of the letter from the Librarian of the National D.A.R.? I have copies of all their records published in the Limeage Books up to about vol. 130, but not of the later members.

You ask if it seems more than a coincidence that my father's sister, Mary McVicker (married John Morgan at Morgantown, (W) Va. in 1828) was called Polly as was your great grandmother, Mary McVicker McBride, who was thus an aunt of my aunt Mary McVicker Morgan. I regard it as evidence pointing to the relationship.

I am very much interested to note that yours is a family of attorneys. I have practiced law in Iowa, but I am present teaching in the University of Kentucky College of Law, having taken Dean Evans classes while he is on a year's leave of absunce attending Harvard Law School. I taught law in the University of Detroit Law School and later in the Chicago-Kent College of Law. I was a public school teacher and superintendent before I took my law course, hence the teaching experience later caused me to entertain the idea of teaching law which I have enjoyed. I served four years as Clerk of the District Court of Keokuk County, Iowa, 1903-1907. My brother, Harry S. McVicker, has been County Superintendent of Schools of that County for the past 27 years.

Last June-July I was on a trip East and stopped at Bedford, Pa., Morgantown, W. Va., and other places, but did not have time to search the records as I should like to have done. However, I made contacts with several kinsfolk who have since sent me information.

I hope to receive some information from Hampshire County and have made note to write some letters there which I will do soon.

I am pleased that you liked my letters. I enjoy the research and I hope to get back to some source which will confirm and make certain the family record. I realize that it is a hard search and hard to find out what one tries to obtain, but the interesting fact remains that one usually finds out something else interesting even if he is continually baffled on some of the points.

It has given me great pleasure that you have pursued this research also, and I appreciate the copies and your interest in furnishing me your records. You will probably be surprised at the voluminous contents of the enclosures herewith. I have just completed making an abstract of some of my collections on the McVicker and McCollum families, and I am herewith sending you a set of these in which I believe that you will be interested. They may contain some information which you already have, but perhaps some additional information. They may suggest certain facts to you, and I should like to know your view or opinion when you have had time to look these all over. It will probably require some time. The thin sheets are not so easily read but it is possible to make seven copies at one typing by their use, and I wished to send out some copies to you and others. We may thus have these as a basis, and perhaps may manifold other documents for future use.

I am trying to get proof of Duncan McVicker's wife as Nancy McCollum, and of the seven sons and of his two or three daughters. I believe that Nancy McCollum was his wife and mother of his children (see the page on parallel given names in the McVicker and McCollum families). I also believe that your great grandmother, Mary McVicker McBride was a daughter of Capt. Duncan McVicker.

Please convey my appreciation and thanks to Mr. McBride.

Dear Mrs. Gifford:

Your letter of February 1 is greatly appreciated and will be kept in my files for future study. I wish that I had a complete word for word copy of that article in the "History of Caldwell and Livingston Counties, Missouri." In my pursuit, I have found the articles in county histories invaluable, and I have secured complete copies of all I could find. I have to piece this information together, and a very small detail, a word, a sentence, a name, may mean much somtimes.

It is somewhat likely too that your certificate from the Adjutant General of New Jersey as to Capt. Duncan McVicker differs somewhat from mine, perhaps it is far more complete. Hence, I would very greatly appreciate it if you would copy it word for word with all dates exactly and including the date it was issued. A copy of your certificate may afford me some basis of comparison and may give me some significant additional fact. Being made by a different officer at a different time, it may contain something more than does mine.

I intend to make some preliminary statements from time to time. I hastily typed one last night from hurried occasion to send to a correspondent who may use it to make a search for me in New Jersey. It is not very good but I will enclose a carbon copy for you, but will be glad to send you a better summary when I draw one later on.

Your information bears internal evidence to me that Mary McVicker was a daughter of Capt. Duncan McVicker. You may accept the fact of Nancy McCollum being the wife of Duncan McVicker. I have so doubt of it after having searched extensively. Howevers in my own work I shall continue to try to get more information. I fully believe this will prove the matter more conclusively. A large number of ladies have alreads entered the D.A.R. on this basis. It is evident to me that there are many facts to be discovered if indeed they can be discovered. I would like to get more records of the Duncan McVicker family in New Jersey and also of the McCollum family in New Jersey. I have a large correspondence with members of both families, that is descendants. They have sent me much information. So far, however, I have not been able to exactly locate the town or exact place of residence of either family in New Jersey. If I could do that I would have a concentrated search made there and in all county and church records thereof.

But your letter illustrates the fact that there are people here and there over the country who are descendants, and who can add more facts. There are probably family records in some persons' possession which would be very valuable. I have sought all that any of them have and can give me from time to time and shall continue to do so.

I will enclose a blank which I request you to kindly fill out as far as you can and return. I do not expect to charge any one for the work I plan, because I do not know how soon or how well I can finish it, and I do not wish to become obligated. I follow this as a pleasureable project of research, ever expecting to make some "lucky strike" of additional information. So far the project has rewarded me with many new facts, but has remained far harder to push to completion than I supposed such a search would prove. But as long as I can make progress, which I do with almost every inquiry sent, the time will come when I will have a very presentable array of facts. I have now as to Bedford County, Pa. I have more information than I can use myself in its present form as to that county and I need to arrange it and write it all out connectedly. It would probably supprise even myself. A lady searched through the courthouse of that county and sent me everything she could find about any McVicker names.

Dr. Thomas Huston McBride was President of the State University of Iowa and a long-time professor of Botany there. He was born at Rogersville, Tenn., July 31, 1848. He graduated from Monmouth College (111.) in 1869. Might he be related to your family? My home was in Iowa City, Iowa, before I came down here to teach law in the University of Kentucky this year for Dean Evans who is on leave of absence and attending graduate courses at Harvard Law School.

Please note the facts related in the enclosed copy referred to.

I will endeavor to obtain some information from Romney, W. Va.

It may be that Mary McVicker was born in New Jersey and not in Ireland.

My understanding up to this time has been that Duncan McVicker came
to the United States and settled in New Jersey as early as 1757 and that
he was 18 years old at that time. The primary source of my information
on this point has been pr. Winters <u>Duncan Hamaker</u>, who is \$2 grandson of
Alexander McVicker, of Bedford County, Pa. Dr. Hamaker is a grandson
of Duncan McVicker who was a son of Alexander McVicker. Capt. Duncan
McVicker lived in his old age with his son Alexander on a farm near
Schellsburg, Bedford County, Pa., and died there, in 1818. The grandson Duncan knew Capt. Duncan McVicker for about 19 years since this
grandson was born in 1799 (died in 1879). Dr. Hamaker lived in an
adjoining house to his grendfather Duncan McVicker (1793-1879) for
about the first 20 years of his (Pr. Hamaker's life) and often heard
his own grandfather relate the recollections told him by the grandfather
of this grendfather (Capt. Duncan McVicker-1739-1816). I have thus
corresponded extensively with the grandson of the grandson of Capt.
Duncan McVicker, who is an aged man, a retired physician now living
in Los Angeles, Gal., with his own son who is also a physician.
Thus I have the personal recollections of a good witness who until he
was about of age lived with his grandfather Duncan McVicker (17991879) who in turn until he was about of age lived with the original
Capt. Duncan McVicker and often related the recollections told him
by the Captain about Valley Forge and his experiences in the Revolution.
Dr. Hamaker writes sketches and sends them on to me for filing. I try
to keep him at it, and he evidently enjoys doing this. He addresses me
as "Dear Cousin" because he says I am a better correspondent than his
own first cousins. I will relate to him about your and my correspondence
and he will be interested. Dr. Hamaker's family, his parents, a son,

It may have been that instead of Mary (Polly) McVicker having been born in Ireland that it was her mother, Nancy McCollum, who was born there. The McCollum family as well as the McVicker family came from Scotland, but the McCollum family of some of them may have lived in Ireland intermediately. Duncan McVicker came to New Jersey by way of the North of Ireland and may have lived there a while intermediately, and may have married Nancy McCollum after the McCollum family came to New Jersey.

My father had a sister, Mary McVicker, who married John Morgan at Morgantown, (W) Va. in 1828. She was called Polly and sometimes Pop. I am well acquainted with this family.

My father had a sister Jane McVicker who married \_\_\_\_\_Wolverton and they lived in Ohio. They had a son, Aaron Norvel Wolverton, who was last heard of in Texas. I do not know where in Ohio they lived.

My father had a sister Lucinda McVicker who married Corbly Garard in Monroe County, Ohio. They moved to Iowa. His sister Mary McVicker who married John Morgan, son of David Morgan and Mary Prudence Morgan, also lived in Monroe County Ohio, and the family later moved to Iowa.

My father Norvel Wilson McVicker was in Ohio with these relatives for a while in his 'teens. He told me that he had an uncle in Ohio, but did not know or tell me his name. My father also had a brother, Aaron McVicker, who lived in Ohio, just where I do not know. All these relatives who lived in Ohio either moved away or died there, and so my father did not know of any of them or descendants of them living there at the time of his death (1923). However, you may have heard of some of them, or have some reference to some of them, but likely not.

