
FINDING ELLA VOIGHT

Ella Voight was the tenth child born to Nancy Rogers and John Voight. We find her first census record in 1880 (right) where she is 9 years old. So she was born around 1870/1871. Further search of the records for Ella Voight was unsuccessful until an examination of Joseph Voight's 1929 obituary (below) revealed that, among others, he was survived by a sister "Mrs. E. C. Jordan of Baltimore." The initial "E" suggests this is Ella. The sister named "Elizabeth" in the 1880 census was Sarah Elizabeth AKA "Mrs. J. E. White" in the obit. The sister "Julia M" was actually Emily Julia called "Mrs. T. M. Mathias" in the obit.




Joseph Voight, aged 64, died yesterday afternoon at 1:40 o'clock at the residence, 632 Redgate avenue. He was a native of Nansemond County and had been a resident of Norfolk for 25 year and was prominent in business affairs of the city. Besides his wife. Mrs. Lillian O Voight, he is survived by three daughter, the Misses Jessie, Lillian and Marion Voight; one son, Joseph Voight Jr.; one granddaughter, Margaret Wright, all of Norfolk; three sisters, Mrs. T. M. Mathias, of Corapeake, N. C.; Mrs. J. E. White, also of Mrs. E. C. Jordan, of Baltimore, and one brother, J. B. Volght, of Norfolk. Mr. Voight was a member of Norfolk Lodge No. 38, B. P. O. Elks. Funeral services will be held at the residence tomorrow afternoon at 2 o'clock. Interment will be in Elmwood Cemetery.


"Mrs. E. C. Jordan" just had to be Ella. Joseph's obit held the first clue to Ella's whereabouts!

If Ella was living in Baltimore in 1929 with the last name "Jordan" it was worth a search of the Baltimore city directories of that period to try to find her. Fortunately there were only a couple columns of Jordans in the 1928 Baltimore directory and only one entry for an Ella Jordan - the wife of George W Jordan!

If there was only one Ella Jordan in Baltimore, the odds are very good that it's our Ella Voight. Her trail grew hot...



The 1930 census for Baltimore also shows George and Ella at the 261 Colgate Ave address. The record indicates that both George and Ella are 50 years old, but she should be 59 or 60 in 1930. Maybe Ella married a man 10 years younger and she's lying about her age now? That's not terribly uncommon. This Mrs. Ella Jordan was born in Virginia which supports the proposition that she is indeed Ella Voight. The Jordans own their house worth \$2,000 and rent space to another couple. There are no children listed. George is a night watchman and he was born in North Carolina. This census also tells us that George was 18 when he first married and Ella was 16 at her first marriage. So maybe this is a second marriage for each of them.



A search for a George W. Jordan born in North Carolina circa 1880 brings him up in the 1920 census. He's a 39 year old widower in Gates County NC living with his sixteen year old son Roy. George is farming. Roy has quit school and he's a laborer on a horse farm. And there's even more to learn from this 1920 census record...

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George and Roy Jordan are family number 111 in the 1920 census for Holly Grove Township. Family number 104 on the previous page is Ella's sister Sallie whose husband James White owns a horse farm. Sallie's son Romie White also lives nearby and runs his own horse farm. Did Roy Jordan work for the White family?

Ella had other relatives living near George Jordan, too. On the following page of the census we find that family number 117 is the family of Lillie Mathias and G.C. Hollowell. Lillie Hollowell is Ella's niece, the daughter of Emily Julia Mathias. Emily Julia's own household was family number 157. They all lived along Virginia Road in Holly Grove Township. Perhaps one of her sisters, Sallie or Emily, introduced Ella to the widowed man who lived down the road. Certainly the extended Voight family and George Jordan knew of each other by virtue of proximity in their small farming community.

Going back to that 1928 Baltimore City Directory and turning the page we find one listing for a Roy Jordan, a molder with a wife named Mary. This could be George's son, though Jordan is a common name and without more information it is impossible to say if this Roy Jordan might be George's son - who would be 24 in 1928, certainly old enough to be married...

