A quarterly accounting of the database at RootsWeb shows four new direct ancestral family lines have been uncovered as well as the addition of almost 200 new individual records.

FEATURE ARTICLE

Three Families of Chanceford Township

During a recent trip to the York County Archives I discovered quite a bit of information about several ancestral families that have resided in Chanceford Township for many generations.

Chanceford Township is bounded on the north by Fishing Creek, which separates it from Lower Windsor; on the east by the Susquehanna River; west by the north branch of Muddy Creek, which separates it from Windsor and Hopewell Townships; and south by Lower



Chanceford Township which was created from Chanceford in 1806. Chanceford's population was 2,994 in 1880 and 5,973 at the 2000 census.

The settlement of Chanceford was first made in the southern half of the township about the year 1735 by Scots-Irish settlers from New Castle, Delaware. The settlement of the northern part of Chanceford took place after the American Revolution when some paroled Hessian prisoners and their families located there.

The first church was organized in 1754 by the Guinston congregation of the United Presbyterian Church. The two churches that appear to have had a close association with the Arnold, Schall, and Ilges familes are the Lutheran and Reformed Church, also known as St. Luke's or "Stahle's Church", and the New Harmony Presbyterian Church. The Lutheran Church situated in the northern part of the township was founded in 1784. Here the Lutheran and German Reformed congregations united to construct the first building and held services alternately therein. My 5th great-grandfather George Ilges is recorded as having attended a 1786 meeting of the Deacons and Elders. The New Harmony Presbyterian Church was established in When the German Reformed congregation 1848. disbanded at "Stahle's Church" several of the families associated themselves with the New Harmony Church. These individuals included members the Hauer, Ilges, Becker, Werner, Weiss, and Schall families. As members of this primarily Scots-Irish congregation they soon Anglicized their surnames to Howard, Ellis, Baker, Warner, Wise, and Shaull.

ARNOLD FAMILY

My 5th great-grandfather Johannes Arnold, a native of Erlangen, Bavaria, Germany arrived at Philadelphia on the ship "Two Brothers" September 28, 1753. Soon after his arrival in the "New World" Johannes moved west into Lancaster County. Here he married Elizabeth Ulrich on January 26, 1761 at Trinity Lutheran Church in Lancaster. He and Elizabeth began a family and produced at least three known children between 1761 and 1770. In 1771 Johannes Arnold, along with Nicholas and John Olerick, purchased a tract of 158 acres in Chanceford Township, York County, Pennsylvania called "Stoney Bottom." Soon

after their arrival in Chanceford Township the family began to attend church at Stahle's (St. Luke's) Church located near the town of Bridgeville. Records of this church show that on April 26,



1801 Johannes and Elizabeth took communion here. Many records of their descendant's baptisms have been found in the docuents of this church.

My Arnold family line continues through John a son of the aforementioned Johannes and Elizabeth, and his son Adam Arnold. Adam was born on the family farm in 1799. He lived most of his life here in the household of his father. A review of census documents between 1820 and 1840 do not show Adam as the head of any household. As such it is most probable that he continued to live in the household of his father John Sr. as did his brother Jacob. It appears that Adam remained a bachelor until 1841 when he married Catherine Ellis. Three known children were produced of this union between 1842 and 1847. Adam died in 1851.

My Arnold line ends with my great-great grandmother Mary Arnold born in 1847. She married Jonathan Dellinger in 1866 when she was about 19 years old. Mary tragically lost here first three children early in their lives. Sons John and George passed away on the same day in 1870. Her daughter Katherine died in 1872 just short of her 2nd birthday. Mary went on to have five more children between 1872 and 1883. Prior to her own death in 1932 she was residing in Red Lion, York Co., Pennsylvania. Mary is buried in St. Luke's Cemetery, Chanceford Twp., Pennsylvania.

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ILGES / ELLIS FAMILY

The Ilges surname name is spelled differently throughout official records. Sometimes it appears as Ilgis, Illis, Eales ,Illius, Liges, Ilges and eventually Ellis, which other researchers have cited. The English surname of Ellis was utilized by Prowell in his "History of York County."