I will be glad to get the information (a copy of it) which was given you by the Librarian of the National D.A.R. Society, and to have also copies of the following:

Dear Mrs. Gifford:

Your letter of January 24, 1936, to Mrs. Alberta McVicker Whidden, of 1009 Elmwood Ave., Wilmette, Illinois, has just been received by me today, from Mrs. Whidden, she being a cousin through descent from an uncle of my father, and she thought that perhaps we might be able to unravel facts to our mutual satisfaction.

Tam intensely interested in your letter and am very anxious to reply to you at once in the hope of mutual helpfulness and to obtain all information I may from you. I should state that for some time I have been very greatly interested in searching the genealogy of Duncan McVicker, who was a Captain in the Second Regiment of Sussex County New Jersey Militia in the War of the American Revolution. I note your statement that he is said to have been a Lieutenant. I have checked that fact and find the following: That he was commissioned as Lieutenant in the Second Regiment of Sussex County New Jersey Militia. However, I have found the firm tradition of the descendants of two of his sons that he was promoted as Captain. The records of New Jersey and the records of the Government at Washington do not yield results in confirmation of that statement. However, Capt. Duncan McVicker evidently served throughout the War of the Revolution and beyond his service in the New Jersey Regiment. That record is not shown in the New Jersey State records. And it can not be found in the U. S. Government records, for the reason that when the British burned the Capitol of the United States in the War of 1812 that one wing of that building with government records of the Revolution was burned. However, the tradition has been handed down and carefully checked by me, coming from descendants of two of his sons, from West Virginia and Pennsylvania, respectively, that Capt. Duncan McVicker served as a paymaster in Washington's Army, that he served with Washington at Valley Forge, and while I have subjected these statements to every test of evidence that I could, I have come to believe and to accept them. I could almost write a book on this whole subject, if I did not hold myself down to a letter, and in fact I do intend to continue my searches as fast as I am able to do so and to publish the results and put them into all the State Libraries, D. A. R. Libraries, etc. But that mey be some time hence, for the collection of material is slow work, esp

The traditional record is that he came from Scotland by way of the North of Ireland to New Jersey with three of his brothers in 1757 (when he was 18 years old), that he lived in the Scotch-Irish settlement in Northern New Jersey, that he went into the War and served as stated, that not long after the War that he with seven (7)

sons went to Bedford County, Pennsylvania, and settled there. This brings us down to the known and official record. The U. S. Census of 1790 shows that Capt. Duncan McVicker was living in Bedford County Pa., as head of a family, with 2 males over 16, 5 males under 16, and three females in his family. That is all the information that records yields but it partly answers your question as to whether he had a daughter, and I believe that he had. I am a great grandsom of Duncan McVicker, my father being Morvel Wilson McVicker, who was born at Morgantown, W. Va., Sept. 8, 1827, and his father being Joseph McVicker, whose date of birth I do not have but who had a family of 12-6 boys and 6 girls (my father the youngest). I have an official return of Joseph McVicker as a Constable of Bedford County, Pa., made out in 1799. My father was thus a grandson of Capt. Duncan McVicker, through his father Joseph McVicker, who was a son of Capt. Duncan McVicker. My father was orphaned in his 13th or 14th year, and came west from Morgantown, Virginia, living successively in Ohio, Indiana, Illinois, and in Iowa, where I was born, of his third wife. He lived to the age of 96 (1923). My father was thus not able to state much about his family and that left me curious to learn more. In 1901 he went to visit in Morgantown after being away for 60 years. From what he and my brother learned I have been working on this from time to time since then. Father's Uncle James McVicker, who once owned about 3000 acres of land near Morgantown, left many descendants, very substantial and honorable people, who of course have scattered out over the country, although several are living in that vicinity. I visited Morgantown for 2 or 3 days last summer and improved the time to gather all I could find out.

I have finally pieced together the names of the seven sons of Capt. Duncan McVicker but do not have the names of any of his daughters, except your suggestion that one was named Mary, or Aunt Polly. I should like to know all about her and herdescendants. I have traced families of four of these sons in a general way, but have 2 or 3 of them to trace-Duncan McVicker Jr. and John McVicker. Father said that an uncle of his settled in Ohio, but he did not know his first name. I have learned that there was a Duncan McVicker living in Cowington, Ky. in 1810 and that a John McVicker bought land in this state in 1807. I am thinking of paying a searcher of records to try to find out more about them as this corresponds with the two missing sons.

Duncan McVicker may have lived in North of Ireland for a time but all I have on that is the tradition that he with three brothers came to America by way of North of Ireland, and probably did not stop in Ireland long, but that ds indefinite information, which much of this now is.

For a long time I worried about the name of the wife of Capt. Duncan McV-cker because I had two names--Nancy McCullom and Annie Laurie, the one being handed down from the West Virginia branch and the other coming from the descendants of the Pennsylvania branch. While I may get more definite information, I have come to accept as a fact that Nancy McCollum was the wife and mother of his children, and I believe that he married her in New Jersey and that she died there before he came to Pennsylvania after the Revolution.

Capt. Duncan McVicker is buried in the cemetery about a quarter of a mile west of Schellsburg, Bedford County, Pa., and last summer I visited his grave and copied the **inscription** from his monument. It stated after his name:

"1739 Capt. Duncan McVicker, 2d New Jersey Line, Revolutionary War 1818"

"His Wife Annie Laurie" Note that it gives no dates for her. From all evidence I believe that she was never in Pennsylvania but died in New Jersey. Her name was secured by a lady who went to New Jersey to make the search for information because the Pennsylvania branch did not have the name and they (or she) wished to put the name on the monument. She is not buried there although her name thus appears on that monument. Furthermore, I believe that her name as thus given is (1) fanciful, or (2) a pet name by which she was called, or (3) that her full name was Annie Laurie McCollum (maiden name) but that she was called Nancy instead of Annie just as the people of those days called girls named Elizabeth by the name of betty or Betsy. Much investigation of this has caused me to believe that the real name of the wife who was the mother of his children was Nancy (Annie Laurie) McCollum. I have traced this back within the memory of people now living to 75 or 80 years ago. It is very surely given by the West Vibginia branch. Their printed records in that state give that name (Nancy McCollum) back over half a century ago, and a wealth of corroborative evidence has caused me to accent that name. I believe that Nancy McCollum and April to accept that name. I believe that Nancy McCollum and Annie Laurie are the same person. Thus, I have gone back of the monument and have found who put the name down on the monument as Annie Laurie and how she found the name (going to New Jersey to get it). This information I have in letters from her brother, a kinsman with whom I correspond and who in writing me (at age of 75) often with sketches of his recollections for my use. He is a blind retired physician who formerly served as Secretary of the Pennsylvania State Board of Health, now living in Los Angeles, and whom I owe a letter and must write him soon, for he is a regular contributor to my storehouse of collections of sketches and recollections about the Descendants of Duncan McVicker. He is a great great grandson and was born at Schellsburg, Pa. His sister who searched out the name of Annie Laurie, going to New Jersey to get information, is now in a sanitarbum, so that I cannot hear from here. She wrote me letters last Spring and I called to see her at Washington last sugmer but she had been afflicted three days before and went to the sanitarium. From her I had hoped to learn the sources of her information when she made her searches. She is a very aged lady, formerly a civil service employe at Washington.

Now perhaps I had better not write too much. I have answered some of your questions and will be glad to give you any and all information. You can accept the name of Nancy McCollum as the name of Capt. Duncan McVicker's wife. It is abundantly evidenced as correct.

I wish that upon receiving this that you would write me soon.

I would like all information you can furnish me about your branch.

We are evidently both descendants of the same Capt. Duncan McVicker of Sussex County N.C. militia. Please give me a copy of his war service as complete as you have it for comparison with mine, perhaps affording me some additional information. Please write soon, and please give me all information as I value it very highly.

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

Dear Mrs. Satterthwaite:

Your receipt and kind note therewith received. Thank you.

I am interested in your theory, but doubt if we can find the record to substantiate it. It goes on the assumption that we can harmonize the discrepancies by assuming that all sources of my information are virtually correct.

I am writing you this preliminary note because I can not take time to prepare the careful abstract of all information I have, but I will attempt\*a running summary of what I have.

The names of Duncan McVicker's wife or wives have come to me through different channels: The one you gave, Jean McConnell, is the only mention I have of her. It seemed to me that there might be another Duncan McVicker who married her, since your records bore internal evidence of there being McVickers in New Jersey earlier than the Capt. Duncan McVicker with three brothers is said to have come over from Scotland (via North Ireland) with three brothers when he was 18 years of age in 1757.

I mistrust dates and particulars, since records of otherwise high credibility differ in particulars such as dates, even places of burial, etc. That is because, as I think, that said records are partly traditional in origin. They have an authentic origin, but they get twisted. So the information you have furnished may be correct as to Jean McConnell being a wife of my great grandfather, Dumcan McVicker.

