FEATURE ARTICLE

A Brief History of Lower Windsor Township - Part 2

The community of Yorkanna is located about three miles west of the Canadochly Church on the York and East Prospect Road, now Route 124 and seven miles distant from the city of York. This place was originally called "Kauffelt's Store", and for nearly one hundred years went by that name. It was a center of interest of interest and importance in the township for more than a century. Kauffelt's Store was the place for the annual muster and battalion parade in the days when the local militia was of great importance. Early in the 19th century two men one named Miller and the other Jacobs, each platted a town here. One place was called Millerstown and the other Jacobstown. succeeded in selling a few lots, and a small collection of houses in the vicinity was for many years given the name of Millerstown. During the later half of the 1800's the town took on the name of Yorkana. My grandparents George J. Silar and Ida M. Dellinger were married at Yorkana on February 7, 1892.



The 1876 atlas of York county shows Yorkana as a busy community with Kauffelt's Store, the Tannery (Beard's Tannery), a Shoe Store, the Evangelical Church, a School, and numerous residences of families such as Dellinger, Keller, and Gohn.

Two important historical sites that lie within the area known as Yorkana are the sites of Beard's Tannery, and the Evangelical Church. Beard's Tannery was the last of such enterprises to be located in Lower Windsor Township. Started during the first decade of the 1800's, it was located just beyond the stream called, "the head of Kreutz Creek," on the road from York to East Prospect. The bark used in the tanning process was from the chestnut and oak trees in the adjoining woods. The original Evangelical Church was a framed building built in 1867. On January 14, 1893, the old Yorkana church was destroyed by fire, and a new building was built across the road in the same year. The current building of Christ Church was

dedicated in 1961.

At the base of the Conojohela Valley, located on a charmingly beautiful spot, stands the borough of East Prospect. It is two miles from the Susquehanna River and eleven miles from York, on what was referred to in the 19th century as the York and Dritt's Ferry Road. Today this is Route 124 called Maple Street within the borough. John A. Jacobs laid out the town in 1849. The first house was owned by William E. Oleweiler. The early inhabitants were undecided as to what name to give to the town until Prospect was thought of. Since there was already a town in Butler County called Prospect the name East Prospect was selected. The town was incorporated in 1874. Main Street running north and south was the first to be built up with new homes and businesses. The other primary road in town is Maple Street, which runs east and west. During the early days of the town George Kise kept a dry goods store. Also at that time there were several other stores and a hotel in the town in addition to several companies in the business of manufacturing cigars. At the turn of the 20th century Lower Windsor Township farms were producing a large tobacco crop, and about 100,000 cigars were made daily in factories in East Prospect and around the township.

The Zion United Methodist Church (originally Lower Zion's Evangelical Church) is located in the center of the village, is a well designed stone structure.



A short distance to the northeast on a small hill overlooking the town center is Riverview Cemetery. A charter was granted in 1868 and it was laid out soon thereafter. Many of the Silar family are buried here including my 3rd great-grand parents George W. Silar, Sr. and his wife Mattie (Gilbert) Silar, he in 1881 and she in 1890. Their son, my great-great grandfather William Henry Silar is known the have resided in East Prospect until his death in 1915 and is also buried at the cemetery along with his wife Sarah (Hayes) Siler who passed away in 1917.

In addition to the aforementioned Zion's Church there are four other historical churches of note within the area of East Prospect Borough. North Trinity Church, no longer in existence, was located about three miles northeast of East Prospect on the road leading to Wrightsville.

The Ebenezer Church is located three miles southeast of East Prospect at Long Level along the Susquehanna River. It was built in 1872 and is a 40 foot by 60 foot brick structure. At the front of this church is a monument



dedicated to veterans of the two World Wars that includes many local family names such as Axe, Blouse, Leiphart, Oleweiler, Reisinger, Silar, and Smeltzer. Among the dozen or so gravestones behind the church is that of Mary Elizabeth Silar who died in 1885 at the early age of 17 years. The Salem Church was originally built in 1840. It is situated five miles south of East Prospect, near the border with Chanceford Township, and about a mile south of Martinsville. There is a very old cemetery nearby. The new church was rebuilt in 1880. The Margaretta Church, which is no longer in existence, was built, under the auspices of the Presbyterian denomination, when the furnace under Henry Y. Slaymaker was in its prosperity. Slaymaker had the wood frame church constructed around 1834, for his employees.