Johann Paul Ilges, my 6th great-grandfather, is the progenitor of this branch of the Ilges family in America. He was born about 1706 in the village of Thaleischweiler which was at that time was located in that area known as Bayern-Pfalz, an historical region also called the Rhenish Palatinate. Today this area is located in the German state of Rheinland-Pflaz. During his early years Paul learned the trade of a cooper or barrel-maker. He was married twice during his lifetime. Paul had seven children by his first wife Anna Margaretha. In 1745 he married Maria Catharina Blau also a native of Thaleischweiler. Between 1745 and 1752 they produced at least three known children. In 1750 the family boarded the English ship "St. Andrew" at Rotterdam and began their voyage to the New World. They arrived in Philadelphia on August 18, 1750. Soon thereafter Paul moved his family west to Lancaster County where in 1752 another son Johann Philp was born. Records of the Trinity Church in Lancaster show that Paul's daughter, by his first marriage, Elizabeth was married there on January 28, 1753 to John Michael Weicker Schneider.

My Ilges family line continues through Johann Georg, the eldest off-spring of Paul and Maria Catharina. believed that upon the death of his father in 1761 George Ilges, then sixteen years old, removed from Lancaster County to York County. Here he was apprenticed to Paul Trout of Windsor Township, to be taught the art or mystery of a "cordwainer", until he became twenty-one years of age. George was a soldier in the Revolutionary War, serving seven years as a private. His rifle has been preserved by his descendents. By 1780 George was married to his wife Anna Margaret and settled in Chanceford Township as a farmer. George was an early member and a deacon of St. Luke's "Stahle's" Church. He died at his farm in 1801 and is buried in the cemetery at St. Luke's Church.

David Ellis, one of seven children born to George and Anna Margaret, was born on the family farm in Chanceford Township. He was christened on March 30 1780 at Saint Luke's Church. David earned a living as a farmer and teacher in Chanceford Township. He first married Maria Hake who died in 1805 with no known children. His second marriage was to Anna Catherine Shaul, a native of Maryland. Upon the death of Anna Catherine's father, John in 1814, David and Catherine inherited the 700 acre Shaul farm in Chanceford Township. When the German Reformed congregation

disbanded at "Stahle's Church" David and his family became associated with the New Harmony Church. As members of this primarily Scots-Irish congregation they soon anglicized their surname to Ellis.

My Ellis family line ends with my ggg-grandmother Catherine born in 1807 on the family farm in Chanceford Twp. She was the second of twelve children produced by David and Catherine Ellis. Catherine married Adam Arnold around 1840. They had at least three known children between 1842 and 1846. Catherine Arnold became a widow in 1851 and lived much of her later life in the household of her daughter Mary and son-in-law Jonathan Dellinger. Catherine died in 1895 and is buried at the St. Luke's Lutheran Church cemetery.

SHAUL FAMILY

The earliest known ancestor of the Shaul family of Chanceford, is my 11th great-grandfather Blasius Schall, who was born during the latter half of the 1500's in the German town of Bolanden. Bonlanden a former municipality in the Esslingen district, in Baden-Württemberg is today a section of Filberstadt.

My 6th great-grandfather Joseph Schall was born 1719 in Bonlanden, the illegitimate son of Joseph Schuster, a soldier, and Anna daughter of Hans Schall. Joseph immigrated from Germany to Philadelphia in 1749 on the ship "Albany". By 1761 he had settled in Baltimore County, Maryland. Records show that in 1765, Joseph Shaul signed the petition to move the Baltimore county seat of from Joppa to Baltimore, and in 1778 he also signed an Oath of Fidelity to the cause of the American Revolution. Joseph died in Baltimore County in 1785. The name of his wife is unknown but the following four children were named in his Will: John, Joseph, Elizabeth, and Barbara.

