ANCESTOR PROFILE

Johann ''Jacob'' Dellinger 1697-1777

Johann Jacob Dellinger was a citizen and farmer in Oberacker, Baden-Wurttemburg, Germany. Although references are made to Germany, a single united Germany did not exist until 1871. The most probable region or principality of his birth was the present day German State of Rhineland-Palatinate, Hesse, Baden-Wuerttemberg, all of which adjoin the Rhine River or the Alsace-Lorraine region. It is noted that persons from these various areas were referred to as Palatines or as being from Palatinate.

On the 27th of August 1733 the ship "Elizabeth" sailed into the Philadelphia harbor from Rotterdam. Within the list of passengers were Jacob Dellinger aged 33 years, a farmer; his wife, Maria Barbara aged 28 and their son Johan Frederick (Friederich) aged 8. In January of 1734 Jacob is known to have been in Chestnut Hill, a short distance north of Germantown, when his daughter Maria Barbara was baptized on 3 January 1734 by Rev. John Casper Stoever. The early Dellingers were members of the Lutheran Church.

Following their stay in the area in the Philadelphia area, Jacob and his family moved west to what is now York County, Pennsylvania. The route that Jacob and his family took from Philadelphia to York Co., (then Lancaster Co.), is not specifically known. Lancaster County had been formed in 1729 from Chester County, one of the original three counties of Pennsylvania, which had been created in 1682. Around 1729 the first white settlements were made within the present limits of York County. At first the settlements were few and Indians for the most part occupied the county. In 1749 York County was created from part of Lancaster County.

The exact date of Jacob's settlement west of the Susquehanna River is not yet known. The Dellinger name first appears in the Canadochly Union Church records in 1755. Jacob and his wife

are shown as sponsors for Maria Barbara Hermann on 15 May 1758 at the Canadochly Lutheran Church in Lower Windsor Township, York Co., Pennsylvania. The first land record

discovered so far is Jacob's Warrant for land in 1762. This would have been his first step in obtaining a patent or deed from the sons of William Penn who were at that time the Proprietors of the Colony of Pennsylvania. This warrant, dated 31 May 1762, was for 100 acres of land from the Penn Family. The land was located in Windsor Twp., York Co., Pennsylvania. Jacob may have lived on the site some years before requesting the Warrant, Survey and Patent, because this typically was the case. The area in which he settled was originally part of Hellam Township, which was formed in 1738, while part of Lancaster County. The area later became Windsor Township in 1758 and remained so until 1838 when Lower Windsor Township was created.

Articles of Agreement were signed between Jacob Dellinger, Sr. and Jacob Dellinger, Jr. on 12 Feb 1776(5). Both lived in Windsor Twp., York Co., Pennsylvania. Part of the agreement was that if John Dellinger, son, came back from the Army, he was to be a party to the Agreement. John did return from service in the Continental Army. These articles name payments or benefits to the following heirs of Jacob Dellinger I. Named heirs were: Jacob Jr., son, got the 260 acre farm plus equipment and stock, but had to provide for Jacob, Sr. and his wife for their lifetime. Fred Dellinger, son, got L20. Joseph Dellinger, son, got L20. John Dellinger, son, on return from war got half the land. Joseph Tritt, grandson, got L10. Margaret Tritt, granddaughter, got L10. John Nicholas Howert, grandson, and son of Michael Howert, got L10. Philip Gohn, son-in-law, got L20. Paul Shafer is a witness to this agreement.

Jacob died in 1777 soon after the aforementioned Articles of Agreement were written. He was probably laid to rest in the old Canadochly Church graveyard.

He is standing center behind who we believe is Agnes Mahala Ellwein and Calvin Glatfelter. Calvin was married to Agnes's cousin Euphema Shutter. Euphema's mother was Leah Ellwein. After Euphema died Calvin moved in with Agnes Ellwein Diehl who was also a widow.

The male on the left of the photo is Raymond (Berger) Diehl. He is the son of Agnes and David Berger who were married in 1901. David split before or shortly after Raymond was born so he always went by Diehl.

An updated version of my paternal lineage database was recently uploaded to the World Connect site at RootsWeb.com. <u>12</u> new names have been added during the past three months. It now has information on <u>1,241</u> persons, which include, not only ancestral grandparents, but also aunts, uncles, and cousins. Since the database is updated quarterly to coincide with the publishing of this newsletter you are all reminded to take a look at what is new with our family history research. If you do check the database site you may find some new information that will enhance your own research or you may find some errors in ours that we need to know of.