George Jordan is still in his home at 261 Colgate in Baltimore in the 1940 census. But now he's a single white male working in the steel mills. He's listed as single – not widowed or divorced. There are two lodgers in the house and there's no mention of Ella. Were George and Ella divorced after more than a decade together? Did she die? There's still more to do to find out about her. What happened to Ella Voight?

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The last record on Ancestry.com for a living Ella Jordan is in the 1937 Baltimore directory:


We've seen her given middle initials of "C," "T" and "M." One of them could be for her own middle name. One of them could have been the surname of a first husband. Any of them or all of them could be erroneous. But if one of them is an initial for her first husband's surname, then it could be a clue to finding out about her earlier history, including possible children.

Note to Self >>> September 2012, plans for further research: Searching line by line for "Ella" (last name maybe starting with "C", "T" or "M.") as a wife or a widow in the 1900, 1910 & 1920 census records for Nansemond CoVA & Gates CoNC. (How many records would that be? Maybe 2500? 5000? Do-able.) Did Ella have any children by her first husband, whoever he was? >>> Or follow up the Roy Jordan name for his living descendents who might know about Ella. >>> Or check Maryland death records and Baltimore obituaries 1937 - 1940.

At this point another researcher took the torch and ran on with the search for Ella's story. Thank you, Janie Evans, collaborator and genealogist extraordinaire, for unearthing Ella's first family!


A search on Ancestry.com of the 1900, 1910, and 1920 census records for any "Ella" born about 1870/71 in Nansemond County resulted in one Ella of the right age who was a widow in 1920. Ella Corbitt (there's the initial "C") was a candidate for our Ella Voight.

In the Cypress Magisterial District in 1900 Ella M Corbitt gives her birth as September 1870 in Virginia. She's 29. Ella and G B Corbitt have been married 11 years. Their children are Pearlie M age 10, McGregor age 8, Carrie L age 6, Grover Cleveland age 5, Waddell age 3 and Annie Susie age 1. Mr. Corbitt is from North Carolina. He's a farmer and he's 34 years old.



In 1910 "Gus" Corbitt is 47 years old and a general farmer. Ella is 38 and she reports being the mother of 11 children, 7 of whom are still living. Daughters Pearl and Annie, age 20 and 10 respectively, live at home. Sons Grover and Mack, 15 and 18 respectively, work on a horse farm. Grover and Mack may be working for their uncle James White (Sallie Voight's husband) who had a horse farm in North Carolina, just down the road and across the state line. At 14 Wardell is already a farm hand. Grover, Mack, Wardell and Annie have all attended school "anytime since Sept 1, 1909."

There are 2 new children since 1900 – sons Fitz Lee age 4 and Wilbur age 1. The daughter Carrie who was 6 in 1900 is missing in this census and presumably among the 4 children who are deceased. Childhood was much more dangerous then. Without vaccinations or antibiotics childhood mortality was much higher than it is in the 21st Century.

By 1916 they moved to Portsmouth. In the city directory Gus is called Gustave (?) and he's a "supt" Grover's an "appr" and Wardell is a "blksmith." Pearl is over 18 & single so she gets a listing, too.

1920 finds Ella Corbitt is a 45 year old widow living at 1607 High St in Portsmouth City. Four of her sons are living with her and one daughter-in-law.

McGregor is 27, working as a street car conductor.

Grover is 24 and he's a cushion maker in a carriage factory.

Fitzhugh Lee is 14. He works in a carriage factory as a trimmer and he has attended school "any time since Sept 1, 1919."

22 year old Wardell is a boilermaker in the U.S. Navy ship yard. Wardell's wife Susie is 17. One imagines that Susie was expected to help Ella with all the cooking, cleaning, washing and ironing for those four hard-working men. Certainly Mack had uniforms to keep starched and pressed. Wardell's son Louis also reports that his mother Susie was a great cook. It seems like she might have been a breath of fresh air in the Corbitt home in 1920. A dose of young love and good food would be a blessing to a home that we will find has suffered great loss and grief.

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Is Ella Corbitt really the same woman who married George Jordan from Holly Grove and moved off to Baltimore by 1926? We need more evidence.

Wardell and Susie Corbitt are in the 1929 Baltimore city directory. That supports the theory that we might have found Ella Voight. But it's not proof yet.


