FEATURE ARTICLE

Our Scruggs Non-Paternity Event

In our Fall 2005 issue of this newsletter we published a feature article entitled, A New Family Mystery Discovered!!! due to the fact that we were shocked to discover that our DNA results bore absolutely no kinship to any other Scruggs family lineage. Since then we have spent time seeking information that might explain our Scruggs line back beyond our ancestor Samuel Scott Scruggs. Although we haven't solved this mystery we have been able to bring together more facts that should be useful in our further research. As a result of our findings the Scruggs Family Association had requested we write an article for their semi-annual publication, "Searching For Scruggs". The following is the article as submitted.

In 2003 the Scruggs Family Association (SFA) in concert with Family Tree DNA, sponsored the Scruggs Family DNA Project. At that time there were approximately thirteen separate active family lines of research. The primary question, that researchers were asking was, "could some of these separate family lines have a most recent common ancestor?" The answer turned out to be yes – and no. All of the family line DNA results were close enough to clearly indicate an "estimated most recent common ancestor" (EMRCA) among them all at some point in history. Tests have proven that the DNA of our Samuel Scott Scruggs, Sr., born in Albemarle County, Virginia in 1757 does not match any of the other Scruggs family lines!

During the first two years of the SFA DNA Project testing, our Samuel Scott Scruggs, Sr. line had three cousins complete a Y-chromosome DNA test. When the results of our cousins test, (2 of which were 37 marker), were compared with the results of the other 12 testers of various lines, we were shocked to discover that our DNA results bear absolutely no kinship to any of them. The analysis from the Spring 2005 edition of Searching for Scruggs Quarterly magazine produced by the SFA reads as follows, "...Samuel S. /Jane Childress Scruggs could be a totally new and different Scruggs branch, but more likely is what is called as a *non-paternity* event. This is one of the risks run when Y DNA testing is used. Somewhere in this line a legal adoption, unannounced adoption, infidelity, or

illegitimacy occurred. Some male in this line did not have a Scruggs as his biological father."

In the Last Will and Testament of Susanna Carter Scruggs she identifies Samuel Scott as her grandson and makes him her sole heir and executor. As a result of new-found knowledge we are currently speculating that Susanna Carter, born about 1711 in Henrico County, Virginia and the daughter of Theodrick Carter of Henrico County, Virginia, married, c. 1736, to a John Scruggs, who was born c. 1709, son of Richard Scruggs of St. Peters Parish, New Kent County, Virginia. We also feel that John Carter Scruggs, presumably John C. Scruggs, witness to Susanna's will, was a son of John and Susanna Carter Scruggs. The connections of these Carter and Scruggs families are illustrated as follows: (1) Susanna Carter's sister Mary married Drury Scruggs, son of Richard Scruggs of St. Peters Parish, New Kent County, Virginia; (2) Theodrick Carter, Jr's 1741 land purchase cites Richard Scruggs as a witness; (3) John Scruggs, Thomas Carter, and Theodrick Carter were all involved with William Randolph's will, executed 1742; (4) A 1745 Goochland County land transaction by John Scruggs of Albemarle County is described as, "Property being the plantation whereon the said Scruggs lately dwelt, so as and adjoining lines of Theo^d Carter, and Thomas Bassett, and Robert Burton"; and (5) with regard to the Carter and Scruggs families living in close proximity, it appears that they lived within 20 miles of each other and that some of their lands were contiguous but separated by the Chickahominy River.

Based upon the aforementioned new information we have listed a few of our more prominent theories and welcome any and all new ideas and discussion that might help us to better focus our research:

Theory 1 – Perhaps Susanna Carter Scruggs and the aforesaid John Scruggs had an unwed Scruggs daughter that became pregnant at an early age. The father may have been unable to marry this unwed Scruggs mother. Perhaps he died before being able to or simply "scooted off" to parts unknown when this event took place. Possibly the unwed Scruggs mother died in childbirth. The end result may have been an

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adoption legal or otherwise of Samuel Scott by grandparents Susanna Carter Scruggs & her husband John. In this way Samuel Scott grows up as a legitimate Scruggs male and takes the Scruggs surname.

Theory 2 – Shift back another generation: Suppose Susanna Carter has a son from a previous relationship. Susanna's husband John Scruggs then legally or otherwise adopts her son who in turn fathers Samuel Scott. Again Samuel Scott takes the Scruggs surname.

