- Declaration -

In order to obtain the benefit of the act of Congress
Passed June 7th 1832,

State of North Carolina } Court of Pleas & Quarter Sessions
Chatham County } February Term 1837. -

On this 13th day of February 1837.

Personally appeared in open Court, before the Court
now sitting, Andrew Peddy, a resident of the County
of Chatham & State of North Carolina, Aged seventy
three years & upwards, who being first duly sworn
according to Law, doth on his Oath make the
following declaration, in order to obtain the
benefit of the act of Congress, Passed June 7th 1832,
That he entered the service of the United States under
the following named officers and served as herein
stated.

In the Year 1779. he volunteered his service
in a Company of Militia in the County of Wake
State of North Carolina, Commanded by Capt. Pledger
and was mustered into service at Wake old
Court house, from whence he was marched to
Hillsborough, where he joined a Regiment Com-
manded by Gen. Fanning, from whence he was
marched to Salisbury where we were joined by
other troops, from thence to Savannah, in Georgia,
where we joined the army Commanded by

General Lincoln, from thence to Charleston, South Carolina, which place he reached near Christm^{as} and remained there till near the last of March, thence he marched to Charlo^tte in North Carolina, where he was discharged after having served at least five months - His discharge was signed by Capt Bledsoe and is now lost or destroyed & he is unable to procure the same -

In the last of August or thereabouts in 1780, he was drafted in the County of Wake, State of North Carolina, and joined a company commanded by Capt Woodson Daniel at Hillsborough, from whence he marched to Salisbury, from there to Charlotte and joined a Regiment commanded by Col. Umphries, where he remained guarding Prisoners until the term of his service expired, after having served at least Three months, his discharge was signed by Col. Umphries, but is now lost or destroyed and he is unable to procure the same;

In the Year 1781, he volunteered his services in a company of horse in the County of Wake, N.C. commanded by Capt Matthew McClellan - He was Mustered at Wake Court house, from whence he marched to near Hillsborough, where they rec^d intelligence of the capture of the Governor of the State, and a number of officers by the Tories under the Command of Col's McNeill & Fanning, whom we immedi-

Latly Pursued and overtook them at Cape Creek
where a Battle ensued in which the Whigs under
the command of General Butler, Col. Lattrell
& Mehan were defeated; Col. Lattrell & Major
Hall fell in this action, the declarant was
in the action and saw Major Hall when
he fell, from thence we pursued the Tories to
near Wilmington & had a slight skirmish
with them in the neighborhood of the Cape
New River, he was marched to the White
Marsh and in the neighborhood of Lambertson
on Crowning Creek where they remained
for some time subduing the Tories, when
they marched back to Wake County &
discharged after having served at least
three months, he received his regular
discharge on this occasion -

The declarant further states
that he has no documentary evidence &
that he knows of no Person who testifies
he was Pursued to testify to his services, &
he further states that the reason why he has
not applied at an earlier period for his

Pension is, that he did not believe, that the act-
of June 7th 1832 was a law founded in Wisdom,
and he did not intend to apply for any benefit
under it, nor should he have done so at this time
but from the advice of his friends, and the neces-
sities of his family -

He hereby ~~believe~~ ~~claim~~ ~~claim~~
whenever to a Pension or annuity except
the Present, and declares that his name is
not on the Pension Roll of the Agency of
any State or Territory in the Union.

Carroll, hereby Certify that we are well acqu-
ainted with Andrew Paddy who has subscribed
& sworn to the above Declaration, that we believe
him to be Seventy Nine years of age, that he
is Reputed & believed in the neighborhood where
he resides to have been a Soldier of the Revolution,
and that we Concur in that Opinion,
Sworn to & subscribed the day & month aforesaid -

Let the said Court do hereby declare their
Opinion, after the investigation of the Matter &
after putting the interrogatories Prescribed by the War
Department, that the above named applicant was
a Revolutionary Soldier & served as he states
& the Court further Certifies that it appears
to them, that Thos Sappater and Mrs Carlson
who have signed the preceding Certificate are
Residents in the County of Chatham, Ga, and
are Credible Persons. — A. H. HARRIS, Chairman

The following questions were
Propounded by the Court to the declarant, and
answered as herein stated, —

Question 1st — Where & in what year were you born
Answer. — I was born in the County of Halifax
in the State of Virginia, in the year 1757.

Question 2^d — Have you any record of your age
and if so, where is it —

Answer. — I have the record of my age, at my
home, in a family Bible —

Question 3^d — When were you living when called
into service, when have you lived since
the Revolutionary War & when do you
now live —

Answer. — I lived in the County of Wake when called
into service & remained there until 1818,
when I removed to the County of Chatham
where I at present reside —

Question 4th - How was you Called into Service, Were you drafted, did you Volunteer or Were you a Substitute, and if so, for whom -

Answer - I Volunteered on Two Occasions & was drafted on the third, -

Question 5th - State the Names of Some of the Regular officers, who were with the troops when you served, Such Continental & Militia Regiments as you Can Recollect, and the general Circumstances of your Service -

Answer - This Question is answered in the body of my Declaration -

Question 6th - Did you ever receive a discharge from the Service & if so, by whom was it given & what has become of it -

Answer - This Question is also answered in the body of my Declaration -

Question 7th - State the Names of Persons to whom you are Known in your Present Neighborhood & who Can testify as to your Character for Veracity & their belief of your Service as a Soldier of the Revolution -