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
Further searching of the Corbitt family members on Ancestry.com leads to a cemetery record on Find-A-Grave. It lists a man named Grover Cleveland Corbett (spelled with an "e") buried in Oak Grove Cemetery in Portsmouth in 1964. Searching the Oak Grove Cemetery records with both spellings yields more of the family – A.G. Corbett deceased October 6, 1918, Pearl who died October 2, 1918 and Wilbur who died October 7, 1918. Annie Corbitt Cotton is also there, died September 30, 1918. Perhaps one of the obituaries will reveal their mother's maiden name. And what's with 4 deaths in the fall of 1918?


Eureka! Grover Cleveland Corbitt's 1964 obituary confirms that his mother IS ELLA VOIGHT. Now we know Ella Voight's first husband's name was Augustus B Corbitt and the family we found is, in fact, hers. This obit does not mention her Jordan surname.

Obituaries for Pearl and Wilbur lead to another story...


We learn that 19 year old Annie was married to Joseph V. Cotton but she died at her parents' address on September 30, 1918.









Two days later on October 2, 1918, Pearl died - even before Annie's funeral which was held in the family's home on October 3. Pearl's funeral was scheduled to be held at the undertakers on October 5. Friends and acquaintances were invited to attend.





Pearl's funeral was reported in the paper on October 6.




This was the flu pandemic of 1918 which peaked in the Norfolk area in October. Thousands in the Tidewater died within a few weeks. It hit young and healthy people the hardest. Pregnant women were the most vulnerable. Some places used steam shovels to dig the graves because there were so many to dig and many of the gravediggers were taken ill, too. Worldwide 500 million people were infected. Between 20 & 50 million died. Wikipedia has an excellent article about "the greatest medical holocaust in history."

The flu was not finished with the Corbitt family yet. Pearl was buried on Saturday. Then her father died on Sunday October 6. The youngest child Wilbur died on the 7th. Ella and one of her other sons, Grover or Wardell or Fitzhugh, had already been in the "emergency hospital for several days." (The oldest son Mack was in France fighting with the British forces in WW I. He barely escaped succumbing to the flu in Europe, story on page 19.)



It's no wonder that the double funeral for Augustus "Gus" B Corbitt and his son Wilbur was a simple, private graveside service.

Between September 30 and October 7 – in just 8 days – Ella lost both of her daughters, her husband and her youngest child, her "baby" boy Wilbur. Who can imagine this mother's nightmare and her unspeakable heartbreak?

How does anyone recover from so much loss and suffering? Ella's story is a reminder that we can be thankful for and take joy in every day pleasures of ordinary lives - because it can all change in the twinkling of an eye.

We already know that Ella married a widower named George Jordan sometime between 1920 and 1926 when they show up in the Baltimore city directory. The last listing for them together in Baltimore is 1937. Ella's own obituary was found in Portsmouth newspaper archives. She died in 1939.

She was buried in the Oak Grove Cemetery in Portsmouth where Gus Corbitt and their children Annie Susie Corbitt Cotton, Pearl and Wilbur had been buried in 1918. Grover would also be buried in Oak Grove in 1964.






Ella Voight Birth Sept 1870 in Nansemond County, Virginia, USA Death 25 May 1939 in Baltimore?

In 1910 Ella had reported that she had given birth to 11 children. Only these eight listed here lived long enough to be named in any census. Carrie died before 1910. Pearl, Annie, Wilbur and Ella's husband Gus died in the flu of 1918. She and 4 sons survived - Mack, Grover, Wardell and Fitzhugh.

It was Grover's 1964 obituary which confirmed that Ella Corbitt was Ella Voight. Between 1920 and 1964 there's not much known about Grover. He had been a "carriage maker" and a cushion maker in a carriage factory in the Portsmouth records up until 1920. Grover's nephew Fitzhugh Corbitt Jr. remembers that Grover was "always nursing home in Baltimore." He does not remember Grover ever being married or having children.




There is a Grover C <u>Corbett</u> listed in the 1924 Baltimore city directory. He's married to "Ruth" and works as a carpenter. Is it our Grover? We know that Ella was living in Baltimore with her



second husband George Jordan by 1926. Perhaps Grover moved there first. Grover's name does not appear again in the Baltimore city directories as either Corbett or Corbitt.