Theory 3 – This theory may not account for the fact that Susanna Carter Scruggs identifies Samuel Scott

Scruggs as her grandson. His revolutionary war pension application clearly states that Samuel Scott Scruggs used the alias Scott Martin. Interestingly, a male bastard child of Hannah Allen and a man named Martin (first name possibly James) was baptized in St. Peter's Church, New Kent County, Virginia in 1736, as recorded in the vestry book. This Hannah thereafter married a James Scruggs sometime before 1744. Ostensibly, this John Martin/Allen would have been raised by his mother Hannah and later stepfather James Scruggs thereby taking the Scruggs family surname. Perhaps this John Martin/Allen/Scruggs becomes the father of our Samuel Scott Scruggs.

Arizona Genealogy Birth and Death Certificates

at: < <http://genealogy.az.gov/> >. Hard to beat if you have Arizona ancestors, this site serves up birth records (1855 to 1933) and death records (1844 to 1958) linked to PDFs of the originals.

Colorado Historic Newspaper Collection

at: < <http://tinyurl.com/3c5xwuy> >. This ambitious collaboration between the Colorado State Library and the Colorado Historical Society is like a paperboy from the past, delivering more than 500,000 pages from 163 newspapers published in Colorado from 1859 to 1923.

Colorado Plateau Digital Archives

at: <http://archive.library.nau.edu/index.php> This Northern Arizona University site covers the whole Southwest with digitized photographs, oral history interviews, films, diaries, letters and maps.

Washington State Digital Archives

at: <http://www.digitalarchives.wa.gov/> Leading the way in digitizing its past, Washington State now has more than 85 million records online, with more than 26 million of them searchable. You'll find vital records, censuses, land records, military records, naturalization documents and more.

Nevada Census Database

Western States Historical Marriage Records Index

at: <http://tinyurl.com/453ggik> The goal for this index is to put historical marriage data from 12 Western states at the fingertips of genealogy researchers. While not there yet, the site now has nearly 700,000 nuptials, including most pre-1900 marriages for Arizona, Idaho and Nevada, and many counties of those states extend into the 1930s or later.

1940 Census Will be Free on Ancestry.com

Subscription genealogy website Ancestry.com has decided to make the 1940 census images and index—which will be on the site after the 1940 census is opened next year for research—free to search and view through 2013.

There will be more than 3.8 million images with 130 million records. The records will be indexed by 45 fields, meaning you'll be able to search on the name, street address, county, state, parents' birthplaces and

more. The records won't be on Ancestry.com right when the census is released April 2, 2012. Ancestry.com's press release says they'll commence "streaming onto the website in mid-April 2012."

If you can't wait until mid-April the record images will be available first on the National Archives' website at, < <http://www.archives.gov/> > but they won't be searchable right away by name.

New Records Uploaded to the Databases at RootsWeb and Ancestry

Our Moreland–Scruggs Family Line database at *Ancestry.Com* currently contains the records of **3,264** persons. The database can be viewed by all Ancestry subscribers. This tree will change every three months as we edit, remove, or otherwise modify the data therein.

An updated version of our MMPS Database was recently uploaded to the, open to all and FREE, “World Connect” site at *RootsWeb.com*. Several new records have been added over the past three months. We now have information on **3,160** persons. Since we update the database quarterly to coincide with the publishing of this newsletter our readers are all reminded to take a look at what is new with our family history research. If you do check out the website

you may find some new information that will enhance your own research or you may find some errors in ours that we need to know of.

I recently found this court order in Frederick County, Virginia regarding a Catherine **DeMOSS** in 1748: Order Book 2, page 407. Order of binding Moses **HENDRICK**, "*Ordered that Morgan **MORGAN**, Gent. Bind Moses **HENDRICK**, orphan of Hendry **HENDRICK**, deceased, to Catherine **DeMOSS**, she in open court having agreed to cause him to be taught the trade of weaver and also to read, write cipher, likewise give him at the expiration of his time a suit of clothes, a cow or a young mare for his freedom dues.*" Although the surname in this document is **HENDRICK**, not **HENRY**, I'd like to know what anyone might have for this Catherine **DeMOSS**. My Aaron **HENRY** was born 1 OCT 1744, the son of Moses **HENRY** who died 1750. There were several men by the names of Aaron & Moses **HENRY** in Frederick County, Virginia.