The name first furnished me, Nancy McCollum, is that given as the name of Captain Duncan McVicker's wife by the descendants of his son, James McVicker, who went from Bedford County, Pa., to Monongalia County Virginia (now a part of Mest Virginia) and settled near Morgantown in said County, and opened a tavern near Morgantown about 1800. I should have stated that this James McVicker who was an uncle of my father and with whom my father lived a while in early boyhood, came to Monongalia County about 1793. Record obtained by my brother in 1901 from a tombstone at the grave of James McVicker show that he was born Jan. 16, 1768, died Oct. 31, 1852, aged 84 years 9 mos. 15 days. This record I accept because personally secured by my brother on a visit at Morgantown with my father in 1901 and written down in a careful notebook which he kept, on the spot, together with a very complete account including much other record. We have this notebook. My brother was then about 21, my father about 74. My brother was then a newspaper foreman and had been a teacher and was one of the most careful notetakers I ever knew. When I visited there last this summer, the monument was gone, and none of the descendants had this record but some of them took it down from my records, secured by me from my brother's notes made in 1901.

The reason I have dwelt on this fact of the age of James McVicker is because that of all the numerous descendants of James McVicker who have joined the D. A. R., none of them have given in their records any date as to James McVicker except the date of his death, 1852. And none of them with whom I have corresponded or whom I have seen, both in the home vicinity at Morgantown and elsewhere, have ever been able to give me these dates which I had already obtained through my brother from the old tombstone at my father's Uncle James McVicker's grave in 1901. This stone together with several others in the private burying ground on the old McVicker farm have been stolen from the grave lot.

But this date is thus credibly fixed as the birth of James McVicker in 1768--evidently he was born in New Jersey.

The traditional account is that Duncan McVicker with 7 sons went from New Jersey to Bedford County, Pa., after his service in the Revolution. The tradition is that some man in New Jersey who saw them as they were leaving thought it was so remarkable that he had these 7 sons that he placed a new hat on the head of each one of the 7 sons.

The claim that Nancy McCollum was the wife does not come to me at all through my father who never saw his grandfather, Capt. Duncan McVicker. My father was the youngest of 12 children, was born near Morgantown, 1827, his mother dying when he was 5 or 6 years old at Salem, W. Va., and his father, Joseph McVicker, brother of said James McVicker, dying when father was 13 or 14 years old. Father went west to homes of sisters and brothers in Ohio and never returned to West Virginia until 60 years afterward, when my younger brother Harry took him on the trip to his old boyhood home.

The claim of Nancy McCollum as wife of Duncan McVicker appears in a sketch on page 658 in Wiley's History of Monongalia County, West Virginia, published in 1883, and said sketch was personally transcribed by me from said book in Morgantown last July. That places the claim back in a printed book published over 52 years ago. One of the soms of said James McVicker was George Washington McVicker who married Mary Ann St. Clair on April 26, 1835. He was born June 16, 1812, died May 9, 1847, and his wife Mary Ann St. Clair was born March 20, 1809, died May 1, 1887. I have personally talked with "Aunt" Cosby McCollum, a maiden lady of 91 years of age at Hopwood near Uniontown, Fayette County, Pa., last July, who stated to me that she knew this family and played with the children of George Washington McVicker and Mary Ann St. Clair McVicker, went to Sunday school with the children whose names she recollected, etc., and she stated that Marya Ann St. Clair McVicker had told her at different times that the McVicker and McCollum families were interrelated by a marriage of a McVicker and McCollum. As this was a long long time ago, when she thus told her, it is strong corroborative evidence that the wife of Capt. Duncan McVicker was a McCollum since no other intermarriage has been found between a McVicker and a McCollum and it comes from the scene and would be reasonably certain at the time of the transaction narrated. the undoubted belief that the wife was Nancy McCollum. A daughter of this George Washington McVicker (the second one named) said in a letter to me of July 28, 1935: "There is no reasonable doubt about my great great grandmother's name being Nancy McCollum. My grandfather who was her grandson always said so, and the received his information from his father who was her son. Then, too, Judge Marshall Hagans (of Morgantown, W. Va.) always said that we were related to him through the McCollums. About 3d cousins I believe. His mother was Jane McCollum, sixth daughter of Ensign Daniel McCollum. She was married to Enxign Harrison Hagans in 1818.

"Daniel McCollum's father was James McCollum. He had four known brothers and one sister, namely, John McCollum, Alexander McCollum, Reuben McCollum, Daniel McCollum, and Mary McCollum. James McCollum after living in North Carolina returned to New Jersey where one or more of his brothers lived. At the beginning of the Revolution he was living in York County, Pa.

"My grandfather always said that Duncan McVicker was a paymaster in Washington's army. That his father James McVicker had often told him about seeing Duncan paying off the soldiers. I have never been able to verify this as all records wareadsates and the soldiers. pertaining to the Revolution were destroyed when the British burned the capitol in 1812.

"The name McCollum is a corruption of the name McCallum, or Maelcoluim, or Malcolm." . . .

This lady who is a daughter of Capt. George Washington McVicker who served in the Civil War on the Union side from W. In conclusion of this phase, I have now given you a resume of some of my evidence that the name of the wife was Nancy McCollum.

The third phase opens with the name of Annie Laurie. As to the credibility of the record, it appears in the name of the monument at Capt. Duncan McVicker's grave in the cemetery at Schellsburg, Bedford County, Pa., where I have seen the name and have the transcription of the record on this rather remarkable monument. I also have the history of the monument. It was erected by a great granddaughter of Alexander McVicker (1773-1832) who was one of the sons of Capt. Duncan McVicker. She being a maiden lady, a civil service clerk at Washington, D.C., and desirous of erecting the monument, made a trip to Trenton, Therhaps elserdue a New Jersey, and there procured the name of the wife as Annie Laurie. Her brother states that she gave him the name of the wife as Miss Laurie as he has remembered. The family was a substantial one. An old monument is also on the lot, one erected by a grandson of Capt. Duncan McVicker and shows the dates of Capt. Duncan McVicker as 1739-1818. The large monument to which I have referred has the names of ten members of the McVicker and Hamaker families thereon.

The material part of that record for you and I is as follows:

#### His Wife Annie Laurie

The above appears inscribed on said monument as I have seen.
You will readily see from these facts why I have concluded that
his wife did not come from New Jersey with him, as she was
probably deceased in New Jersey prior to his coming. If not, or who we have a dates not given for her, and why can we get no other
trace of any wife of his in Pennsylvania?
And why did this lady who erected the monument have to go to
New Jersey to research out the name of his wife if she had
ever come to Pennsylvania at all? Would she not have left
some more impress in Bedford County if she had ever been there?
My conclusion has been that the Pennsylvania branch (Alexander
McVicker line) did not have the record of the Captain's wife
and that her name was forgotten by the time that this lady
wished to place the name of the Captain's wife on the monument
which she erected and paid for herself out of her own funds.
I called to see this lady last summer (74 yrs of age) but her
mind having failed she had been taken to a sanitarium a short
time before. She was born and raised in Schellsburg, Bedford Co., Pa.,

near the place of the monument which she erected.

Pennsylvania Census of the U. S. 1790 shows Duncan McVicker in Bedford County having family of two males over 16, 5 males under 16, and 3 females, one of those over 16 probably being himself. It shows in nearby Mifflin County another "Duncan McVicar" having family of one male over 16, and three females, probably himself, wife and 2 girls. It is suggested that he may have been one of the sons of Capt. Duncan McVicker as he had a son Duncan whom I have been unable to otherwise trace, and his inclusion is needed to make out the number of 8 males including himself in Capt. Duncan McVicker's family. The 3 females I am at a loss to account for, except on the theory that Capt. Duncan McVicker had 3 daughters, or else after all that's that he did have a wife in Pennsylvania, then his wife and 2 daughters would make up this census enumeration as to females. But I incline to believe he must have had some daughters, probably 3, of whom this is the only information I have ever found.

In the century and more than a quarter little remains to obtain in Pennsylvania or in West Virginia, although I suppose I may ascertain far more than I have as I get time to devote in this direction.

A dk hollow, descendant Wilbur & Hagans suggests Basking Ridge as a house of his distilling relatives and therestone. I one of the places suggested is Basking Ridge, New Jersey, which I think is in Morris County, or nearby.

The History of Sussex County shows that Duncan McVicker went from there to serve in the Revolution. He belonged to the Sussex County militia.

In the letter appearing on page 3 of this letter as copied are given the names of the McCollum brothers who came from Scotland. They likely lived in Northern New Jersey.

Duncan McVicker may himself have lived in Trenton a while after the War and have gone from there to Pennsylvania.

Page 248 of the History of Newton County New Jersey gives a sketch of Jacob McColtam who was a substantial citizen and a member of the legislature of New Jersey in 1778, of the County Committe of Safety in 1775, etc. Nancy McCollum may have been related to his family.

The History of Morris County New Jersey published 1914 shows a prominent citizen there, Charles McCollum, postmaster of Morristown, etc.

All theories (yours, mine, and others) agree that Annie Laurie must have been a given name. However, who can tell?

Upon receiving yours of November 5 I replied at some length giving you a summary of what information I have but I have not since heard from you.

I was then particularly interested in getting your opinion of what you thought the probabilities were of obtaining further information through the records or any personal researches to be made in New Jersey.

I wonder if information may be obtained of the McCollum family in New Jersey from whom Nancy McCollum may have been descended.

As near as I can think, Buncan McVicker must have first been married in Sussex County or perhaps in some nearby county. There is some indication that there were McCollums in or near Basking Ridge., that there was a Scotch Irish settlement in North New Jersey south of the Holland settlement and that the McCollum family or families may have lived therein.