We find a 42 year old SWM named G. Corbett in the Spring Grove State Hospital in Catonsville MD in the 1940 census. According to his nephew Louis Corbett this is, indeed, Ella's son Grover. Lou remembers that Grover was only sometimes in a wheelchair. We don't know how he came to hospitalized or why he was confined to a wheelchair. Louis remembers that his father Wardell did visit Grover at the hospital but the children always waited outside.



Ella's son Mack Corbitt is found in the 1935 Norfolk directory working as an auto mechanic for the Virginia Electric & Power Co.





The 1940 census finds Mack still single at age 45, still living in Norfolk and working as a mechanic but residing as a lodger with Mr.& Mrs. Bowden at 508 29th St.



Mack's 1940 address also rang a bell. From Sallie Voight's story we know that Mack's cousin Nannie White and her husband Herbert E Harrell lived in the same house in 1951!

The earliest record found of Harrells at 508 W 29th St. is in the 1942 Norfolk city directory. Sometime before 1942 Mack's cousin's family had bought the house at 508 W 29th plus the one next door to it and by 1942 Nannie & Herbert are at 510 W 29th St. James W and Edward H Harrell live at 508.


Mack is definitely in touch with his Norfolk cousins from Sallie White's family. Remember, too, that Sallie lived very near to Ella's second husband George Jordan back in Gates Co, NC in 1920. It seems that Ella and Sallie had to be close because their children were close, too.

There is a record of a Mack Corbitt in the Florida Marriage index for August, 1962, but the index does not reveal any more identifying information about the man nor about the bride, not even her name. (The document can be seen in Mack's folder within Ella's folder on the CD.)

Again, the nephew Fitzhugh Corbitt Jr recalls that Mack was a machinist who married late in life and he had no children; also that Mack, too, eventually moved to Baltimore. Then when he retired Mack & his wife moved to a trailer somewhere in Gates Co., NC. The first name of Mack's wife might have been "Hattie."

The North Carolina Death record confirms that Mack was married when he died in Gates County in 1974.




Wardell Corbitt, Susie and their two daughters, Odell 9 & Katherine 7, are living at 503 Rappolla St. in Baltimore in the 1930 census, just one block away from Wardell's first cousins Oscar E. and Othar L. Voight (they were sons of Ella's brother Oscar Leroy Voight.)

Wardell is a "moulder" in a foundry - as is his cousin Oscar E Voight. (Roy Jordan back on page 3 was another molder.) They were lucky men to find steady jobs in the Depression.



Wardell also became a deacon and lay minister in the Patterson Park Baptist Church. His special ministry was visiting the sick.



The Corbitt's are sharing their rented row house with the Pierce brothers and the wife and daughter of one of the Pierce's. Each family pays \$20 monthly for rent. Neither family has a radio. In 2007 the house at 503 Rappolla (right) has more than a radio; it boasts a satellite dish and an air conditioner.

In the1940 census Wardell and Susie are still in Baltimore. Now he's working as an engineer of some sort in a power plant. Daughter Odell, who would be 19, has left the household. Catherine has finished 3 years of high school and she's still attending school. They have 6 years old twins Louise A and Louis P. We learn that Wardell finished 5 years of school and Susie one year of high school. They own their home at 605 Newkirk. (Remember Roy Jordan on page 3? He had also lived on the 600 block of South Newkirk back in 1928. Coincidence? Perhaps.)




Fitzhugh Lee Corbitt

The 1930 census show that Fitzhugh has married. He and his wife Helen live at 1713 Prentis Ave in Portsmouth. Fitzhugh is listed as an "interior decorator" for a "dry goods store."





1937 finds Fitzhugh Corbitt & his wife Helen in the Portsmouth city directory. Fitzhugh works in the upholstery department at W G Schwartz Co in Norfolk. They've moved a block away to 1612 Prentis Av.








In the 1940 census Fitzhugh and Helen are still in Portsmouth. Fitzhugh works in the interior decorating department of a department store and they have a baby boy, Fitzhugh Lee Corbitt Jr. Now the family owns their house at 1509 Atlanta in Portsmouth (photo inset).