The Lower Windsor Fire Insurance Company was organized in 1879, In 1886 the board of directors was comprised of Joseph Gilbert, Gerard C. Brown, Samuel

Burg, Henry Burg, H.H. Sprenkle, Henry Thomas, Rudolph Neiman, John Tschoop, J. Lieberknecht, Samuel Libhart, and Jacob Leber. The current fire protection unit now called the East Prospect Fire Company was formed in 1907 and provides coverage for much of Lower Windsor Township.

During the first half of the 19th century the local iron works were of great importance to the economy of Lower Windsor Township. Margaretta Furnace and Woodstock Forge were both located near where the town on East Prospect now stands. The furnace was built by Samuel Slaymaker, of Lancaster, in 1823, and put into operation in 1825 by his nephews Henry Y. and S. Slaymaker who succeeded in their ownership and began a large business. They utilized a good quality of native ore, in the immediate vicinity, was used and a good pig iron was made. Soon a foundry named Woodstock Forge was erected, in 1828, about one and a half miles east on Cabin Branch Creek, so named because the Indians had built cabins along the creek near the Susquehanna river. It was probably the lure of employment at this foundry that brought John Frederick Siler, a blacksmith by trade, to this part of York County. Two of his son's George W. and Henry also worked here as blacksmiths. John Frederick is identified as the head blacksmith in tax records between 1831 and 1836. It appears that his son Henry succeeded him in that position in 1837. At the foundry, a large number of ten-plate stoves were made as well as iron kettles, skillets, and various kinds of hollow ware. Henry Y. Slaymaker conducted the business alone for a number of years. Although he was very popular with his employees the business did not bring in the revenue needed to keep it going. The Slaymaker Iron Works operation eventually went out of business in 1843.

Who needs to go tromping around graveyards when you have this easy-to-search site, which makes it easy to, well, dig into graves? You can make quick progress finding not only ancestors' final resting places but also their birth and death dates, transcribed from tombstones, among the 22 million records here.

Shared Tree < http://www.sharedtree.com/ >

As long as you're on the Web, why not keep your family tree there, too? This free online application is a shade more sophisticated than the alternatives. There's nothing to download, it's GEDCOM compatible, files have no size limit, and you can collaborate with fellow researchers in real time.

If the FamilySearch Web site is old hat to you already, check out this "lab" where you can preview the next generation of the site as well cool tools that the brains behind it are developing. An accompanying blog lets you give feedback on these works in progress.

You will now find our family trees at the Ancestry. com website. One is named Ancestors of Sherman R. Silar and contains the records of 1,233 persons. The other tree is Ancestors of Florence E. Pfeffer with 57 records.

An updated version of the database was recently uploaded to the World Connect site at *RootsWeb.com*. 42 new records have been added over the past three months. We now have information on 1,775 persons.

Since the databases are completely quarterly to coincide with the publishing of this newsletter you are all reminded to take a look at what is new with regard to my family history research. you do check the either database site you may find

The scope and volume of the various subsites created for our **Special Topics** continued to increase since the last issue of this newsletter. currently researching a particular U.S. State / County or U.K. Shire take a look at our Genealogy Reference Library for a history or records for that locality. Most of these books are fully searchable and can be downloaded to your computer. In addition text may be cut & pasted directly to your family tree software or other document. Readers who have an interest in Historic American Roads And Migration Routes should take a look at the new updates and revisions at the pages, which address the Oregon, and De Anza trails. Also the Mormon Trail and other routes to the Western Mountain States. Our War Veterans sub-site has basic accounts about each of the eleven most important American war periods in which our ancestors may have participated. Links within the text will provide the researcher with additional insight regarding the key aspects of each conflict.
