## Nancy Jane Rogers

Born about 1839


This likeness of Nancy Jane Rogers Voight was taken from a portrait of Nancy that used to hang in the Gates County, NC home of her daughter Emily Julia Voight Mathias.

The documents in this chapter tell the story of the Rogers family from 1800 to 1880 . My comments are inserted in red into transcriptions of the earliest census records. All the documents came from Ancestry.com.

Research on Nancy's Rogers family begins with her mother's 1860 death record.

The Feb. 29, 1860 (leap year!) death record for Emely Rodgers, nee Smith, contains Emily Smith's vital information. (Different records spell her name Emily, Emely or Milley, Rogers or Rodgers.) She was born about 1806 in Gates County (It says "Virginia" though Gates County is in North Carolina and it borders Virginia.) Her parents' names are Richard and Sarah Smith. The record also confirms that Emily's husband was James Rodgers (also spelled "Rogers.").

James Rogers' parents Salley Griffith and Mills Rogers were married in 1809. James was born about 1810. Salley's formal married name would be Sarah Rogers, the same as the mother of James Rogers in later census records. James named his second son Mills and Nancy Jane named her second son Mills. All the names, ages, dates and places coincide with other data for Nancy's paternal line with no competing or conflicting data being found to cast doubt on this identification of James Rogers' parents as Mills Rogers and Salley Griffith.

$\square$ Line 13: James Rogers
Free White males: One under age 5; One age 5-10; One age 30-40 This tells us that James Rogers was born between 1800 and 1810; he has 2 sons, one under 10 and one under 5 .
Free White Females: One under age 5 This fits Nancy Jane Rogers, who was born about 1839.
One age 20-30 Based on her death record, Emely might be "about" 34...close enough in 1840.
Male Slaves: One under age 10, One age 56-100
Female Slaves: One under age 10, One age 10-25
Three family members are engaged in agriculture.
Total 9 persons.
Line 14 :Sarah Rogers, living next door to James Rogers. Since the 1840 census only named the head of each household, Sarah is probably a widow, most likely the widowed mother of James himself and she moves in with James \& his family by the 1850 census. Her household in 1840 includes: Free white males: one $10-15$, one $15-20$. (A couple younger brothers to James, born since 1820. That the youngest child could be 15 suggests his father was still living at least 15 years earlier, i.e. ca. 1825.) Free white females: one age $15-20$, one age 20-30, (two younger sisters to James, 1 born since 1820)

And one age 60-70 Meaning that Sarah herself was born between 1770 and 1780.
Male slaves: four < age 10, one age 10-24, one age $24-35$. Female slaves: two < age 10, 3 age $10-24$. Four family members are engaged in agriculture. Total: 16 persons.
Also enumerated on this page at line 8 is Quinton Baines, the same name as the man who married John T. Voight's sister Nancy Ann. Could be him, or maybe his Daddy.

Beginning in 1850 the federal census begins to list the names of all family members in a household and slaves are counted in a separate census.
In the $\mathbf{1 8 5 0}$ Census for Nansemond County, Virginia, the James and Emily Rogers family is found on page 288 , enumerated as family number 271


James Rogers, age 40, a farmer born about 1810 in Nansemond County, with real estate valued at $\$ 1500$, lives with his wife Emily, who is age 45; she was born in North Carolina about 1805. These five children are all born in Nansemond County-

## Richard T, age 15

Mills, age 14 (Nancy's second child and this brother who was a Confederate soldier were named after their paternal grandfather.)


Nancy, age 10 (born ~1840)
James G, age 7
Mary F, age 4
And Sarah Rogers, age 65, also born in Nansemond County ca 1785 , was most likely the widowed mother of James.

The household of Barsheba Rawls, age 50, is found three pages earlier and 28 families away from the Rogers family in this census. The Voights are family number 243 on page 285 as found in the chapter "John T. Voight Family of Origin." Living on the farm with his widowed mother Barsheba, is her 18 year bachelor old son John Voigt (no "h"). He's a "farmer" and the future husband of neighbor Nancy Rogers. John T Voight was 7 or 8 years older than his wife Nancy in the 1870 census. The math and geography work.

In 1850 James Rogers owned 8 slaves; his mother Sarah Rogers owned one.