Fitzhugh Lee Corbitt, Jr. Wilson Hi-Y, D. O. Club, History Club, Science Club, Traffic Assistant Fitzhugh Corbitt Jr was an only child. His high school yearbook shows that he was busy in a variety of activities. Online records show his 1978 Las Vegas legal marriage to Patricia Lynn Corbitt. Fitzhugh explained that he and Patricia were first married in Portsmouth in 1953. The Las Vegas wedding was really a renewal of their vows. Fitzhugh and Patricia had no children.

Ella Voight's online story ends here with a flashback to the beginning of the search and her second husband George Jordan. In the January 1920 census in Gates Co, NC George Jordan was a 39 year old widower with a 16 year old son named Roy. Looking for his history reveals this family in April 29, 1910 census for Rowan Co, NC. This family is headed by 28 year-old George Jordan and there is a five year old son named Roy. If they each have birthdays between January 17 and April 29, the ages match perfectly. This 1910 George Jordan is a night watchman in a cotton mill. Ella's husband George Jordan is also a night watchman in the 1930 Baltimore census we already saw on page 2.

If this 1910 census records the same George Jordan that Ella married in the 1920's, one can

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are gone by the time we meet him in 1920. Did he also lose multiple family members to the flu of 1918? Perhaps that connection of shared grief was strong enough to lead Ella and George to marry each other despite their ten year age difference. Every genealogical discovery leads to new questions. There's always more research that can be done.

ADDENDUM

The records are confusing with the family name originally spelled "Corbitt," then somtimes "Corbett." Wardell's family eventually adopted the "Corbett" spelling and Fitzhugh's family kept "Corbitt." It is not clear from the records which spelling Mack and Grover preferred to use.

TWO FAMILY ANECDOTES

From Louis P. Corbett, October 2012:

When Wardell and Susie Corbett got married they took a honeymoon trip to the Blue Ridge mountains, driving the family's old Model T with bad brakes. They were having a fine time going up the scenic mountain roads, but when when they started going downhill on the first steep, narrow and winding two-lane road, no doubt with a steep drop-off on one side, Wardell literally stood up on the brakes to maintain some kind of control of his car, lucky not to crash. It was a much more thrilling honeymoon than they had ever planned on!

From Fitzhugh Lee Corbitt Jr, October 2012:

Mack Corbitt was on the front lines in France in 1918 when the flu went through the troops. The only thing they could do with the many corpses was to bury them right there on the battlefield. Mack was ill enough that he had been pronounced dead and his grave was being dug. Someone was going through the bodies "kicking" gold teeth out of the dead soldiers. When he was kicked, Mack regained consciousness, making it clear that he was, indeed, living. His gold tooth saved his life.



Gus Corbitt's death certificate was written at the Portsmouth Emergency Hospital during the height of the flu epidemic. It gives very little information, not even his actual first name, his date of birth or his parents' names. It seems they were so busy with the flu patients that they took shortcuts with the paperwork.

Even though Fitzhugh's photo is the full front of his face and Mack's photo is in profile, they certainly look like brothers here. Fitzhugh Junior has said that they didn't look all that much alike in person, but after Fitzhugh Senior died, lying in his casket, he looked just like his brother Wardell.

Fitzhugh, Mack and Wardell are 3 of the 4 Corbitt children who survived the flu of 1918. Grover spent most of his life in a state hospital in Maryland and we have no photos of him.

Catherine married a young man named Jack Holmes and they lived in Baltimore but divorced later in life.

They had one daughter named Sharon and she is married and living in West Palm Beach in Florida.

Odell and Catherine are both deceased and Louise is in poor health.

Louise is married to Kenneth Willey and they have two children Debbie and Kenneth Jr. They live in Glen Burnie MD also.

I am 78 years old and in good health and also the last male in the Corbett line.

My wife's name is Catherine and we have two children, Karen Ingman and Joyce Kroneberger.

Karen is married and has daughter named Amy.

Joyce is married and has a daughter named Laura and a son named Kyle. Laura is married and has two boys named Jacob and Nathan and they live in Shippensberg Pa. We are really Blessed to have two great grandsons.