I would like to have your opinion on what you think the chances are of obtaining further information and in accordance with the questions submitted in my letter in November. I have kept thinking that I would probably soon hear from you, but of course do not know if you are giving this matter any attention or not.

I have a sen, Benjamin F. McVicker, living in Philadelphia, who was last August honorably discharged from a four years enlistment term of service in the Navy. He sometimes goes to Trenton, but I think he is now employed in a factory in Philadelphia. If he were again not employed for some time, I might get him to make a personal trip to Newton, Basking Ridge, and around, and to make specific inquiries for me according to instructions I could send him. I might have him call and see you, but at present I think he is employed.

I received your letter of January 20, 1936, among other things saying:

"I went through the 5 volumes of Abstract of Wills printed-I did "that today and send an outline.

"I think the three brothers who came from Swotland were James,

"James will tell us in his will--I imagine that James is the eldest
"brother. I will also look among the records at the Adj. Gen.-"I think all that would cost \$10. But I will make it as reasonable

I have been delayed in replying in full (although I sent two postal cards) until I could make up an abstract of collections for your use and reference in relaion to your search in New Jersey.

Replying first to your last specific question, "When was Joseph born?" He was my grandfather, but my father being orphaned at 13 or 14 and joining the pioneer westward movement with relatives, he may not have known. At least he never told me his father's age, but fixed the death of his father about 1840-1841. Father was next to the youngest of 12 children and he was born Sept. 8, 1827, died 1923. Father's sister Mary McVicker was born 1811 married John Morgan at Morgantown, (W) Va. 1828. Joseph McVicker was a constable in Bedford County, Pa., in 1799, according to a copy of a "Return as Constable, "which I have. The brother of Joseph McVicker, James McVicker, was born in 1768, presumably in New Jersey. Another brother of Joseph, Alexander McVicker, was born in 1773. Other facts which you may wish will appear in the abstracts which will enclose.

Duncan McVicker must have married in New Jersey and I think his 7 sons and 2 or 3 daughters were born there—exact locality unknown to me, but think he lived in North New Jersey, he served in £d Regiment Sussex County Militia, and I have suggestions and have found implications of Basking Ridge as a likely home of the McVickers and McCollums or perhaps that vicinity. Also McVickers and McCollums lived in Northampton County, Pennsylvania, across the river from New Jersey—all these regions being nearby.

The search for the McCollum family in New Jersey offers possibilities for the desired record. Cumulative and cumulating evidence convinces me that Nany McCollum was the name of Capt.Duncan's wife. Your suggestion and others' that Nancy McCollum and Annie Laurie were one and the same person seems most probable to me. Descendants of Duncan's son, James McVicker, claim positively that Nancy McCollum was his wife. This claim is corroborated in so many respects in my search that I can hardly doubt it. James McVicker lived 1768-1852.

The name Annie Laurie has had but one person as voucher: she as a great great granddaughter descended from Duncan's son, Alexander McVicker (1773-1852), desired to erect a monument to Capt. Duncan McVicker, which she very laudably did (inscriptions enclosed in abstract herewith). She did not get the hame Annie Laurie from the traditions of her family, indeed they had all probably lost the name of Capt. Duncan McVicker's wife who had probably died in New Jersey even sometime before he moved to Pennsylvania. But she wished to place on that monument the name of the wife, perhaps only the given name was desired. At any rate she went to New Jersey where she made some ressarches and reported the name thereafter as Miss Laurie to her brother and had the name placed on that monument as annie Laurie. This is first hand information, authentic to the utmost, but it is all I can get—only she and her aged brother are living—the brother writes me but he was not then on the scene and has given all that he knows to me, which is that his sister so searched and so reported the name after searching in New Jersey. The sister was then a civil service employe—she is now quite aged and has suffered a mental breakdown (last June) and is in a sanitarhum, and one may not now take up this cuestion with her. Should I be advised hereafter that I may do so, I would ask her where she secured this information, but if it was in Trenton, you will find the source most likely. This lady planned and paid for the monument herself, probably a couple of decades ago. Undoubtedly, she was entirely conscientious to the utmost. I think the name may have been Annie Laurie McCollum.

The name Jean McConnell coming from your report may be the wife of another Duncan. Duncan was quite a common name. In my abstracts you will come across the name of a Duncan McVicar in the Census of 1730-Mifflin County-and in the page on Cumberland County of Pa. Acclines Your solution that Nancy McCollum and Annie Laurie were the same person, first wife, mother of the family, who died, and that Duncan then married Jean McConnell, who did not live long and perhaps died before Duncan and his family moved to Pennsylvania, may be the real answer.







I note you are getting all files of WHO'S WHO material out so as to be ready for action. My write-up will suggest your putting in many points perhaps. This from their practice as specialists. However, a well-known thing like laryngitis is in some of the good medical books. I have in the past gone to some of the medical books in the office of Dr. Smith. I have a line on some of his descendants and will later edit up a sketch of his branch. His wife was named Eve. He dealt in land and sold lots in the vanished town of "Clarksburgh," Bedford County, a map or plat of which I sent you long ago.

Some of the notes typed of my trip last year, Masontown, Pa. I have not assembled all of my notes even yet, but have this done.

Letter of John W. Williard, old friend of Ashbel Fairchild Hill and James R. Hill, a very old man, and a very fine letter (original comprised many pages, but it is all typed on this one paper).

Certificate (copy of official) of Jeremiah Hill, secured 1935. This is all right for the military record, but if one tried to use it to join the Daughters or the Sons of the American Revolution, he would have to produce the name of the wife who was the mother of James Hill and that is still under investigation by me and others. Nobody has ever joined the organization on the record of Jeremiah Hill, so there is no previous record in the Lineage books. This last information came to me in a letter from the Librarian—General D.A.R. Washington within the past few days.

The record of the Regiment of Jeremiah Hill, the Third Pennsylvania Regiment, ContinentallLime, American Revolution. A person will have to read between the lines from Creat Grandfather Jeremiah Hill's long service for the part he played in this. They had a very hard time to get this sketch up and there is supposedly nothing further at all as to the individual record of Jeremiah Hill to be found. He got paid depreciated money. A fine stone was erected at his grave by the Fayette County Soldiers' Association. Mrs. Mickey thinks his sister Martha Hill was buried by his side and she thinks that James and

Martha Hill were buried at Old Frame. In looking through Ellis' History of Fayette County, a book of 840 pages, printed in 1880, that sold at twelve dollars per copy, It refers to A.F.Hill in these words: "Ashbel Fairchild Hill was born Oct. 23, 1842 and died at the close of the Presidential campaign Nov. 7, 1876. He was a member of Capt. Cyrus L. Connor's Company and lost a limb in the war. During his soldiering he wrote "Our Boys," later he wrote "The White Rocks," "Secrets of the Sanctum," and several romances for literary papers."


If I remember correctly he lost his leg in the battle, of Antietam or South Mountain. I stopped once there an my way to Gettsburg. Mr. Hill took an active part in the Democratic campaign for Tilden and Hendricks, as a speaker. The last time I saw him alive was at a Democratic meeting where he was the speaker and I was a secretary. He worked on newspapers in Philadelphia and California. He wrote up the grafting of one William "Bill" Man of Philadelphia. He put the two words together and made it read "Billma n." Suit was brought for damages. "Bill" Man lost the case. A "black bird" is not a "blackbird."

James Rufus Hill was a bright boy. He was great on "ghost" stories. At school he was a fine reader. A.F.Hill was a schoolmate of my brother-in-law, A. S. Richey, who died at the age of 93 years. He said "Ash" Hill kept the children excited with his stories. The patrons talked of keeping him out school.

The Kefovers have been substantial citizens in Fayette County. number of their descendants have been farmers, carpenters and teachers.

No returns of this regiment have been found, and with the exception of a few letters that relate to the regiment incidentally, nothing upon which to be se any account at length. Formed on the be sis of the second battalion (Col. St. Clair's), it was recruited in December 1776, January and February, 1777, and arranged in the Continental service March 12, 1777. The health of Col. Joseph Wood was impaired by wounds received in the Canada campaign, which induced his resignation. He resided in Jonestown, now in Lebanon County, in 1785, and died there December 12, 1788, aged 65 years. His son, Dr. William Wood, practiced medicine at Jonestown, for a long time, and died there.

Col. Thoma's Craig succeeded him in the command, retiring only in January, 1783. He died in Allentown, Lehigh County, Penn'a, January 30, 1832, aged 92. He is to be distinguished from Capt. Thomas Craig, of Baxter's batta lion, who was one of the commissioners of purchase, for Bucks County, in 1780, having rank of colonel in the militia.

Of Lieut. Col. Rudolph Bunner, formerly a captain in the second batta lion, James McHenry, afterwards Secretary of War, says in a letter written a few days after the battle of Monmouth, "On our part, Lieut. Col. Bunner was killed, having very much distinguished himself on the field."