From the Federal Mortality Census Schedules 1850 - 1880: The cause of Emily Rogers' death in 1860 is recorded as "dropsy," which usually refers to swelling, especially of the lower limbs, due to poor circulation and the water retention which is caused by congestive heart failure. She was 55.

Just for the record: it seems that in 1865 James Rogers paid $\$ 1.00$ tax on a carriage assessed at $\$ 262$. He was residing in Chuckatuck, located in the Upper Parish of Nansemond Co., VA


Between the 1865 tax record that we just saw and the 1870 census, below, James Rogers moved from Chuckatuck in the northern end of Nansemond County, near the mouth of the Nansemond River at Hampton Roads, to Cypress Chapel in the south end of the county, near the Great Dismal Swamp. Daughter Nancy Rogers and her husband John T. Voight, as well as John T. Voight's brother James Voight, all made the same move around the same time. One might wonder why.


Where did young Philip and Charles come from? Who are the young women Susan C. Vann and Catherine A. Vann?
The two black people, Rachel Wiggins and Elbert Vann, are hired help who live in the household.

It's very possible that between 1860 and 1870 James Rogers remarried, fathered Philip and Charles with a younger wife and was widowed again. The Vann girls could be his stepdaughters from the second wife. James Rogers' son, James G. Rogers, came back home from the Civil War as a disabled Confederate veteran; he lived on his father's farm in Cypress Chapel and never married.

I searched for the woman who was James Rogers' second wife, the mother of Phillip and Charlie Rogers as well as Susan and Catherine Vann, those girls who lived in James Rogers' household in the 1870 census. I came up with these interesting results:

James Rogers and Mrs. Annie M. Vann (a previously married woman, possibly with children) were married in Gates County, NC, in April 1863.
(Her daughters from her first marriage would be Susan
Vann, born about 1860, and Catherine Vann, born
about 1861; they were just toddlers when Mrs. Annie M. Vann married James Rogers.)
Phillip, the first son of James and Annie Rogers was born in Feb 1864, about 10 months after the wedding.

When Annie M. Rogers, the wife of James Rogers, died in Nansemond County in May of 1868, it was about a year following the birth of their second son Charles Rogers. Annie left James with four motherless children.
It seems that Annie M. Vann Rogers was born in South Carolina.

The girls Susan C. Vann and Catherine ("Cattie") A. Vann were both married in 1879, giving the names of their parents as Abram and Annie Vann.


Now I think we know the name of James Rogers' second wife who was the mother of his two youngest sons - as well as the mother of his stepdaughters from that 1870 census. We also have the name of her first husband. Further searching for Annie and Abram Vann, however, has led to dead ends - so far.

1880, Cypress Magisterial District, Nansemond Co., James Rogers


In 1880 the 69 year old James Rogers still has four children living at home: James G., Mary, Phillip and Charly range in age from 35 to 13 . This is the last written record I found for James Rogers, the maternal grandfather of our Voight clan. He died sometime after 1880. This is also the last record that I could find for Mary Rogers until she is discovered as the widow Harrell, with Charles in 1910 and his son in 1920.

Nancy Jane Rogers had four documented full siblings and two half－brothers．Some sources list several more．（Those same sources also attribute the children Philip and Charles to Emily who had died in 1860， before they were even born．Had she still been living，Emily would have been in her late 50＇s when Phillip and Charles were born－not likely．）

Nancy＇s brother Richard Thomas Rogers married Almira Savage and farmed land near his father till he died in 1909．Richard and Almira had eight children．Richard

Almira＇s cousin Texanna married John T．Voight＇s brother James．See the chapter called＂Kissin＇Cousins＂in the Misc． folder on the CD to try to understand the Voight－Rogers－Savage family connections．

"During the Civil War Nancy's brother Mills Rogers, Jr. served in the 41st Virginia Infantry, Company I of the Confederate Army. Sergeant Rogers was born June 10, 1834[?], son of James and Milly (Emily) Smith Rogers. He owned 639 acres two miles east of Suffolk.
Rogers was wounded in action at Spotsylvania in 1864, about a year before the end of the war. He returned to the Cypress Chapel area and then was engaged in farming