Joseph's son John Shaul was born around 1755. He grew to maturity in Baltimore County. Around 1778 he married Catharine Valentine of Frederick County, Maryland. John and Catherine produced at least nine known off-spring between the time of their union and 1794. The family lived at Piney Creek Hundred, located in Frederick County, Maryland up until 1800 when John removed north into York County, Pennsylvania and settled in Chanceford Township. John owned four properties in both Chanceford and Lower Chanceford Townships. The first purchased in 1800 was 331 acres called "Gwins Town" and "Conquest" from the Patrick McGee estate. second tract, 341 acres in the area of Collinsville, was also The third tract, "Rural Banks," purchased in 1800. composed of 398 acres, was purchased in 1803. It is now the Lee Kennedy Farm in Lower Chanceford Township. The family cemetery, also known as Wises' Burying Ground, was located on this farm. The fourth tract, "Hill Head Place," composed of 223 acres, was purchased in 1807. Continued on page 4

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The last Shaul family ancestor is my 4th greatgrandmother Anna Catherine one of nine children born to John and Catherine Shaul. She was born 1786 at Piney Creek Hundred, located in Frederick County, Maryland. Anna Catherine married David Ellis at Chanceford Township around 1803. She had at least twelve known children eight of which were males. After the death of her husband David in 1842 the widow Catharine Ellis continued to run the family farm in Chanceford Township with the assistance of her son John. Anna Catherine died on the family farm at the ripe old age of 97 years.

This new digital edition will be available for free to subscribers of the traditional print magazine, and will also be available as a separate, online-only subscription at a reduced subscription rate of \$12.00 per year for the monthly

magazine, (the print version has a current subscription rate of \$27.00 per year).

The new Online Edition of Genealogical Helper will be available in PDF format which is fully-searchable. Hopefully, there will be no restrictions on downloading/saving these PDF files to your computer, as it's always nice to be able to go back articles you read months and even years ago

Family Tree Maker 2009 Released

The Generations Network (TGN) has announced the release of Family Tree Maker 2009. It's mainly the same as version 2008 with all its patches plus improved functionality, but it does have some new features.

Those include charts and reports, such as hourglass, bowtie, 180-degree fan and others (in case you're wondering, there's no need to be signed up with Ancestry Publishing to generate these reports).

Automatic backups and more-powerful global data manipulation are other updates. Use the following link to see the full list of new features: http://tinyurl.com/3jpb96. Several patches are planned for Family Tree Maker 2009 that'll add bookbuilding features, better integration with the subscription data service Ancestry.com, an improved

relationship calculator and more.

The 2009 version will read Family Tree Maker files back to version 4 (which takes you to the mid-1990s). To learn more about it, see FamilyTreeMaker.com.

If you purchased Family Tree Maker 2008, don't buy version 2009—registered 2008 users are eligible to upgrade for free. If that's you, during early to mid-September, you'll receive an e-mail with instructions and a coupon code good for 2009 in the Ancestry store.

The offer will be available for a limited time, but the TGN spokesperson says there'll be follow-up emails, so if you just ordered 2008, you still have time to register the software and be eligible for the free upgrade. Get more information on the free upgrade offer on Ancestry.com's blog.

Here I found the following two databases for Philadelphia records: (1) death certificates 1803-1915; and marriage record indexes 1885-1951. As a result I now possess many important records pertaining the PFEFFER, KNECHT, and MILDENBERG families.

On a recent visit to York county, PA I visited the cemetery at St. Luke's Lutheran Church in Chanceford Township where I took many photographs of headstones of ILGES/ELLIS and ARNOLD family members.

Many new volumes have been added to my Genealogy Reference Library during the past three months. The USA Collection web page now totals well over 200 books covering state-wide, county, and local subjects in 33 states.

A few months ago I was contacted by David Christman who has developed a website, http://www.christmanfamily.net/, dedicated to the Christman surname. David invited me to take a look at his creation and requested that I provide a link from our own Christman Surname web page to his website. As a result I and my brother Tom became interested in the possibility of creating a similar site for our family history research.

As of this newsletter we've purchased the

appropriate software from , The Next Generation of Genealogy Sitebuilding[©] ("TNG"), see more at http://lythgoes.net/genealogy/software.php, as well as space on a web server. We are not sure what to expect at this point but do hope that the new website will make our online site management a lot easier than before. In addition we believe that the features included into the "TNG" software will enhance our users' ability to access more information at not only our website but all other "TNG" family history websites.