A letter dated April 17, 1780, has the following account of Maj. Thomas Langhorne Byles' death:

"Yesterday morning, a detachment of 200 Continental troops, under the command of Maj. Byles, stationed at Paramus, was suddenly a ttacked by a party of the enemy, consisting of 200 horse and 400 foot. The attack commenced a little after sunrise. Maj. Byles besides his usual patrols had that morning sent out two parties, each with a commissioned officer, but such is the situation of that part of the country, intersected with roads, and inhabited chiefly by disaffected people, that all precautions failed. The sentinels near the quarters, were the first that gave notice of the enemy's approa ch. He immediately made the best disposition the hurry of the moment would permit, and animated his men by his exhertation

and example. The house he was in was surrounded. Some of the men began to cry for quarters; others, obeying the command of the officers, continued to fire from the windows. The enemy upbraided them with the perfidy of asking for quarters, and persisting in resistance.

Maj. Byles denied, in a dtermined tone, that he had called for quarter; but his resolution did not avail. A surrender took place, and, in the act, the Major received a mortal wound, with which he expired.

Lieuts. Clentworth and Sherman had thrown themselves into the Major's quarters, and assisted in the defense. That latter was wounded, Lieut. Bryson being a few days before detached by Maj. Byles to the new bridge, defended that post with great gallantry, but, overpowered, he surrendered. He received great attention from the enemy on account of his bravery. Such of the detachment as could be collected, aided by a few militia, hung on the rear of the enemy, retaking four wagons and 19 horses. The enemy made their boasts that as Maj. Byles did not present the hilt of his sword in front when surrendering, they shot him."

Gen. Hand, on the 22d of A pril, recommended George Trucker of the Fourth, "as an old and experienced officer, and one in every respect qualified to fill the vacancy with credit to the Line," but the rank was accorded to Capt. William Alexander, of the 7th Pennsylvania.

In July, 1778, the 12th Pennsylvania, which had been reduced to a skeleton regiment by exposures as a picket regiment, being largely composed of riflemen, was incorporated with the Third; and, on January 17, 1781, the Third was reorganized, under Col. Craig, and, after recruiting at Easton, accompanied Gen. Wayne, upon the Southern campaign or, at least, the largest portion of it, being detached for that purpose.

Capt. James Chrystie was born in Edinburgh, Scotland, in 1750. Came to Pennsylvania in 1775. On the discovery of Arnold's plot at West Point, he was detached especially by Gen. Washington to visit all the posts. He served until the end of the war, and was said to be the oldest captain in service, except one. He was the father of Lieut. Col. James Chrystie, of 15th U.S. Infantry, who distinguished himself at Queenstown in the War of 1812-1814. They were both dead in 1824.

Capt. Thomas Butlet, at the battle of Brandywine, received the thanks of Gen. Washington on the field for rallying a detachment of retreating troops. He was a major at St. Clair's defeat, and had his leg broken by a ball, and it was with great difficulty that his surviving brother, Capt. Edward Butler, got him off the field. In 1794, he was promoted lieutenant colonel commandant to sub-legion, and, in 1802, on reduction of the army, he was continued as colonel. He died September 7, 1805, aged 51.

"On Friday, March 14, 1902, she had a paralytic stroke and although a li was done that could be done for her yet it was without avail. On Mednesday morning at 4 o'clock God called her home and she left us to join . . . .

HISTORY OF BEDFORD, SOMERSET AND FULTON COUNTIES, PENNSYLVANIA (1884)

JOSEPH COVODE, M.D. (Portrait, Facing Page 430)

Dr. Covode, one of the oldest practing physicians in the county of Somerset, was born in Ligonier valley, Westmoreland county, Pennsylvania, August 14, 1822. Garret Covode, the progenitor of the family, was a native of Amsterdam, Holland. When a child he was kidnapped in the streets of his native city by a sea-captain, who brought him to Philadelphia and under a then existing law sold him into bondage as a "redemptioner," in which condition he was held for some years after arriving at manhood, and was employed as a domestic servant in the household of Gen. Washington. After the completion of his term of servitude he went to York county, and from thence to Westmoreland, where he resided until his decease, which occurred in 1826, at the advanced age of ninety-four years. During the war of the Revolution he served his adopted country, but in what capacity or for what length of time is not known. The name of Garrett Covode does not necessarily represent that of the Hollandish family from which he was born, as it was coined or originated by the sea-captain who stole him, any by him conferred upon the boy.

He reared a family of four children. Jacob, the only son, was born in York county, and grew to manhood in Westmoreland county. He was a pioneer in all that the name implies. He died at the age of eighty-two. He married Anna Updegraff. She was a Quakeress, and it is among the traditions of her family that two of her ancestors, uncles, together with a person named Wood, prepared and published a protest against the decision of William Penn, recognizing the legality of negro slavery. This protest is said to be the first anti-slavery manifesto published in this country. To them were born seven children, four sons and three daughters: Mary, John, Jacob, Susan, George W., Anna and Joseph. John, extensively known as one of the most prominent and able men in the commonwealth, was for many years member of congress. He led an active and useful life, and died in Westmoreland.

Joseph was reared on the farm of his father. He received an academical education, and at the age of twenty-two years began the study of medicine in the offic of br. George B. Fundenberg, of Pitts-burgh, graduating at the Pennsylvania Medical College at Philadelphia in 1849. Shortly after he came to Jenner Cross Roads, where for thirty-four years he has been actively engaged in the practice of his profession. For many years he was the only physician in the northwest portion of the county, his practice extending from near Johnstown, on the north, to near Somerset, a distance of twenty miles. But few practitioners have led a more active and useful life than Dr. Govode, or have attained a greater degree of success in the practice, and mone have secured a larger portion of public esteem. He possesses the essential qualities of the successful physician other than knowledge—firmmess and compassion blended with kindness and discretion.

Jeremia h Hil, my great grandfather (grandfather of my Mother), served throughout the Revolution in the Third Pennsylvania Line (1777-1781). I am working in my desire to compile the gensalogy of his families and of his descendants.

Jeremia h Hill was married three times and raised three families. His grandson, Mr. George D. Hill, 305 Church Street, Masontown, Pa., is descended from the third wife, ANNA HELMICK. I have interviewed him at Masontown and secured all the information which he says that he is able to give me. He is not informed much about the families of the former two wives and does not know their names.

I am a descendant of one of his first or second wives, I do not know which one. My mother was Margaret Emma Hill and she was a sister of Ashbel Fairchild Hill, the soldier-author-editor. Their parents were James Hill (1815-1859) and Martha (Kefover) Hill (1816-1867). Another brother of my Mother, Margaret Emma Hill, who was James Rufus Hill and for whom I was named, said that the mother of their father, James Hill (1816-1859) was \*Patricia Kefover.\*

Now this James Hill's (1816-1859) wife was Martha Kefover. She was often called "Patty," "Aunty Patty," and "Patty Hill." So it seems to me a confused idea of my Uncle James Rufus Hill that his grandmother was Patricia Kefover Hill when his own mother was Martha ("Patty") Kefover Hill. Even if this were true, I do not know how to place her as to ha ving been either the first or the second wife of Jeremiah Hill—that is the alleged Patricia Kefover, said to have been the wife of Jeremiah Hill. So it seems to me to me that it may be a mistake to have said that the wife of Jeremiah Hill who was the mother of James Hill(ma rried to Martha ("Patty") Kefover)was Patricia Kefover.

Furthermore, I have made research into the Kefover genealogy and I have found no other evidence that there was a Patricia Kefover who married Jeremiah Hill. If there was a Patricia Kefover, she was not a daughter of Philip Kefover Sr. (1789-1881) who settled (from Maryland) in Nicholson Township, Fayette County, Pa. He was the founder of the Kefover line in Fayette County, Pa., having 5 sons and 5 daughters. Nor was the said Patricia Kefover, if any such person, apparently a sister of Philip Kefover Sr., the list of his sisters having been carefully furnished to me after consultation with the Kefover relatives by my cousin, Miss Daisy Ophelia Springer, R.F.D. No. 2, Smithfield, Pa., as follows:

There is room for speculation that a cousin, niece, or other relative, or person other than a relative, perhaps a distant relative, married Jeremiah Hill and that her name was Patricia Kefover. I have a chart (not conclusive of course) of the Maryland County of Frederick KEFAUVER fa mily listing this family from the date of the advent of the 1mmigrant, Philip Kefauver, into Frederick County, Md., about 1750. Philip Kefover (1789-1881) apparently came from a family of his descendants—but no name of a Patricia Kefover is listed.

There could have been a Patricia Kefover who married Jeremiah Hill, but it is also probable that the name Patrcia Kefover ascribed as the name of a wife of Jeremiah Hill is a mistake. Besides there are two wives to be accounted for other than ANNA HELMICK, the third wife and grandmother of the aforesaid George D. Hill of Masontown. Jeremiah Hill lived to be 103 to 105 years old, as variously stated. He is buried in the Fairview Dunkard Church cemetery about one mile from Masontown, Pa. I do not think there is a monument to him. Jeremiah Hill died 1851-1858, as variously stated to me by relatives trying to fix the date from their own ages, as they though when he died. Upon diligent inquiry somewhat limited in time, I was unable to elicit information either at Masontown or at Uniontown. Names were referred to me as knowing about him, but upon being consulted they aid that they did not know—it was too far back for them, and the one they did know about was his son, Jaes Hill who as my grandfather. Upon diligent and numerous inquiries, I know of no living person whom I think knows anything about Jeremiah Hill. Only the historian or the record-seeker can find out. Doubtless some record exists somewhere. But I do not think he made a will. There was no record of vital statistics kept in Pennsylvania counties for those times—nor for long afterwards, until about the 1890's. Old writings, old Bibles might throw some light if they could be found.