He married $1^{\text {st }}$ Ellen Duke; his $2^{\text {nd }}$ wife was Sarah Eliza Boyt (1838-1907), daughter of David and Abausha Knight Boyt whom he married on Dec, 18, 1882.
Late in life he was almost blind. Mills Rogers died February 3, 1920, and was buried in Wesley Chapel Methodist Churchyard."(Source: Clarence Whitley, the Whitley Family Tree, Ancestry.com)
Nancy's and Mills' brother James G. Rogers, the older son who still lived at home with his father at least till the 1880 census, was also a veteran of the $41^{\text {st }}$ Virginia Infantry. The Virginia $41^{\text {st }}$ saw action at some of the war's bloodiest battles including Fredericksburg, Chancellorsville, Gettysburg, Spottsylvania and Wilderness. The Rogers brothers survived but not unscathed.
In 1904, at age 61, James G. Rogers applied for a veteran's pension based on total blindness related to "typhoid and neuralgia" contracted while in the service. Perhaps that explains why he never married and he continued to live at home long after the war. The census records show that James had claimed to work on the family farm in some capacity prior to his pension application. A copy of his pension application is among other documents about some of Nancy's siblings on the Voight Family Roots CD, in the folder for Nancy Jane Rogers Family of Origin, subfolder for her siblings. The same folder also includes documentation for the siblings featured on the next page: James G., Mary F., Phillip L, and Charles M. Rogers.

James G. Rogers 1843-1913 Phillip L. Rogers $1864-1943$

Phillip L. Rogers married Ella Pearce and they lived on a farm in Cypress Chapel District. They had no children. However, James G. Rogers, the disabled Civil War vet who was Phillip's twenty-one-years-older halfbrother, made his home with Phillip and Ella at the end of his life, until he died in 1913. James G. Rogers was buried at the Cypress Chapel Christian Church, as were Phillip when he died in 1943 and Ella in 1934.


Mary F Rogers
1846-1920
Charles M. Rogers was a craftsman - a machinist and a wheelwright. He and his wife Mary had 7 children. When Charles died in 1916, he left his widow with the two youngest girls still at home. His elder sister Mary, now the widow Mary F. Harrell, was also living in their home. These four females - Charles' wife, two girls, and his sister went to live with the son James Lowder Rogers in Norfolk. James, who shares a headstone with his parents at Riverside Memorial Park in Norfolk, worked as an "auto machinist" and supported the family.


I found Hardesty's Historical and Geographical Encyclopedia, Special Virginia Edition, published in 1885, in the Suffolk VA public library. The book has an entry for Mills Rogers

Jr. on page 432. Mills Rogers Jr. was Nancy's brother, so his greatgrandfather Mills Rogers "who served in the war of the Revolution," was also Nancy's great-grandfather, hence an direct ancestor of ours. I was not able to find any more documentation for
this Revolutionary soldier ancestor, but further searching at the Library of Virginia in Richmond might confirm his service and qualify Nancy's descendents for the Daughters and Sons of the American Revolution.


MILLS ROGERS, Jr.- is a native of Nansemond county, born June 10, 1835. He is a son of James Rogers, who lives in this county, and Milly (Smith) Rogers, now deceased. His great grandfather, Mills Rogers, served in the war of the Revolution, battling for the independence of the colonies. Hıs own war history is that of so many Virginians of the present day. He enlisted in the defense of Virginia's rights and sovereignty in the first year of the war, and he never missed a roll call, or was absent from the post of duty until severely wounded in the battle at Spotsylvania C. H. He was a member of Company I, 41st Virginia Infantry, and served till the disbanding of the regiment. The first wife of Mills Rogers was Ellen Duke, and they had three children, of whom one now survives, W. R. Rogers, born in 1861. In Nansemond county, December 18, 1882, Sarah Eliza Boyt became the wife of Mills Rogers, jr. She was born in Nansemond county, September 19, 1838, a daughter of David and Abausha (Knight) Boyt Her parents are no longer living. Mr. Rogers is one of the farming residents of Chuckatuck district, and his postoffice address is Chuckatuck, Nansemond county, Virginia.


Great Fork Baptist Church Whaleyville, Virginia

There was a stained glass window in memory of Nancy Jane and her father James Rogers placed in the Great Fork Baptist Church circa 1911. Along with the other stained glass in the church, it was restored in 2013 The restoration of the Voight Window was sponsored "In Memory of Wallace L. Hobbs Sponsored by Estelle Hobbs, Susan H., James N., Virginia B. \& Meredith P. Burroughs."
