he picture appearing in Volume 1, Number 1, page 5 was thought to be Moses Groom Tullis and his wife Mary Summerset. After publication and mailing, we received a delightful letter from Dewey and

Garnet Tullis. They advised that they had inherited a photograph of Moses and Mary Tullis and that the picture published was definitely not them.

We retraced the origin of the mistaken picture and discovered that it was from a collection of family pictures which was owned by Walter Hercules Tullis. It was marked "Grandfather and Grandmother Tullis". However, upon close examination, it appears that they were indeed the Grandparents of Walter Tullis, but on the maternal side. We base this on a comparative analysis between the mistaken photo and a picture of Henrietta Clay Ogle, Walter's Mother. The similarity is quite defined.

We feel that when the photo was marked it was known to be the Grandparents of Walter, but it was assumed that it was the Tullis'.

JOEL TULLIS PIONEER

oel Tullis was born in Hardin County, Kentucky on April 3, 1800 to Joel Tullis Sr. and his wife Catherine Poppin Tullis. When he was quite young he moved with his parents to Ohio. In 1818, he

migrated to Indiana where he met and married his wife. On April 26, 1826, Joel took possession of the N.W. 1/4 of Section 2 of what is now Schuyler County, Illinois. It was on this farm that most of his children were born. He had married Miss Cassie McKee, the daughter of William McKee in Crawford County, Indiana on June 17, 1824. During the Blackhawk War (April 26 to Sept. 21, 1832) Joel served in the Militia. It is said that he was one of the only two men strong enough to lift a cannon which was used to test the strength of the soldiers camped near Chicago. Joel was only 5 feet 8 inches tall and weighed 185 pounds. He could endure much more of the hardships of his day than most of his peers.

During the late 1840's a missionary names Marus

Whitman had succeeded in taking a two-wheeled cart across the great plains and the Rocky Mountains to Oregon. At the same time the American Fur Traders were making a concerted effort to hold Oregon from the British Fur Company which laid claim to the same territory. To encourage migration to Oregon, over-bright stories were systematically spread through the country to accomplish this aim. It appears that these stories were the cause of Joel Tullis giving up his fertile farm in Buena Vista Township, Illinois for the prospects of a better life in Oregon.

Perhaps Joel Tullis felt he was better suited for the life of a pioneer than that of a farmer, or perhaps the love of adventure led him on. Regardless of his private motives, he sold his farm to one Charles Moore, loaded a caravan drawn by horses, oxen and cows, and started for Oregon in the Spring of 1847. Unfortunately, there is no record of who besides Joel Tullis's family and a son-in-law, John McKee. (John McKee had married Joel's eldest child, who had just died after childbirth, leaving John to care for the infant daughter they had named Mary.)

The Tullis caravan was probably joined along the route to Oregon by other groups much like themselves. They successfully passed through the great plains and over the Rocky Mountains with nothing more interesting than an occasional raid on their stock by Indians and the loss of a few animals by drowning during the many river crossings. Upon reaching Oregon though, tragedy came in such magnitude that even these sturdy pioneers were deeply affected.

Several of the party contracted a fever (any ailment that they couldn't diagnose was declared Mountain Fever). During that fever epidemic, Joel's daughter Mary Tullis died. This was followed a few weeks later by a measles epidemic which caused the death of three more of Joel's daughters: Cassie, Sarah and Amanda, and John McKee's infant daughter, Mary McKee.

Looking back on the drastic effects a measles epidemic had, it can be safely assumed that the entire Tullis party was weakened by the hardships of their transcontinental journey and by drinking the alkali water found in the mountain deserts. All of these dead were buried near the Columbia River at The Dalles, Oregon.

Before getting settled in their new environment, Joel discovered that the farm equipment and supplies they had brought across the country were worth a great deal more in Oregon than in Illinois. Joel sold every bit of their equipment and then did a little prospecting, finding some gold. He had enough to book passage on a ship bound for New Orleans, and river boat passage to Illinois. After that expenditure, he still had enough money left over to re-establish a farm. John McKee, Joel's son-in-law, bought some of the equipment and moved on to California.

Joel and his family made the passage to Illinois, arriving at Frederick in early 1850. (They are listed in the 1850 Census for Schuyler County, Illinois, which was taken in mid-summer.)

Upon arriving they were met by Joel's Father-in-law, William McKee, who had brought a wagon and a carriage. For the children, this must have been the most impressive of the entire trip. Meeting their grandfather, and again hearing the stories about the old homestead and friends and relatives. The boys rode in the wagon, while the girls rode in the faster, more comfortable carriage.

Joel bought the Swan farm and settled down, now that there were no new lands to be explored in the United States. He eventually became a Justice of the Peace and was known as Squire Tullis.

His wife of 46 years, Cassie McKee Tullis, passed away on the 30th of March 1870. Joel remarried and was very unsuccessful in this new venture. His second wife was also named Cassie McKee. She was the daughter of Thomas McKee, brother of the aforementioned William. Unfortunately, this marriage ended in divorce.

After the Civil War, in which Joel's sons Horea, John Henry and James fought, the boys in his family migrated to Hutchinson, Kansas.

Joel at first appears to have stayed in Illinois, where many of his neighbors had never seen an Indian and did not know a pirogue from a pin cushion. Joel knew Illinois when a man needed only his rifle to supply most of his needs, but lived there to see a poorhouse built. In his later years, Joel moved to Hutchinson, Kansas, and lived with his son. He died at Hutchinson on October 26, 1888.