However, you may be able to give me a suggestion as to some probable source of information on this matter.

Dear Mr. Kefauver:

I thank you for your letter and inclosures of August 15, 1957, and for those of July 16, 1957, all of your inquiries in which I will now endeavor to answer. Upon careful reading of these, I believe that you very well establish the connection between the Kefauver family of Maryland and the Kefover family of Fayette County, Pennsylvania, from the latter of which I am descended through my Mother, Margaret Emma Hill, who was a daughter of Martha (Kefover) Hill and James Hill.

I especially appreciate your thoroughgoing report and analysis dated July 29, 1937, and your evident interest in the genealogy, and I will gladly co-operate. I will gladly pass over to you shatever I can obtain on the Philip Refover (1789-1881) line and will appreciate your exchanges and outlines.

As you suggest, I am indebted to Miss Gladys Reference for considerable information in the way of charts and census reports especially; and since I take it that you are mutually interested, I will also send her a copy of this letter which will enable each of you to have it for your respective files and may save time and effort.

I will now endeavor to enswer your specific inquiries for data. As requested, I return to you one copy of the duplicate outline of the Kefover line in Pennsylvania but think it better instead of filling in on this outline to take up all points in detail, answering, commenting and correcting so that this will be complete as may be in itself.

I have the definite statement from Henry Stanton Kefover (b.1868), of Masontown, Pa., that the name of the father of Philip Kefover (1789-1881) was Jacob Refover, but he did not know the name of the mother of said Philip Kefover and he had no knowledge of the existence of the Family Bible or records, if any, of the said Philip Kefover. He supplied his information from his own recollection of family traditions. As yet, I have no other information of the said Jacob or of his supposed date of death, or of having been an invalid in his old age, except as suggested by you.

From sources of my visit to Fayette County (summer, 1935) and correspondence with others, I have a list of the sisters of Philip Refover (1783-1661) as follows: "Eva (Refover) Griffin, Matilda (Refover) Humbert, Jennie (Refover) Osburne, Betsy (Refover) Jaco, Hannah (Refover) Hertzog." This substantially corresponds with your list except that you have "Ibbie" instead of "Eve" Griffin, and you have "Hanna Linton"instead of "Hannah Hertzog." Perhaps the latter was married twice. You have two brothers of said Philipt James Refover and another (name unknown), but my informants never heard of any Obthers. Further, I note you have listed still another brother of said Philipt "George, settled in Virginia", but I have no other information as to him. In old data somewhere, I have a reference to a member of the Linton Family being a cousin of my uncle, Ashbel Fairchild Hill (1834-1876), and both being authors.

Your statement of the S marriages of Philip Mefover (1789-1881) corresponds with my information, except that I have the full name of his lat wife as "Ochelia Elizabeth Lucky," 2d being the same as you have, Phoebe Harper, and 5d as Delilah Boice (Bice, Bise, variously) and you have it Delilah Boyce.

In your column giving the names of the children of Philip Refover (1769-1881), your list of first given names is correct except for the one:
"8) Morgan (lost a leg in R.R. accident." This "Morgan" was not a child but a further descendant of Philip Refover (1769-1881). Instead of "Morgan" is the name of John Refover, not mentioned often nor hardly known because he died while quite young from having drank white whiskey in the field where it is supposed his elders were working and had this liquor where he found it.

I think that I will take up this list in detail and obser partly by way of comment and partly by way of enclosures:

"(1) James (Bachelor-went to lows)" --James Kefover (1811-1904), cliest son of Philip Kefover (1769-1881) married and had a family of at least 5 children, the descendants of one of whom at least survive. His cliest son, James Robinson Kefover (1854-1981) was a bachelor. See the 2-page cutline of the James Kefover (1811-1904) branch enclosed. This outline is about complete, except to say that I doubt if the wife of James Kefover (1811-1904), Susan was raised in the family of Gen. George Brinton McClellan or, even, that of his father, Dr. George McClellan, as narrated. That statement was made to me and I have sought to check its plausibility, and now think that the two orphan girls, sisters, mentioned were raised in some other family of similar name. Here is a town, McClellandtown in Fayette County, and I am inclined to think that the name of the family sought may have been McClelland. Hence, this outline, while fairly complete, is subject to needed revision. I lived neighboring the family of James Kefover (1811-1904) in Wilton, Iowa, until I was past 12 years of age, and then we moved about three counties further West in Iowa, to Sigourney, Meokuk Gounty, Iowa, in 1888.

"(2) William" — See page 5 of 20 page outline herewith enclosed. This was my first outline and has been in process of revision. The enclosed is rather complete in parts but also incomplete in other parts, but it may serve you in checking. Material is being collected to revise outline of William Refover.

"(5)"Albert"—This refers to Albert Gallatin Kefover. See page 7 of 292 page outline (very incomplete). The material has been collected for the most part for this outline, except for the descendants of Eving Hernando Kefover (1883-1826) who had 7 children\* It will make a voluminous outline. Albert Gallatin Kefover (1851-1914) married Sarah Ann Bowers (1829-1896). They had messanghildren 5 childrens (1) (John Austin Kefover (1855-1924); (2) Mary Lydia Kefover (1855-died young) (Alames Elmer Kefover (1857-1890);

(4) Cynthia Jane Kefover (1863-) married Cyrus Washington Ramsey (1855-1913);
(5) Ewing Hernando Sefover (1865-1928); (8) Henry Stanton Kefover (1868-).
A copy of the obitaary notice is enclosed for John Austin Eefover, listing living descendants. Henry Stanton Kefover has living one son, Herold Carmon Kefover (1889-), a veteran of the World War. I hope to receive the reports for the descendants of Ewing Hernando Refover before long, at which time I will work all this material mentioned and much more already collected into a report which will necessarily be lengthy as I have about the most complete survey in reports received from this branch of all the descendants of Philip Kefover (1789-1881).

This outline is very incomplete but I have considerable unarranged saterial with which to revise it and which I hope to increase and work up into a fair report before long. What I have is almost too diversified to present a running abstract until I can properly arrange and classify it into a report.
- "(6) Morgan (lost a leg in R.R. accident"—This obviously refers to John Morgan Kefover who was a son of Thomas Kefover (1815-1894) but I think the one who lost a leg was Plumaer Warren Lefover who was a son of this John Morgan Kefover. All this will be better cleared up in my report to be prepared on Thomas Kefover (1815-1894) and his descendents. However, instead of the "Morgan Kefover in your #6 I think you should have reference to a John Kefover, a son of Philip Kefover (1789-1881) who died young as a result of drinking white whiskey in a faild for the use of older persons working there.
- "(7) Margaret m. Thomas Sessier" -- See page 9 of the 20-page report herewith enclosed. This is incomplete. Blanks were sent with requests a year or more ago and have not been returned. At the same time I am sure that these relatives would be very glad to comply, but may find it a difficult task so do not get at it. I will renew my efforts to get this information.
- "(8) Martha a. James Hill" -- Martha Kefover was my grandmother. I have the record of her descendants quite fully but the same will be further completed. For her descendants see pages 10, 11, 12, 13, 14, 15, 16, 17, 18, 19, including that of my own family record on page \_\_\_\_\_. Page 20 is the first record which I made of the descendants of James Kefover (1811-1904) which has now been supplanted by the 2 page record referred to in the second paragraph of page 2 of this letter.

Pages 1 and 2 of this 20-page outline refer to Jerezich Hill, my mother's grandfather on the Hill side. You may not find any use for them, as they consist of questions concerning him, but will include it for completeness and for a very remote possibility of a chance suggestion on your part to me. One of his 3 marriages was said to be to Patricia Kefover, concerning whom I have previously inquired o'you and of others without any discovery.

- "(9) Mary a. -- Mallaby" -- This refers to Mar Jane Kefover (1824-1902) who married (Sep. 5, 1842) Henry B. Maleby. I have just completed a revised 5-page report of her branch, a copy of which I will enclose for you. It contains the material so far as I have collected it on this branch, but I will continue to collect material and so complete the blanks. But it is complete as a good outline.
- "(10) Clarissa m. --Hanners in Iowe" -- This refers to my Mother's Aunt Clarissa (Kefover) Hanna, whom I remember of seeing on her visiting us more than a half century ago while we were living in Wilton, Iowa. You will find all the material that I have collected about her on page 8 of my 20-page outline enclosed. Her children were evidently May and Oliver. All inquiries have been returned to me as unclaimed smil. I hope to get hold of an old inhabitant of Clarksburg, Iowa, or of Dumont, Iowa, some day and to inquire further.

#### II. THE KEFOVER FAMILY

The Kefovers are of German descent. The founders of the family in America were George and Peter Kefover, who emigrated from Germany and settled at Fredericksburg, Virginia. Philip Kefover, the grandfather of Charles Fremont Kefover, and descendant of said Peter Kefover, settled in Nicholson Township, Fayette County, Pennsylvania, where he was one of the leading agriculturists of said township.

