ANCESTOR PROFILE

Albea E. Scruggs


Albea E. Scruggs was the 11th of the 15 children born to Joseph and Frances Scruggs. He was born in 1846 on the family farm located near Palmyra in Fluvanna County, Virginia. His early education was received in the public school near his home.

Although Albea was only 15 or 16 when the War Between the States commenced in 1861 he eventually followed his older brothers into the Army of the Confederacy most likely sometime after his eighteenth birthday, probably in the spring of 1864. It is known that Albea was a Private in Company B of the 5th Virginia Cavalry. Company B was commanded by Captain Frederick Windsor, and thus was usually referred to as "Windsor's Company". The 5th Virginia Cavalry was definitely involved in the fighting that occurred around Farmville, Virginia on April 6, 1865. It was in this battle that Albea's older brother James, a trooper of the 2nd Virginia Cavalry, captured the sword of the mortally wounded Union General Theodore Read. It is most probable that Albea participated in that and many other Cavalry battles and skirmishes that occurred during the final weeks of the war

during Grant's pursuit of Lee's army that ended at Appomattox on April 9, 1865. Records show that Albea signed parole papers at Charlottesville, Virginia on May 17, 1865.

After the war the economic prospects in his native state of Virginia were not very good as such Albea decided to seek his fortune in the more remote west because he believed that opportunities were more abundant in the newer states. In 1867 he migrated to California, first locating at Crow's Landing in Stanislaus County. Subsequently he made several trips back east but his interests remained in California.

One must wonder what circumstances encountered by Albea that led him to move clear across the United States? When Albea traveled to the west coast did he journey by land or sea? If by land did he go by train, horseback, stagecoach? If he made the transition by sea a landing at San Francisco may partially explain the reason why he initially settled in Stanislaus County.



In 1875 Albea relocated to Tulare County and began to raise livestock. In that same year he married Julia Rhodes Turner a widow residing in that county. It is interesting to note here that at this time Julia's father, William Rhodes, was well established as a stock-raiser in Tulare County. Could Albea have met his future wife as a result of business transactions with her father? Did Albea make the decision to move from Stanislaus to Tulare County because of his attraction to Julia? The next year, 1876, he purchased his ranch from a railroad company and began to make improvements; while at the same time followed grain farming as well as the raising of stock.

Albea fathered a total of nine children (7 boys and 2 girls). The family lived at a homestead located about 9 miles west of Porterville, California, near the town of Poplar. He and his family are listed in the 1880 Census as living in Tule

River Township. In the 1900 census Albea is listed as living in Tipton Township. Both he and his brother Samuel Monroe Scruggs are listed in 1890 and 1898 Great Register as living in the Woodville Precinct.

In 1892 he began setting out an orchard of prunes, pears, and peaches being one of the first in the area to devote land to this purpose. By 1905 Albea owned 400 acres of land on section 28 and 33, township 21, range 26. Of this land 150 acres was devoted to the cultivation of alfalfa, and 25 acres in an orchard. He also maintained a dairy that was noted locally for the excellence of its products. The entire property was under irrigation by the Woods Central Irrigation Company of which he was a director. At another location, on the plains, he farmed 480 acres in grain.



Albea passed away in 1906 at the age of 60. (4) He was buried on 27 December 1906 in the Old Porterville Cemetery, (Plot D-199-6). He was a member of the Methodist Church in Poplar. Fraternally he was a member of the Independent Order of the Odd Fellows. His political inclinations were conservative as he usually voted for the Democratic party in national elections.

UPDATE ON THE SCRUGGS DNA PROJECT

And the DNA Project marches on! Recently, a 3rd cousin performed a 12 marker Y-DNA test in conjunction with the ongoing DNA testing with the Scruggs Family Association. The results of this recent test are back and they match with the first two tests performed with one variation. Since this 3rd Y-DNA sample was taken from a descendent of Samuel Scott Scruggs Jr. brother to our Joseph C. Scruggs and sons of Samuel Scott Scruggs Sr. who is more closely related to our Samuel Scott Scruggs Sr. this supports the theory that this Non-paternity event took place prior to our Samuel Scott Scruggs Sr. Since the 12 marker test is considered an entry level test and provides only limited information, we are currently upgrading this sample to a 37 marker test. This will give a greater amount of data to compare with our first two samples. Again we would like to point out that with all of the research attempted on not only the Scruggs surname as a whole but within this family specifically, there has been absolutely no gain made to who the parents were of Samuel Scott Scruggs Sr. Neither do we know who his paternal grandfather was. We do believe that his paternal grandmother was a Susannah Carter b. abt. 1720 in Henrico County, Virginia. She named Samuel Scott Scruggs Sr. as her executor and sole heir in her will. It is in this "black hole" that we believe lies the non paternity event. Also, we still match a John PARKER, b Abt. 1525 Essex England, d Abt. 1581 Essex England and a Samuel Parker, b. Feb, 8, 1817, Lubec, ME, d. Feb. 2, 1899, Oak Hill, St. Stephen, NB, Canada.

GENEALOGY USA TOUR