The above note was copied by James R. McVicker from History of Fayette County, Pennsylvania, page \_\_\_\_\_, in June 1931, at Gilbert Coffman's home, McClellandtown.





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

What was the ancestry of Philip KeTover (1789-1881) ?

Various suppositions have been advanced by descendents.

Minor Fox Sangston (great grandson) thought that the name, Mefover, is Dutch. Menry Stanton Mefover (grandson) also thought that the name, Mefover is derived from the Dutch, or from Holland. (Interviews with the writer, June 25-26, 1985.)

"Melson's Biographical Dictionary and Historical Heference Book of Fayette County Pennsylvania," Vol. III, page 859 (published, 1900), states:

"The Kefovers are of German descent. The founders of the family in America were George and Peter Kefover who emigrated from Germany and settled at Fredericksburg, Virginia. Pailip Lefover, the grandfather of the subject of this sketch (Charles Fremont Lefover), and descendent of said Peter Kefover, settled in Micholson Township, Fayette County, Pennsylvania, where he was one of the leading agriculturists of said Township." ...

Jordan and Haddon's "Genealogical and Personal History of Payette County Pennsylvania, " Val. I, page 81 (published, 1912), states:

"Peter Kefover come to America from Alsace-Lerraine, now Germany, and is the founder of bie family in this country. He settled at Frederickstonn, Maryland, with his brother George. He was a farmer, an occupation usually followed by his descendents. He married and among his descendants was a son Philip, of whom further. Shile many descendants are found in Maryland, an important branch of the family settled in Fayette County, Pennsylvania, founded by Philip, son of Peter Mefover, the enigrant.

"(II) Philip, son of Peter Kefover, was the first of his family to settle in Payette County, coming from Maryland during the closing years of the 18th century. He was a farmer all his life, dying in Payotte County. He carried

"(III) William, som of Philip Kafover, was born in Payette County, Pannsylvania. He was educated in the public school, and has been devoted to agriculture all his life. Further developments have advenced in line with the last stated view or trudition-that stated by Henry Stanton Kefover and Martha (Kefover) Mickey. In the light of this tradition, public records adduced, and all the evidence taken together, it now appears reasonably clear that Philip Kefover (1789-1881) was a son of Jacob Kefover (Keefober, Kefauver, or otherwise variously spelled) and his wife, Mary (Issainger) Refever, who were married in Frederick County. Maryland, under a marriage license issued on July 25, 1783.

#### REPORT OF PUBLIC RECORDS

The critic has received from Dr. Harry Joshus Kefauver (R.F.D. # 2. Frederick, Maryland) a carefully prepared report embodying his "Theoryations and Hotes Concerning Jacob Kecfober, Benior, Second Kefauver Generation in Maryland and Fennsylvania." From the documentary evidence disclosed in this report, it clearly appears that Jacob Keefober, Sr., with his family moved into Springhill Township, Fayette County, Pennsylvania, from Frederick County, Maryland, at sometime between the years 1790 and 1800.

PANILY OF PULLIP KENFOBER, Sr. (d. 1779): 7 CHILDREN INCLUDING JACOB KENFOBER, Sr.

Jacob Keefober (Kefauver...) was one of the sons of Philip Keefober (Kefauver) and his wife, Anna Mary ( Miden name unknown) Keefober. This Philip Keefober was the progenitor of the Maryland families spelling the name as Refauver and, it appears, of the Fennsylvania families in Fayotte County spelling the name as Asfover, and of numerous descendants in other states. It is supposed that this Philip Keefober cans from Germany to America, and it is indicated that he settled in Frederick County, Maryland, prior to November 27, 1750. The year when he came to America, whether he came alone or with a wife and children or with brothers or other relatives, ere all points which apparently are not disclosed by the data known. He died in Frederick County, Maryland, in 1779, and as in the cases of many early pioneers it has not been possible to locate his grave. The wife of this earliest known Philip Koefober (d.1779), Anna Mary (\_\_\_\_\_\_, maiden name unknown) Keefober, and their children, except one, survived him. Their sevem children were as below indicated first after the numbers (1-7):

- 1 Philip Keefober (Kefauver), Jr., b. Mar. 10, 1747, d. Feb. 9, 1814. The Frederick County Maryland Census of 1700 indicates that his children consisted of one male under 16 years and 3 females. The census records for both 1800 and 1810 report no children in his femily. The nemes of any of the children of Philip Kesfober Jr. have not been definitely identified.
- Peter Keefober (Kefauver), b. family consisted of two males under 16 years, and in 1800 of 4 males in the 1-10 age group, and of one female in the 1-10 age group. Apparently, Peter Keefeber moved to Virginia sometime between 1800 and 1810 as indicated by the Census of 1810 for Botetourt County, Virginia, showing in this family two males under 10, two males in the 18-26 age group, two females under 10, and one female in the 18-26 age group. Peter Keefober (Kefauver) and Catherine (Kest) Keefober (Xefauver) were probably the parents of Jacob Kefauver (1788-1865) who married Nancy Vineyard (1890-1825). Jacob Refauver and Mancy (Vineyard) Kefauver were the parents of only one child of their marriage, Jacob Feter Kefauver (1819-1895), who in 1861 married Kiss Kancy Rieves Cooke (his 2d wife) to whom were born four obildrens

Philip Reefober, Senior, who settled in Frederick County, Maryland, prior to Movember 27, 1750, executed his Mill on December 27, 1778 (probated February 27, 1779), naming his two sons, Philip Reefober and Peter Reefober as executors, and mentioning the following members of his family: his wife, Anna Mary; four sons, (1) Philip, (2) Peter, (5) Micholae, (4) Jacob; two daughters, (1) Susamah (under 18 years of age); (2) Magdalene (under 18 years of age); and one grandson (name not given), the son of a decembed daughter (name of this 5d daughter not given). (Liber G.M. #1, Folio # 109, Records of Office of Register of Mills in Circuit Court of Frederick County, Maryland.)

Jacob Keefober, Sr., one of the sons of Philip Keefober, Sr., married Mary Iseminger, under a marriage license issued on July 25, 1785. (Records of Circuit Court of Frederick County, Maryland. Mary Iseminger was probably either a sister or a daughter of Adam Iseminger, whose children as 5 boys under 16 years and a girls are reported in the Census Records of 1790, Heads of Families, etc., for Frederick County, Maryland (page 66).

Jacob Keefeber, Sr., is shown in the Will of his father, Philip Keefeber, Sr., as the devises of all the real estate owned by Philip Keefeber, Sr., except 67 acres ("Whiskey 11:07") 90 acres ("Lewnell"), given to his son, Philip Keefeber, Jr., and 70 acres and the Mill given to his two sons, Feter and Michales. (Liber G.M. #1, Folio #109, of the Records in the Office of the Register of Wills, in the Circuit Court of Frederick County, Maryland.)

#### MARYLAND LANDS DEEDS RECORDS

Jacob (Reefober), farmer, of Frederick County, Maryland, executed a trust deed on August 50, 1785, to Jacob Derner, Conrad Young, Nicholas Basiass.
John Carn, Adam Smeltzer, and John Flucks, Members and Trustees of the German Reformed, Intheren, and Calvinist Congregations in and about Middletonn, Prederick County, Maryland, for the tract of land called "Resurvey of Maiskey Allag" (about 50 acres, to be set apart for the Use of said Congregations as the Constitution thereof contemplates and no other use whatsoever.

(Recorded in Liber W.R. #4, Folio 179, land Records of Circuit Court of Frederick County, Maryland; Ammapolis Archives, W. E. \*, page 179.)

They were the parents of George W. Linton (1859-1891), a newspaper contributor, writer and poet of fine and recognized ability, and who was a relative and contemporary of the author and journalist, ashbel Fairchild Mill (184201876). George W. Linton was born in German Township, Payette County, Pennsylvania, December 24, 1859. His mother, Hannah (Kefover) Linton, was a sister of Philip Refover (1789-1881), of Micholson Township, Fayette County, Pennsylvania. The parents of George W. Linton lived in German Township and later in or near Masontown, where George W. Linton became a Eddler by trade and wrote as a pastime.

Therefore, it seems that one of the B boys of Jacob Keefeber (Kefauver) and Eary (Iseminger) Keefeber (Kefauver) reported in the Frederick County Maryland Census for 1790 may be identified as Philip Kefever as above listed, born May 12, 1789, died April 5, 1881.

#### THE CENSUS RECORDS OF 1800 AND OF 1810

"The census records of 1800 for Springhill Township, Payette County, Pa., show that Jacob and Mary Kiehaver (Kefover, Keefober) had one boy in the 1-10 age group, 1 boy in the 10-16 age group and 1 in the 16-26 age group, 4 girls in the 1-10 age group, 2 girls in the 10-16 age group.

"In this census report the boy in the 10-16 age group could be logically identified as Philip (born May 12, 1789, died April 5, 1881. ...

"There are no Refauvers by the name of Jacob reported in the census returns from Maryland in 1800. The records in Frederick County, Maryland, show that Jacob Refauver disposed of his real estate in Maryland between 1790 - 1800 and obviously moved to Fayette County, Pennsylvania, sometime prior to 1800. In a deed dated Esptember 5, 1796, made to Laurence Everhart, Jacob Refever of Fayette County, Pennsylvania, is mentioned as one of the grantors. This doed is recorded in liber 5.8. \$14, Folio 482, one of the records of the Circuit Court for Frederick County, Maryland, as previously stated.

"The census records of 1810 for Springhill Township, Payette County, Pa., shows two (2) Jacob Kefauvers. Jacob Kefauver Sr. is reported as having 3 boys in the 1-10 age group, I girl in the 10-16 age group and 1 girl in the 26-46 age group.

"In this report the name of Philip cannot be identified in any age group, as only one age group 1-10 of boys is reported. It is quite likely that Philip Refover (1782-1981) had established a family of his own and had moved to Micholson Township, Fayette County, Pennsylvania. We have not secured the census records for this township. ...

"There is no entry in the 45 up female group. It is probable therefore that his wife Mary (Jacob Kefauver Sr's wife) died between 1800 and 1810, unless his wife was very much younger than he was in which case his wife may be the individual reported in the 26-45 age group for 1810.

"Jacob Kefauver, Jr. shows one male in the 1-10 age group, 2 males in the 16-26 age group, 1 female in the 1-10 age group, 5 females in the 10-16 age group, no females older. It would appear, therefore, that his wife was deceased at the time the 1810 report was made. "

#### IDENTIFICATION OF PHILIP KEFOVER (1789-1881) AS A SON OF JACOB KEEFOBER FROM CENSUS RECORDS

The above and foregoing enalysis of census data quoted from the Report of Dr. Harry J. Kefauver, further advances the view that Philip Xefover (1788-1881) was a son of Jacob Keefober (Kefauver) and his wife Mary (Leminger) Keefober (Kefauver)), who with their children including Philip Kefover (Keefober) (1788-1881) removed from Frederick County, Maryland, to Springhill Township, Fayette County, Pennsylvania, between the dates of the first and the second consus (1790-1800).

#### CORROBORATION

The view that the father of Philip Refever (1782-1881) was Jacob Reefober (Refauver, Refever) is corroborated by the same statement smally made to the writer by Henry Stanton Refever (Box No. 1, Masontown, Pa.), a grandson of said Philip Refever (1789-188), on June 26, 1885, and further confirmed by him in writing in a letter received by this writer on July 20, 1885. Further corroboration is afforded by the same statement orally made to the writer by Martha (Refever) Mickey (Masontown, Pa.), a granddaughter of said Philip Refever (1789-1881), on June 25, 1985.

#### VIEW OF THE WRITER

In the opinion of the writer, all this evidence from tradition, public records, and family bistory is convincing, and tends quite clearly to establish as a fact the proposition that Philip Refover (1789-1881) was a som of the same Jacob Reefober (Refauver) and Mary (Iseminger) Reefober (Refauver) and ease with their family (obviously including Philip Refover 1789-1881, as one of their children) from Frederick County, Maryland, to Springaill Township, Payette County, Fannsylvania, between the years 1790 and 1800.

In closing, we note that repetition in statement seemed necessitated herein to avoid confusion and to present the evidence, identifications, and corroboration in this situation involving different suppositions which have resulted from the great lapse of time, varied oral traditions, lack of family records and the consequent variation in the views obtaining.

After the severe fire in What Cheer, Iosa, in the latter 1880's in which his harness and shoe stere was burned, he gathered his resources and purchased the 80 acre fare near Keswick, Keokuk County, Iowa, which ever afterward has remained the home of his family and on which Miss Eva Phillips and Miss Ita Mue Kefover now reside. He was a man of very genial, lively and kindly disposition, and always an interesting conversationalist. He was a well beloved relative, a man of exemplary habits, and a fine character. 

Philip Alexander Kefover, 2d son of James Kefover (1811-1904) and James Beatty, oldest son of William Beatty, above mentioned, also married wives who were sisters, Mrs. Bessie Arilia (Upson) Phillips and Miss Hannah Upson, respectively. Albert Gallatin Kefover was born in Payette County, Pa., February 10, 1931. He died, August 10, 1914, in Garman Township. He married Sarah Ann Bowers, born November 26, 1829, in Bicholson Township, parents Jacob Bowers and Lydia (Poundstone) Bowers. Sarah Ann (Bowers) Kefover died August 24, 1896. Albert Gallatin Kefover and wife Sarah Ann Kefover are buried in Lutheran Cenetery. He was a son of Philip Kefover (1789-1861) and his first wife, Ophelia Blizabeth Kefover whose maiden name was Lucky. The given name of Albert Gallatin Kefover was in namesake of the distingathhad Secretary of the Treasury in President Thomas Jefferson's Cabinet, Albert Gallatin, who was appointed to this post in 1801. Before his acceptance of the post, he journeyed to Payette County, Pa., and disposed of his interest in an arms factory to his partner in the enterprise, Melchier Saker. This factory had been established by Albert Gallatin and Melchier Saker in 1799, to supply guns and arms in the impending danger of foreign war. The factory was located near New Geneva in that part of Springhill Township which is now Bicholson Township, on land that was later owned by Philip Kefover (1789-1881). The arms factory was operated on this land for a few years longer by Malchier Saker and was then discontinued due to the competition of the Federal Government in this line in its manufacturing armories at Harper's Ferry, Virginia, and Springfield, Mass. (See Kilis' History of Fayette County, Pennsylvania (1882), pages 700-701.)

They had so lived in nearly half a century of happily married life, a quarter of a century of which was spent in Uniontown, that a sympathetic bond of attachment was syddenced to a marked degree during their last illnesses. Both were devout Christians, being active in the work and members of the Third Presbyterian Church. John Austin Refover was a member of the John Enox Bible class and his wife was a member and regular attendant of Class "15."

He had followed an industrious life, by trade a blackswith, painter, and wagon—maker. He was a number of the Uniontown Lodge of the Independent Order of Old Fellows.



Clark N. Refever, son of John Austin Refever and Ellen Amanda (Capan) Refever, was born Feb. 14, 1881, at High House, Fayette County, Fa. He was married on Nov. 14, 1987, at Bellevue, Fa., to Florence Ada Hoswell, daughter of Joseph B. Boswell and Emms E. (McCrackin) Boswall. Mr. and Mrs. Glark M. Refever reside at 164 Irwin Ave., Ben Avon, North Side, Fittsburgh, Fa. They have no children. They are mambers of Forest avenue United Presbyterian Charch, Bellevue, Fa. Clark M. Refever is a member of the following named Masonic organizations: Fayette Ledge, No. 228, F. & A. M., Unicotown, Pa.; Pennsylvania Consistory 52d degrae, Pittsburgh, Pa.; Allegheny Commandery No. 55, Pittsburgh, Fa.; Syria Temple of the Ehrine, Pittsburgh, Fa. For several years he has served as Vice President and General Manager of the McCann Company, engaged extensively in the Betsik Food Business, Pittsburgh, Pa.

A former Uniontown boy who attained a sell-carned competence enabling him to retire from business at the age of 49 years and with his wife to emberk upon a trip around the world, Clark M. Kefover has since been active in the conservation for others of the business establishment whose interests he had so faithfully promoted. His rise to success and his recognition in business leadership have been due to the sterling integrity inherited from his forboars and to his own indefatigable industry and unstinted energy. In his early career, he was employed with the National Bank of Fayette County, at Uniontewn, Pa., from which employment he later on was called to accept a position in the store of Boggs & Buhl, at Pittsburgh, Pa., and so left home at Unionteen to enter upon his career in the larger city. In his twenty years service with the firm of Boggs & Buhl, his productive work was rewarded in his continuous promotion from one department to another until he became the store superintendent. He went from the latter position to accept a place in McCann & Company, dealing in retail pure food products, acquiring a substantial interest in and becoming a junior member of this firm. For ten years he devoted his unbounded industry and enterprising service to the upbuilding of the business with consequent business expansion and its profitable development. He later disposed of his interest but remained as general manager of the firm until January 1, 1931, when with Mrs. Kefover they embarked upon their trip around the world. Upon returning from this toyage, he resumed his service as the general manager of McCann & Company and continued his duties for some time until his physical condition again necessitated his temperary retirement from steemious business activities. The great store of McConn & Company, cutstanding as a food products business in the whole country, came into the ownership of Mr. Alexander S. Fraser, its president-treasurer, in 1988, she more recently has transformed it into a unique example of industrial socialisation, whereby the employes of the business now own the McCann & Company Store and receive the profits of the business. Mr. A. N. Fraser turned over his entire interest to the supposes established employes through an intervening board of management, the McCann Trusteeship. Almost the entire McCann & Company stock is held by a trusteeship of four persons as trustees and business managers with substantial salaries provided for their active services as managers of the business and the faithful promotion of its best interests. Under the management of these trustees, as it is provided, the profits of the business are divided among the established employs, their participation in the division and charing or profits being based upon their annual wage or salary after a preliminary one year of service, as such employe, and after compensating the management. Under this plan, the trustees were constituted as Mr. Alexander S. Fraser, president-treasurer, Mary I. Michelberger, secretary and adverticing manager, D. S. Mobinson, vice president and
